TO BREED BEARING HORSES.

Young horses are sometimes given to

the bad habit. One who has had some

experience with these says to use a mar-

OPEN SHEDS FOR SHADING CATTLE.

There are many who now incline to

the belief that open sheds are better for

shading cattle than pastures are trees.

The advantage of the shed is that it may

be a permanent fixture but that need not

be constructed in such a way as to make it

possible to shift it to the different fields

scattered down to pasture in any given

season. Where permanent pastures are

found on the farm, trees are appropriate

and profitable, but where the pasture

land is in its turn to be broken up and

cultivated to cereals or corn, trees are a

positive nuisance. It would seem that

even in a permanent pasture an open

shed furnished with drinking-troughs and

feed-boxes is preferable to a clump of

trees located, as often is the case, in a

boggy slough. In the latter instance

the water becomes foul from the droppings

of the stock and the puddling of the

mud by their feet. Place the shed

where the wind can pass through it from

all sides, furnish pure water from a

windmill and tank, and the best condi-

tions are supplied for summering cattle

on grass. —Farmers' Review.
