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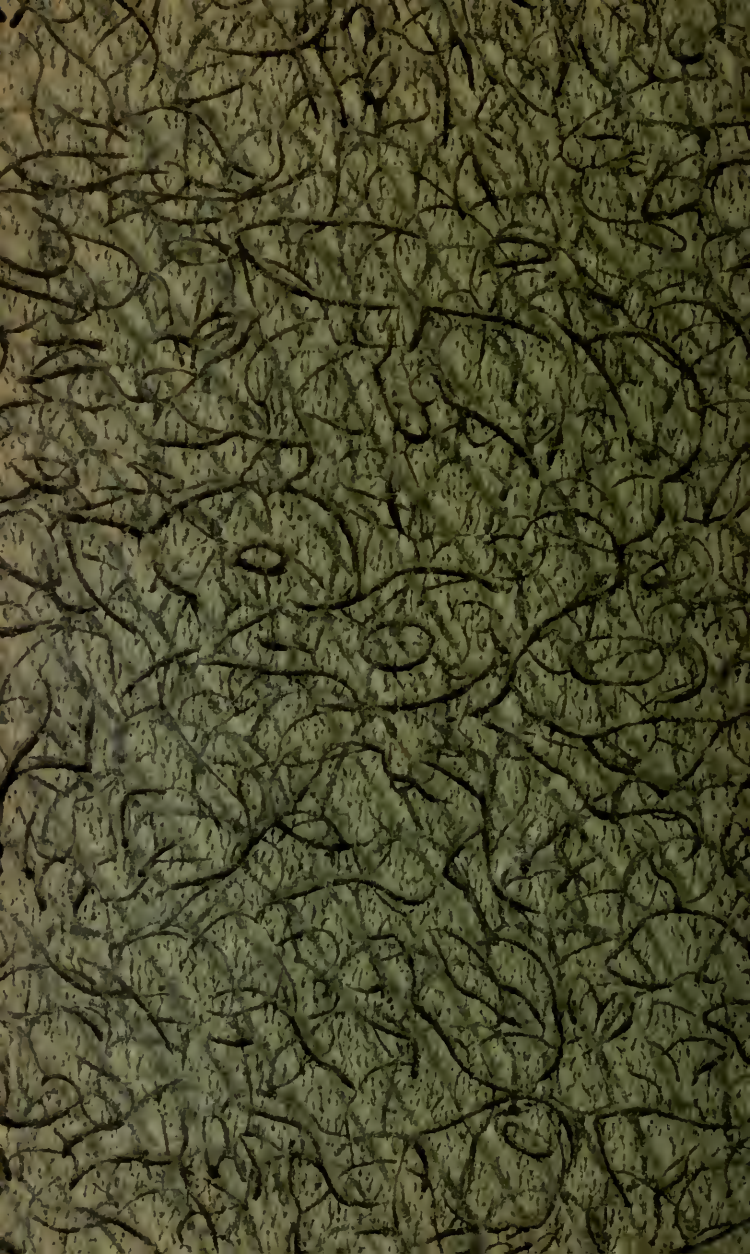
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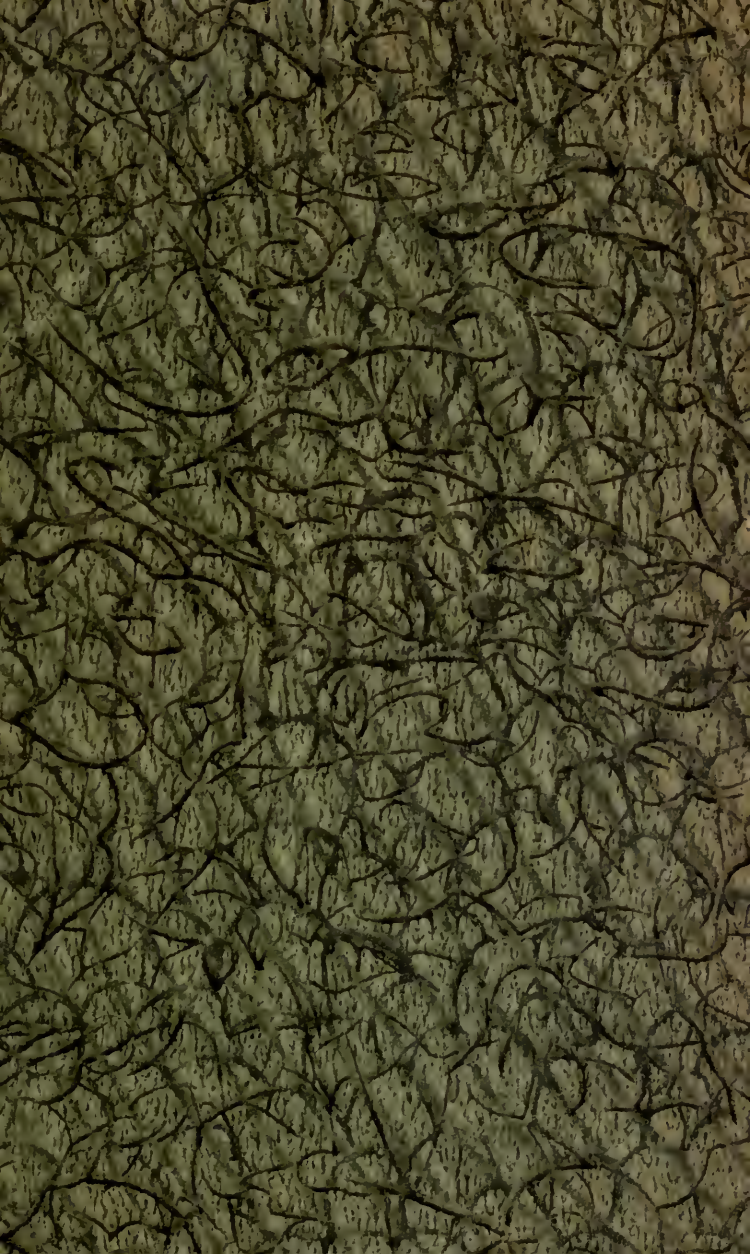

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## PREFACE.

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THIS volume is primarily intended to supply a working and practical knowledge of the Persian language, for the benefit of those who have not the time or the inclination to master the grammar, and yet require to use the spoken tongue for purposes of business or pleasure. With this object in view it supplies many vocabularies of words carefully selected to suit the needs of those holding communication with Persia and the Persians, classified according to subject, and a large number of colloquial phrases and sentences of a practical character, similarly classified. Throughout these sections of the volume the Persian words are given in the romanized form, and the English phonetic pronunciation is added (in the third column) in accordance with Marlborough's system of phonetics—for which, of course, the Publishers alone are responsible—a system which has grown out of long experience, and is of so simple a nature that, by means of it, a stranger to the language, who knows English only, can read off the words at a glance, and thus easily make himself understood amongst Persian-speaking people. An outline of the Grammar is added for the use of students of the language.

The work thus forms a useful and valuable handbook of Persian for tourists and travellers, commercial men, naval and military officers, students and others. We may add that the Persian language is very sweet, and compared with other languages is easy to master. It has a complete literature of its own. It is not spoken in Persia alone, but in Afghanistan and many parts of India, and is the official language of some of the courts of that country. It is also used in Turkish Arabia (Baghdad), and by educated people in Russian Turkestan.

The study of Persian is almost essential to one who wishes to learn Hindūstānī and modern Turkish, as the former of these contains about 40 per cent. and the latter about 25 per cent. of Persian words.

# PERSIAN SELF-TAUGHT.

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## THE ALPHABET.

THE Persi-Arabic letters at first sight appear very bewildering to Europeans, and are a frequent cause of stumbling to many who would find a knowledge of the language of immense importance to them. It is to meet this difficulty that the Romanized characters have been adopted in this work.

Students who desire to study the wonderful literature of the East at first hand, must, however, overcome this initial difficulty, and to do this the best plan is to copy each letter repeatedly, and with care, until it is fixed in the memory, only two or three being dealt with at a time, and not the whole alphabet. In this way one is surprised how soon the characters in their various positions become familiarized to the mind.

Having mastered the alphabet, the words given in the vocabularies should next be learned, pronouncing the phonetic aloud, and writing the word from memory in the Persi-Arabic letters, which can then be corrected by reference to the following tables. In this way the rudiments of the language will be easily acquired.

The letters and sentences are written and read from *right to left*, as in all the Semitic languages—the Persi-Arabic being one of these—although it should always be borne in mind that the Persian language proper is not of Semitic origin, but is akin to the old Sanskrit.

## REMARKS ON THE ALPHABET.

The Persian alphabet contains no vowels, properly so called. The short vowel-sounds are indicated by (˘) *zabarr*, (◌) *zeerr*, (ˆ) *pīsh*. The first is a short (*a*) as in *at*; the second (*zeerr*) short (*e*) as in *effort*; the third (*pīsh*) gives the short (*u*) sound something like the sound of *ou* in *should*, or of *u* in the French *plume* pronounced short: ex. مَ، مِ، مُ, pronounced respectively *ma*, *me*, *meu*. When the long vowel-sound *ā*, as in *art*, occurs at the beginning of a word it is indicated by the sign (◌) *madd*, placed over *ā* as in اَدم *ādam*, اَمد *āmad*, but elsewhere in a word it is indicated simply by *ā* as in شاد *shād* (*glad*). There is no sign in Persian for the vowel (*o*) as in *no'e*, but (*a*) with (˘) *zabarr*, followed by (*v*) is pronounced as (*o*): ex. اودر *oder* (*paternal uncle*), اورنگ *orang* (*throne*).

ي (*y*) following any letter with (◌) *zeerr*, is pronounced as long *ī*, i. e. as double *ee* in *sheep*: ex. ايران *eerān* (*Persia*), ديشب *deeshab* (*last night*). There are two other signs, namely (◌) *djasm*, and (◌) *tashdeed*. The first of these is placed over any letter which is followed by no vowel-sound, as over *f* in رفتن *raftan* (*to go*); the second doubles the letter over which it is placed, as over *q* in نقاش *naq-qāsh* (*artist*). These vowel-signs are in fact never used in Persian writing, but their omission causes no ambiguity, as any doubtful word is determined by the context.

## PRELIMINARY NOTES.

**Persian equivalents.**—It is necessary to point out that in the third part of the book, “Conversational Phrases and Sentences,” the Persian *equivalents* of the English phrases are given in the second column, and not merely a translation of the English words. How different the equivalent and the literal translation may be is shown by the few instances where both are given. (See p. 65.)

**Pronunciation.**—The student will do well to master the pronunciation at the outset. The use and value of each phonetic sign adopted are shown on page 11, and should be carefully noted.

Marlborough’s system of phonetics is based on the principle of **one sign, one sound**, and conversely, one sound, one sign. The particular use of each English letter in representing the sounds of the Persian characters should be learnt, and each must always be pronounced in the same manner (one sign, one sound).

To facilitate the correct pronunciation of the short vowels, the words in the vocabularies have, to a great extent, been divided up by hyphens, but these divisions do not always correspond with the true syllables; e.g., *sadum*, pronunciation written “sad-eum” (properly “sa-deum”); *negāh*, pronunciation written “neg-āh” (for “ne-gāh”).

In such words as “daste man,” where the letter *e* stands for Izāfat, it will be noticed that it is represented by *i* in the third column (*dast-i-man*) to remind the reader that it is Izāfat. Where *e* does not stand for the Izāfat it is denoted by “e” in the the third column also.

The conjunction *va* (and) in such words as *dast va pā* (hand and foot), *rooz va shah* (day and night), is pronounced *eu* in conversation, like the French *e* in *plume*; (*dasteu-pā*, *roozeu-shah*).

In all questions the interrogative (*āyā*) is inserted. In conversation, however, it is often omitted, the question being inferred from the inflexion of the voice.

# OUTLINE OF PERSIAN GRAMMAR.

## THE NOUN.

All nouns in Persian are of one gender. They form their plural by adding ان *ān* or ها *hā*, the former for persons, the latter for things.

### EXAMPLES.

مرد *mard*, man.

مردان *mardān*, men.

کتاب *ketāb*, book.

کتاب ها *ketāb-hā*, books.

But ها *hā* is now generally used for both classes.

The accusative is formed by adding را *rā* to the singular or plural.

### EXAMPLES.

قلم *qalam*, pen.

قلم را *qalam rā*, pen.

قلم ها *qalam hā*, pens.

قلم ها را *qalam hā rā*, pens.

This termination has also the force of the definite article.

### EXAMPLES.

باغ را دیدم *bāgh rā dīdam*, I saw the garden.

باغ دیدم *bāgh dīdam*, I saw a garden.

In the singular the indefinite article is indicated by the ending ی *ī*, pronounced *ē*.

### EXAMPLES.

اسبی *asbī*, a horse.

اسب سفید *sefīd asbī*, a white horse.

But when the adjective follows the noun ی is attached to it also.

### EXAMPLE.

اسب سفیدی *asb-i-sefīdī*, a white horse.

## THE IZĀFAT (denotes possession).

The *izāfat* signifies possession ; it is denoted by the sign (ـ) *zīr* and is used in the following three ways :—

1. The genitive is formed by adding the *izāfat* to the governing noun, which usually precedes the governed noun.

## EXAMPLES.

کلیدِ در *kalīd-i-dar*, the key of the door.

درختِ خرما *derakht-i-khurmā*, the tree of the date.

But when the word ends in a vowel or *v*<sup>1</sup> semi-vowel, it takes the form *ی* pronounced *yi*.

## EXAMPLES.

خدایِ جهان *khudā-yi-jehān*, the God of the world.

رویِ دریا *roo-yi-daryā*, the surface of the sea.

2. When several adjectives form attributes to the same noun they are connected by the *izāfat* or by the conjunction *وَ* *va*.

## EXAMPLES.

درختِ گلِ سرخِ خوبی *derakht-i-gul-i-surkh-i-khoobī*, a good red rose tree.

درختِ گلِ سرخِ وَ خوبی *derakht-i-gul-i-surkh va khoobī*, a good red rose tree.

3. Personal pronouns are connected with nouns by the *izāfat*, thus forming possessive pronouns.

## EXAMPLES.

دستِ من *dast-i-man*, my hand.

پایِ شما *pāy-i-shumā*, your foot.

<sup>1</sup> When (ʾ) *pīsh* is followed by *v*, it is pronounced as *oo* in *good*.

## ADJECTIVES.

Adjectives usually follow nouns, and in this case are connected with them by the *izāfat*.

## EXAMPLES.

کتابِ عربی *ketāb-i-arabī*, the Arabic book.

کاغذِ انگلیسی *kāghaz-i-engelīsī*, the English paper.

The termination *را* *rā* for the accusative is added to the adjective only.

## EXAMPLE.

کتابِ عربی را خریدم *ketāb-i-arabī rā kharīdam*, I bought an Arabic book.

But if there are several adjectives *را* *rā* is only added to the last.

## EXAMPLE.

کتابِ بزرگِ خوشخطِ عربی را خریدم *ketāb-i-buzurg-i-khushkhatt-i-arabī rā kharīdam*, I bought a large well-written Arabic book.

A few adjectives sometimes precede the noun, to which is then generally added the indefinite article *ی* (*y*), and the *izāfat* is mostly omitted.

## EXAMPLES.

خوب مردی *khoob mardī*, a good man.

بد شهری *bad shahrī*, a bad town.

Adjectives often precede nouns, forming compounds.

## EXAMPLES.

بد خلق *bad khulq*, of bad temper.

خوش رنگ *khush rang*, of fine colour.

The degrees of comparison are formed by adding the terminations *تر tar* for the comparative, and *ترین tarīn* for the superlative.

## EXAMPLES.

*بزرگ buzurg*, large.                      *بزرگ تر buzurgtar*, larger.  
*بزرگ ترین buzurgtarīn*, largest.            *بهترین behtarīn*, best.

*Than* is expressed by *از az*.

## EXAMPLE.

*جوان تر از همه djavāntar az hama*, younger than all.

The superlative construction, as in English, is with the genitive.

## PERSONAL PRONOUNS.

*من man*, I.                                      *ما mā*, we.  
*تو tu*, thou.                                    *شما shumā*, you.  
*او ā*, he, she, it.                            *ایشان īshān*, they.

*تو* is used when speaking to inferiors in rank or age, otherwise *شما*, as *you* in English.

The personal pronouns are declined as nouns except that the accusative of *من man* (I) is *ما marā* instead of *را man rā*.

## POSSESSIVE PRONOUNS.

These are either the same as the personal pronouns or the following shorter forms can be used, as also for the accusative of the personal pronouns :—

1st pers. *ام am*, my, me.                      *مان mān*, our, us.  
 2nd „ *ات at*, thy, thee,                      *تان tān*, your, you.  
 3rd „ *اش ash*, his, hers, its, him.            *شان shān*, their, them.

## EXAMPLE.

*دست من dast-i-man*, } my hand.  
*دستم dastam*, . }



The short form of possessive pronoun added to the word preceding the verb has the force of the accusative of the corresponding personal pronoun.

## EXAMPLES.

ولش کن	<i>vīl-ash kun,</i>	}	let him go.
اورا ول کن	<i>ū-rā vīl kun,</i>		
می بینمت	<i>mībīnam-at,</i>	}	I see you.
تو را می بینم	<i>tu-rā-mībīnam,</i>		

The accusative of possessive pronouns is formed as in nouns by the addition را *rā*.

## EXAMPLE.

دست من را	<i>dast-i-man rā,</i>	}	my hand.
دستم را	<i>dast-am-rā,</i>		

To form the plural ها *hā* is added to the nouns.

## EXAMPLE.

شمشیر های من	<i>shamshūr-hā-yi man,</i>	}	my swords.
شمشیر هام	<i>shamshūr-hā-m,</i>		

The possessive case is often denoted by مال *māl* (property).

## EXAMPLES.

این خانه مال من است *īn khāna māl-i-man ast*, this house is mine.  
 آن باغ مال شماست *ān bāgh māl-i-shumāst*, that garden is yours.

The six reflexive pronouns are :

خودم <i>khudam</i> , myself.	خودمان <i>khudimān</i> , ourselves.
خودت <i>khudat</i> , thyself.	خودتان <i>khuditān</i> , yourselves.
خودش <i>khudash</i> , himself, her- self, itself.	خودشان <i>khudishān</i> , themselves.

N. B. Personal and possessive pronouns must be replaced by reflexive when they refer to the same subject.

## EXAMPLES.

من خودمرا میشویم *man khudamrā mīshūyam*, I wash myself  
(من مرا میشویم).

من پدر خودمرا دیدم *man padar-i-khudamrā dīdam*, I saw my  
father (من پدرم را دیدم).

The following are demonstrative pronouns, declined as nouns :

این *īn*, this.

آن *ān*, that.

همین *hamīn*, this same one.

همان *hamān*, that same one.

همچنین — چنین *chunīn*, *hamchunīn*, such a one as this.

همچنان — چنان *chunān*, *hamchunān*, such a one as that.

همچو *hamchu*, so, such.

چندان — چندی *chandīn*, *chandān*, so much.

## RELATIVE PRONOUNS.

که *ki*, who, that, accusative اورا . . . . که *chi*, which, *ki* . . . .  
*ūrā*, or اش . . . . که *ki* . . . . *ash*.

## EXAMPLES.

مرد که سرش را شکسته بودند *mard ki sarashrā shikasta būdand*,  
the man whose head they had  
broken.

کالسکه که چرخش را ساختند *kāliska ki charkhashrā sākhtand*,  
the carriage, the wheel of which  
they made.

The relative pronouns که *ki* and چه *chi* are often connected  
with the demonstrative pronouns.

## EXAMPLES.

این که پول دارد *īn ki pūl dārad*, this one who has money.

آن که فقیراست *ān ki faqīrast*, that one who is poor.

When a noun is followed by a relative sentence defining it, a *ی* *yi* is added to the noun.

## EXAMPLES.

مردی که *mardī ki*, the man who . . . . .  
 پسر *ی* که *pisarī rā ki*, the boy who . . . . (accusative).

## INTERROGATIVE PRONOUNS.

These are the same as the relative pronouns: *که* *ki*, who; *چه* *chī*, what.

## EXAMPLES.

که آمد *ki āmad*, who came?  
 چه خوردید *chī khurdīd*, what did you eat?

## THE VERB.

In the Persian verb there is only one conjugation.

All verbs are formed from two principal parts, the infinitive and imperative. To these the same terminations are added for all verbs.

1. The auxiliary verb بودن *būdan*, to be, has infinitive بودن *būdan*: imperative باش *bāsh*; but some tenses are derived from the radical هستن *hastan*, and in this respect are slightly irregular.

INFINITIVE بودن *būdan*, TO BE.

*Indicative (weaker form).*

*Present.*

ام <i>am</i> , I am.	ایم <i>īm</i> , we are.
ای <i>ī</i> , thou art.	اید <i>īd</i> , you are.
است <i>ast</i> , he, she, it is.	اند <i>and</i> , they are.

*Present (stronger form).*

هستم <i>hastam</i> , I am.	هستیم <i>hastīm</i> , we are.
هستی <i>hastī</i> , thou art.	هستید <i>hastīd</i> , you are.
هست <i>hast</i> , he, she, it is.	هستند <i>hastand</i> , they are.

*Present negative.*

نیستم <i>nīstam</i> , I am not.	نیستی <i>nīstī</i> , thou art not, &c.
---------------------------------	--

## Preterite.

بودم *būdam*, I was. بودیم *būdīm*, we were.  
بودی *būdī*, thou wast. بودید *būdīd*, you were.  
بود *būd*, he, she, it was. بودند *būdand*, they were.

## Imperfect.

می‌بودم *mībūdām*, I used to be, &c.

## Perfect.

بوده‌ام *būda am*, I have been. بوده‌ایم *būda īm*, we have been.  
بوده‌ای *būda ē*, thou hast been. بوده‌اید *būda īd*, you have been.  
بوده‌است *būda ast*, he has been. بوده‌اند *būda and*, they have been.

## Pluperfect.

بوده‌بودم *būda būdam*, I had been, &c.

## Future.

Future formed with the auxiliary verb خواستن *khāstan*, and the shortened infinitive بود *būd*.

خواهم بود *khāham būd*, I shall be. خواهیم بود *khāhīm būd*, we shall be.  
خواهی بود *khāhī būd*, thou wilt be. خواهید بود *khāhīd būd*, you will be.  
خواهد بود *khāhad būd*, he will be. خواهند بود *khāhand būd*, they will be.

## Infinitive.

بودن *būdan*, }  
هستن *hastan*, } to be.

## Past Participle.

بوده *būda*, been.

## Imperative.

باش *bāsh*! be! (thou), for the other persons subjunctive present is used, so for all verbs.

*Subjunctive present.*

باشم *bāsham*, I may be.      باشیم *bāshīm*, we may be.  
 باشی *bāshī*, thou mayest be.      باشید *bāshīd*, you may be.  
 باشد *bāshad*, he may be.      باشند *bāshand*, they may be.

*Imperfect.*

میباشم *mībāsham*, I might be, &c.

For the pluperfect بودم *būdam*, میبودم *mībūdam*, بوده باشم *būda bāsham*, may be used.

باد *bād*, may he, she, or it be, is used as optative to express a wish: ex. عمرت دراز باد *umrat dirāz bād*, may your life be long.

2. The auxiliary verb شدن *shudan*, to become, is regular, and therefore forms its present indicative and subjunctive from the imperative شو *sho*, but the other tenses from shortened infinitive شد *shud*. The final *v* in شو *sho* is pronounced as *v* before a vowel: ex. شوم *shavam*.

## INDICATIVE.

*Present.*

میشوم *mīshavam*, I become, &c.

*Preterite.*

شدم *shudam*, I became, &c.

*Imperfect.*

میشدم *mīshudam*, I became, &c.

*Perfect.*

آم شده *shuda am*, I have become, &c.

*Pluperfect.*

بودم شده *shuda būdam*, I had become, &c.

*Future.*

خواهم شد *khāham shud*, I shall become, &c.

## INFINITIVE.

شدن *shudan*, to become.



*Present Participle.*

شونده *shavanda*, becoming (very seldom used).

*Past Participle.*

شده *shuda*, become.

## GERUND.

شدنی *shudanī*, what ought to become.

*Subjunctive present.*

شوم *shavam*, I may become, &c.

Imperfect and pluperfect the same as in the indicative, and so for all verbs.

## 3. THE REGULAR VERB.

All infinitives end in دن *dan*, or تن *tan*.

To conjugate a verb we must know its infinitive and imperative. The imperative of verb whose infinitives end in یدن *īdan* are formed by cutting off this termination: ex. بخشیدن *bakhsh-īdan*, to present; imperative بخش *bakhsh*, present.

From the imperative are formed:—

(1) The present indicative by prefixing می *mī* and adding the termination ام *am*, ی *y*, د *d*, &c.: می بخشم *mī-bakhsh-am*.

(2) The present subjunctive by prefixing بی *bi*, as بی بخشم *bi-bakhsh-am*.

All other tenses are formed from the shortened infinitive بخشید *bakhshīd*.

## PARADIGM OF THE REGULAR VERB

*Active voice.*

*Infinitive* گرفتن *giriftan*, to take, to seize.

<sup>1</sup>*Imperative* بگیر *gīr*! take!

<sup>1</sup> In colloquial Persian it is usual to prefix ب *b* before the imperative, as بگیر *bigīr*, &c.

*Indicative present.*میگیرم *mīgīram*, I take, &c.*Preterite.*گرفتم *giriftam*, I took, &c.*Imperfect.*میگرفتم *mīgiriftam*, I took or I used to take, &c.*Perfect.*گرفته ام *girifta-am*, I have taken, &c.*Pluperfect.*بودم گرفته *girifta būdam*, I had taken, &c.*Future.*خواهم گرفت *khāham girift*, I shall take, &c.*Infinitive.*گرفتن *giriftan*, to take.*Present Participle.*گیرنده *gīranda*, one who is taking.*Past Participle.*گرفته *girifta*, taken.

## GERUND.

گرفتنی *giriftanī*, what must be taken.

## PREPOSITIONS.

Space will not allow us to give in detail this part of Persian grammar, but the following list gives a few of the most important:—

در *dār*, at.در کلیسا *dār kilīsā*, at the church.تو *tū*, in.توی اتاق *tuyī utāq*, in (into) the room.به *bi*, to.به همه کس *bi hama kas*, to everybody.رو *rū*, on.روی میز *rūyi mīz*, on (at) the table.

## ADVERBS.

There are no adverbs properly so called in Persian. Their place is taken by nouns, with or without prepositions, or by adjectives.

## EXAMPLES.

بی سبب *bī sabab*, without reason.

بخوبی *bi khūbī*, well.

آسودگی *āsūdagī*, safely.

Arabic adverbs with terminations *ā an*, are also used.

## EXAMPLES.

تخمیناً *takhmīnan*, approximately.

یقیناً *yaqīnan*, certainly.

غالباً *ghālīban*, mostly.

## PERSIAN HANDWRITING.

At first sight there appears perhaps little or no difference between the written and printed characters of the Persi-Arabic alphabet. There is a certain amount of variation, however, and if the student will carefully examine the illustration of Persian penmanship, given on the following page, he will readily perceive the points of difference. He should particularly note—

1. In manuscript the usual signs of *tashdeed* (°) and *djazm* (°) are generally omitted.

2. The combined form of the letter ه is generally written thus: initial ه instead of ه, هر, هم as هر, هم; medial ه instead of ه, بهار نهادن as بهار نهادن; final ه instead of ه, خانه as کله خانه.

With these exceptions the letters are written very much the same as in the printed characters. In the Shikastah or cursive hand many peculiar forms and combinations of letters occur which can only be learnt by practice. Letters which should not be connected with a following letter are ا د ذ ر ز و; they are generally written combined in Shikastah only, and the dots distinguishing the various letters are frequently omitted.

Copper coins are known as *pool-i-seyāh*, i.e., black money, and silver coins as *pool-i-sefeed*, white money.

The standard is silver and fluctuates considerably.

THE RATE OF EXCHANGE.—The English sovereign is usually exchanged for about 50 *qerān* or 5 *toomān*. It is on this basis that the table on page 96 is calculated.

  - About 3 *mesqāl* (about ½ oz.) costs 13 *shāhee* (about 3¼ d.)
- For FOREIGN Post-cards ... 6 „ (about 1½ d.)

TELEGRAMS (INTERNAL).

- For 10 words, including address, 2½ *qerān* (about 1s.)
- For every additional 10 words or less than 10, 2 *qerān* (about 9d.)



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
