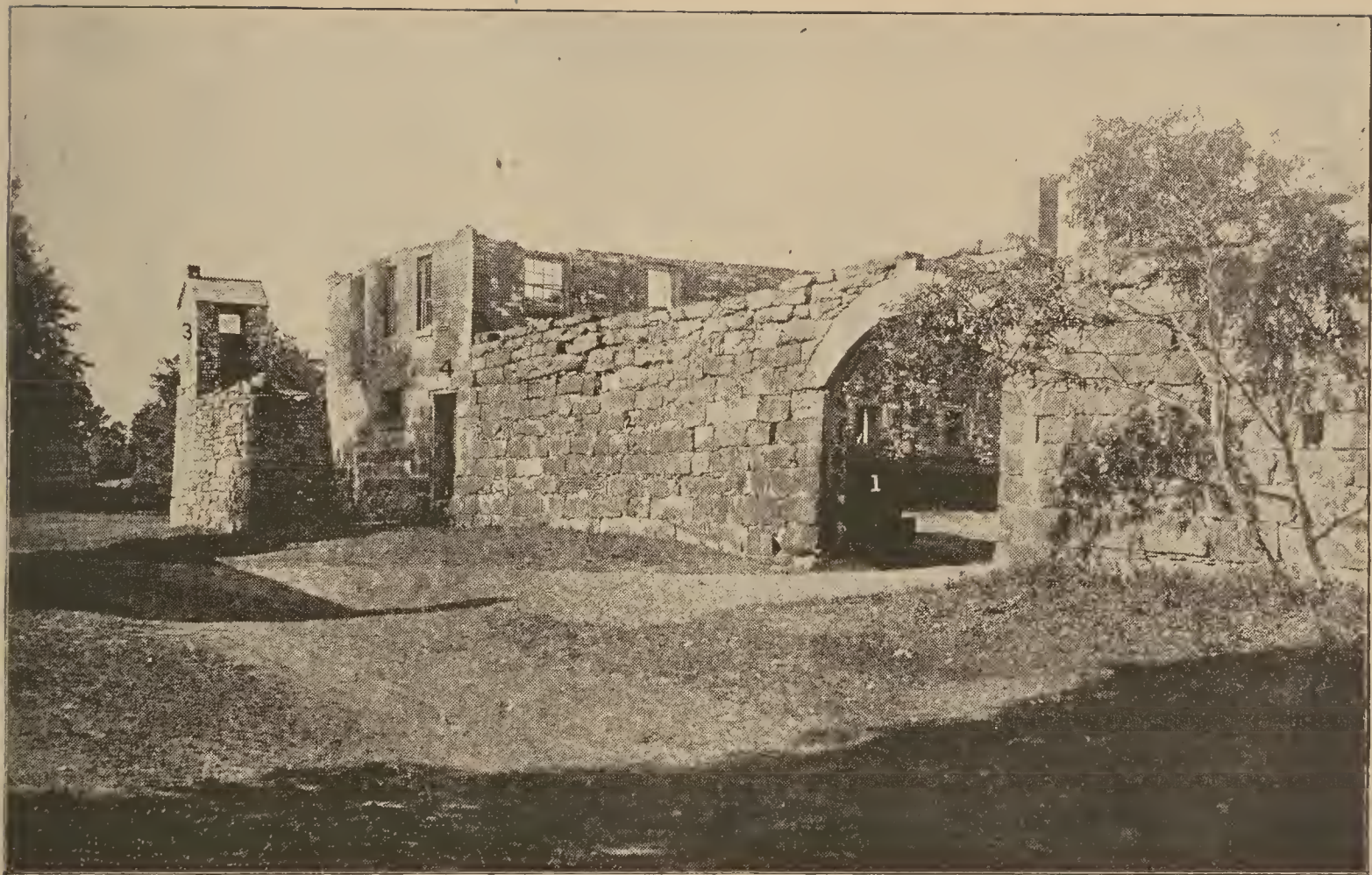

Showing the Gateway, with Keystone bearing the name "Newgate Prison," taken from the Newgate of London, and the date 1802, when the wall was completed.



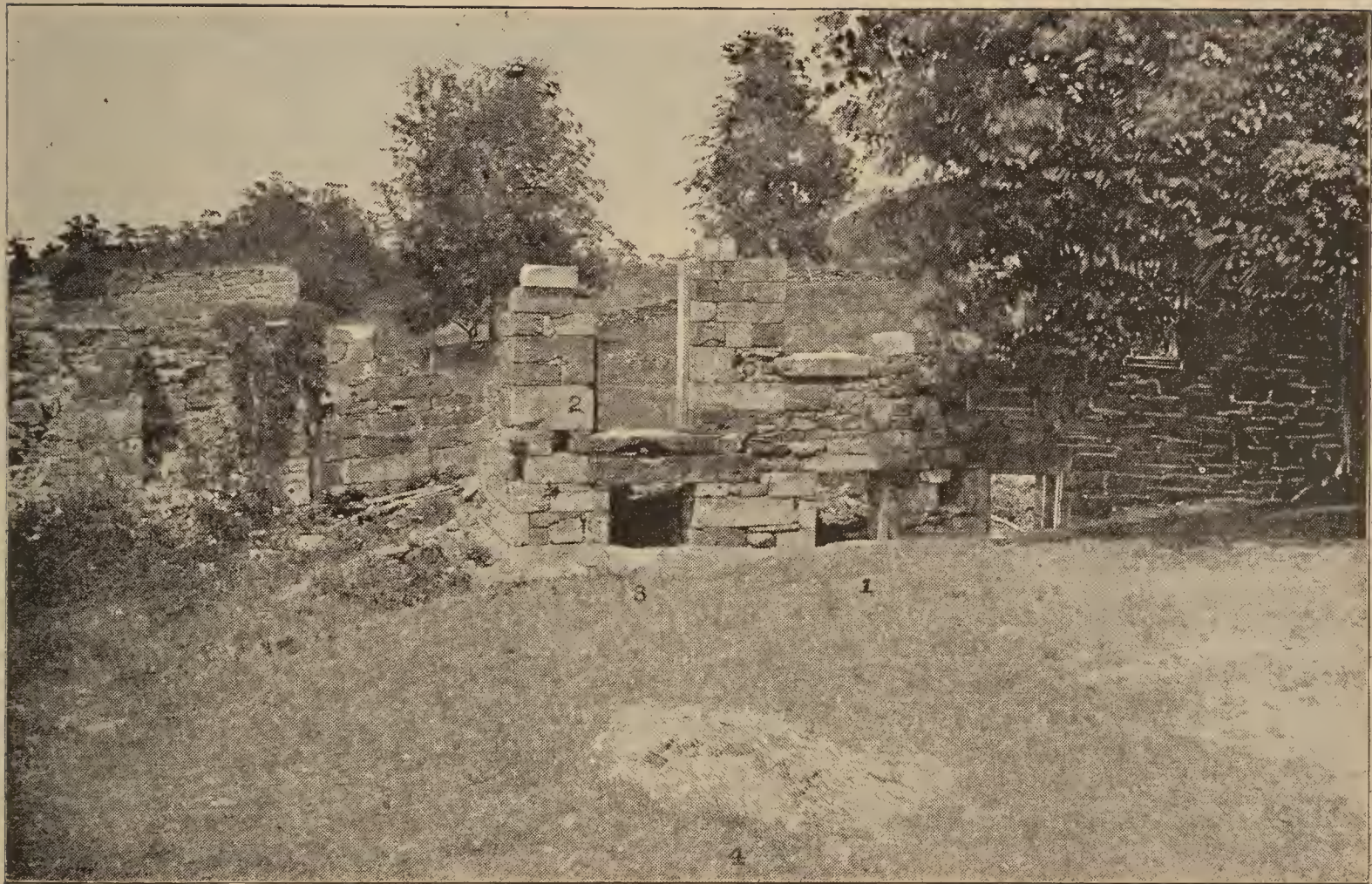
Seventy-foot Shaft, (1); Front wall, (2); Sentry, (3); Chapel, (4).



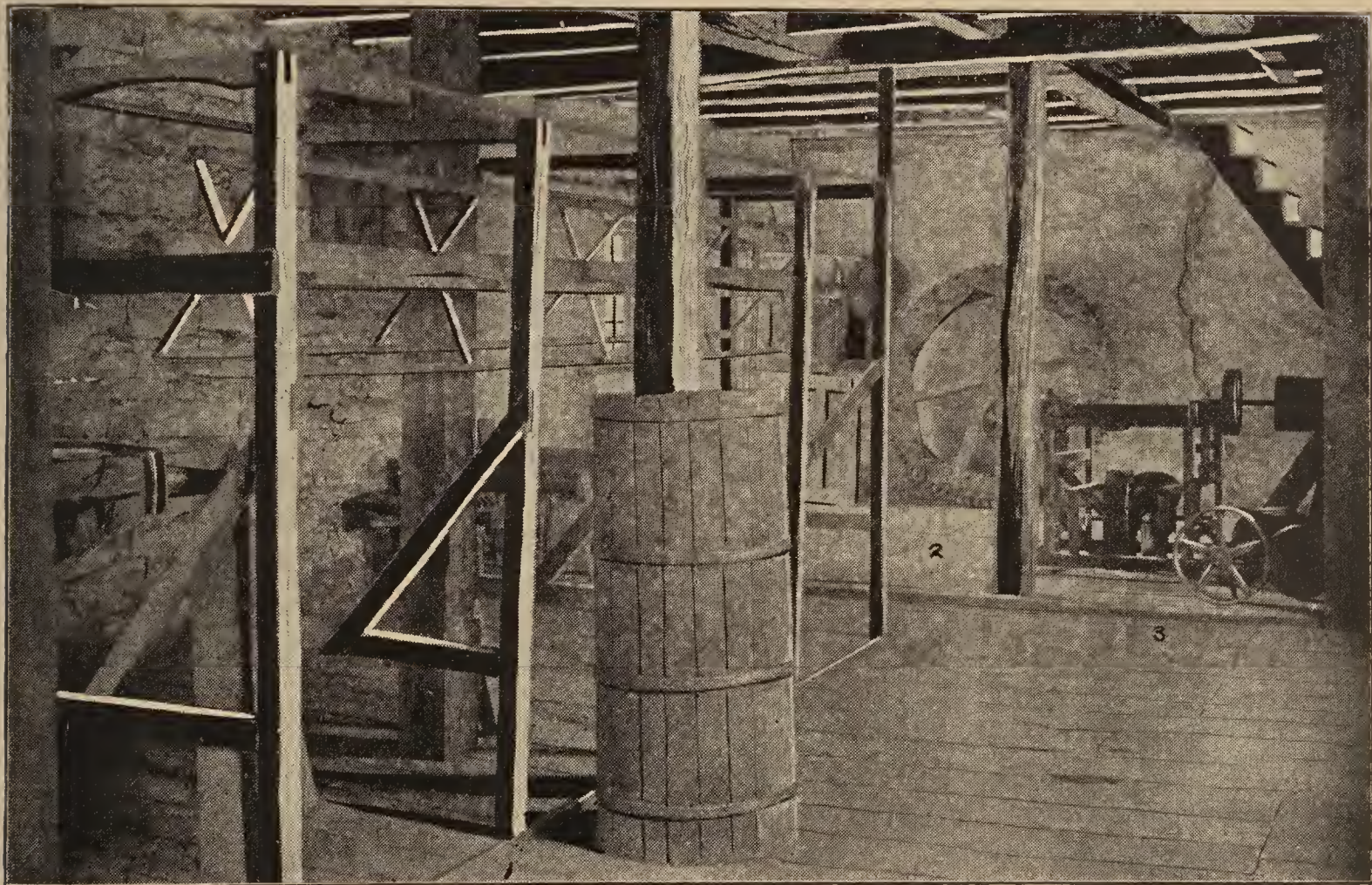
Interior of Yard, (1); Workshop, (2); Shoe Shop, (3); Hospital Rooms

Section of Blacksmith, Wheelwright, Nail and Cabinet Shops Nail shop (1) where the prisoners, after making false Keys from the pewter buttons on their clothes, at a given signal unlocked their fetters. They marched through the Doorway (2), over the Bridge (3), and attacked the Guard by the Rock (4), where the leader was shot by one of the Keepers.



Interior of Treadmill Room, showing Bolt, (1); Main Gear, (2); Screen, (3); and other parts of mill.



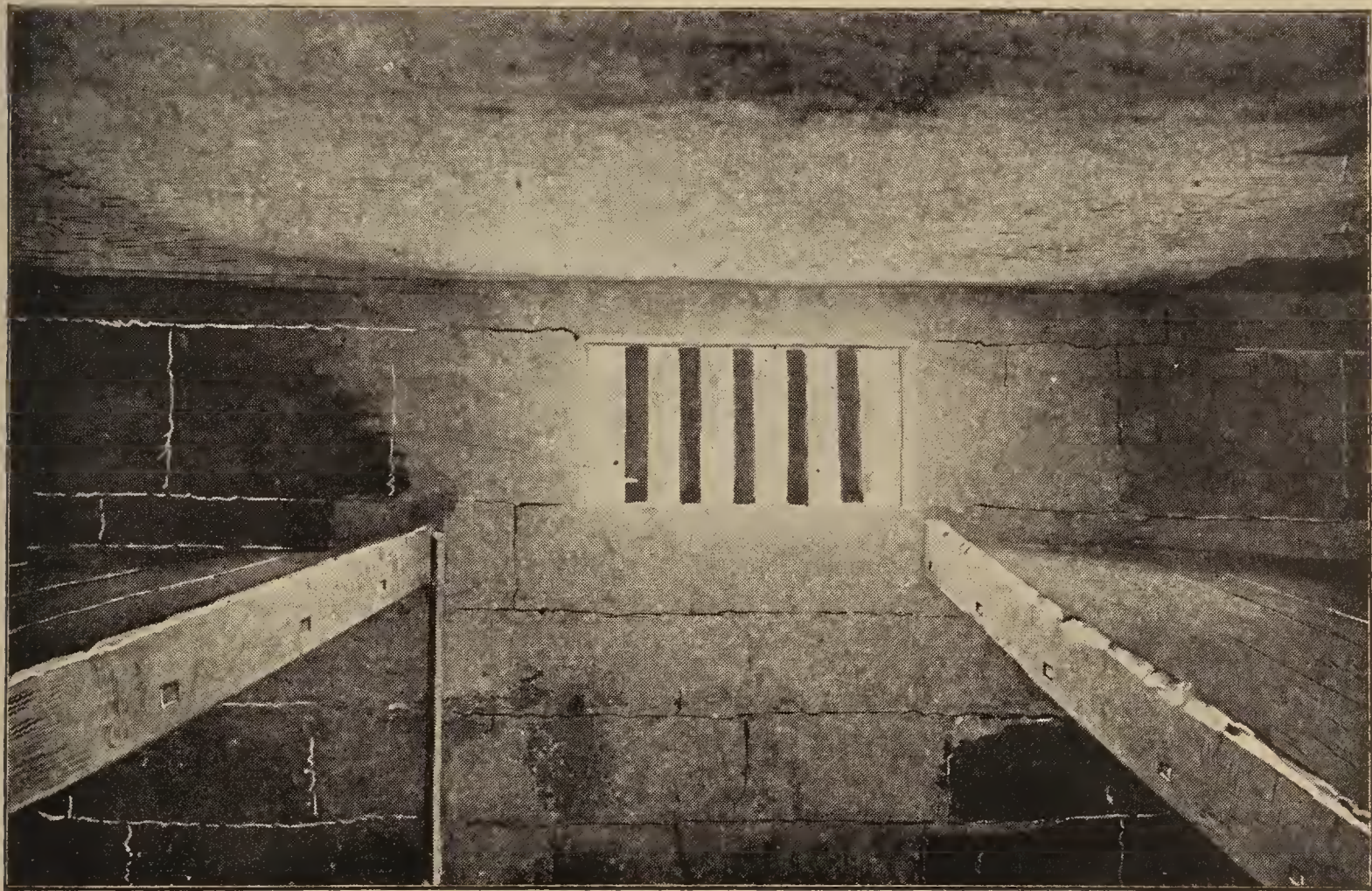

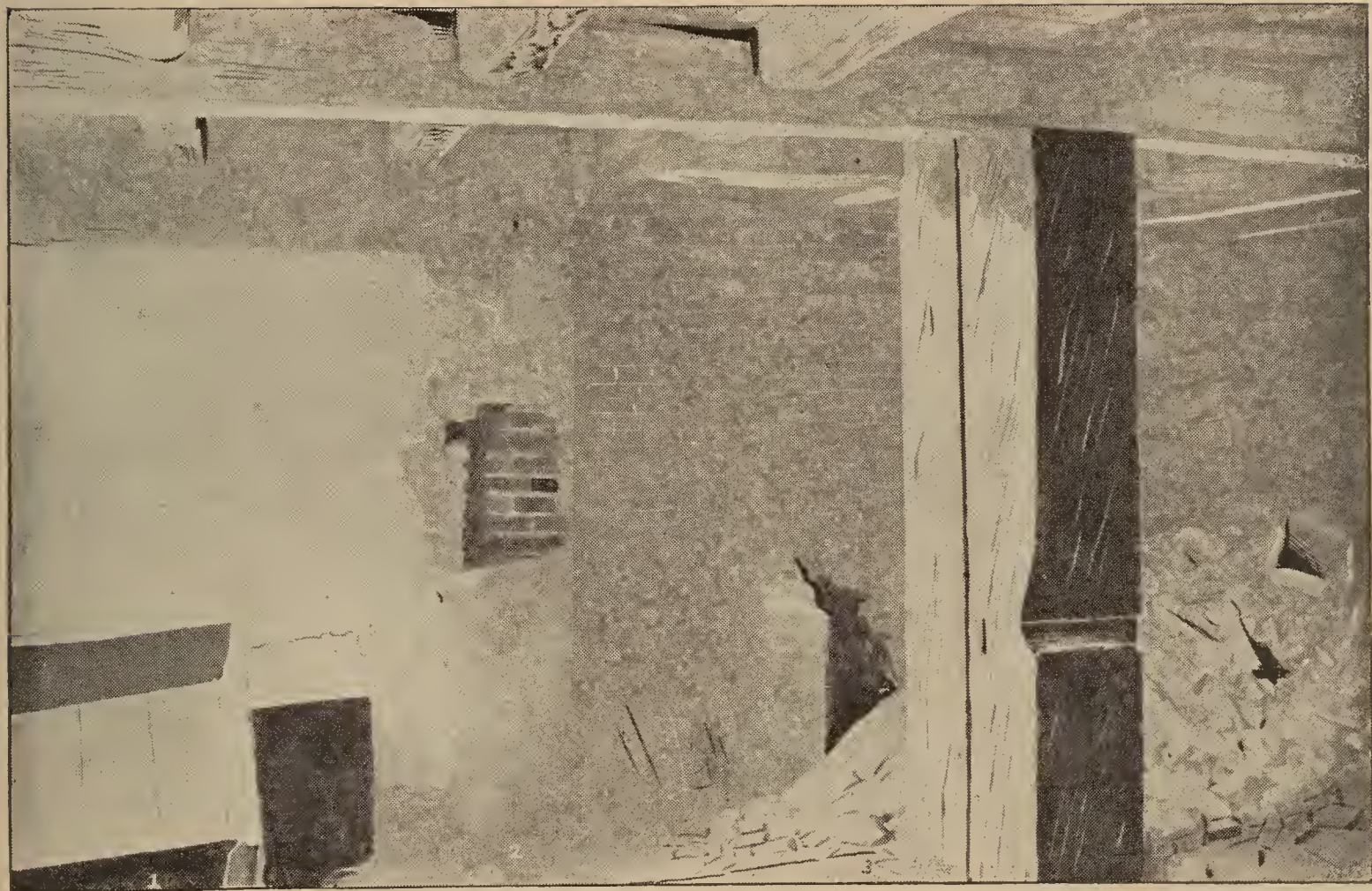
