THE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF CANADA

SCHREYER, THE RIGHT HONOURABLE EDWARD RICHARD, C.C., C.M.M., C.D. Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Canada since 22nd January 1979. Chancellor and Principal Companion of the Order of Canada. Chancellor and Commander of the Order of the Military Merit, Edward Richard Schreyer was born at Beauséjour, Manitoba, on 21 December 1935. He is the son of John and Elizabeth Schreyer who were members of a pioneer farm family in the district. After elementary and secondary schooling at Beauséjour he studied in Winnipeg at United College, St. John's College and the University of Manitoba, earning the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Education and Master of Arts (international relations and economics). While at university he served for two years (1954-6) as second lieutenant in the Canadian Officer Training Corps, Royal Canadian Armoured Corps. Mr. Schreyer was first elected to the Manitoba Legislative Assembly in the General election of 1958, at the age of twenty-two and was returned in the general elections of 1959 and 1962. From 1962 to 1965 he was Professor of Political Science and International Relations at St. Paul's College, University of Manitoba. Following the federal general election of 1965 he entered the House of Commons as Member of Parliament for Springfield. He was re-elected in the general election of 1968 as M.P. for Selkirk. On 8 June 1969 he was chosen Leader of the New Democratic Party in Manitoba. Three days later he resigned his seat in the House of Commons. In the provincial general election of 25 June he was returned as Member of the Legislative Assembly for Rossmere and became Premier of Manitoba. In the general election of 1973 he was re-elected and commenced a second term as Premier. Though he was re-elected M.L.A. in the general election of 1977, his party lost and he became Leader of

the Opposition in the Manitoba Legislature. Throughout his tenure as Premier of Manitoba, Mr. Schreyer held the portfolio of Minister of Dominion-Provincial Relations. He also served as Minister of Finance from 1972 to 1976 and as Minister charged with the administration of the Hydro Act from 1971 to 1977. In 1975 he was given the Vanier Award as an outstanding Young Canadian of that year. He has been a member of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association and the Interparliamentary Union. On 30 June 1960 he married Lily, daughter of Jacob Schulz who was at one time a Member of Parliament for Springfield, Manitoba. The Schreyers have four children; Lisa, Karmel, Jason and Toban. OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL

Letters Patent constituting the Office of Governor General of Canada effective October 1, 1947.

I. We do hereby constitute, order, and declare that there shall be a Governor General and Commander-in-Chief in and over Canada, and appointments to the Office of Governor General and Commander-in-Chief in and over Canada shall be made by Commission under Our Great Seal of Canada.

II. And We do hereby authorize and empower our Governor General, with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada or of any members thereof or individually, as the case requires, to exercise all powers and authorities lawfully belonging to Us in respect of Canada, and for greater certainty but not so as to restrict the generality of the foregoing to do and execute, in the manner aforesaid, all things that may belong to his office and to the trust We have reposed in him according to the several powers and authorities granted or appointed him by virtue of The British North America Act, 1867 to 1946 and the powers and authorities hereinafter conferred in these Letters Patent and in such Commission as may be issued to him under Our Great Seal of Canada and under such laws as are or may hereinafter be in force in Canada.

III. And We do hereby authorize and empower Our Governor General to keep and use Our Great Seal of Canada for sealing all things whatsoever that may be passed under Our Great Seal of Canada.

IV. And We do further authorize and empower Our Governor General to constitute and appoint, in Our name and on Our behalf, all such Judges, Commissioners, Justices of the Peace, and other necessary Officers (including diplomatic and consular officers) and Ministers of Canada, as may be lawfully constituted or appointed by Us.

V. And We do further authorize and empower Our Governor General, so far as We lawfully may, upon sufficient cause to him appearing to remove from his office, or to suspend from the exercise of the same, any person exercising any office within Canada, under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted, by Us in Our name or under Our authority.

VI. And We do further authorize and empower Our Governor General to exercise all powers lawfully belonging to Us in respect of summoning, proroguing or dissolving the Parliament of Canada.

VII. And whereas by The British North America Acts, 1867 to 1946, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for Us, if We think fit, to authorize Our Governor General to appoint any person or persons, jointly or severally, to be his Deputy or Deputies within any part or parts of Canada, and in that capacity to exercise, during the pleasure of Our Governor General, such of the powers, authorities, and functions of Our Governor General as he may deem it necessary or expedient to assign to such Deputy or Deputies, subject to any limitations or directions from time to time expressed or given by Us: Now We do hereby authorize and empower Our Governor General, subject to such limitations and directions, to appoint any person or persons, jointly or severally, to be his Deputy or Deputies within any part or parts of Canada, and in that capacity to exercise, during his pleasure, such of his powers, functions, and authorities as he may deem it necessary or expedient to assign to him or them: Provided always, that the appointment of such a Deputy or Deputies shall not affect the exercise of any such power, authority or function by Our Governor General in person.

VIII. And We do hereby declare Our pleasure to be that, in the event of the death, incapacity, removal or absence of Our Governor General out of Canada, all and every, the powers and authorities herein granted to him shall until Our further pleasure is signified therein, be vested in Our Chief Justice for the time being of Canada, (hereinafter called Our Chief Justice) or, in the case of the death, incapacity, removal or absence out of Canada of Our Chief Justice, then in the Senior Judge for the time being of the Supreme Court of Canada, then residing in Canada and not being under incapacity; such Chief Justice or Senior Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, while the said powers and authorities are vested in him, to be known as Our Administrator.

Provided always, that the said Senior Judge shall act in the administration of the Government only if and when Our Chief Justice shall not be present within Canada and capable of administering the Government.

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THE DOMINION OF CANADA

Canada occupies the northern half of the North American Continent with the exception of Alaska and Greenland, extending in longitude from Cape Spear, Newfoundland, at $52^{\circ} 37' W.$, to Mount St. Elias, Yukon Territory, at $141^{\circ} W.$, a distance of $88^{\circ} 23'$ or 3,223 miles. In latitude it stretches from Middle Island in Lake Erie, at $41^{\circ} 41' N.$, to the North Pole. The northernmost point of the land is Cape Columbia on Ellesmere Island, at $83^{\circ} 07' N.$, and the straight-line distance from Middle Island to Cape Columbia is 2,875 miles.

In shape, Canada resembles a distorted parallelogram with its four corners making important salients. In the north the salient formed by the Arctic Archipelago, which penetrates deep into the Arctic basin, guards the northern approaches to the Continent from Europe and Asia and makes Canada neighbour to the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics. In the south the salient of peninsular Ontario thrusts far into the heart of the United States. In the east the salient of Labrador and the Island of Newfoundland command the shortest crossings of the North Atlantic Ocean and links Canada geographically with Britain and France. In the west the broad arc of land between Vancouver in southern British Columbia and Whitehorse in Yukon Territory provides the shortest crossings of the North Pacific Ocean between continental North America and the Far East. Canada thus lies at the crossroads of contact with the principal powers and some of the most populous areas of the world.

In size, Canada is the largest country in the Western Hemisphere and the second largest country in the world. Its area of 3,851,809 sq. miles may be compared with that of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, 8,649,512 sq. miles, the United States of America (including Alaska and Hawaii), 3,615,214 sq. miles, and Brazil, 3,286,478 sq. miles. It is more than forty times the size of Britain and eighteen times that of France. The immense size of the country, while encompassing many resources and seeming to afford much scope for settlement, imposes its own burdens and limitations, particularly because much of the land is mountainous and rocky or is under an arctic climate. The developed portion is probably not more than one third of the total; the occupied farm land is less than 8 p.c. and the currently accessible productive forest land 19 p.c. of the total.

The territories which now constitute the Dominion of Canada came under the British flag at various times, some by settlement and others by conquest or cession. Nova Scotia (Acadia) was discovered by the Cabots, in the service of King Henry VII, in 1497. The part of Canada, now forming the Province of Quebec was discovered by Jacques Cartier, in the service of King Francis I of France, in 1534. The colony of Halifax was founded in 1749. By the treaty of Utrecht (1713) Acadia and the Hudson Bay Territory (Hudson Bay was discovered by Henry Hudson in 1610) were acknowledged to be British Territory. The Hudson Bay company's charter, conferring right of government over the territory now known as the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the North-West Territories, was granted in 1670. The old French Colony of Canada was surrendered by the capitulation of Montreal, signed September 8, 1760 and along with the Prince Edward Island, and part of the present Province of New Brunswick, formally ceded to Great Britain by France under the Treaty of Paris, signed Feb. 10, 1763.

Vancouver Island was acknowledged to be British by the Oregon Boundary Treaty of 1846, and British Columbia was occupied in 1858.

As originally constituted, the Dominion of Canada was composed of the provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick. They were united under the provisions of an Act of the Imperial Parliament (30 Victoria, Chapter III) passed in 1867, and commonly cited as "The British North America Act, 1867," although its full official designation originally was: — "An Act for the Union of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the government thereof, and for the purposes connected therewith." This Act received the Royal assent March 29th, 1867, and came into effect by virtue of Royal Proclamation, July 1st, 1867. This Act expressly provides that the Constitution of the Dominion shall be "similar in principle to that of the United Kingdom" (1st clause), so that the executive authority shall be vested in the Sovereign of Great Britain and Ireland, and carried on in her name by a Governor-General and Council "to aid and advise in the government of Canada, to be styled the Queen's Privy Council for Canada." (Clauses 9, 10 and 11). Provision was made in the Act for the Admission of British Columbia, Prince Edward Island,

The North-West Territories, and Newfoundland into the Dominion (Clause 146). Newfoundland entered Confederation, March 31, 1949. In 1869 the extreme region known under the various designations of "Rupert's Land," "the Hudson Bay Territory," and "the North-West Territory," was added to the Dominion by purchase from the Hudson Bay Company. The Province of Manitoba was set apart out of a portion of its (32-33 Victoria, Chap. 3), and admitted into the Confederation, July 15, 1870.

July 20, 1871, the Province of British Columbia, and July 1, 1873, the Province of Prince Edward Island, respectively entered the confederation.

June 25, 1886, the Royal Assent was given to "An Act respecting the representation in the Parliament of Canada of Territories which for the time being form part of the Dominion of Canada, but are not included in any Province," commonly cited as "The British North America Act, 1886," (49-50 Victoria, Chapter XXXV).

This Act provides that the Parliament of Canada may, from time to time, make provisions for the representation in the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, or in either of them, of the Territories which, for the time being, form part of the Dominion of Canada but are not included in any Province thereof.

The Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan were formed from the provisional districts of Alberta, Athabasca, Assiniboia and Saskatchewan (4-5 Edward VII, Chap. 3 and 42), and were admitted to the Union as Provinces on September 1st, 1905.

During the first session of the 12th Parliament a bill was passed extending the areas of Manitoba, Ontario, and Quebec north-ward by adding to those provinces portions of North-West Territory.

THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA

The present Canadian system of government which was established under the British North America Act of 1867, is a Federal Union, the first of its kind in the British Empire. It comprises a general or central government controlling matters essential to the development, the permanency and the unity of the Dominion as a whole, and also a number of provincial governments having the control and management of certain clearly defined local matters naturally and conveniently falling within their jurisdiction. These several governments are administered in strict accordance with the principles of British parliamentary government.

The executive Power of the Government of the Dominion of Canada, as also the chief command of the military and naval forces is vested in the Queen, represented by the Governor-General, appointed by Her Majesty the Queen and advised by a Cabinet chosen from members of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, and consisting of ministers holding departmental offices, besides, often, one or more ministers without portfolios. The government holds office as long as it has the confidence of the popular branch of Parliament.

According to the B.N.A. Act, 1867, Sec. 55, where a Bill passed by the Houses of Parliament is presented to the Governor-General for the Queen's assent, he shall declare, according to his discretion, but subject to the provisions of the mentioned Act and to Her Majesty's instruction, either that he assents thereto in the Queen's name, or that he withholds the Queen's assent, or that he reserves the Bill for the signification of the Queen's pleasure.

Disallowance of Bill — The present constitutional position is that the power of disallowance can no longer be exercised in relation to Dominion Legislation.

As to the reservation of bills, said reservation could take place only upon the advice of Her Majesty's Government in the Dominion of Canada as it would not be in accordance with constitutional practice for advice to be tendered to Her Majesty by Her Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom against the views of the Government of the Dominion concerned.

THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA

The British North America Act, 1867, provides:

"There shall be one Parliament for Canada, consisting of the Queen, an Upper House styled the Senate, and the House of Commons." (Clause 17.)

"There shall be a Session of the Parliament of Canada once at least in every year, so that twelve months shall not intervene between the last Sitting of the Parliament in one Session and its first Sitting in the next Session." (Section 20.)

"Every House of Commons shall continue for five years from the Day of the Return of the Writs for choosing the House (subject to be sooner dissolved by the Governor General), and no longer." (Section 50.)

"The Governor-General shall, from time to time, in the Queen's name, by instrument under the Great Seal of Canada, summon and call together the House of Commons." (Section 38.)

The Parliament and Government of Canada (Sec. 132 B.N.A. Act), possess all powers necessary or proper for performing the Obligations of Canada or of any Province thereof, as Part of the British Empire, towards Foreign Countries, arising under Treaties between the Empire and such Foreign Countries.

Either the English or the French language may be used by any person in the Debates of the House of the Parliament of Canada and of the House of the Legislation of Quebec, and both these languages are used in the respective records and Journals of those Houses; and either of those languages may be used by any person or in any Pleading or Process or in issuing from any Court of Canada established under the B.N.A. Act and in or from all or any of the Courts of Quebec.

As Canada possesses a system of federal government, the legislative powers of Parliament are limited to certain subjects set forth in the British North America Act of 1867, including sections 91, 92 (10), 93 (4), 94, 94 (A), 95 and 101.

"91. It shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate and House of Commons, to make laws for the Peace, Order and Good Government of Canada, in relation to all matters not coming within the Classes of Subjects by this Act assigned exclusively to the Legislatures of the Provinces, and for greater certainty but not as to restrict the Generality of the foregoing Terms of the Section, it is hereby declared that (notwithstanding anything in this Act) the exclusive Legislative Authority of the Parliament of Canada extends to all matters coming within the Classes of Subjects next hereinafter enumerated, that is to say:—

1. The Public Debt and Property.
2. The Regulation of Trade and Commerce.
3. The Raising of Money by any Mode or System of Taxation.
4. The Borrowing of Money on the Public Credit.

5. Postal Service.
 6. The Census and Statistics.
 7. Militia, Military and Naval Service and Defence.
 8. The fixing of and providing for the Salaries and Allowances of Civil and other Officers of the Government of Canada.
 9. Beacons, Buoys, Lighthouses and Sable Island.
 10. Navigating and Shipping.
 11. Quarantine and the Establishment and Maintenance of Marine Hospitals.
 12. Sea Coast and Inland Fisheries.
 13. Ferries between a Province and any British or Foreign Countries, or between two Provinces.
 14. Currency and Coinage.
 15. Banking, Incorporation of Banks and the Issue of Paper Money.
 16. Savings Banks.
 17. Weights and Measures.
 18. Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes.
 19. Interest.
 20. Legal Tender.
 21. Bankruptcy and Insolvency.
 22. Patents of Inventions and Discovery.
 23. Copyrights.
 24. Indians and Land reserved for the Indians.
 25. Naturalization and Aliens.
 26. Marriage and Divorce.
 27. The Criminal Law, except the Constitution of the Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction, but including the Procedure in Criminal Matters.
 28. The Establishment, Maintenance and Management of Penitentiaries.
 29. Such Classes of Subjects are as expressly excepted in the Enumeration of the Classes of Subject by this Act assigned exclusively to the Legislature of the Provinces."

THE SENATE OF CANADA

The Senate of Canada was created by the British North America Act, 1867. Section 17 of that Act declares "there shall be One Parliament for Canada, consisting of the Queen, *an Upper House styled the Senate and the House of Commons*".

The Senate as originally constituted at Confederation consisted of 72 members, the representation being as follows: 24 for the Province of Ontario, 24 for the Province of Quebec and 24 for the Maritime Provinces, comprising at that time Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

A person to be eligible for appointment to the Senate must (1) be of the full age of thirty years, (2) be either a natural born or a naturalized subject of the Queen, (3) be the owner of real property, free of all encumbrances, to the value of \$4,000, within the province for which he is appointed, (4) have real and personal property together worth \$4,000 over and above his debts and liabilities, and (5) be a resident of the province for which he is appointed. In the case of Quebec, he must have his real property qualification in the electoral division for which he is appointed or be a resident in that division.

Senators are appointed by the Governor General. A senator's place becomes vacant (1) if for two consecutive sessions of Parliament he fails to attend, (2) if he becomes a subject or citizen of a foreign power, (3) if he is adjudged bankrupt or insolvent, applies for the benefit of any law relating to insolvent debtors or becomes a public defaulter, (4) if he is attainted of treason or convicted of felony or of any infamous crime, or (5) if he ceases to qualify in respect of property.

The Governor General in Council appoints the Speaker of the Senate, the Clerk of the Senate and the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod. The debates and proceedings of the Senate are governed by rules and orders modelled to a considerable extent after those of the British House of Lords.

Each of the Senators from Quebec is appointed to represent one of 24 divisions corresponding with the electoral divisions of the former Province of Lower Canada. Senators for other provinces are not appointed for any designated divisions.

The first increase in the membership of the Senate took place in 1870 when Manitoba, upon entering Confederation, was awarded two seats. The following year, British Columbia was admitted into the Union and was entitled to be represented by three senators. In 1873, Prince Edward Island, upon entering Confederation, was granted a representation of four members, in accordance with section 147 of the British North America Act, and by virtue of the same section the representation of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick was reduced by two senators each. In 1882, Manitoba was given an additional member, in accordance with its decennial census, and in 1892 another. In 1887 the Northwest Territories were given two senators. In 1903, by virtue of Chapter 42 of the Statutes of Canada of that year, the representation of the Northwest Territories was increased to four. Upon creation of the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan in 1905, each was allotted 4 seats in the Senate.

In 1905, the Senate was constituted of 87 members as follows: — Ontario, 24; Quebec, 24; Nova Scotia, 10; New Brunswick, 10; Prince Edward Island, 4; British Columbia, 3; Manitoba, 4; Saskatchewan, 4; Alberta, 4.

In 1915, an amendment to the British North America Act increased the number of Senators from 72 to 96. The amendment also provided that the divisions of Canada, in relation to the constitution of the Senate, be increased from 3 to 4, the fourth division to comprise the Western Provinces of Manitoba, British Columbia, Saskatchewan and Alberta, each to have a representation of 6 senators. Provision was also made that, if Newfoundland entered Confederation at any time thereafter, it would be entitled to be represented by 6 senators. Newfoundland joined the Union in 1949, bringing the total number of senators to 102.

The most recent change in representation was made on June 19, 1975 by Chapter 53 of the Statutes of Canada, which amended the B.N.A. Act by increasing the total number of senators from 102 to 104, adding one senator each for the Yukon Territory and the Northwest Territories. Thus, the Senate now has the following membership: Ontario, 24; Quebec, 24; Nova Scotia, 10; New Brunswick, 10; Prince Edward Island, 4; Manitoba, 6; British Columbia, 6; Saskatchewan, 6; Alberta, 6; Newfoundland, 6; Northwest Territories, 1; and Yukon Territory, 1.

The eligibility of women for appointment to the Senate of Canada was declared by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in 1929, and in February 1930, for the first time in the history of Canada, a woman was appointed to the Senate.

Salaries and Allowances. — Senators receive a sessional allowance of \$32,800 per annum as well as an annual expense allowance of \$7,000. In addition, for each session of Parliament, a senator may be paid expenses for travelling between his place of residence and Ottawa.

The Speaker of the Senate receives a salary of \$16,000 in addition to the sessional allowance and the expense allowance.

Tenure of Office. — Under the British North America Act, senators were originally appointed for life, but by Chapter 4 of the Statutes of Canada, 1965, a senator appointed after June 2, 1965 holds his place in the Senate until he attains the age of seventy-five years.

Applications to Parliament for Private Bills

Every application to Parliament for a private bill must be advertised in the *Canada Gazette* by a notice stating clearly and distinctly the nature and objects of the application.

Where the application is for an Act to incorporate a company or to amend a company's Act of incorporation, the notice must also be published in a leading newspaper in the area and in the official gazette of the province concerned.

The notice must be published at least once a week for a period of four weeks in the English and French languages when reasonably required in accordance with the population composition of the area or province concerned.

The fee for the introduction of a private bill in the Senate is \$200. In addition to this fee there are printing costs.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS OF CANADA

The House of Commons of Canada is elected by the people for five years, unless sooner dissolved by the Governor General. Members require no property qualifications, but they must be of the age of 18, and Canadian citizens, not disqualified by law. The Speaker is chosen by the House at the opening sitting of the first session of each parliament.

The members are elected by constituencies and voting is by ballot.

The number of members of the House of Commons is regulated by the following section of the British North America Act, 1967 to 1975: —

51. (1) The number of members of the House of Commons and the representation of the provinces therein shall upon the coming into force of this subsection and thereafter on the completion of each decennial census be readjusted by such authority, in such manner, and from such time as the Parliament of Canada from time to time provides, subject and according to the following Rules:

1. There shall be assigned to Quebec seventy-five members in the readjustment following the completion of the decennial census taken in the year 1971, and thereafter four additional members in each subsequent readjustment.

2. Subject to Rule 5(2) and (3), there shall be assigned to a large province a number of members equal to the number obtained by dividing the population of the large province by the electoral quotient of Quebec.

3. Subject to Rules 5(2) and (3), there shall be assigned to a small province a number of members equal to the number obtained by dividing

(a) the sum of the populations, determined according to the results of the penultimate decennial census, of the provinces (other than Quebec) having populations of less than one and half million, determined according to the results of that census, by the sum of the number of members assigned to those provinces in the readjustment following the completion of that census; and

(b) the population of the small province by the quotient obtained under paragraph (a).

4. Subject to Rules 5(1)(a), (2) and (3), there shall be assigned to an intermediate province a number of members equal to the number obtained

(a) by dividing the sum of the populations of the provinces (other than Quebec) having populations of less than one and a half million by the sum of the numbers of members assigned to those provinces under any of the Rules 3, 5(1)(b), (2) and (3);

(b) by dividing the population of the intermediate province by the quotient obtained under paragraph (a); and

(c) by adding to the number of members assigned to the intermediate province in the readjustment following the completion of the penultimate decennial census one-half of the difference resulting from the subtraction of that number from the quotient obtained under paragraph (b).

5. (1) On any readjustment,

(a) if no province (other than Quebec) has a population of less than one and a half million, Rule 4 shall not be applied and, subject to Rules 5(2) and (3), there shall be

assigned to an intermediate province a number of members equal to the number obtained by dividing

(i) the sum of the populations, determined according to the results of the penultimate decennial census, of the provinces (other than Quebec) having populations of not less than one and a half million and not more than two and a half million, determined according to the results of that census, by the sum of the numbers of members assigned to those provinces in the readjustment following the completion of that census, and

(ii) the population of the intermediate province by the quotient obtained under sub-paragraph (i);

(b) if province (other than Quebec) having a population of

(i) or less than one and a half million,

or

(ii) not less than one and a half million and not more than two and a half million

does not have a population greater than its population determined according to the results of the penultimate decennial census, it shall, subject to Rules 5(2) and (3), be assigned the number of members assigned to it in the readjustment following the completion of that census.

(2) On any readjustment,

(a) if, under any of the Rules 2 to 5(1), the number of members to be assigned to a province (in this paragraph referred to as "the first province") is smaller than the number of members to be assigned to any other province not having a population greater than that of the first province, those Rules shall not be applied to the first province and it shall be assigned a number of members equal to the largest number of members to be assigned to any other province not having a population greater than that of the first province;

(b) if, under any of the Rules of 2 to 5(1)(a), the number of members to be assigned to a province is smaller than the number of members assigned to it in the readjustment following the completion of the penultimate decennial census, those Rules shall not be applied to it and it shall be assigned to the latter number of members;

(c) if both paragraphs (a) and (b) apply to a province, it shall be assigned a number of members equal to the greater of the numbers produced under those paragraphs.

(3) On any readjustment,

(a) if the electoral quotient of a province (in this paragraph referred to as "the first province") obtained by dividing its population by the number of members to be assigned to it under any of the Rules 2 to 5(2) is greater than the electoral quotient of Quebec, those Rules shall not be applied to the first province and it shall be assigned a number of members equal to the number obtained by dividing its population by the electoral quotient of Quebec;

(b) if, as a result of the application of Rule 6(2)(a), the number of members assigned to a province under paragraph (a) equals the number of members to be assigned to it under any of the Rules 2 to 5(2), it shall be assigned that number of members and paragraph (a) shall cease to apply to that province.

6. (1) In these Rules,

"electoral quotient" means, in respect to a province, the quotient obtained by dividing its population, determined according to the results of the then most recent decennial

census, by the number of members to be assigned to it under any of the Rules 1 to 5(3) in the readjustment following the completion of that census;

"intermediate province" means a province (other than Quebec) having a population greater than its population determined according to the results of the penultimate decennial census but not more than two and a half million and not less than one and a half million;

"large province" means a province (other than Quebec) having a population greater than two and a half million;

"penultimate decennial census" means the decennial census that preceded the then most recent decennial census;

"population" means, except where otherwise specified, the population determined according to the results of the then most recent decennial census;

"small province" means a province (other than Quebec) having a population greater than its population determined according to the results of the penultimate decennial census and less than one and a half million.

(2) For the purpose of these Rules,

(a) if any fraction less than one remains upon completion of the final calculation that produces the number of members to be assigned to a province, that number of members shall equal the number so produced disregarding the fraction;

(b) if more than one readjustment follows the completion of a decennial census, the most recent of those readjustments shall, upon taking effect, be deemed to be the only readjustment following the completion of that census;

(c) a readjustment shall not take effect until the termination of the then existing Parliament."

At Confederation (1867) the House of Commons consisted of 181 members of which Ontario returned 82, Quebec 65, Nova Scotia 19; and New Brunswick, 15. During the fourth session of the 1st Parliament the representation was increased to 191, Manitoba (4 members) and British Columbia (6 members) having entered Confederation.

The representation in the 2nd Parliament (July 8, 1872, to Jan 2, 1874), under the Redistribution Act of 1872, was 200 up the last sessions, when there was an increase of 6 members owing to the admission of Prince Edward Island to Confederation. Ontario had 88 members; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 21; New Brunswick, 16; Manitoba, 4; British Columbia, 6.

In the 3rd Parliament (Jan 2, 1874, to August 17, 1878), and in the 4th Parliament (Aug. 17, 1878, to May 18, 1882) the representation remained as at the dissolution of the 2nd Parliament, viz:—Ontario, 88; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 21; New Brunswick, 16; Manitoba, 4; British Columbia, 6; Prince Edward Island, 6. Total 206.

The representation in the 5th Parliament (Feb. 8, 1883, to Jan. 15, 1887) under the Representation Act of 1887, was increased to 211, the Ontario representation being increased from 88 to 92 and that of Manitoba from 4 to 5.

In the 6th Parliament (Jan. 15, 1887, to Feb. 3, 1891), the representation remained unchanged, except that in 1887 the North-West Territories were granted representation with 4 members, thus making a total representation of 215.

During the 7th Parliament (Feb. 3, 1891, to April 24, 1896) there was no change in the representation.

In the 8th Parliament (April 24, 1896, to Oct. 9, 1900), under the Representation Act. of 1892-3, the representation was as follows: —Ontario, 92; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 20; New Brunswick, 14; Manitoba, 7; British Columbia, 6; Prince Edward Island, 5; North-West Territories, 4. Total, 213.

During the 9th Parliament (Oct. 9, 1900, to Sept. 29, 1904), there was but one change in the representation, a seat being added for the Yukon Territory (Chap. 37, 1902). This made 214 members, distributed as follows: —Ontario, 86; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 18; New Brunswick, 13; Manitoba, 10; North-West Territories, 10; British Columbia, 7; Prince Edward Island, 4; Yukon Territory, 1.

The House remained so constituted until the dissolution of the 10th Parliament, September 17, 1908.

During the first session of the Tenth Parliament of Canada (1905) provision was made for the creation of the new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta out of part of the North-West Territories, and provision was made for the taking of a census of population in the two new provinces, as also in Manitoba, in the middle year of each decade commencing with 1906. The results of the first quinquennial census made necessary, according to the Saskatchewan and Alberta Acts, a readjustment of the representation of Saskatchewan and Alberta Acts, a readjustments of the representation of Saskatchewan and Alberta in the House of Commons, and at the session of 1906-07 an amendment was passed to the Representation Act (Chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes, 1906) providing that the House of Commons shall consist of two hundred and twenty-one (221) members, as follows: Ontario, 86; Quebec, 65; Saskatchewan, 10, (a gain of 4); British Columbia, 7; Alberta, 7, (a gain of 3); Prince Edward Island, 4; Yukon Territory, 1.

By a special clause embodied in this Act, it only took effect upon the dissolution of the 10th Parliament.

During the session of 1914 (3rd session 12th Parl.) a Redistribution Bill was passed, providing for an increase in the number of members of the House of Commons to 235, divided among the provinces as follows: — Ontario, 82, Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 16; New Brunswick, 11; Manitoba, 15; British Columbia, 13; Prince Edward Island, 4; Saskatchewan, 16; Alberta, 12; Yukon, 1. Total 235. The new Act came into effect with the dissolution of the 12th Parliament.

During the session of 1923 (2nd of the 14th Parl.) the Government introduced a Redistribution Bill based upon the census of 1921. It was not passed before prorogation and was accordingly re-introduced at the 1924 session and with certain amendments adopted. Under its provisions the Maritime Provinces lost two members; both in Nova Scotia; the Prairie Provinces gain eleven — four going to Alberta, five to Saskatchewan and two to Manitoba. British Columbia gains one. The other provinces remain as at present, as does the representation of Yukon Territory. The net increase in the representation for the whole Dominion is, therefore, ten.

The Representation Act, 1933, based on the census of 1931 was passed at the session of 1933 (4th of the 17th Parl.). It reduced the membership of Nova Scotia to 12 and New Brunswick to 10; increasing Alberta to 17, and British Columbia to 16, other Provinces remaining the same. However in 1949, with the Union of Newfoundland, the representation was increased to 265 members.

The Representation Act, 1952, based on the Census of 1951 was passed at the Session of 1952 (6th of the 21st Parliament). It reduced Nova Scotia to 12 (13), Manitoba to 14 (16); Saskatchewan to 17 (20); increasing Ontario, 85 (83); Quebec, 75 (73); British Columbia, 22 (18); Yukon 1; Mackenzie River (N.W.T.) 1 (1). Other Provinces remained the same. The representation was increased to 265 members.

The representation set forth in the preceding paragraph was superseded on repeal of the Representation Act (when the under-mentioned "Representation Order" became effective on the

dissolution of the 27th Parliament by virtue of the Electoral Boundaries Readjustment Act, given Royal Assent on November 20, 1964, S.C. 1964-1965 c. 31). The Electoral Boundaries Readjustment Act provides in section 22(2) for the proclamation of a "Representation Order" which shall:

- (a) specify the number of members of the House of Commons who shall be elected for each of the provinces as calculated by the Representation Commissioner under section 12; and
- (b) divide each of the provinces into electoral districts, describe the boundaries of each such district and specify the representation name to be given thereto, in accordance with the recommendations contained in the reports referred to in subsection (1).

For the representation in the House of Commons based on the census of 1961, the "Representation Order", was proclaimed on June 16, 1966 and came into effect with the dissolution of the 27th Parliament, resulting in the following allocation of seats:

In 1975, legislation was enacted giving the Northwest Territories two seats under future "Representation Orders".

For the representation based on the census of 1971, the "Representation Order" was proclaimed on June 11, 1976 and came into effect with the dissolution of the 30th Parliament. This resulted in the following allocation of seats:

The functions, powers and prerogatives of the Canadian House of Commons approximate as closely as may be to those possessed by the Lower House of the Parliament of the United Kingdom.

Bills for appropriating any part of the Public Revenue, or for imposing any Tax or Impost, must originate in the House of Commons. It is not lawful for the House of Commons to adopt or pass any vote, Resolution, Address, or Bill for the Appropriation of any Part of the Public Revenue, or of Tax or Impost for any Purpose, that has not been first recommended to the House by Message of the Governor General in the Session in which such Vote, Resolution, Address or Bill is proposed.

In 1887, when the old Northwest Territories were first given representation in the House of Commons, four electoral divisions were created:

(1)—Assiniboia East, adjoining Province of Manitoba; (2) Assiniboia West, next; (3) Alberta, extending to the boundary of British Columbia, and (4) Saskatchewan, in the north. Under the Act of 1903, the two Assiniboias and Saskatchewan were given six seats, namely: Assiniboia East, Assiniboia West, Humboldt, Mackenzie, Qu'Appelle, Saskatchewan. These old divisions practically compose the present province of Saskatchewan, which according to the Act of 1906-07 returns 10 members to the House of Commons, the constituencies being: Assiniboia, Battleford, Humboldt, Mackenzie, Moose Jaw, Prince Albert, Qu'Appelle, Regina, Salcoats and Saskatoon.

The return of the returning officer showed that each of the two candidates had received the same number of votes. The return officer had not, as now, the right to give his casting vote. In due course the matter came before the H. of C. and was referred to the Commission of Privileges and Electors, who reported that the return officer should (under the old system of double returns) have declared both candidates elected. Under an order of the House (April 25), the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery attended and on motion of the Hon. Mr. Cameron, of Peel, a resolution was passed, instructing the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery to amend the return so as to declare both candidates elected. This was done, and Dr. Lynch, who was present in Ottawa, forthwith subscribed to the oath and took his seat. Then Hon. Mr. Cameron drew attention to the rule which provided that a member must withdraw while the matter of his election was before the House, whereupon Dr. Lynch withdrew. May 13, McKay, having arrived in Ottawa, presented himself and took the oath and his seat. Under similar conditions as Dr. Lynch he withdrew. A delay of six weeks was allowed the Elec. Comm. to enquire into the matter. Before the House finally disposed of the matter Parliament was dissolved (See Journals of the House.)

PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

(Revised August, 1981)

With the Province of Saskatchewan formed from part of the Northwest Territories by Act of Dominion Parliament, 1905, (first session, 10th Parliament). The two provinces are divided by the meridian of 110, west from Greenwich. They lie between British Columbia on the west, and Manitoba and the Northwest Territories on the east, and between the International boundary at the 49th parallel on the south, and the 60th parallel on the north. From north to south each province extends 760 miles, or as long as from the mouth of the Detroit River to the mouth of the Saguenay in a straight line. The area of the two provinces is 504,190 square miles, which is as large as the united areas of Great Britain, France and Germany, as large as the States of Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota and the two Dakotas combined, and more than twice as large as the six New England States together with New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana. The provisions of the B.N.A. Act 1867, with its several amendments, apply to the new provinces. The public lands became the property of the Province in 1930, under the terms of the Transfer Agreement.

Act creating Province of Alberta came into force Sept. 1, 1905.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

(Revised August, 1981)

Juan de Fuca, a Greek Mariner, in the employ of the Spanish Government, cruised as far north as the Straits named after him and entered the Straits of Georgia.

Spaniards passed along present Pacific coast of Canada in 1774. Captain Cook R.N., landed in Nootka, 1778, British opening fur trade as a result. Captain Meares, R.N. established first settlement in present province at Nootka, 1788. Official expedition and survey by Captain George Vancouver, R.N., 1792-95. The Nootka Convention determining the rights of British to establish settlement in present Province of British Columbia, 1794. Nootka abandoned 1795. Alex. Mackenzie reached Pacific coast via overland route from Montreal, June 22, 1793.

Parliamentary Government in British Columbia dates from the inauguration Aug. 12, 1856 of the first Legislative Assembly of the Colony of Vancouver Island November 17, 1866, Royal Proclamation announcing the union of the former colonies of Vancouver Island and British Columbia (formerly new Caledonia), to be known as British Columbia. 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NEW BRUNSWICK LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

At, and for many years after Confederation, New Brunswick had a Legislative Council as well as a Legislative Assembly. April 16, 1891, an Act (54 Vic., Chap. IX) was passed abolishing the Legislative Council and vesting all its powers in the Lieutenant-Governor and Assembly, thereafter designated the Legislative Assembly. This Act came into force upon the dissolution of 1892.

Elected by popular vote — 58 members. Last general election, Oct. 23, 1978. Yearly salaries: Premier, \$25,000 and \$2,500 for expenses incidental to the discharge of his duties as Premier; Ministers, \$16,000; Ministers without Portfolio, \$10,000; Members, \$14,015 plus expense allowance \$7,008; expenses for which members may be reimbursed: 1. Travel cost of up to 25 journeys between the member's home and Fredericton, except when the Legislative Assembly is sitting. Expenses for each journey are to be claimed separately and supported by explanations. 2. Subject to item 3, travel costs between the member's home and Fredericton during sittings of the Legislative Assembly on the basis of one return journey for each week or part week of sittings. 3. Costs of subsistence in an amount of twenty dollars per day, and actual accommodation costs, supported by vouchers, while attending sittings of the Legislative Assembly; but the total of these shall not exceed fifty dollars per day. (Members living at home may claim subsistence costs of twelve dollars a day and travel costs.) 4. With respect to items 1, 2 and 3, where a personal automobile is used travel costs at the rate prescribed in Part A of the Travel and Removal Regulations made under the Financial Administration Act, 1975, c. 33, 5.3. 5. Telephone costs for calls on member's business between the constituency and Fredericton, collect calls and calls within the province, accounted for on the basis of an authorized telephone credit card. Speaker, \$5,000 and \$1,000. Annual expense allowance; in addition the Speaker is reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in performing his duties. Leader of the Opposition, \$16,000 annually and \$8,000 to be used for travel, accommodation and such other expenses of his office and staff as may be incurred.

NOVA SCOTIA LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Consists of 52 members elected by popular vote. The Redistribution Act in 1955 increased House membership from 37 to 43. Amendments to the House of Assembly Act in 1967 increased House membership from 43 to 46. Amendments to the House of Assembly Act Chapter 22 in 1978-79 increased the membership of the House to 52. One member is returned in each electoral district except in Inverness and Yarmouth, which return two members each.

Members receive sessional indemnity of \$15,600 per session and \$7,800 for expenses.

The Premier receives \$32,000 per annum in addition, Ministers holding a portfolio or portfolios \$25,000 and Ministers without portfolio \$7,500 to \$25,000.

The Speaker receives \$15,000 per annum in addition, the Deputy Speaker \$7,500 and the Leader of the Opposition \$25,000 and the leader of a recognized party \$10,000.

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ONTARIO LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Sessional Indemnity \$30,000, and expense allowance \$10,000 for Members. Emolument of Mr. Speaker \$17,200 in addition to his indemnity and expense allowance as a member of the Legislative Assembly.

Last general election March 19, 1981.

The Legislature at present consists of 125 Members elected by popular vote. After some fluctuation prior to 1933 the membership was reduced to 90 by the Representation Act of 1933. A new Representation Act in 1954 increased the membership to 98 and an amendment thereto in 1963 again increased the membership to 108. In 1966 a new Representation Act increased the membership to 117, and the new Representation Act in 1975 increased the membership to the present 125.

Salaries: In addition to his indemnity and allowance as a Member of the Legislative Assembly the Premier receives a salary of \$33,200 per annum and a Leader's Allowance of \$6,000; similarly, each Minister with Portfolio receives a salary of \$23,300 per annum. Ministers without Portfolio receive salaries of \$11,700 per annum. The Leader of the Opposition receives an additional indemnity of \$23,300 as well as a Leader's Allowance of \$4,000. The Leader of the Third Party receives an additional indemnity of \$11,700 as well as a Leader's Allowance of \$2,000.

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QUEBEC NATIONAL ASSEMBLY

Section 1 of the Legislature Act (R.S.Q., chapter L-1) provides, as from January 1, 1969, that:

"The Legislature of Québec shall consist of the Lieutenant-Governor and the National Assembly of Québec; it shall exercise all the powers vested in the Legislature of the Province of Québec consisting of the Lieutenant-Governor and two Houses called the Legislative Council of Québec and the Legislative Assembly of Québec".

Consequently, since that date, it is a unicameral House in the Province of Quebec.

The National Assembly is composed of 122 members elected by the various electoral divisions into which the province is divided.

Annual indemnity: Members, \$33,110 plus an annual allowance of \$7,500. for entertainment expenses.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT — YELLOWKNIFE

The Northwest Territories comprises all that part of Canada north of the Sixtieth Parallel of North Latitude, except the portions thereof within the Yukon Territory and the Provinces of Quebec and Newfoundland.

The Northwest Territories Act. Chapter 331. R.S.C., as amended to 1979, provides for the Government of the Northwest Territories by a Commissioner under instructions given from time to time by the Governor in Council or the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development.

The Act also provides for a Council consisting of not less than fifteen members nor more than twenty-five. The exact number of members and electoral district boundaries are determined by the Council. Every Council serves for a term of up to four years unless earlier dissolved. Legislative powers are exercised by the Commissioner in Council on such matters as direct taxation within the

Territories, maintenance of municipal institutions, licences, solemnization of marriages, property and civil rights, administration of justice, education, public health and generally all matters of a local nature. The administration of the Territories under the Northwest Territories Act and the ordinances passed by the Commissioner in Council is carried on by the Commissioner and the Public Service of the Northwest Territories.

From 1956-64 was engaged in mining exploration in Yellowknife area as Chief Engineer for Norman W. Byrne Ltd. In 1964 became Pres. of, and partner in, an associated company, Precambrian Mining Services Ltd. In 1958 was elected to Yellowknife Town Council and in Dec. 1963 was elected Mayor of Yellowknife and was returned as Mayor, by acclamation in 1965. By Order-in-Council in June 1965 was apptd. a mem. of Advisory Commission on the Development of Government in the N.W.T., known as the Carrothers Commission, studying problems facing residents of the entire N.W.T. On March 2, 1967 was apptd. Deputy Commissioner and Commissioner on April 15, 1979.

APPAQAQ, MOSES (Hudson Bay) B. in the Belcher Islands in 1946. He lives in the island's only settlement, Sanikiluaq. He is a purchaser for the Mitiq Co-operative. A hunter and a carver. First elected in 1979, is a Mem. of the Assembly's standing committee on legislation.

ARLOOKTOO, JOE (Baffin South) B. in Frobisher Bay in 1939. He lives in Lake Harbour where he is a fuel contractor and active in community life. Elected as a chairman of the settlement council, chairman of the Kimik Co-operative and chairman of the local Housing Assoc. First elected in 1979 and is a Mem. of the standing committee on legislation and the Mem. Services Board.

BRADEN, HON. GEORGE, B.A., M.A. (Yellowknife North) B. in Sask. in 1949. He attended Sir John Franklin H.S. in Yellowknife, then obtained a B.A. in political science from the Univ. of Alta. He also holds an M.A. in political science from Dalhousie Univ., Halifax. Worked for the Vancouver based Gemini North consulting firm on studies for the proposed Mackenzie Valley pipeline, as a regional planner for the Dept. of Economic Development and Tourism and his own consulting firm. He was also a policy analyst in the office of the Special Representative for Constitutional Development in the N.W.T. Mr. Braden was first elected in 1979. Nov. 23, 1979 became Min. of Economic Development and Tourism. On July 25, 1980 he was chosen Leader of the Elected Exec. and as well was given responsibility for the Exec. Comm. Secretariat. His present portfolio is Justice and Public Services since Jan. 5, 1981.

BUTTERS, HON. THOMAS H., B.A. (Inuvik) B. in Vancouver in 1925. Coming North in 1948, he later joined the Dept. of Indian and Northern Affairs. He was elected first in 1970 and re-elected again in 1975 and 1979. Was elected Deputy Chairman of Committees of the Whole in May 1975 and resigned that position in Jan. 1977. In Mar. 1978 apptd. Min. of Natural and Cultural

Affairs, in Dec. 1978 was apptd. Min. of Economic Development and Tourism and of Social Services and on May 1, 1979 was given the portfolio of Health. On Nov. 23, 1979 was given the portfolios of Education and Justice and Public Services and on Jan. 5, 1981 was given his present portfolios of Economic Development and Tourism and of Finance, making him the first Minister of Finance in the N.W.T.

COURNOYEA, NELLIE J. (Western Arctic) B. in Aklavik in 1940. Worked as a station mgr. for CBC radio and has been an administrator and land rights worker for the Inuvik based Committee for Original People's Entitlement. Until 1978 was a dir. of the Can. Council on Social Development and has been active in community affairs, including Northern Games Committee. First elected in 1979 is a mem. of standing committee on finance and the special committee on education and on the impact of division.

CURLEY, TAGAK E. C. (Keewatin South) B. in Corah Harbour in 1944. He worked for the Territorial Government and the federal dept. of Indian Affairs and Northern Development between 1966 and 1970 and between 1970 and 1971, was Repulse Bay settlement manager. He lived in Edmonton and then Ottawa until 1976. A founding mem. and first pres. of Inuit Tapirisat of Can. between 1971 and 1974. Mr. Curley has been pres. of Inuit Development Corp. since July 1979. First elected in 1979 is a mem. of the standing committee on legislation as well as the special committee on education and the impact of division.

EVALUARJUK, MARK (Foxe Basin) B. in the Igloolik area in 1937. Was a mem. of the Igloolik Community Council from 1963-1975, pres. of the Igloolik Eskimo Co-op and presently owns and operates a hotel in Igloolik. Is a former Hudson's Bay sales clerk and co-op manager, and is still a hunter. He was first elected in 1975. Re-elected in 1979. Named mem. of Order of Can. 1981.

FRASER, PETER C. (Mackenzie Great Bear) B. in Fort Chipewyan, Alta. in 1921. He came to N.W.T. in 1939 and worked

for the federal government for 30 years. Is a former lands and forests resources management officer. Is a resident of Norman Wells and won a 1976 by-election. In Jan. 1977 was elected Deputy Chairman of Committees following the resignation of Mr. Butters. Re-elected in 1979 is presently Deputy Speaker of the House, Chairman of the special committee on the impact of division, a Member of the standing committees on finance, legislation and rules and procedures, the special committees on constitutional development and the executive committee of the N.W.T. Branch of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

KILABUK, IPEELEE (Central Baffin) B. in Pangnirtung, N.W.T. in 1932. Chairman of the Hamlet Council of Pangnirtung, mem. of Dir. of Pangnirtung Eskimo Co-op. Ltd. and Inuit Tapirisat of Can. Mr. Kilabuk was first elected in 1975, def. in 1979 and re-elected in a by-election 1980. Mem. of standing committee on finance and the special committee on the impact of division.

MCCALLUM, HON. ARNOLD J., B.A., B.Ed., M.E.A. (Slave River) B. in P.E.I. in 1931. He moved to the N.W.T. in 1964. He has taught at Sir John Franklin School in Yellowknife and is former principal of the Joseph Burr Tyrell Secondary School in Fort Smith. He was first elected in 1975 and in May of that year he was apptd. Min. of Education and in the Spring of 1977 he devoted full time efforts to Comm. on Constitutional Development. In Sept. 1977 he became Min. of Local Government, in Jan. 1978 became Min. of Health and Social Services and in Dec. 1978 became Min. of Health and Local Goverment. Upon re-election in 1979 was apptd. Min. of Social Services and of Health. Mem. of the Members' Services Board, the standing committee on rules and procedures, the special committee on the impact of division and the executive committee of the N.W.T. Branch of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

MCLAUGHLIN, BRUCE, B.Sc. (Pine Point) B. in Edmonton in 1946 and attended Univ. of Alta. where he obtained a bachelor of

science degree. He is active in sports and community activities and now is serving his third term on the Pine Point town council. NERYSOO, HON. RICHARD W. (Mackenzie Delta) B. at a camp on the Peel River in 1953. Was educated in Inuvik and Whitehorse. He was vice-pres. of the N.W.T. Indian Brotherhood between 1975 and 1976 and then worked for the territorial government for one year before he was elected vice-pres. of the Dene Nation. Mr. Nerysoo was first elected to the Assem. in 1979, he is Min. of Renewable Resources and of Energy, as well as chairman of the exec. sub-committee on legislation and a mem. of the exec. comm. of N.W.T. Branch of Commonwealth Parl. Assn.

NOAH, WILLIAM (Keewatin North) B. at Back River in 1943. He was educated in Baker Lake, Winnipeg and Saskatoon. He was pres. of the Sanavik Co-operative for seven years, chairman of Can. Arctic Producers in Ottawa for two years, and has been Mayor of the Hamlet of Baker Lake for the last two years. Mr. Noah is an artist and print-maker. First elected to the Assem. in 1979 and he is chairman of the standing comm. on rules and procedures and a Deputy Chairman of comm. of the Whole.

PATTERSON, HON. DENNIS G., B.A., LL.B. (Frobisher Bay) B. in Vancouver in 1948. He is a lawyer and has lived in Frobisher Bay since 1975. He attended Univ. of Alta. in Edmonton

and graduated in 1969 with distinction in a Bachelor of Arts program. Attended Dalhousie Univ. in Halifax, N.S., as a Sir James Dunn Scholar and graduated with a law degree in 1972. Admitted to the N.S. and B.C. Law Societies and worked for legal firms in both N.S. and B.C. He is the first dir. of Maliiganik Tukisiiniakvik, Frobisher Bay's Legal Services Centre. SIBBESTON, NICK G., B.A., LL.B. (Mackenzie Liard) B. in Fort Simpson in 1943. Attended the Univ. of Alta. in Edmonton, obtaining a B.A., before returning to the North as secty.-mgr. for the hamlet of Fort Simpson. He served on the N.W.T. Council from 1970 to 1974, then attended law school and received his law degree from the Univ. of Alta. in 1975. He practiced law in Yellowknife for a year before returning to Fort Simpson. He was re-elected in 1979 and is chairman of special comm. on constitutional development.

SORENSEN, LYNDA, R.N. (Yellowknife South) B. in Saskatchewan and has lived in the N.W.T. for eleven years. She graduated as a Registered Nurse from Edmonton Royal Alexandra School of Nursing in 1968. She worked as Dir. of Nursing for the Stanton Yellowknife Hospital. In 1973 she joined the Consumers' Assoc. of Can., since then has served on various local and national bds. associated with the consumer movement. She was the N.W.T. rep. to National Consumers' Assoc. of Can. Bd. of Dir. for 4 years. Presently a mem. of the N.W.T. Labour Standards Board. First elected in 1979 she is the chairman of the Standing Comm. on Finance, a mem. of the Rules and Procedures Comm. and the special comm. on the impact of division, and a mem. of the Mem. Services Bd.

STEWART, HON. DONALD M. (Hay River) B. in Edmonton in 1923. He has lived in Hay River since 1947, serving as mayor from 1964-67 and 1970 to present. Mr. Stewart owns a building and supply company and theatres. He was elected in 1967, def. in 1970 and re-elected in 1975 and 1979. SUPREME COURT OF CANADA

(Revised July, 1981)

The Supreme Court of Canada was constituted in 1875 and is now governed by the Supreme Court Act R.S.C. 1970, chapter S-19, as amended.

The Supreme Court of Canada has jurisdiction as the final Court of Appeal in both civil and criminal cases throughout Canada. It is a Court of Appeal in contested election cases, appeals from the Federal Court of Appeal and the provincial courts of appeal. It may consider constitutional issues between the Provinces and the Federal Government on references respecting the same submitted by the Governor-in-Council. The Supreme Court may also examine and report upon any bill or matter before the Senate or House of Commons, pursuant to the rules in that regard of the Senate or House of Commons.

The Supreme Court sits in Ottawa, and the judges must reside in the National Capital Region or within 40 km thereof. Three sessions are held in each year, beginning on the fourth Tuesday in January, the fourth Tuesday in April and the first Tuesday in October.

The Supreme Court as originally constituted on 8th April 1875 consisted of a Chief Justice (whose title is Chief Justice of Canada) and five puisne Judges. The number of puisne judges was increased in 1927 to six and in 1949 to eight, so that the Court now consists of the Chief Justice and eight puisne judges. The judges are appointed by the Governor-in-Council by letters patent under the Great Seal of Canada and they automatically cease to hold office on attaining the age of seventy-five years.

By Royal Letters Patent dated September 8th, 1947, and effective October 1st, 1947, the office of Governor General and Commander-in-Chief in and over Canada was constituted. By paragraph vii of the Letters Patent, authorized by the British North America Acts, the Governor General may appoint a Deputy. During the absence of the Governor General from Ottawa but within Canada the Chief Justice is usually appointed Deputy Governor General. By paragraph viii thereof, in the event of the death, incapacity, removal or absence of the Governor General out of Canada, all his powers and authorities are vested in the Chief Justice of Canada, to be known as Administrator of the Government.

FEDERAL COURT OF CANADA

(Revised July, 1981)

The Federal Court of Canada is a court of law, equity and admiralty and it is a superior court of record having civil and criminal jurisdiction (section 3 of the Act).

The Court is divided into two divisions called the Federal Court — Appeal Division, and the Federal Court — Trial Division. The Appeal Division may be called the Court of Appeal or the Federal Court of Appeal (section 4 of the Act).

The Court of appeal consists of the Chief Justice of the Federal Court of Canada and five other judges. The Trial Division consists of the Associate Chief Justice of the Federal Court of Canada and nine other judges. Every judge is an **ex officio** member of the Division of which he is not a regular member (section 5 of the Act).

While all the full-time judges must reside in or near the National Capital Region (section 7), each Division of the Court can sit any place in Canada and the place and time of the sittings must be arranged to suit the convenience of the litigants.

The Federal Court of Appeal has jurisdiction on appeals from the Trial Division, appeals from Federal Tribunals, review of decisions of Federal Boards and Commissions, appeals from Tribunals and Reviews under Section 28 of the Federal Court Act, and references by Federal Boards and Commissions.

The Trial Division of the Federal Court of Canada has jurisdiction in claims against the Crown, claims by the Crown, miscellaneous cases involving the Crown, claims against or concerning Crown Officers and Servants, relief against Federal Boards, Commissions, and other Tribunals. Inter-Provincial and Federal-Provincial Disputes, Industrial, Industrial Property Matters, Admiralty, Income

Tax and Estate Tax Appeals, Citizenship Appeals, Aeronautics — Interprovincial Works and Undertakings, residuary jurisdiction for relief if there is no other Canadian Court that has such jurisdiction, jurisdiction in specific matters conferred by Federal Statutes.

The Court has one Registry for all of Canada. That Registry consists of a principal office in Ottawa and other offices in the different parts of the country where the convenience of litigants makes it expedient that there be such offices (section 14 of the Act.).

The officer of the Court who has overall responsibility for the operation of the Registry is known as the Administrator of the Court (Rule 200).

INTERNATIONAL BOUNDARY COMMISSION

The International Boundary Commission functions by virtue of the Treaty of 1925 between Canada and the United States of America. Under Article IV of this Treaty the Commissioners are empowered and directed to maintain at all times an effective boundary line by repairing, relocating, and rebuilding monuments, and keeping the boundary vista open; to determine the location of any point on the boundary which may become necessary in the settlement of any question that may arise between the two governments; and to report annually to the governments upon the work of the Commission.

The International Boundary Commission Act further empowers the Commission to regulate all "work" or construction within ten feet of the international boundary.

INTERNATIONAL JOINT COMMISSION

The International Joint Commission was established in 1909 by a treaty between the United States of America, Canada and Great Britain. This treaty was confirmed and sanctioned by The International Boundary Waters Treaty Act (S.C., 1911, Chapter 28, as amended).

The Commission deals with the use, obstruction and diversion of boundary waters and rivers crossing the boundary between Canada and the United States. Structures which would raise the natural levels of waters at the Boundary require the prior approval of the Commission before work can proceed. In addition, the Commission carries out extensive investigations on questions arising between the Canadian and United States Governments along the "common frontier" and reports its findings with recommendations to such Governments.

It also assists in implementation of the Canada-U.S. Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement of 1978 and reports to the Governments and the public with advice and recommendations.

The Commission consists of six members, three appointed by the Government of Canada and three appointed by the President of the United States with consent of the Senate.

LAW REFORM COMMISSION

The Law Reform Commission of Canada is a permanent commission established by an Act of Parliament proclaimed 1 June 1971 as amended by an Act proclaimed on April 24, 1975 and further amended by an Act proclaimed on Feb. 19, 1981.

The objects of the Commission, as set out in the *Law Reform Commission Act*, are "to study and keep under review on a continuing and systematic basis the statutes and other laws comprising the laws of Canada with a view to making recommendations for their improvement, modernization and reform, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing,

(a) the removal of anachronisms and anomalies in the law;

- (b) the reflection in and by the law of the distinctive concepts and institutions of the common law and civil law legal systems in Canada, and the reconciliation of differences and discrepancies in the expression and application of the law arising out of differences in those concepts and institutions;
 - (c) the elimination of obsolete laws; and
 - (d) the development of new approaches to and new concepts of the law in keeping with and responsive to the changing needs of modern Canadian society and of individual members of that society.”

The objects and purposes of the Commission, as defined by the National Capital Act, are "to prepare plans for and assist in the development, conservation and improvement of the National Capital Region in order that the nature and character of the seat of the Government of Canada may be in accordance with its national significance."

OFFICIAL PRECEDENCE

The establishment and the maintenance of tables or scales of official precedence result from the fact that in all nations and communities there are individuals, who, because they have had entrusted to them by the nation the performance of certain responsible and honourable official or communal functions, are by common accord regarded, either for the time being, or permanently as occupying positions of various degrees of eminence.

In the old patriarchal communities social pre-eminence was naturally accorded to the heads of tribal families, and precedence throughout the tribes was generally regulated by the seniority of the sons of the patriarchs and the individuals of their families. Of course there were exceptions to this rule, due to the personal ambitions and achievements of individuals.

Since nations have been evolved from the old tribal organizations, an official class of citizens has been developed, comprising those who, besides occupying the usual position of members of the state, have entrusted to them the execution of what have been described as the life functions of the nation; that is such functions as are peculiar to the civic organization in contra-distinction to the general functions exercised and actions performed by individual citizens as independent units. Official service calls in a special degree for a sense of duty to the public trust, and in many cases for a spirit of sacrifice and, if need be, self effacement. In recognition of these conditions, and often for very practical state reasons, special privileges are granted to certain of the more responsible officials within the spheres appointed for them.

"Precedence" has been defined as the priority of place, or superiority of Rank, in the conventional system of arrangement under which the more eminent and dignified orders of a community are classified on occasion of public ceremony and in the intercourse of private life.

Public functions of some form or another occur with more or less frequency in every state, and those who serve and represent the people in official capacities are necessarily the principal, often the only, participants. An ordinary sense of decency, not to speak of dignity, or that wholesome sense of national pride which exists in all races, demands that such functions be orderly, and that places of honour be given to those entrusted by the nation with the administration of its affairs and the guardianship of its interests and honour, and thus, in a very special sense, representing it.

"Tables" or "Scales" of Precedence emanate from the Crown, and they are issued under authority of the Sovereign. The Crown is "the fountain of honour", and it is its undoubted prerogative to confer on any of its subjects, in any part of its dominions, such titles and distinctions and such rank and place "as to it may seem meet and convenient." Its discretion is limited in those cases only wherein it has been submitted to restraint by Act of Parliament.

There is not any complete and comprehensive code whereby the scheme of social gradation has been defined and settled, once and for all, on a permanent foundation. The principles and rules at present controlling it have been formulated at different periods and have been derived from various sources.

In Britain, questions of precedence came in the ordinary course of things within the jurisdiction of the Courts of Chivalry in which figured such picturesque officials as lord high constables, earl marshals, kings of arms, heralds, pursuivants, etc. Points of unusual moment were referred to and decided by the sovereign in person, the privy council, or parliament.

Although there were "estates" titles and orders of various degrees in England from earliest historical times the oldest English table of precedence in existence is the "Order of All Estates of Nobles and Gentry" prepared for the coronation of Henry IV in 1399.

In the thirty-first year of King Henry VIII, Parliament, by statutory enactment, took cognizance of Precedence. It then passed the "Act for Placing the Lords," which, although it concerned directly only the Great Officers of State, and referred but incidentally to the places of Nobility, has since been considered the chief authority for the marshalling of dignitaries.

This Act was originated, it is important to remember, by the desire of the King and it is declared, as a preliminary, that "although it appertained altogether to the Royal Prerogative to give such honour,

reputation, and placing to his Councillors and others his subjects as should be seeming to the King's most excellent wisdom, the King was nevertheless pleased and contented for an order to be had and taken in his Most High Court of Parliament for the placing of the Great Officers and Lords."

The Statute of Henry VIII was in the nature of a declaratory Act, confirming the ancient and pre-existing Law of Precedence, and, in confirmation of this, it is a matter of historical fact that the advice of Garter King of Arms was taken before the bill was brought in. This Act of King Henry VIII's parliament still remains the only legislative measure in which it has been attempted to deal directly and systematically with any large and important section of the English scale or Table of Precedence. (There are separate tables for Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Canada and other Commonwealth Countries and the Crown Colonies.)

Where no act of Parliament applies, precedence is determined by the will of the Sovereign or by what is accepted as ancient "usage and established custom."

Precedence in Canada is governed by the Table of Precedence for Canada, shown below.

NOTES

1. The presence of The Sovereign in Canada does not impair or supersede the authority of the Governor General to perform the functions delegated to him under the Letters Patent. The Governor General, under all circumstances, should be accorded precedence immediately after The Sovereign.
1. (a) Precedence to be given immediately after the Chief Justice to former Governors General with relative precedence among them governed by the date of their leaving office.
2. Precedence to be given immediately after the former Governors General to former Prime Ministers with relative precedence governed by the date of their first assumption of office.
3. Precedence among Ambassadors and High Commissioners, who rank equally, to be determined by the date of the presentation of their credentials.
4. Precedence to be given to Chargé d'Affaires immediately after Ministers Plenipotentiary.
5. This provision does not apply to such ceremonies and occasions as are of a Provincial nature.
6. The relative precedence of the Canadian ecclesiastical dignitaries to be governed by the date of their assumption of their present office, with their representatives to be given the same relative precedence.
7. This precedence to be given to the Chief of the Defence Staff on occasions when he has official functions to perform, otherwise the Chief of the Defence Staff to have equal

precedence with Deputy Ministers with their relative position to be determined according to the respective dates of their appointments to office. The relative precedence of the Chief of the Defence Staff, Deputy Ministers and other high officials of the public service to be determined from time to time by the Secretary of State of Canada in consultation with the Prime Minister.
