

# MAJORITY ARE PROHIBITIONISTS

A national magazine brings out in an editorial the truth that there really are not so many bootleggers among us as we are led to believe; that the home-still is the exception and not the rule; that there are violations of the Volstead law, but that they are becoming fewer; that we, as a nation, are adjusting ourselves to prohibition much more rapidly than any European country could or would.

Another journal claims that many violations of the Volstead law are instigated by those opposed to the law, who then point to these violations with the argument that the law connot be enforced.

There are all too many bootleggers, and they have all too much patronage, but it may be that these violations of the law are given undue prominence. Those who are trying to enforce the law think this cannot be accomplished without giving publicity to the lawbreakers. Those who would like to see the law repealed are anxious to bring to our attention cases where the law has been flagrantly violated so that we shall see the futility of having such a law. With friends and enemies of prohibition thus working zealously to make public the names and the activities of the bootleggers and distillers it may be that we are given an exaggerated impression of the extent of the illicit liquor traffic. Then there is the joke writer who seems to think that references to the prohibition law and its violators are funny; also the fiction story and the scenario author who try to popularize this form of law-breaking and make it seem that it is frequent and common among all classes of people.

Prohibition is effective to a very large extent. There is a large class among us who have always been opposed to intoxicating liquor and who have never used it. Then there are those who have used it and would use it again if they could do so lawfully, but who respect the law. There are those who have used it but who have learned through prohibition that they are better off without it and would not take it again if they could. There are still others who do not use liquor but who might have learned to do so had not its use been prohibited by law.

When we consider the bootleggers and their somewhat extensive operations we are apt to grow pessimistic about the wisdom of trying to enforce prohibition. But when we see the entire country and observe the whole question of prohibition in its proper perspective we realize that the law is benefiting the multitudes and that only a comparatively few of our entire population are engaged in this form of law breaking.
