IRISH BILL IN COMMONS NEXT WEEK

Settlers' Rights Act Is Disallowed From Justice Department

Legislation Held Up on Ground That Measure Is Identical With Previous Statute - Formal Notice to Premier

By the terms of an Order-in-Council passed by the Dominion Government on January 31 last, a copy of which reached Premier Oliver this morning, the Vancouver Island Settlers' Rights Act, 1919, is regarded by the Federal Minister of Justice as clearly in conflict with the policies of the Dominion Government as enunciated by the Order-in-Council disallowing the 1917 Act. Is is therefore disallowed.

The terms of the Order-in-Council recite that the legislation passed by the British Columbia Legislature at its 1919 session is identical with that which was disallowed by the Dominion Government on May 30, 1918. The 1919 Act was a re-enactment of the legislation passed at the 1917 session of the present Legislature, and the provisions of that measure extended the period in which settlers could apply for Crown Grants within the Vancouver Island railway belt.

VESSEL SANK BUT REFUGEES SAVED

Ship Lost Off Bulgaria; Majority of 700 Russians Rescued

Constantinople, Feb. 12.—A telegram received from Varna to-day says that the Russian liner Emperor Peter the Great, which struck a mine and was lost recently, had 700 Russian refugees on board from Odessa and Sebastopol, but that it is believed most of them were saved.

A Paris dispatch on February 10 announced the sinking of Emperor Peter the Great through striking a mine off the harbor of Varna. That message stated that there was no loss of life on the vessel, which was under charter to the French Government.

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SERBIAN-FRENCH EXCHANGES REPORTED

Rome Paper. Says Serbia Worked For Alliance With France

Rome, Feb. 12.-The Ideal Nazion

Rome, Feb. 12.—The Ideal Nazionale publishes two secret documents exchanged between the Serbian and French Governments last year. In one, Serbia proposed to France a military convention as a basis for a definite alliance, and in the other France responded sympathetically, but with reservations.

The Serbian document, dated September 30, declared Belgrade was convinced that she needed the friendship of France to guarantee her outlets on the Adriatic, and also to prevent any hegemony in the Adriatic, and pointed out that this would insure to France "free action on the Dalmatian coast in the event of a conflict with a Mediterranean power."

NATIONALIZATION OF MINES OPPOSED

Lloyd George Definitely-Takes Stand Against Miners' Proposal

London, Feb. 12.-Stating his op sition in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon to the miners' proposal for nationalization of the coals mines of the United Kingdom, Mr. Lloyd George said the scheme would discourage development of the mining industry, and that it would be impossible to have nationalization be impossible to have nationalization without bureaucracy. What the Miners' Federation really wanted was full control of the coal industry, but to hand it over thus would be disastrous to the community and a misfortune to the miners themselves. It would be useless, he said, to establish another system unless Mr. Brace, the miners' leader, was able to prove that it would be better than the existing system. He declared there was no guarantee that under the plan proposed by the member the present output would be increased.

The Prime Minister ridiculed Mr. Brace's idea that the miners would work harded for the state than for private interests.

A Scene.

Mr. Lloyd George created something of a scene by quoting from Leon Trotzky to show that the Bolshevik experiment of nationalization in Russia had failed, and that the Bolsheviki had been obliged to resort to conscription of labor. This brought forth excited shouts of "thanks to your fighting."

Mr. Brace's scheme, the Prime Minister contended, would discourage the development of the mining industry, while it was impossible to eliminate the speculative incentive except by confiscation, and that was a dangerous game to begin.

A Challenge.

Referring to the address of Wm. Lunn, a Labor member, who had spoken previously, demanding nationalization of all industries, the Prime Minister declared that if any attempt were made to convince the country by violence it would be a challenge to the whole of the British Empire on free government. On such issues declared the Prime Minister, "we will fight him to the death." Such action, declared Mr. Lloyd George, would not be a strike for wages and betterment of conditions of labor, but for the establishment of a soviet, and that would mean the end of constitutional government.

"This nation has ever fought for liberty, and will fight for it again," Mr. Lloyd George exclaimed.

Miners' Scheme.

Mr. Brace declared that his plan was not one of confiscation, but of fair purchase. He asked that a tribunal be established to fix a fair price for shares, and he would favor even a generous price. He said coal would be sold to exporters under the nationalization system as freely as at present, with the proviso that the exporter divide with the district mining councils all profits over one shilling per ton.

NOSE CLOGGED FROM A COLD OR CATARRH

London, Feb. 12.—After considerable discussion of the question of nationalization of the coal mines of the United Kingdom, the conference of manufacturers and producers convoked by the Federation of British Industries yesterday passed a resolution against state ownership and state managership of any branch of industry.

Sir Adam Nimmo, vice-president of the Mining Association of Great Britain, who presented the resolution, said that the meaning of the demand of the miners for nationalization was an effort to seize the vitals of the community and force out of the community conditions as to wages and employment which the miners believed they ought to obtain.

After nationalization of the mines, Sir Adam stated, labor intended to nationalize the land, shipping, banking and insurance, and ultimately secure in their hands the whole means of production of the country.





There is no proof that oil exists in or beneath the Bullhead sandstones, but the possibilities are sufficient to justify extensive reconnaissance work in adjacent areas by a large oil corporation."







Accommodation Will Be Provided for 3,377 Passengers in Six Steamers



STAGGER TRUSTEES

Members of School Board Assail What They Consider Improper Expenditures

Staggered by bills for some \$9,000—bills which had been contracted without the consent of the 1920 Board — members of the School Board last night took the opportunity to assail the whole system of expenditure in vogue.

Trustee J. L. Beckwith expressed not a little concern over the matter, while Trustee Mrs. Andrews, reiterating the views she voiced last year, uttered strong criticism regarding what she considered the illegal practice under which the Board business has been conducted. Trustee Mrs. Spofford, Chairman of the Finance Committee, appeared to concur with these ideas, and said she would refuse to act on the committee unless all expenditures were made strictly in accordance with the by-laws of the Board.

The bills in question were for work done in January of this year. They did not come before the present Board for consideration, it is stated, but the expenditures involved were authorized by the 1919 Board. This action was taken in order that certain works which were progressing when the 1919 Board retired might continue uninterrupted, and in order that the purchase of the year's supplies of stationery and supplies might not be delayed.

The Board decided, after discussing the question fully, to authorize the expenditure of the bills which appeared to some of the Trustees to have been improperly incurred.

How Was it Done?

"Expenditures should receive discussion before they are incurred," declared Trustee Beckwith, when the bills in question came up for discussion. "As a matter of information I would like to know upon what basis they were incurred. Were tenders called? I note, for instance, that we are paying one teamster \$8 a day and another \$10. There may be a reason for this. I don't know. But I do want to point out that the only way we can proceed properly, is to have all expenditures come before the Board. I don't mind the previous Board handing us a surplus, but I do object to it handing us a bill."

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
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

All lines of business and every pro-fession are affected and the school attendance is gradually lessening in every city and town because of the malady. So far the disease is of a mild type. There are many deaths notwithstanding the mild type, however, and as was the case in the 1918-1919 epidemic, most of the deaths are due to pneumonia, following influenza.

There have been 138 deaths from influenza and 154 from pneumonia in Toronto since January 1. Yesterday there were 17 deaths from influenza and 15 from pneumonia.

FOREST PRODUCTION SHOWS BIG INCREASE

Year 1919 Is Largely in Excess of the Two Previous Years

The total value of the Forest Products of British Columbia for the year 1919 places the final figures at \$70,285,094, as against \$54,162,523 in 1918; \$48,300,469 in 1917 and \$35,528,000 in 1916, according to a statement fasued this morning by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands.

The largest increase is in shingles, which show a value of \$12,801,564 as against \$5,805,417 in 1918. The value of the lumber cut is nearly \$5,000,000 more than the previous year, while pulp and paper shows a gain of over \$2,000,000.

\$2,000,000. Each item shows a considerable increase over the previous year, and the mining, railroad and general industrial development of the Province is reflected in the gains made.

SOLDIER COMMISSION

Annual Report Issued by Dr. MacLean Shows Help Given

The British Columbia Returned Soldiers' Aid Commission, an organization under the jurisdiction of the Hon. J. D. MacLean, Provincial Secretary, which renders aid to returned men and their dependents, has had a monentous year. The handling of the \$250,000 provincial grant of last year fell to the lot of this organization, and the annual report just issued shows that up to the end of December, 1919, the sum advanced on gratuities alone amounted to \$281,-427.50, a considerable portion of which has been since returned. A total of 1,156 men were thus assisted, the average advance being \$243.

Relief expenditures.

Relief expenditures have totalled The British Columbia Returned

Relief expenditures have totalled \$46,616, more than 950 men having been thus helped. Of this number 747 were married men or women. Assistance was not confined to the soldiers of British Columbia, since 160 who received aid had enlisted in other parts of the Dominion. Of the 950 no less than 828 saw service in France.

France.

At the annual meeting, presided over by the chairman, Major F. A. Robertson, two resolutions were unanimously approved; he first asking, "That the Federal Government be requested to enact legislation along the lines of the Soldier Settlement Board, to provide capital at a low rate of interest for those returned soldiers who wish to establish themselves in various businesses or industries."

The second resolution asks for a change in the regulations dealing with rehabilitation, so that,
"Each and every soldier who can show that his opportunity to educate himself to fill the place to which his natural bent and inclination inclined him has been retarded, shall be given an opportunity to complete such education with the assistance of the Federal Government either by a free grant, or by a partial grant and partial loan, provided always that such continuation of education or training shall be under the supervision of the Federal Government."
Copies of the above resolutions were forwarded to other provincial Returned Soldier Commissions throughout Canada and to the various returned soldier organizations, together with a request for cooperation in securing these privileges

Teachers Request New Salary Schedule and Cost-of-Living Bonus

Another salary problem, which recalls vividly to the Trustees the trouble with the teachers last year, appears to be looming up in front of the School Board. The teachers now request a bonus of \$100 to meet increased living costs, and the adoption of an entirely new salary scale, to go into effect in the school year beginning next September.

A letter from the Victoria and District Teachers' Association making these requests, caused a mild sensation at the School Board meeting las night. No action as taken on the matter, and the communication was tabled until the next meeting of the Board on Saturday afternoon.

Some fear is entertained that the Board will not be able to conclude consideration of such a weighty problem in the one afternoon. Last year in fact, the negotiations with the teachers covered months. If the Board decides to grant the increases suggested, however, it will have to provide for them in its annual estimates which, by statute, must be handed to the City Council by Monday.
