MINING SHAFTS .- DEPTHS AT VIR-GINIA CITY AND ELSEWHERE. - The Territorial Enterprise, speaking of the mining shafts in and around Virginia City,

200 feet is a depth so common that we that depth. We have not gone out of our way to hunt deep sl afts, but can give the depth of a few in the city and vicinity. The deepest shaft in the Gould and Curry mine is 424 feet; Central, 420; in the Ophir they have worked to the depth of 325 feet, and have a shaft 100 feet deeper, or 426 feet deep; despest shaft in the California Company's mine, 275 feet; in the Mexican, 250. There are doubtless a dozen or more of air and prospecting shafts near this city that are between 250 and 300 feet deep. The Golden Gate shaft, near Gold Hill, is 329 feet deep, and there are doubtless several shafts in Gold Hill that are over 300. The Santiago shaft (incline), in Devil's Gate District, is 280 feet deep; and throughout the country are many more very nearly as deep. Some persons appear to think these great depths, and have an idea that our mines must be very nearly worked out when we get down 400 or 500 feet on them; but compared with what has been done in other silver mining countries, we have hardly made a decent beginning.

The deepest shaft in the world is at Kuttenberg, in Bohemia, which is a little over 3000 feet deep. A shaft at Clausthal, called the "Duke George William," is 2,666 feet, and at other places in Germany, also in Mexico, are shafts nearly as deep Very many mines in Europe are worked to the depth of 1,500 feet. The largest shaft we have ever heard of -that is having the largest opening-is a shaft that was commenced at Valencina, in Mexico. This shaft was of an octagonal form and about 8 yards across; it was intended to be sunk to the depth of a total cost of £240,000. We are not informed as to whether it was ever completed. About the most perilcus shaft mining of which we ever heard, was that wractisod in the mine of Huel-werry, near Penzance. Here a shaft was sunk on a spot of ground left dry by the ebb tide for but a few hours at a time. A wooden tower was built over the mouth of the shaft, which being well caulked kept out the water of the ocean when the tide was in and served to support the hoisting apparatus. A vessel driven by a storm run into this tower in the night and overturned it, putting an end to this To give strangers some idea of the inex haustible nature of our mines, we will state in conclusion that the Mexican worked for three years on the south half of their mine, being 50 feet of the length of the lead, averaging 100 tons of ore per day, as donly reached a depth of 250 feet At this rate it would take over 70 years to work 100 feet on the Comstock vein down to the depth of 3000 feet, working every day but Sundays, and 21,191,000 tons of ore would be obtained, worth, at \$50 per ton, (which is a low price) \$109,-

GRAPE, CANISTER, AND SHRAPNELL An officer of the Fourteenth Massachusetts regiment recently communicated the following interesting article to a Lawrence paper: Grape consists of nine shot arranged in three layers, which vary in size according to the calibre of the will not mention such as are not below gun; they are held together by two iron plates of about 1.14 inch less diameter than the calibre of the gun, two rings, a bolt and a nut. The canvas bag arrangement is too old for this war: it is not so simple or durable and has not been used for years. Canister for a gun contains 27 smaal cast iron balls, arranged in four leyers, the top of 6, the remainder of seven each ; for a howitzer it contains 48 small iron balls in four layers of twelve each; for the same calibre you will see that the balls for canister is a tin cylinder, closed at the bottom by a thick castiron plate or a wooden sabot, and at the top by a sheet iron plate with a handle attached; the interstices between the balls are closely packed with saw dust to prevent crowding when the pince is fired. Schrapnell consists of a very thin shell, whice is filled with musket balla; the interstices are then filled by pouring in melted sulphur; a hole is then bored through the mass of sulphur and bullets to receive the bursing charge. Now, to explain the difference between a "shrap-nell" or "spherical case" and a "shell." The destructive force of a shrapnell is what it receives from the charge in the gun, the powder in the shrapnell being only to break the envelope and spread the baals they still moving forward by force of the impulse they received from the charge in the gun. A shell is made very much thicker than the envelope of a shrapnell, and is nearly filled with powder, and will do great execution if it explodes on the ground, it having destructive qualities sn itself aside from the discharge of the gun. A shrapnell shell has only half the charge of rowder that a shell proper has; thus a 24 pounder 500 yards, and it was estimated that 23 | shrapnell contains 175 musket balls, 6 years would be occupied in digging it, at ounces of powder, and weighs 22.75 pounds. A 24 pounder shell has 12 ounces of powder, and weighs 19.75 pounds. A 6 pounder shrapnell hes 39 musket balls and 2.5 ounces of powder.

Harris) had retired at eleven o'clock the previous evening, in her usual health and fine spirits. About twelve o'clock a brass band called to serenade the doctor, and obout the same time he was called away to see a dangerous mining enterprise for all time.

To PRESERVE GRAPES. - As California is eminently a grape growing State, why should we not enjoy this delicious fruit all the year round? Let us take a lesson from the French, who have grapes the year round by coating the clusters with lime. The bunches are picked just before they are thoroughly ripe, and dipped in lime water of the consistency of thin cream. They are then hung on wires, and when dry are dipped the second time and then hung up to remain. The lime coating keeps oue air and checks any tendency to decay. When wanted for the table, dip the clusters in warm water to remove the lime.

CAMEL TRAIN .- A train of camels is running from the Humboldt salt mines to Virginia City, packing salt for the Humboldt Srlt Company. This will be a cheap mode of transportation. Each camel is able to pack from 800 to 1,000 pounds. It costs nothing to keep them, and they will keep fat on sage brush and greasewood, and the deserts which are so hard on horses and mules, are just ducks for camels.

# Judicial Election.

On Wednesday next the Election for an entire Supreme Bench, for District and County Judges, and Justices of the Peace takes place. This requirement that the Judiciary should be elected at a for San Francisco, which foundered latetime when no political officers were to be chosen is a good provision in our Constitution, if the elections were a few months furtler apart, but as it is they might as well have both come off on the same day.

So far es our own county is concerned there seems to be too little interest mani fested to bring out a full vote, and we should not be surprised to find the present election in this county full three hundred votes short of the general election in September; it is not likely, however, that this inertness on the part of the voters will at all change the result from what it would have been in September, for both parties alike will doubtless partake of the apathy.

LAST Tuesday the election of State Officers took place in Pennsylvania, Ohio and Iowa. The Union ticket has been elected without exception, Pennsylvania re electing Gov. Curtin with a majority of about 30,000. In Ohio about one half the counties give Brough 50,000 majority over Vallandigham, indicating that complete returns, including the soldiers' vote, will give him the astounding majority of 100,000. The majority of Col. Stone, Union candidate for Governor in Iowa, is estimated at from 12,000 to 15,000.

On motion it is ordered that Amos Mathews. County Surveyor, Geo. Swingle and S. H. Lettner be appointed viewers to view a proposed road from Franklin School House to the town of Washington; further ordered that they proceed to view said road on Monday, the 26th inst., or within five days thereafter.

Tuesday, Oct. 13th. On motion it is ordered that an advertirement be published in the Knight's Landing NEWS and Sacramento Bee for bids to build a bridge from the bridge across Sac River to the lands of Mike Bryte, said bridge to be built in accordance to plan and specification of County Surveyor now on file.

Wednesday, Oct. 14th. It appearing to the Board that no one having bid to build the bridge across Willough Slough, and but one having bid to build the bridge on Canon Road, J. W. Tilly proposing to build for same for \$875 00, on motion said bid was rejected, it being deemed by the board too high. Therefore ordered that advertisements be continued in K. L. NEWS for proposals for building said bridge until the 16th day of November next, at which time said bids will be opened. On motion it is ordered that the petition of B. F. King and others prying for the formation of a new School District in Merritt township be granted, and that said new District be bounded as follows: On the North, by the North line of the Ranch of King; on the West by the Tulo Lake; on the South by the south line of the ranch of Job Woods and on the East by the Sacramento River, embracing a territory about 4 miles in length, and 1 mile in breath.

Accounts audited and allowed this day amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one thousand eight hundred and twenty-three doilars and sixty one cents.

On motion adjourned.

DESERTERS FROM GEN. MEADE'S AR-MY .- Official returns show that there have been six thousand desertions from the Army of the Potomac since the first of July, of which four thousand, or nearly, have been recaptured and returned to the ranks or subjected to various grades of punishment. Large numbers of de serting drafted men and substitutes are now finding a way from the army by taking refuge in the country south of the Orange and Alexandria Railroad, and then choosing their opportunity to cross the P tomac in Maryland. The boats of the Potomac flotilla have made several captures of those fugitives in the last few

SAN FRANCISCO BAPTIST ASSOCIATION. This Association, in session at Sacramento, resumed its business on Monday morning. The entire day was consumed in hearing the reports of various Committees. The Committee on Resolutions reported a highly patriotic paper on the state of the country, sustaining the Government and the Administration in all acts adopted for the prosecution of the war and the suppression of the rebellion. This resolution drew out an animated discussion, and was finally adopted by a unanimous vote, excepting two.

LARGE FIRE AT WEAVERVILLE .- The Union of the 12th had a telegram, which gives a few additional particulars. It says:

There was a large fire here yesterday. At four o'clock a fire took place in a China house four doors below the St. Charles Hotel, consuming all of China town, Brady's brick hotel, Lang's brick store and the Journal office; total loss in all more than one third of the town. The estimate of loss is \$400,000.

ENROLMENT IN THIS STATE .- We insert the following interesting documents for the benefit of all concerned:

Provost Marshal's office, Middle District of California, Sacramento, Oct. 12th, 1863.

It is of much importance to the citizens of this State to know exactly the duties of the Provost Marshal, and duty of the citizen in relation to the enrollment now about to take place. The duty of the Provost Marshal will be strictly performed, and I hope that all persons will perform their duty so that it may not be necessary for the arrest of any persons for refusing to answer any question put to them by the enrolling officer, or answering such questions falsely. The enrollment will commence in each of the following counties on the 20th of this month, to wit : Sacramento, Placer, Nevada, El Dorado Amador, Calaveras, San Joaquin, Stanislaus, Tuolumne and Mono. My officers will be fully instructed to ar rest and hand over to the proper officers for punishment all persons who shall vio-late the law. The inclosed opinion of William Whiting, Solicitor of the War Department, will fully explain the duty of the Provost Marshal and citizen, and the penalty attached to the violation

The following opinion of William Whiting, Solicitor of the War Department, has been ordered to be published by the Secretary of War:

OPINION. "It is made the duty of the Provost Marshals to obey all lawful orders and regulations of the Provost Marshal General, and such as may be prescribed by law, concerning the enrollment and calling into service of the National forces.'

(Act March 3, 1863, Sec. 7.) "The 25th section of the same Act provides, 'that if any person shall resist any draft of men enrolled under this Act into the service of the United States, or shall counsel or aid any person to resist any such draft; or shall assault or obstruct any officer in making such draft, or in the performance of any service in relation thereto; or shall counsel any person to assault or obstruct any such officer, or shall counsel any drafted men not to appear at the place of rendezvons, or willfully disuade them from the performance of military duty as required by law, such person shall be subject to summary arrest by the Provost Marshal, and shall be forthwith delivered to the civil authorities, and, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine not exceeding \$500 or by imprisonment not exceeding two years, or by both of said punishments."

"To do any act which will prevent or impede the enrollment of the National forces, (which enrollment is preliminary and ess ntial to the draft), is to prevent or impede the draft itself.

'The enrollment is a 'service to be performed by the Provost Marshal in reation to the draft.' It is not the act of drawing ballets out of a ballot box itself, but it is in relation to it,' and is the first step that must by law be taken prepara tory to draft. It is, therefore, clearly within the duty of the Provost Marshal to subject all persons who obstruct the enrollment, the meeting of the Board, or any other proceeding which is preliminary and essential to the draft, to summary arrest, according to the provisions of section 25,

"There are many ways of obstructing officers in the performance of their services or duties in making, or in relation to the draft, without employing physical force. The neglect or refusal to do an act required by law to be done, may itself be such an 'obstruction' as to subject the offender to arrest.

"Suppose a person be found standing n a passage through which the drafting officers were required to enter into a place designated by law as the place for graft. and suppose that his standing in that place would prevent access by these officers to the place of draft. If they request him to move away, and he neglects or refuses so to do, for the purpose of preventing the draft, the non-performance of the act of removal would be itself an 'obstruction of the draft, or of an officer in the performance of his duty in relation to it.

"Standing mute in civil Courts, is, under certain circumstances, a punishable offence; and so, if a person, with intent to prevent the draft, refuses to give his true name when lawfully requested so to do by an officer whose legal duty it is to ascertain and enroll it, it is an obstruction of that officer in the performance of one of his duties in relation to the draft. So, also, of the giving of false names with the same intent; and the offender will, in either case, be subject to summary arrest by the Provost Marshal.

Qualifications of an Elector:

Article 2120, section 10 .- Every white male citizen of the United States, and every white male citizen of Mexico who shall have elected to become a citizen of the United States under the treaty of peace exchanged and ratified at Querataro, on the thirtieth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of the State six months next preceeding the election, and the county or district where he claims his vote thirty d ys, shall be entitled to a vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Article 2121, section 11 .- For the purpose of voting, no person shall be deemed to have gained or lost a residence by reason of his presence or absence, while employed in the service of the United States, nor while engaged in the navigation of the waters of this state or of the United States or of the high seas; nor while a student at any seminary of learning; nor while kept at any almshouse, or other asylum, nor while confined in any

public prison.

Article 2122, section 12 —No idiot or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privileges of an

Article 2123, section 13 .- Absence from this state on business of the state, or of the United States, shall not affect the question of residence of any person.

Article 2136, section 27.—Any person offering to vote may be challenged as unqualified by the inspector, or either of the judges, or by any legal voter, and it shall in all cases, be the duty of the inspector and of each judge to challenge any person offering to vote whom he shall know or suspect not to be duly quali-

fied as an elector. Article 2137, section 28 -When any person offering to vote is challenged, it shall be the duty of the b ard of judges to declare to him

the qualifications of an elector. Section 29 If such person shall insist that he is entitled to vote, and the challence shall not be withdrawn, he shall not be entitled to vote unless he takes the following oath, to be administered by the Inspector or one of the Judges, viz:

"You do swear (or affirm, as the case may be) that you are a citizen of the United States, that you are of the age of twenty one years, according to the best of your knowledge and belief, that you have resided in this State six months next preceeding this election, and that you have not voted this day."

Upon taking which oath, he shall be entitled to vote for all State officers, and if he offer to vote for any district, county, or ownship officer, hes all, in a dition thereto, make onth that he has resided in such district, county or township, (as the case may be,)

Proceedings to be observed in conduct-

ing Elections: Act of April 20, 1863, section 35.—As soon as all the votes are read off and counted, a certificate shal be drawn up on each of the papers containing the poli list and tallies, or attached thereto, stating the number of votes each person voted for has received, and designating the office to fill which he was voted for, which number shall be written in words at full length. Each certificate shall be signed at full length. Each certificate shall be signed by the clerks, the jindges, and inspector. One of said certificates, with the poll list, and tally paper to which it is attached, shall be retained by the Inspector, and preserved by him at least six months. The ballots shall be strung

on a cord or thread by the inspector during the counting of the ballots, in the order in which they are entered upon the tally list by the clerks, and said ballots, together with the other of said certificates, with the poll list and tally paper to which it is attached, shall be sealed up by the inspector in presence of the judges and clerks, and indorsed "Election Returns" and he directed and delivered ion Returns," and be directed and delivered r sent by the inspector to the County Glerk of the county in which the election is held, of the county in which the election is held, and the said ballots shall be kept for at least ax months by said Glerk; and if any person se of the opinion that the vote of any precinct hall not have been correctly counted, he may appear on the day appointed for the Board of Supervisors to open the returns, and demand a recount of the vote of said precinct, and the Board of supervisors shall preced to reconst Board of supesvisors shall proceed to recount the vote of the precinct that is so claimed to have been incorrectly counted.

Article 2131, section 22 .- At all e'ections the polls shall be opened at 8 o'clock in the morning, and shall continue open untill sunset, at which time the judges shall close the polls; provided, that the judges of the election may take a recess of one hour at any time they may think proper during the day, before three o'clock in the afternoon.—[Am. April 26, 1851; R. s. st. 1850, 103.

Article 2132, section 23 .- The board of udges, before they commence receiving ballots, shall cause it to be proclaimed aloud at the place of voting that the polls are opened.

Article 2133, section 24.—The voting shall be by ballot. The ballot, shall be a paper ticket containing the names of the persons for whom the elector intends to vote, and designating the office to which each person so named is intended by him to be chosen.

Article 2134, section 25.—Whenever any person offers to vote, the inspector shall pronounce his name in an audible voice, and if there be no objection to the qualification of such person as an elector, shall receive his ballot, and in the presence of the other judges put the same, without being opened or examined, into the ballot-box.

Article 2135, section 26 -The name of each elector whose ballot has been thus received, shall be immediately entered by each clerk, in the column of his poll list, headed "names of voters," numbering each name in the additional column, as it is taken down, so that it may be seen at any time whether the two lists

Article 2137, section 31 .- If the vote of any person be challenged on the ground that he has been convicted of an infamous crime, or disfranchised by any court of competent ju-risdiction, he shall not be required to answer any questions respecting such alleged conviction; and in the absence of any authentical record of such facts, it may be competent for two disinterested witnesses upon outh to

Article 3138, section 32 - When the polls are closed, proclamation thereof shall be made at the place of voting, and no votes shall be afterwards received.

Article 2139 section 33 .- As soon as the polls re closed on the afternoon of the day f election, the judges shall open the ballothox and commence counting the votes, and in no case shall the ballot-box be removed from the room in which any election may be held, until all the ballots are counted; the counting of ballots shall in all cases be public. The fallots shall be taken out carefully, one by one, by the inspector or one of the judges, who shall carefully open them, and read aloud thename of each person contained therein, and the office for which every such person is voted for. Each clerk shall write down each office to be filled and the name of each person voted for for such office, and shall keep the number of votes by tallies, as they are read by the inspector or judge. The counting of the votes shall be continued without adjournment until all are counted.

Article 2140, section 34 -If two tickets are found folded together, they shall both be rejected; and it more persons are designated on any ticket for any office than are to be elected to such office, such part of the ticket shall not be counted for any of them; but no ticket shall be lost for want of form, if the board of judges can determine to their satisfaction the person voted for and the office intended. Statutes of 1850, Woods' Digest, page 377.

The attention of Inspectors and Judges is especially referred to Act of April 22, 1863, Statutes of 1863, pages 398 and 399.
