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
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DAILY PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

FORTY-FIFTH SESSION

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY.

Pontiac, Mich., Sept. 12, 1900.

The forty-fifth session of the Detroit Annual Conference met in the Methodist Episcopal Church in Pontiac, Michigan, Wednesday, September 12, 1900, at 9 a.m., Bishop Isaac W. Joyce, presiding.

The hymn "Blest Be the Tie that Binds Our Hearts in Christian Love" was sung. Bishop Joyce read Isaiah liii. for the first lesson and Matthew xxvi:18-28 for the second lesson.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was then administered by Bishop Joyce, with the assistance of Bishop J. C. Hartzell and the Presiding Elders.

The Communion hymns were numbers 393 and 211.

At the close of the Communion service we sang one stanza of "Nearer My God to Thee," and were led in prayer by Bishop Joyce.

Nominations for Secretary were then called for. A. W. Stalker, being nominated for the fifth year in succession, declined re-election.

The Bishop appointed the following tellers: Clarence E. Allen, Paul Desjardins, Reuben Crosby.

Formal ballot was taken after nominations for Secretary.

The tellers retired for counting of ballot.

George F. Tripp was re-elected Statistical Secretary and named the following assistants: O. J. Blackford, C. H. Perrin, F. E. Dodds, F. I. Walker, F. L. Leonard, Howard Goldie, James Chapman, who were confirmed.

W. G. Nixon was nominated for the fifth successive time as Treasurer, but declined re-election.

Thomas M. Mott was nominated and elected by acclamation as Treasurer and named Edwin D. Dimond and W. G. Stephens, who were confirmed as assistants.

The Rules of Order governing the last session were adopted. The hour for devotional services was fixed at 8:15 a.m.

The bar of the Conference was fixed at a line crossing the church from the second post in the rear.

A Committee on Superannuated Preachers' Aid Society was added to the list of Standing Committees, and the officers of the Superannuated Preachers' Aid Society were made said committee.

The Standing Committees were confirmed.

The tellers here returned and the Bishop read their report. Herman C. Scripps was declared elected Secretary and named A. Raymond Johns for his assistant.

Bishop J. C. Hartzell and Rev. E. S. Dunham, D. D., and Rev. Frank L. Hart were introduced to the Conference.

At the introductory suggestion of Bishop Joyce, Dr. Dunham was invited to conduct Conference evangelistic services during this session.

Bishop Joyce addressed the Conference.

C. M. Thompson moved that the order for the day at 10 a. m. Thursday be the taking of a collection for the Galveston, Texas, sufferers.

Bishop Hartzell, representing the Missionary Society, Rev. F. L. Hart, representing the Church Insurance Company, and H. L. Canright, M. D., representing our missionary work in West China, briefly addressed the Conference.

C. W. Baldwin, P. E., moved that the Committee on Church Insurance be continued. The committee is as follows: W. B. Pope, J. H. Thomas, J. M. Gordon, A. Roedel, E. W. Frazee, S. A. Dean, R. Crosby.

J. E. Jacklin addressed the Conference on the interests of the "Michigan Christian Advocate," and presented as proceeds of the Methodist Publishing Company a check for two thousand and seventy-five dollars and sixty-six cents for our Superannuated Preachers.

On motion of Seth Reed the Conference accepted the check and extended a vote of thanks.

On motion the time was extended.

On motion of Joshua Stansfield the officers of the Superannuated Preachers' Aid Society were permitted to present the business and interests of the Superannuated Preachers at the beginning of the program this evening.

After various announcements, the calling of Standing Committees, the Doxology was sung, Bishop J. C. Hartzell pronounced the Benediction, and on motion we adjourned.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY.

PONTIAC, MICH., Sept. 13, 1900.

The Conference was opened at 8:15 a.m. with Pentecostal service, led by Rev. E. S. Dunham.

At 9 a. m. we sang "Blest Be the Tie that Binds Our Hearts in Christian Love," and Bishop Joyce was in the chair.

The minutes of the first day were read and corrected and approved.

Bishop Joyce introduced Bishop W. X. Ninde, who was cordially welcomed and with sincere pleasure heard.

On motion of Dr. L. R. Fiske the name of Bishop Ninde was added to the Conference roll.

Harvey G. Pearce was appointed to receive subscriptions for the "Methodist Review."

At the request of Bishop Joyce the Conference referred to the Presiding Elders the distribution of the various benevolent assessments on the several districts.

The accounts due the Book Concern were referred to the Committee on Debts Due the Book Concern, and the papers placed in the hands of Paul Desjardins.

The Bishop presented the following drafts, viz.: twenty-two dollars from the Chartered Fund, and one-thousand five hundred and sixty-two dollars from the Book Concern for the Superannuated Preachers. The Conference ordered that these drafts be drawn in favor of the Conference Treasurer.

On motion of Seth Reed the further roll call was dispensed with.

On motion of E. B. Bancroft, P. E., Brother S. G. Taylor was excused from attendance on account of sickness.

The Statistical Secretary here called the roll of delinquents.

Rev. Samuel Upham, D. D., was introduced to the Conference.

13th Question of the Discipline was taken up.

The Ann Arbor District Report was called for. The character of E. W. Ryan, P. E., was passed, and he presented his report.

At the close of this report a collection was ordered taken for Brother J. L. Newkirk, who is detained on his charge by serious sickness. The amount of this collection was sixty-seven dollars.

The Saginaw District Report was called for. The character of John Sweet, P. E., was passed, and he presented his report.

On motion of Alfonzo Crane the order of the day (a collection for Galveston, Texas, sufferers) was deferred to Friday morning, just prior to the Bishop's address to the class for admission into full connection.

On motion of L. R. Fiske a recess was ordered to hold the business session of the Corporate Conference. L. R. Fiske presided. Seth Reed, Secretary, presented the report of the Trustees as follows:

The Trustees of the Detroit Corporate Conference held their annual meeting in Detroit, Sept. 10, 1900.

The Treasurer submitted his annual statement and report, which were referred to a committee for examination, who reported in favor of their correctness. The report shows the amount of assets in the treasury at date, consisting of mortgages, notes, certificates and cash, to be \$16,903.49. Of this, \$510 is a bequest to the Church Extension Society, the interest on which—\$20.40—is due to that fund. Five hundred dollars is the G. W. Lowe bequest, the interest on which—\$20—is due to the two most necessitous cases in the Conference as ascertained by the Board of Stewards.

The Board ordered these two items of interest paid.

These deductions leave the amount of the Trustees' Fund at date \$15,853.09. The Board recommended that \$850 from interest account be turned over to the interest account of the Superannuated Preachers' Aid Society, to be by them distributed.

The term of office as Trustees of S. Clemens, S. Reed, and J. E. Jacklin expires, and the Board respectfully nominated them for re-election.

The Conference adopted the report and ordered the Secretary to cast the ballot for the names nominated. The Conference instructed the Trustees hereafter to nominate twice the number of names of Trustees as are to be needed.

The draft for \$850 was ordered and the Corporate Conference adjourned.

The Conference resumed with Bishop Joyce in the chair. Bishop Joyce invited Bishop W. X. Ninde to preside.

Bishop Ninde called for Report of Bay City District. The character of Wm. M. Ward, P. E., was passed, and he presented his report.

Detroit District Report was called for. The character of Wm. H. Shier, P. E., was passed, and he presented his report.

Bishop Joyce resumed the chair.

Flint District Report was called for. The character of E. B. Bancroft, P. E., was passed and he presented his report. Brother Bancroft's report was followed by Seth Reed, in expression of the sympathy of the Conference for Brother and Sister Bancroft in their affliction in the death of their little Huldah, aged eight and one-half years.

Port Huron District Report was called for. The character of Chas. W. Baldwin, P. E., was passed, and he presented his report.

Lake Superior District Report was called for. The character of Joseph Frazer, P. E., was passed, and he presented his report.

Bishop Joyce here called the College of Presiding Elders before him and asked each one the following questions:

Have you paid personal attention to the benevolent collections on your District this year?

Have you paid personal attention to the insurance of our church property on your District this year?

Have you any charges against any effective elder on your District?

Each Presiding Elder answered the first question "Yes."

Each Presiding Elder answered the second question "Yes."

Each Presiding Elder answered the third question "No."

On motion of E. B. Bancroft, P. E., Rev. Charles E. Marvin, a member of our Conference, in good standing, desiring to enter the ministry of the Presbyterian Church, was permitted to withdraw from the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, his credentials having been surrendered. The Secretary was instructed to return to Bro. Marvin his credentials with the proper disciplinary statement written across the face, signed by the President and Secretary of the Conference.

Samuel Upham, D. D., addressed the Conference in the interest of Drew Theological Seminary.

The time was extended.

President John P. Ashley was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interest of Albion College, bringing good cheer.

Dr. Thomas B. Neeley was introduced and presented the interests of the Sunday School Union and Tract Societies.

Dr. W. G. Hubbard, State Superintendent of the Michigan Anti-Saloon League, was introduced to the Conference.

On motion of Roland Woodhams the duty of questioning the candidates for admission on trial was assigned to the Committee on Conference Relations, reversing the order of last year (see Minutes 1899, page 8).

Announcements were made by Bishop Joyce and W. F. Sheridan.

N. Norton Clark moved that the names of J. M. Kerridge and C. E. Benson be added to Committee on Conference claimants, which was done.

The Committees were called.

The Doxology was sung and Bishop W. X. Ninde pronounced the Benediction and Conference adjourned.

THIRD DAY-FRIDAY.

PONTIAC, MICH., Sept. 14, 1900.

The Conference session opened in the blessed atmosphere of the Pentecostal service and Bible reading, conducted by Rev. E. S. Dunham.

At 9 o'clock a. m. Bishop Joyce called for the reading of yesterday's record. The minutes were read and approved.

Bishop Joyce invited Bishop Ninde to occupy a seat on the platform.

Dr. W. A. Spencer, Secretary of our Church Extension. Society, was introduced to the Conference, and made brief statements in the interest of Church Extension.

Dr. Lewis R. Fiske presented the report of the Detroit Conference Deaconess Board of Nine. The report was accepted.

DEACONESS BOARD OF NINE.

To the Detroit Annual Conference:

The last General Conference enacted some important legislation for the Deaconess work. It created a General Deaconess Board, to consist of the Board of Bishops, the same to have general supervision over all Deaconess work throughout the Church. This Board is required to divide the conferences-annual and mission-into Deaconess Districts, and appoint for each a Bishop as Superintendent over these several Districts. It is made the duty and work of this General Board to authorize, on the recommendation of the annual conference, the establishment of homes. orphanages, hospitals and old people's homes and other institutions such as properly come under the care of Deaconesses of the Church, and to authorize conventions and other general meetings held in the interest of the Deaconess work. This Board may also authorize the establishing and maintenance of homes for Deaconesses who, on account of age, loss of health, or other disability, are unable to continue in the work and are without adequate means of support. Questions of administration in the Deaconess work are to be referred to this Board by the District Superintendent.

The District Superintendent, who, for this conference, is Bishop Ninde, has supervision of all Deaconess work within the district. To him reports must be made of Deaconesses, churches, conference boards, Deaconess institutions and benevolent societies, and of other matters pertaining to Deaconess work, who shall render annual report of the same to the General Board. All transfers of Deaconesses from one field of labor to another shall be subject to his approval.

The age at which a young woman may be appointed has been changed from 25 to 23 years. She must present a certificate of good health from some reputable physician.

Approved Deaconesses are required to present annually to

the Conference Board a certificate of standing and character from the quarterly conferences of the churches with which they are connected.

The property for homes and other Deaconess institutions may be held in trust for the church by any disciplinary societies of the church or local board of trustees elected by the society with which the institution is connected. The order of present homes is not to be disturbed.

The foregoing is a statement in brief of changes made by the last General Conference and of the principal new provisions enacted in regard to the same.

There is but one Deaconess Home within the bounds of the Detroit Conference, located on Elizabeth street, in Detroit. Of this Miss Sara J. Gaunt is Surerintendent. This Home reports as follows:

We have disciplinary certificates from the several churches to which these Deaconesses belong. We ask approval for future Deaconess work of all now licensed except Sarah E. Hicks, who expects to leave the work this fall.

We have licensed Dorothy M. Leavitt, and ask that she be consecrated at this session of the Conference.

Chairman Board of Nine.

The Board asked for the approval by the Conference of the licenses of Deaconesses Sara J. Gaunt, Deborah B. Kerfoot, Katharine A. Blackburn. They were approved.

George O. Robinson, Mrs. George H. Stalker, Mrs. Wm. B. Pope were elected members of Detroit Deaconess Board of Nine.

The order of the day was called for, and the collection for the Galveston sufferers amounted to \$52.00.

The Secretary nominated Eugene Coffin as Financial Secretary, and D. Burnham Tracy as Secretary of Transportation. They were elected.

7th Question was taken up, "Who have been admitted into full membership?"

The Registrar reported the examinations passed, and as their names were called, the following brethren presented themselves before the Bishop, viz.:

The Conference stood to sing the hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have," and we were led in prayer by Rev. J. M. Kerridge.

Bishop Joyce addressed the class, and was reverently heard by the large congregation. Afterwards the Bishop asked the Disciplinary questions, receiving required responses.

At the close of the address their examination standings were reported, their characters passed, and Alvin F. Knobloch, Otto L. Dreys and Wm. S. Smith were elected to Deacon's Orders. Arthur T. Camburn has been already ordained a Deacon.

On motion of E. B. Bancroft, Edwin C. Benson was continued in studies of the second year.

9th Question was taken up, "What Members are in studies of Fourth Year?"

The following names were called, their examinations reported, and they were elected to Elder's Orders, viz.:

Frank E. Dodds, being already an elder, was also reported by the Registrar as having passed in his studies.

E. J. Baskerville was invited to address the Conference on "The Work of An Evangelist." C. B. Allen followed in commendatory remarks, and W. F. Stewart presented the following resolutions, viz.:

Resolved, That we have great respect and admiration for the spirit of our brother, Rev. E. J. Baskerville, in undertaking the work of an evangelist. Knowing his personal life and special gifts, we most heartily commend him to all our pastors and churches as our evangelist.

The pastor who overlooks the League in taking inventory of the instruments which may be used for the upbuilding of the Church is sadly blind.

We place still greater emphasis upon the imperative necessity of working among the children.

Your Committee suggest, in view of Art. 47, Discipline of 1900, that the Junior League superintendents may with highest wisdom be appointed class leaders as well; that the well-nigh forgotten fact may be recalled that baptized children are practically probationers in the Church, and that closer attention may be given to them for qualified membership. This must be emphasized.

We congratulate the League management on the spirit in which it has entered upon the twentieth century forward movement and approve its plan to make the coming year one of special interest in good literature—emphasizing the claims of the peerless *Epworth Herald*—and of Christian education, benevolence and charge organization.

Your Committee nominate as officers of the Detroit Conference Epworth League for the following year: For President, Hiram C. Colvin; First Vice-President, A. Ames Maywood; Second Vice-President, Geo. A. Fee, Cor. Sec., Howard A. Field; Recording Sec., Cauley H. Perrin; Treasurer, Bertram E. Allen.

Memoirs.

Rev. Marsenus B. Wilsey.

Rev. M. B. Wilsey was born in the town of Stark, Herkimer county, New York, April 7, 1817, and died at his home in Milford, January 30, 1900. When seven years old his parents moved to Alexander, Jefferson county, and settled on a new farm in a new country. Here he grew up, subject to all the privations incident to pioneer life. The nearest school, three miles away, was of the poorest quality and kept but three months in the year, and that in the summer time. He had an ardent desire for knowledge, and so made the most of his limited privileges. At fifteen his parents returned to Stark, where the school was much better, and here he prosecuted his studies with all the ability which he possessed. When 18 he left home and attended a select school for five terms. At its close such had been his desire for knowledge, and steady application to books and eagerness to grasp every source of information that came within his reach, he found himself well qualified to teach any of the common schools of his day, and for a number of years he followed the teacher's profession. In 1838 he came to Michigan, wherehe devoted his winters to teaching, and during the summer worked on a farm, meantime improving his mind as he had opportunity. Thus was his young life spent mostly in a new and undeveloped country, surrounded with its difficulties and privations, which served, possibly, to make him more self-reliant and fitted him the better to grapple with the sterner duties of his mature manhood. He was married to Alma Ann Bigelow, sister of Rev. W. E. and A. J. Bigelow, May 13, 1840, who survives him. He gave his heart to his Savior in a meeting held by Rev. Samuel Bibbins and Marcus Swift, and so vivid and genuine was the transformation of his whole moral nature and spiritual powers that he never afterwards doubted that the work was of God. He united with the Wesleyan Methodist Church at the time of its organization in Michigan in 1842. In 1843 he was licensed to preach, and at an annual conference held in Ann Arbor. September, 1844, he was received on trial and appointed to Grand River Circuit. This was a large circuit, having Grand Rapids

as a center, which at that time was but a small village with a The outlying country was one vast few hundred inhabitants. wilderness, the roads often were almost impassable and the difficulties and hardships great, yet he heroically pushed his way through the tangled forests, hunted up the scattered people, and in their log cabins preached to them the blessed consolations and the saving power of the glorious gospel of the Son of God. In 1848 he was ordained elder and continued to preach in the Wesleyan Methodist Church for a number of years. twice elected a delegate to their General Conference and served as trustee for a long time of Adrian College. At the close of the Civil War, slavery having been abolished, he felt that the cause for which that church had been organized was removed and that her mission was accomplished. So, with Drs. Lee, McEldowney and others, he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church at the annual conference held at Saginaw in 1867, and, on motion of Rev. F. A. Blades, was received into the Detroit Annual Conference by Bishop Janes. His first appointment from the Detroit Conference was Laphamville. From there he was sent to South Lyons, then he went to Hamburg and Whitmore Lake. On each of the charges he did good and faithful work. In 1870, in consequence of failing health, he asked for and received a superannuated relation, since which time he has continued to labor as health would permit, and opportunities opened to him, supplying vacancies, attending funerals and teaching in the Sunday School. Bro. Wilsey was a good, pure man. He was as true as He never flinched when duty called. His convictions were strong, and his perceptions clear. He always aimed to be governed by high moral principles. He was never swayed by mere worldly policy, and never turned to gain the applause of You always knew where to find him. He hated wrong. When a young man he saw that slavery was a great sin against God and human souls, hence he was an Abolitionist, though he had to train with the few. He saw that intemperance was a great evil and the liquor traffic was destructive of the best interests of society, that it was a blight on the souls and bodies of men, hence he was a Prohibitionist, and believed the law should suppress the traffic, and so he did what he could by word and pen and vote to shut up the saloon. Bro. Wilsey was a good preacher. His sermons were logical, Scriptural and spiritual. He loved the church and was always faithful in his attendance upon her ordinances. For over twenty years he taught a large Bible class in the Sunday School, holding them as with bands of steel. He prepared his lessons with the utmost care, giving as much time to it as he would to an ordinary sermon, and then taught as though he believed it to be the word

of God. His funeral was largely attended, and appreciative addresses were delivered by Bros. Bancroft, Perrin and Washburn. A good man has gone to his reward, and his works do follow him.

Rev. Stephen Capham Ramsdell.

Rev. Stephen Lapham Ramsdell was born in Macedon, Wayne county. New York, April 4, 1823, and died in Jackson, Mich., May 4, 1900, being a little past seventy-seven years of age. Bro. Ramsdell was the son of Jonathan and Lydia Lapham Ramsdell, his father being a minister in the Society of Friends. He was early impressed by his religious surroundings, with the necessity of a religious life. Concerning his religious history, Bro. Ramsdell wrote: "I had religious impressions early in life, through religious training at home and a daily exhibition in my parents of a practical Christian life. When twelve years old I was clearly and pungently convicted of sin, and in answer to prayer was conscious of being instantaneously forgiven and brought into a state of favor and communion with God, and for months my beart was filled with love and my mouth with praise to my heavenly Father." I then gradually yielded to the enticements of the world, but the truth was indelibly stamped in my mind, that the religion of the Lord Jesus was real and divine. Although I became a wild young man, yet I never dared to take the name of God in vain but once, and then was so conscience stricken that I never repeated the offense. I always intended to become a Christian again some time, but delayed until my thirty-third year, when in the city of Adrian, under the evangelistic labors of Rev. S. C. Adams, I was led to see and feel that it would not do to trifle longer with the Holy Spirit. I yielded and was soundly and scripturally converted to God, receiving forgiveness and peace through faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. A few months after conversion I felt a call to the ministry of the gospel, which has been confirmed again and again, to the present time." Bro. Ramsdell's educational advantages were equal to those of the times in which he lived. The old academy, in which were taught the sturdy principles of self reliance as well as classics, and which has given us so many prominent characters of the past generation, was his inspiration in study. After leaving district school he attended the academy at Canandaigua, N. Y., afterward teaching in both district schools and academy. In his twentieth year he came to Michigan and taught select school in Adrian. In his twenty-first year he entered a law office in Canandaigua,

N. Y., and at the July term of the Supreme Court, held in New York city, in 1847, he received his diploma as attorney and counsellor at law.

Bro. Ramsdell joined the Detroit Conference on trial in 1857, and was appointed junior preacher on the Unadilla circuit with J. W. Holt as preacher in charge.

In 1859 he was appointed to South Lyen, with S. P. Warner as senior. In 1860 he was junior preacher on the Chelsea circuit, O. Whitman as senior. In 1861-2, to Trenton; in 1863-4 to Northville. In 1865, on account of health failing, he took a supernumary relation. In 1873-4 he was appointed to Goodrich; 1875-6, to Otisville, 1877-8, to Highland; 1879-80, to Bellville; 1881, to Unadilla; 1882, Salem and Northville. In 1883 he took a superannuated relation. At Addison, where he subsequently resided with his son, he often preached once or twice each Sabbath, as he declared, "to the great comfort and satisfaction of myself," and, we may add, to the comfort and satisfaction of the people.

Bro. Ramsdell was married in March, 1855, to Angeline P. Underhill, in Macedon, N. Y. They moved in October to Adrian, where they were both converted. In less than two months after her conversion she died a triumphant death in Christ. In March, 1861, he married Louisa H. Coy, at Northfield, Mich. There were born to them one son and one daughter, of whom only the son remains, Dwight H. Ramsdell, a member of the Conference.

Bro. Ramsdell was a diligent student of God's word, which became increasingly his delight. Before his conversion he purchased a set of Clarke's Commentaries, that he might better understand the Scriptures. After his superannuation he did not relinquish his habits of study. He read his New Testament in Greek, and studied with the aid of such critical commentaries as Godet, Delitzsch, and Meyer. Up to the last he watched the reviews for new books, and was a frequent purchaser. He greatly regretted that he did not take a course at a theological school. He was advised not to do so by older ministers. This, he declared, was "the first great mistake of my life." He was a man of clear mind, conservative, methodical.

His preaching was logical, practical and Scriptural. He loved to present all the doctrines of our theology, but Christ and His redemption work was the central theme. As a soul winner he was successful, some really great revivals attending his ministry. His religious experience was bright, his faith strong. The last months in his life were especially rich in experience. He looked into the future with expectant eye. Shut indoors all last winter, he often expressed himself: "You don't know how I enjoy myself. I have such a sense of the Divine presence."

and after an illness of one week passed away, at the home of Mrs. James Cook, Jackson, Mich. Funeral services were held at the home of his niece, in Jackson, on Monday, May 7. In the absence of Dr. Ryan, presiding elder, Bro. Moore, of Clinton, conducted the services, assisted by Bro. Pope, of Tecumseh.

The interment was near Ann Arbor, within the bounds of his second charge. His memory is blessed.

Rev. Jesse Barber Russell.

This deceased minister of the Gospel and member of the Detroit Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was born in Niagara county, N. Y. He was one of a family of twelve children of Rev. Jesse Russell, a minister in the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Three brothers are now living, Isaac, of Alma; Jacob, of Olmstead, and Rev. John Russell, of New Haven, the last named being familiarly known as "the father of prohibition," and a minister of our church since 1843.

The family moved from New York state to Michigan when Jesse was six years of age and settled in Lenawee county Here he grew to manhood, and on June 24, 1856, was married to Miss Margaret J. Ferrel, of Prospect Hill. A family of three sons and one daughter was born to them, two of the boys dying in childhood.

On September 7, 1881, Mrs. Russell departed this life at Carleton. He was married a second time on November 28, 1883, to Miss May Graves Hall, of Milan, Mich., to whom were born two daughters. She died October 18, 1887, at Deford, Mich.

He was admitted on trial in the year 1857 at Port Huron, Bishop Waugh presiding. He was stationed that year at Napoleon. In 1858 at Genesee. Admitted into full connection 1859, and stationed at Ingham. 1860, at Chesaning. 1861 at Middlebury. He was ordaired Elder and located in 1862, (then he entered the army). He was readmitted in 1865 and appointed to Watrousville and Vassar, two years. In 1867 to Harrisville; 1868, Medina; 1869, to Lambertville; 1870, to Watrousville for two years; 1872, Henrietta; 1873, Unadilla, two years; 1875, Augusta, two years; 1877, Fairfield; Milan, two years; Carleton, one; St. Ignace, two; Port Sanilac, one; Caseville, two. Here he

While on a visit at Ann Arbor and Jackson he was taken sick, suffered a stroke of paralysis, and the next year supplied for some months at Reese. From Reese he went to Tuscola one year; Deford, one, when he took a supernumary relation. In 1893 he was stationed at Eames, remaining one year. Then followed two years at Carrolton and Zilwaukee, and one year at Shields. At the Conference of 1897 he asked and received a superannuate relation on account of failing health. In November, 1899, he became seriously ill, and suffered a third stroke of paralysis, the second having occurred at Reese. After spending some weeks at the hospital in Saginaw, he decided to remove to the Soldiers' Home, near Grand Rapids, where he remained until the end came, on April 2, 1900. He was buried at Cambridge Junction, Lenawee county.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. C. B. Case, of Addison, who spoke words of comfort and cheer from the text, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord." Bro. Russell was an earnest, logical and convincing preacher, of whom no word of recommendation is needed. "His record is on high." "He rests from his labors, and his works do follow him."

A writer in the Michigan Christian Advocate of April 14th says: "Never having heard the late Jesse B. Russell preach, we were not able to speak intelligently about him as a preacher. The other day, a friend, who knew him well and heard him often, went into the most ardent praise of his pulpit capabilities, characterizing some of his efforts as sweeping and overwhelming in their power. His campmeeting sermons were clothed frequently with the unction of the very highest eloquence. A scholastic training and a very slight increase of confidence would have given him a foremost place in the ranks of the greater preachers in the history of his conference."

Our brother has passed through the trials and temptations of life to receive his crown.

It is difficult for the younger members of our conference to understand what it meant to be an itinerant preacher in the early years of these men. They pioneered the way and made possible the well organized charges ready to receive them now. These fathers are worthy of the first place in our affections and memories. Let us emulate their faithfulness and zeal, that we may not be ashamed when we stand in their presence. They may not have many of their kindred on earth, but in heaven many will rise up and call them blessed who have been won to Christ through their labors.

Rev. Thomas Wakelin.

Thomas Wakelin was born at Barrow, upon Lowe, Leicestershire, England, December 31, 1807. He died at Ypsilanti. Mich., September 28, 1899. His earthly pilgrimage, therefore, was 91 years, 8 months and 28 days. Bro. Wakelin was the oldest man in our conference.

From his own testimony we learn that in 1829 he had the privilege of hearing Dr. Adam Clarke preach from the text: "The time is fulfilled, and the Kingdom of God is at hand; repent ye and believe the Gospel." That sermon led to his conversion. He speaks of his conversion as a change from darkness to light, and from bondage to liberty.

Bro. Wakelin came to the state of Michigan in 1842. He joined the Michigan Conference on trial in 1843. ence was held at Ann Arbor, and was presided over by Bishop Joshua Soule. At the Conference held in Detroit, in 1845, presided over by Bishop Janes, he became a member in full connection. He remained 32 years in the effective work, and declared that they were the happiest years of his life. His appointments were Manchester, Ingham, Livingston, Manchester (second time), Farmington, Milford, Detroit (city Mission), Hadley, Byron, Genesee, Groveland, Leesville, Flat Rock, Commerce, New Haven, Perry, Henrietta, Leesville (second time), Wretford and Kearsley, Mt. Morris, Hazleton. He has told us that in 1844 he resided at Mason, and had twenty-two appointments to look after, consequently had not any time to backslide. It is more creditable to him that he did not backslide, inasmuch as his receipts for services that year were only \$126. Ont of this he supported himself, wife and son, and kept a horse.

He has been glad to tell us, however, that during his thirtytwo years of actual service, in general, he had a comfortable support. But, he says, "the best of all was that on our charges we saw hundreds of precious souls converted and enter upon the Christian race."

In 1840 he was united in marriage with Miss Elizabeth Bates, of Leicestershire, England. It was a happy union and continued for forty-eight years. One son was born to them, Amos Wakelin, who for some years has lived in Philadelphia, and has been, and still is, a faithful and honored member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and has given substantial aid, not only to his parents in their declining years, but also to the church of his choice. Bro, Wakelin, in referring to his son, says: "Without his financial aid I should not have been able

to will my Mt. Morris property to be a home for the superannuated preachers, nor to withdraw my claim from the superannuated fund." "A wise son maketh a glad father."

As to the type of Bro. Wakelin's religious faith we quote his own words: "A careful investigation of the evidences of Christianity convinced me fully that all 'Scripture is given by inspiration of God,' and, consequently, I have through many years taken the Holy Scriptures as the rule of my faith and practice." The Michigan Christian Advocate, in its obituary of him, said: "He seemed to us to be a preacher of the 'old school,' not that he was austere or sepulchral, for he was the reverse, being as genial as a child and as fond of a pleasantry as a humorist. But he was doctrinal in his religious thoughts and utterances. He believed in a clear-cut Gospel, which found man a fallen creature, required of him repentence for sin, and promised him pardon on the exercise of unreserved faith in Jesus There was a measured stateliness about his language, and, coupled with this, was a unique use of the circumflex and rising inflection which made his utterances very striking and rhythmical. It invariably pleased, and sometimes amused his listeners." Those of us who knew him remember well these pleasing peculiarities.

Bro. Wakelin was a successful pastor. When this writer was a boy, living within the bounds of Milford circuit, this good man made faithful pastoral visits to his father's home. We remember well how he was accustomed to call us to his side, and while standing there would take us by the hand and give us some good advice. Then placing his hand upon our head would pronounce a solemn benediction upon us. Then he would recite from memory a short Scriptural lesson, and close his call with prayer. The effect could not be otherwise than good. He was also a successful disseminator of our church literature, especially our periodicals.

In this work he was conscientious, systematic, ingenious and very successful. He believed that he was doing a great work for the Master in putting religious papers into the homes of our people. We regret that we do not have exact figures to show what he accomplished in this line. But we believe that, considering the people to whom he had access, he was the most successful canvasser in the Detroit Conference.

Bro. Wakelin's life was long and useful. His disposition was one of contentment and happiness. He died in a good old age, an old man and full of years, and was gathered to his people.

Of his death and burial Rev. A. R. Laing writes: "Three o'clock a. m., September 28, 1899, Rev. Thomas Wakelin fell on

sleep at the home of Rev. G. C. Wortley, in Ypsilanti. The remains were brought to Mt. Morris, and the funeral services were held in the M. E. Church, Rev. E. B. Bancroft presiding, and the Rev. Seth Reed delivered the address."

His remains were laid beside those of his devoted companion, in the cemetery of Mt. Morris.

Thomas Wakelin was a good man, he lived a good life, died a good death, and a good eternity is before him.

Rev. Jacob Q. Wortley.

Rev. Jacob C. Wortley was born in Methwold, England, August 9, 1830, died at his home in Ypsilanti, Mich., October 23, 1899. He came to America in 1852, making his home with his uncle, Mr. William Wortley, first in Rawsonville, then in Ypsilanti. He was converted in youth. As a local preacher he began his work in communities near Ypsilanti, under Rev. Seth Reed, presiding elder.

He attended school first at Albion and then at Ann Arbor. From the State University he graduated in the year 1860. In the same year, at the annual meeting of the Detroit Conference, he was admitted on trial. His classmates were William J. Clack. James Curnelia, O. J. Perrin, Thomas Nichol. John Hamilton and W. J. Campbell.

His appointments were Bay City, 1860-1861.

Bro. Wortley was a faithful preacher of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. While independent in thought and fearless in expression, he never offended those who truly loved Christ and His church. While listening to him one felt that he was in the presence of a man speaking out from the depths of his own heart; a man who would be true to his own convictions under all circumstances. He was, in brief, an honest, earnest man, sent to proclaim the sublime truth of Christ's Kingdom. He ever felt it a duty to maintain discipline and sound doctrine in the church of his choice.

Once upon the Conference floor I heard him complain with deep emotion of the lax manner in which Methodists enforced their discipline. He believed in the equality of men before the law, and insisted that all should try and keep the vows taken at the altar on entering the communion.

Our brother, Rev. William Cook, wrote of him: "His social nature was perhaps not correctly understood by some of his

brethren. Possibly they thought him unsocial. If so it was their oversight of the fact that he had an English, and not an American temperament. He could seem indifferent to one, and all the while his honest heart was hungry for comradship, human love and social intercourse. Those who came to his nature frankly and with genuine brotherliness found his soul as tender, trustful and ardent as a child's. He rested in such friends. The hours were too short when he was with them. The humor of his nature broke forth. He then reveled in story, and was as easy and free as a boy. He was frank, blunt and intense at times, but we think never malevolent or bitter. True kindness touched his nature profoundly. It was never forgotten, and in thinking over alone in his study the kind words and acts of friends, he was capable of such deep gratitude as to burst into tears and be overwhelmed with emotion."

Children and youth loved him because of his tender playfulness. Men respected him because of his intellectual grasp and stability of character. For years an invalid, his hold upon the local church where he was best known, grew stronger with each passing day, until at last, surrounded by weeping, praying friends, he fell on sleep, passing from the sight of men.

Rev. Frederick W. Warren.

Frederick W. Warren was born in Newfane, N. Y., February 20, 1820, and died in Howell, Mich., October 17, 1899.

At the age of ten years, in company with his parents, he came from the place of his birth and settled in Southfield, Mich.

On February 27, 1839, then nineteen years of age, he was converted. To this event he afterwards referred as a matter of as much certainty as any fact in his life. He immediately united with the church, and never to the day that he was taken to the ranks of the church triumphant did he falter in his devotion to her interests. On reception into full membership he was appointed a class leader, which proved of great spiritual profit to himself as well as others.

By approval of the class of which he was a member Rev. James Shaw, who was then in charge of Farmington circuit, gave him license to exhort, July 26, 1840. Three years later, July 15, 1843, by order of the Quarterly Conference of the same charge, the Rev. Henry Coldclazier, presiding elder of the Ann Arbor district, gave him local preacher's license, and three

months later he was engaged by Rev. E. Pilcher as a supply on the Birmingham circuit, with Rev. E. Steel as senior preacher. Although engaged in work as a Methodist itinerant, he had not fully determined to give his life to the work of the ministry. The year's work in the Master's vineyard was so blessed of God and fruitful in spiritual results that he was led to acquiesce in the judgment of his brethren and the demand of his own conscience, and permitted himself to be recommended to the annual Conference. He was received on trial and appointed to Mount Clemens, with Rev. F. B. Bangs in charge.

His next appointment was Plymouth, where he labored two years. Here he made the acquaintance of Miss Lavina L. Seaver, who at the close of his term on this work became his wife. Their labors, most pleasantly begun, covered a period of forty-one years without a single break, during which each contributed to the enrichment of the other in knowledge and spiritual growth.

The following charges were the fields in which he toiled with fidelity and success: Birmingham, Monnt Clemens, Plymouth, Livingston, Farmington, Manchester, Ridgeway, Morenci, Hudson, Manchester, for a second term; Monroe, Owosso district for four years. East Saginaw, Saline, Howell, Napoleon, South Bay City, Brighton, Fowlerville, Marion, South Lyon, Denton, Williamston and Hartland.

At the close of a two years' pastorate at Hartland, at the Conference of 1888, he asked and received superannuated relation, and moved to Howell, where he resided until removed to his heavenly home. Mrs. Warren preceded him by nearly four years. From the time of her death he had a pleasant home with his daughter, Ella, and her husband, Mr. Thomas Gordon.

Some time before his death, while reviewing his life, he wrote what we judge to be the expression of an honest and intelligent conviction. From this we give a brief selection:

"Possibly some one will ask: 'Do you regret having spent your active life in the Christian ministry?' I answer, no, a thousand times no. I have coveted no higher position or greater honor than that of an humble Methodist preacher, believing that I was thereunto called by the Spirit of God and the voice of the church. I believe that some fruit of my work shall appear in the day when the Lord shall make up his jewels, and that I shall meet in heaven the souls whom the Lord graciously saved through my feeble instrumentality. If this shall prove true I will praise Him forever and hail with delight my translation to the paradise of God. Amen, and amen, so may it be."

On Thursday evening preceding his death, having led with much animation the weekly prayer meeting in the lecture room of the church. Bro. Warren was returning home, and descending the steps leading to the walk, missed his footing and fell to the ground, fracturing four ribs, and shocking his entire system. Recovery was impossible, although his physical powers had been well preserved.

He retained his consciousness to the last hour, and, in whisper to Bro. Odell, mentioned the name of E. E. Caster and others with whom he was more closely associated in the ministry, and said: "Tell the brethren I love them all."

In the absence of his pastor, Rev. E. S. Caster, the funeral services were conducted by Rev. E. B. Bancroft, presiding elder of the Flint District, assisted by several of the ministers of our Conference, and Rev. Service, of the Presbyterian Church.

Of his family four children remain, Fred H. Warren, of Detroit; Frank B. Warren, of Sault Ste. Marie; Mrs. Thomas Gordon, of Howell, and Mrs. Dr. Campbell, of Lansing.

Bro. Warren's success in the ministry was reached not by one particular gift, not by the gift of utterance alone, not by his pastoral skill alone, but by his varied powers and devotion, working in harmony toward one specific end.

In his preaching he never rose to sublime heights of eloquence, but his sermons instructed, quickened and comforted his hearers

Among his parishioners he was dignified, yet affable, a friend kindly and unassumingly imparting wise counsel; with his brethren of the Conference, progressive, loyal, loving.

We miss him here. He has been crowned yonder. We memorialize his character and work. They welcome him to the ranks of the glorified.

Rev. Samuel Bird.

Rev. Samuel Bird was born of Scotch and Irish parentage in the north of Ireland, on the 4th of November, 1821, and exchanged worlds in Fort Wayne, Ind., at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Leggett, March 13, 1900.

He was one of a family of seven sons and two daughters, of whom only one, Mrs. Joseph Searles, now over eighty, survives him. Two of his brothers were ministers of the Gospel, one preaching over sixty years. His father was a prominent minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Canada.

He came to America with his parents when three years of age and settled in Canada, where he remained till 1840, when

he came to Michigan and settled at Algonac. In 1844 he was united in marriage to Miss Hannah M. Moore. This union was a haapy one, and she proved a great helper to him in his itinerant life. To them were born three children, Mrs. O. C. Leggett, of Fort Wayne, Ind.; Rev. Samuel W. Bird, of Denton, member of Detroit Conference, and Mrs. S. A. Snow, of North Branch, Mich.

He was converted when a little boy, and soon realized that God called him to the work of the ministry. At Pontiac, in 1859, Bishop Janes, presiding, he was admitted on trial in the Detroit Conference, after serving as a supply one year at Willow Creek. In 1861 he was ordained deacon by Bishop Ames, and ordained elder by Bishop Simpson in 1863, with Thomas Stalker, B. S. Taylor, S. E. Warren, L. S. Tedman, T. G. Potter, M. S. Leet, A. P. Vanduzen and W. M. Triggs, and admitted to the Conference. He served on the following charges: 1858-9, Willow Creek; 1860-1, Vicksburg, now Marysville; 1862-3, Armada; 1864, Oakland and Stony Creek; 1865-6, Oakland, now Orion; 1867-8, Commerce; 1869-70, Davisburg; 1871, Byron; 1872-3, Laingsburg; 1874-5, Vernon; 1876-7, North Branch; 1878-9, Almont; 1880-1-2, Metamora; 1883, Richmond; 1884, Stockbridge; 1885-6, Brighton; 1887, Salem; 1888, Webberville; 1889-90, Salem, and was superannuated in 1891 Since his superannuation, he has resided at Lansing, Williamston and Fort Wayne, Ind.

The imperative necessity of regeneration by the Holy Spirit was a living verity to our brother. He saw men lost out of Christ, and with all the earnestness of his soul would plead with them to accept Christ, and "flee from the wrath to come." His great faith, passion for souls, oneness of purpose, and great zeal made him a fiery revivalist. Hundreds fell at the foot of the cross under his preaching, and cried, "What must I do to be saved?" They were pointed to the atoning sacrifice and directed to pray with full confession of sin. Conversions were clear, and converts well anchored.

The superannuated relation of our brother did not make null his call to preach. He would go to schoolhouses with the Word of life. This was notably true south of Williamston near the little piece of land on which he lived. There the good man's life and preaching had its regenerating influence on the mass of the people. A good harvest has been gathered, and other seed will in due time bring forth a harvest to the glory of God. "He being dead yet speaketh." If nearness to the throne is measured by the number of stars in the crowns of soul-winners, we may be surprised to see some obscure prophets of God very near the Saviour. Prominent churches served, will give to the preacher no glory, only as he may have used them in soul-saving.

Brother Bird handled the Word of God with a depth of knowledge that revealed the mind of the Spirit.

In doctrine he defended the church with a master hand.

He knew men and how to reach them. He made others feel that he was their friend and desired their salvation; thus he was a man of great worth to the Church of God.

He was not unmindful of her who shared the toils of his itinerant life. He gratefully acknowledged that she was a true helper in his work. After his superannuation his presence was a benediction to the church. He was a father in Israel. Though very feeble he desired much to see his brethren in the ministry, so attended the last conference in Detroit, where he became quite ill. When he returned to Fort Wayne he gradually failed till about three weeks before the angel of death came, when he was stricken down with pneumonia, which resulted in his death. As the gates to the new world seemed to be let ajar in the distance, the Biblical Wesleyan doctrine of perfect love so filled his soul that he desired his son and all the ministry to more fully proclaim it. Christ was all and in all to him, and he desired others to partake of this glory. His son sang for him,

"My latest sun is sluking fast, My race is nearly run."

Soon he appeared to be sinking, but kind friends rallied him, when he said, "Why did you call me back?" Soon he reached out his hand as if to say farewell, and without a struggle fell asleep in Jesus. The funeral services were held in Denton, in the church where his son is pastor. The following were present to bear tributes of respect; Revs. W. H. Shier, C. T. Allen, E. W. Ryan, M. H. Bartram, H. C. Colvin, J. Horton and N. Norton Clark.

Reu. Richard Wyatt.

Rev. Richard Wyatt was born at Liskeard, Cornwall, England, on the 22nd day of February, 1871, and died at the parsonage in Champion, Mich., on the 29th of June, 1900.

While he was still very young his parents came to this State and settled in Houghton county, where, amid the rugged scenery and busy business life of Calumet mining region, Richard grew to manhood.

Converted at 17, he early realized that his work in life must be to persuade men to be reconciled to God.

After graduating from the High School at Calumet he went to Albion College to better fit himself for the duties before him.

In the Minutes of this Conference, session of 1895, among those admitted on trial is the name of Richard Wyatt. In 1896 Bishop Fowler ordained him a deacon; and a year ago, by imposition of the hands of Bishop Goodsell and the elders assisting him, he was ordained an elder.

Bro. Wyatt's appointments were Sidnaw, National Mine, Ishpeming, Stephenson and Champion, where by studious habits, earnest, thoughtful preaching, diligent, faithful pastoral work, and above all. by frank, affable, sweet-spirited Christian manliness, he endeared himself to his people, showing himself to be approved unto God a workman that needed not to be ashamed.

On the 28th of September, 1897, he was united in marriage to Miss Emma Brown, of Ishpeming, Mich., who remains, deeply afflicted, yet sublimely hopeful, knowing, that "them also that sleep in Jesus shall God bring with Him."

Our brother realized fully the Wesleyan ambition to "cease at once to work and live." The week of his departure was a very busy one. Though not feeling well he attended the funeral of one of his people, accompanying the remains to a distant city for interment. The three following days were filled with pastoral duties amid much suffering. Thursday evening he attended and blessed a marriage feast. Friday morning he sat at breakfast with his wife and little daughter, never thinking that his coronation day had come, but before another dawning the world of shadows had receded from his vision, heaven opened on his eyes, his ears were enraptured with the seraphic songs of redeemed multitudes, Bro. Wyatt was forever with the Lord.

Rev. S. L. Polkinghorne, of Ishpeming, assisted by Rev. Isaac Wilcox, of Negaunee, and Rev. Edward Bickford, of Turin, conducted the funeral service in the church at Champion. The burial was at Ishpeming, where Rev. M. J. Stevens, of that city, pronounced the words of hope and benediction.

Mrs. Melissa Dobbins.

Mrs. Melissa Dobbins, widow of Rev. Jacob Dobbins, of the Detroit Conference, departed this life from her home in Algonac, Mich., March 30, 1900.

Melissa Wilkins was born July 4, 1815, at Fairfax, Vt. She was married to Jacob Dobbins December 31, 1834, at Commerce,

Mich. She, with her husband, entered the itinerancy in the fall of 1852. She was an ideal minister's wife, a helpmeet in every respect. For more than fourteen years she had been a widow, but during all these years she has been a constant benediction to all. She was a very remarkable woman, remarkable for the breadth and brightness of her intellectual life. Although almost eighty-five years old, and much of the time for the last year and a half she has been a great sufferer, yet she was interested in the topics of the day, and when she was unable to read for herself, she asked that the daily papers and the religious weeklies might be read to her.

She was remarkable in her religious experience. She was truly one of God's saints. From her diary we quote the following:

"I was converted at the age of fourteen years, so clearly converted that I never doubted it in my life. Over forty years ago I felt the need of a complete consecration to God, and was enabled to dedicate myself fully to Christ, and God accepted the offering. Such a glory filled my soul as tongue cannot describe. I regret I have not always retained the clear witness of the Spirit to this second stage of my Christian experience as I could wish, but I have never relapsed into my former state of Christian experience." Under date of March 15, 1893, she writes: "I have been enabled to so fully trust in Christ that he has been all and in all to me, a full and complete Savior. I, even I, so unworthy, and yet I am saved through the atoning blood of Jesus Christ. Other merit have I none, hangs my helpless soul on Thee, and to-day I am realizing that I am nearing my heavenly home, and can adopt the words of the Psalmist, 'Return unto thy rest, O my soul, for the Lord hath dealt bountifully with me." For five months the deceased was dangerously sick in the writer's home within the last eighteen months. For months our home seemed more like the vestibule of heaven than a chamber of death. During all her last sickness she illustrated her faith. From beginning to end she was sweet and patient and beautiful. Once when we spoke of her patience she said: "If I had a murmuring thought it would be wicked, for God has been so good to me." When first taken sick she said to the doctor: "You need not be afraid to tell me the worst of my condition, it will not scare me. I am not afraid to die. That matter was settled more than sixty years ago." At another time she took the doctor by the hand and said: "Doctor, I am on the solid rock, and the sky is all clear overhead." In one of her interesting talks she said: "I have always loved the prayer and class meetings. I never wanted to stay away from them. I always went when I

could." This was one of the secrets of her sainthood. Often in the night, after a severe paroxysm of pain, she would ask us to sing and she would join in. Once we sang "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and she became so happy that she shouted and praised God and said: "God's blessings come in floods upon my soul. Jesus is very precious. All is well. I am very happy." The doctor said to her one night: "Grandma, it will soon be over." She said: "That sounds so sweet. Heaven seems so near and I am enabled to rejoice with joy unspeakable and full of glory," and her face was a picture of heavenly delight. She would say after these spiritual uplifts, "I am all unworthy. It is not of myself, it is all of grace. It is all through the blood of the atoning Lamb." She often expressed her experience in the language of the poets. One of her frequent expressions was:

"My soul is full of glory,
Which inspires my tongue;
Could I meet with angels,
I'd sing them a song;
I'd sing of my Jesus,
And tell of His charms,
And beg them to bear me
To His own loving arms."

On one occasion she clasped her hands and shouted: "Oh, such peace, such glory fills my soul!" Often during her sickness she would say:

"Well, the delightful day will come,
When my dear Lord will bring me home,
And I shall see His face;
Then with my Savior, Brother, Friend,
A blest eternity I'il spend,
Triumphant in His grace."

Again she would say:

"And let this feeble body fail,
And let it faint and die;
My soul shall quit this mournful vale,
And soar to worlds on high."

One day, when it seemed as though she was dying, she said:

"If this be death I soon shall be From every pain and sorrow free;

I shall the King of glory see; All is well, all is well." From this long season of severe illness she came up for a little time from the borders of death, and spent the last few months in her home in Algonac. Her last sickness lasted only about three weeks, but during her conscious hours she was triumphant and peaceful to the very last. The funeral was conducted by the Rev. Jacob Horton, assisted by the pastor at Algonac, Bro. Lewis, and the writer. Her body was laid to rest in the family lot in the cemetery at Marine City.

Mrs. W. F. Davis.

On the afternoon of Saturday, June 23, 1900, the subject of this memoir, after nearly a dozen years of excruciating physical pain and torture, having been made "perfect through sufferings," closed her eyes upon earthly scenes and entered into her eternal rest.

Mrs. Davis was born near Picton, Ontario, in January of 1834. She was nurtured and trained by parents of sturdy Christian character, and at the tender age of eleven years united with the church, and as she grew older continued an earnest, faithful worker in the same. In 1857 she was united in marriage to W. F. Davis. In the fall of 1881 she removed with her husband to Michigan, where he first served Croswell circuit. twelve years ago Mrs. Davis contracted rheumatism, which, despite all medical skill employed, developed into the worst form of that dread disease, which held her in its cruel grasp until it finally crushed out the present life. Though in constant pain her mind and soul rose above the physical, and she maintained her firm faith in God, her daily communion with Jesus Christ and her fellowship with the Holy Spirit, and it has been the testimony of many who have visited her room during her close confinement, that her smiling countenance and cheerful words were a benediction to them, and they left her presence feeling purer in heart for having come into contact with her. Her life was a beautiful one, being "hid with Christ in God." This tribute was paid to the deceased by her eldest son as he stood over the casket: "Looking back through my life I cannot recall one word or act of hers which I could now wish she had not said or done."

A few days before her death she dictated a last message of mother-love and cheerful hope and tender admonition to her children, in which she testified of her assurance that there was for her a "crown of righteousness." In her last hour the family assembled about her bedside, sang "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and just as the spirit winged its flight to God who gave it, two verses of No. 1,000 of the Hymnal were sung, being especially appropriate.

Nine children were borne by Mrs. Davis, seven of whom, together with the husband, survive her. The services, occurring the day following her death, were peculiarly pathetic in that the address was given by her son, George S. Davis, D. D., of Buffalo, and on Monday four of her sons bore the loved form to its last resting place in the cemetery at Croswell.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

Our Church Extension Society needs no defense. Its work accomplished is its defense and commendation. It was fortunate that the society was organized near the beginning of the era of national growth and development which followed the war of '61 and which called for the rapid multiplication of Christian churches.

This society began operations about a third of a century ago. It has aided in bringing into existence 11,503 churches and thereby in making permanent that many congregations. These figures deserve to be repeated over and over, and to be written large on the memories of our ministers and members. Of all the Methodist Episcopal churches now standing, more than one in every three needed and received aid from this society. While the Church may not owe one-third of its present membership and wealth and strength to this organization, it does owe very much.

A permanent loan fund of \$1,126,251.00 has been built up. Some of this has been put out in loans a second, third or fourth time, so that loans aggregating \$2,478,477.00 have been made. The donations to churches foot up \$4,297,683. The past year showed an advance of \$80,000 in collections, and the present year promises a farther gain of \$80,000. We congratulate the Church on this.

Detroit Conference has had aid in the case of 156 churches—about five in every year. Last year eight received assistance; this year thus far only three. The donations to this Conference from the beginning are \$33,240. It has given more than it has received by \$6,048. Its contributions have been \$39,288; its donations received from this society, \$33,240. We come under the rule, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." Our annual apportionment for some years has been \$5,500. If we raise this amount in full we can draw on the treasury up to \$2,500. If we raise less than the apportioned amount, our appropriations are cut down proportionately. That is, if we raise one-third only of the appor-

tionment, we can receive only one-third of the appropriation. If we raise one-half of the one sum, we can receive one-half of the other. This establishes the ratio between apportionments and appropriations of 11 to 5—eleven dollars given permit the return of five dollars in donation. This assumes large giving ability on our part as a Conference and not very great needs. To us who are on the ground, our needs often seem to exceed our ability. But these figures are fixed by the general committee, which is supposed to know the relative abilities and needs of every Conference in the Church.

Our Conference has been actually raising from \$1,400 to \$2,000 a year. At the larger of these figures, we would be enabled to secure donations for churches within our bounds to the extent of \$900 only, which would at the best aid only three or four churches. We often have urgent appeals from eight or ten. We believe the pastors of this Conference would be justified in pressing the collections to a somewhat higher figure. If the total, \$5,500, were raised, it would require an average of only about a dime a member. This year's report shows collections amounting to \$1,810.00.

Your committee would submit for your approval these resolutions:

- 1. That we recognize and rejoice over the splendid achievements of our Church Extension Society.
- 2. That we see no reason for abating our devotion or our gifts to it, inasmuch as the demands for new churches in communities that cannot themselves build them should have our heroic response.
- 3. That the society's effort to raise in three years a 20th century fund of \$1,000,000 is laudable and inspiring.
- 4. That we will encourage our people to make single contributions of \$250; each of which will secure the building of a memorial church on the frontier, and other contributions of \$100, each of which will build a church on the "mountain fund plan."
- 5. That we will seek to insure an advance in our collections next year, so that the total will not fall a penny below \$2,500.

The money expended has brought large results. Its growth has been paralelled only by the success of its undertakings. In every heathen land its schools, and missions, and orphanages, are centers of evangelization. We heartily commend the work of the society, and as pastors, we pledge ourselves to aid it in every possible manner.

We congratulate the Woman's Foreign and Home Missionary Societies on the splendid work they are accomplishing; and trust they may enter the twentieth century with enthusiastic faith and courage, and meet with inspiring success.

The Church is summoned to a special thank-offering of \$20,000,000.00 in the Twentieth-Century movement, and while the tendency of this would be to lessen the regular offerings for the general connectional causes, we are grateful for the indications that our Conference will at least maintain the standard of the past; and we hope that the report of the Conference Treasurer may even show an increase over last year.

As a Conference society, the field of our usefulness is limited; yet we have tried to help along.

BIBLE CAUSE.

We recognize the Bible as the word of God to man, which should be in the hands of all people. Hence we recommend:

- 1. That one-tenth of the amount raised for missions be the minimum to be raised for the Bible cause.
- 2. That the amount raised be sent to the Treasurer, William Foulke, Bible House, Astor place, New York City.
- 3. That the Conference Committee of Arrangements provide for the Bible Society anniversary, in accordance with the recommendation of the General Conference, and that this Conference appoint each year a separate committee of the American Bible Society.
- 4. We would say that tentative translations into five of the more than fifty of the Filipino languages have been made.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

- 1. We recognize in the Sunday school one of the most important factors in the religious and educational life, not only of our own age, but of the ages to come, since the Sunday school teaches the Bible and brings the Gospel to vast multitudes in the respective periods of childhood. The total Sunday school population in the United States is more than 12,000,000, of whom there are in the Methodist Episcopal Church over 31,000 Sunday schools, with 350,000 officers and teachers, and more than 2,600,000 scholars.
- 2. Inasmuch as the education of the young in religion is of the highest importance, great care should be exercised in the selection of teachers. The pastor and superintendent should mutually aid in choosing for the instruction of our children men and women of earnest Christian character, with a knowledge of the Bible and aptness in teaching. We hope the time is not far distant when every teacher in our Sunday schools shall be a professed follower of Jesus Christ, with a living experience.
- 3. We believe that the literature for the Sunday school supplied by the Methodist Episcopal Church, and published by our own Book Concern, is the best for the purpose that can be obtained. We urge that our pastors and presiding elders everywhere see that our literature is used in the Sunday schools. We are confident that this will help to build up an earnest religious

character, loyal to our Church, among the young people who attend our Sunday schools.

- 4. We recommend that wherever practicable the Home Department be established in connection with our Sunday schools. This is a distinct branch of the school for the benefit of those who are unable to attend its sessions, but are willing to study the lesson at home. We suggest that pastors and Sunday school officers send to the Book Concern for literature upon this subject, and take steps for the establishment of this department, which links the home and the school in the study of God's word.
- 5. We recommend that the Sunday schools observe School Rally Day on the second Sunday of October, and on that day take a collection for the Sunday School Union.

Also, we heartily recommend the improved Sunday School Journal and Bible Students' Magazine, not only for the Sunday school, but also for the home and the individual. It is cheap and will be especially useful for the home department.

TRACTS.

- 1. The Tract Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church aids in the circulation of religious literature, particularly in the form of tracts and leaflets throughout the entire world. It is circulating literature in at least twelve languages in the United States alone, and in more than twenty languages in foreign lands. Every year it gives away 11,000,000 pages of tracts in the United States alone, besides sending \$10,000 annually to our mission stations for aid in the publication and circulation of religious literature. During the past year it has distributed tracts to the soldiers in nearly all our camps, to the sailors and marines wherever access could be obtained, to the prisons and public institutions throughout our land wherever application was made, and to thousands of pastors for circulation in their charges.
- 2. We recommend that the pastors in our Conference avail themselves more generally of the liberal offer of the Tract Society, which provides that every preacher who will make application can receive from the Society free, in the form of tracts, one half of the last collection of his charge for the Tract Society. If a larger grant is needed, and his church is not able to pay for the tracts,

the Society will make generous donations of tracts for distribution.

- 3. We recommend that our pastors send to the Book Concern for the catalogue of tracts, which will be sent free to all who apply for it; and that they examine the abundant store of tracts published under the auspices of our Church. Tracts are exceedingly cheap, being sold at the uniform rate of 16 pages for one cent, so that \$1.90 will purchase 1,600 pages of tracts. We earnestly hope that our pastors will avail themselves of the opportunity furnished by the Book Concern and the Tract Society for an increased circulation of these leaves from the tree of life.
- 4. Inasmuch as the Tract Society needs the sum of \$50,000 per annum in order to carry on its work throughout the Church and the world, we urge that a collection be taken for this Society in all our churches during the coming year, and that our support, both morally and financially, be given to the efforts of this Society to spread a Christian literature throughout the world.

FREEDMEN'S AID AND SOUTHERN EDUCATION SOCIETY.

We find the past year to this worthy society has been one of great prosperity. Never before in its history have the schools under its direction been more influential or as largely attended. Thousands of both black and white have been educated in its halls, and many of these are now the educators and tutors in our own schools and that of other denominations, as well as in the public schools of the South and North.

The remarkable advance of the black man, the gradual lowering of the percentage of illiteracy, is in part attributable to the efficiency of the consecrated men and women who are giving their lives to the elevation of our brother in black.

The Methodist Episcopal Church has given to the South nearly \$12,000,000. It has received in churches and parsonages alone, \$17,419,824. The Freedmen's Aid and Southern Education Society has given nearly \$5,000,000, and the Church has received in school property alone, \$3,539,299; the society owns in property more than \$2,000,000. The Church paid \$500,000 to the South last year, and the same South met the gifts with \$500,000 more; so that the Church in what was once slave territory now pays one dollar to help itself for every dollar that it receives from abroad.

At this juncture in the history of our work in the South, we cannot afford to withdraw or to hesitate in our gifts, and for the following reasons:

- 1. The Federal Government has abandoned the people of African descent to the care of the southern states.
- 2. The public school system created in the reconstruction period, and continued since by the states themselves, does not furnish the same school facilities to the black people which is given to the white.
- 3. If the states were disposed to educate all alike, the taxes as now levied only make the school period of the year three or four months long, and then at best, for many reasons, the school is not well endowed.
- 4. There are whole counties in many of the states in which there are no Negro school-houses and some counties in which there are no Negro schools.
- 5. Slavery and the war left the states so poor that the people have not the money to furnish schools in many sections, or to continue them longer than for three or four months in the year.
- 6. The public school system among the black people is largely in charge of their own teachers, and they are often ignorant and ill-fitted for their work. The existing prejudice does not permit white teachers, in most piaces, to teach in these schools without extracizing them.
- 7. The public school system does not, in the kind of instruction imparted, meet the exigencies of the black people. It is moral and Christian education that is needed. The slaves had little conception of conscience or duty. The conditions now are lamentable in many sections.
- 8. The Christian people of the South are not yet educated nor equipped to mission the black people with their own Christian teachers. The two schools they have, have burdened the generosity of the few persons who have undertaken their support.
- 9. The rapid increase of the black population in vicious and ignorant surroundings is a menace to the public welfare. This reason is one of self-interest.
- 10. Christian civilization compels Christian education for unselfish ends. He is not a Christian who is not a missionary.

We congratulate the Society in the advance made in the last year and the reduction of the debt. We also congratulate the Society and the Church at large upon the election of Rev. W. P. Thirkield, D. D., so long connected with the work in the South, as

one of the secretaries, and pledge to him and his senior associate, Rev. M. C. B. Mason, our heartiest co-operation.

We find that during the past Conference year there were in the Detroit Conference forty charges that report no offering to this work. This speaks either of opposition on the part of the laity or careless neglect with the ministry. Many charges report but a very small amount, thus indicating that a faithful presentation of the work of the Society and the needs of the Church in the great home mission field of this republic was neglected.

We believe that the people are ready to respond if they have an opportunity, and we recommend that each pastor preach on the work of this Society and place the collection on its merits.

TEMPERANCE.

For many years the Detroit Annual Conference has considered it a religious duty to utter its unmistakable view upon the so-called temperance question. That question has grown in importance and size through the years until it now involves many important issues, social, moral, religious, economic and political.

There are two issues that must always stand out with great prominence respecting the work of temperance reform, namely, the total prohibition of the liquor traffic, and the suppression of the drinking usages of the people. But we have become so accustomed to the saloon that its relations to society and its effect upon the same, are apt to appear a necessary part of the existing order of things. We must clear our minds of such prepossessed and fixed impressions derived from custom and practice.

Before us is a complicated riddle 'that baffles, confounds. shames and mocks at every point, and will not yield to supplication, to convincing argument or to the sense of right. The liquor business in its aims, intent, purpose, motives and effects is at war with all the purposes of God and the gospel and the ministry of the Church we represent, as well as the wise principles of righteous government we would uphold. As loyal American citizens we view with alarm and indignation the increased power of the liquor traffic in political circles. It masses its forces in powerful leagues, gathers millions of dollars for purposes of bribery and corruption, and dictates by these means in large measure the policy of great political parties. It thus degrades the judiciary, debases the law-making function, and corrupts nearly every spring

of political life in order to give it freer action and wider scope in its damnable campaign against the people's well-being. It is the opinion of your committee, and we hope you will give it emphasis as yours, that we must make greater efforts to arouse the moral nature in order to strengthen the power of resistance, and remove the outward solicitation in order to diminish the force of temptation. The Methodist Episcopal Church must take front rank in this war, not for any definite time, but to win. The duty is ours, and the result of doing we leave in God's hands.

Therefore, glancing around the circle of important matters involved in this question:

Resolved, (1) That total abstinence from all intoxicating beverages is the duty of our ministry and membership, and all other Christian people as well.

Resolved, (2) That we call upon our ministry to read to their congregations the resolutions on temperance adopted at the late session of the General Conference, and to give aid and help to the Church temperance societies that seek to pledge our children and youth to total abstinence.

Resolved, (3) That we deplore the open drinking customs of many of the representatives of the people at the capital of the United States. That we believe that the banishment of intoxicants from the banquets and receptions at the Presidential mansion should be made the rule of all our chief executives, and that we call upon Congress and the Senate to take early action to forever prohibit the sale of liquor in and around the public buildings at Washington.

Resolved, (4) That we believe in the constitutional prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicants for beverage, and therefore in the absolute prohibition of the saloon and the liquor traffic as the policy of the state and the nation.

We believe that the present license system is bad in policy and wicked in principle. That license, high or low, is immoral permission to continue, and that the saloon at any price is a horrid, idiotic, and libelous impeachment of public common sense and justice.

Resolved, (5) That while we do not believe that it is the province of the Church to dictate how its members shall vote, or with what political party they shall affiliate: and while we concede the honesty and sincerity of some whose bad logic and worse prejudice still lead them to uphold the license system through their affiliation with license parties, still we warn such political parties that they cannot reasonably expect our hearty support;

that our sympathies and votes await that existing political party which will indorse the prohibition of the liquor traffic as a leading issue, and that we will hail with pleasure the day of aroused public sentiment which will accomplish the downfall of the license system and the liquor traffic, and all organizations that uphold the same, and will build on the ruins thereof a dominant and victorious political organization that will forever prohibit the existence of a saloon under any condition throughout the domain of the Stars and Stripes.

Resolved, (6) That we feel deeply aggrieved and indignant that the anti-canteen law clearly intended by Congress and the Senate to prohibit the sale of intoxicants to our soldiers at army posts and camps, has been made null and void and ineffectual, by the decision of the Attorney General and the attitude of the higher officials of our government whose plain duty it is to inforce the law as intended. And that we call upon our people to use their utmost influence in favor of the Bower Stock anti-canteen bill, which we are thankful to know has been favorably reported by the house committee on military affairs.

Resolved, (7) We strongly recommend that the fourth Sunday in November be observed in our churches as Temperance Day. That appropriate sermons be preached in the morning and a platform meeting be held in the evening in which our young people shall have a prominent place, and that we join hands in hearty fellowship with the indomitable Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the Anti-Saloon League, and all others that have for their aim the entire extirpation of this insidious enemy of all righteousness.

We advise earnest action on the part of all our preachers in securing subscriptions, and hearty response on the part of our people in patronizing our Church papers, believing that a largely increased circulation of all our Church periodicals will tend to a higher standard of piety and truer loyalty among our people.

EDUCATION.

The past year has been highly favorable to the educational interests of Methodism. The Board of Education has received several very notable bequests, which will materially aid it in its good work.

We learn with pleasure that the contributions received by the Board from the Detroit Conference last year were \$1,206.00, an advance of twenty per cent over the year before. We urge all our preachers to emphasize the educational thought on Children's Day, and to secure a liberal collection for the fund to aid worthy students.

Albion College is in a prosperous condition. Last year there was a healthy growth in the number of students. The trustees have received \$25,000 for general college purposes, and a number of generous bequests are in sight. The debt, however, must be provided for, before Albion will be free to inaugurate a genuine forward movement. We pledge ourselves as a Conference, especially for this next year, to co-operate most earnestly with the officers of the College, in executing plans for the removal of the debt and the increase of the endowment. We are gratified that not only at Albion, but at nearly all of our Methodist Institutions of learning, the study of the English Bible is given a place of prominence.

The reports from our theological schools are full of encouragement.

THE SABBATH.

Occurrences have taken place recently which make an epoch in efforts for Sabbath observance. We feel honored that the epoch was precipitated by the action of a stalwart member of this Conference, Dr. John Sweet, and a brief history of the case is worthy of record.

A game of base-ball had been arranged and advertised for Sunday, July 2, 1898, to take place between the adjoining cities of Owosso and Corunna. Dr. Sweet was then pastor of our First Church, Owosso, and endeavored to stop the outrage by calling

upon the sheriff to interfere and prevent it. The sheriff paid scant attention to the request, and the game took place without any opposing action by the officers of the law. Thereupon, Dr. Sweet wrote an open letter and published it in the Owosso dailies, charging the sheriff with a violation of his official oath and a criminal neglect of duty. The sheriff immediately commenced a suit against Dr. Sweet for \$10,000 damages. On the trial, the jury gave a verdict for \$1,000. Dr. Sweet appealed to the Supreme Court, and the Supreme Court set aside the verdict and remanded the case for a new trial. In the decision, the Supreme Court said: "Experience has taught the world that laborers require at least one day in seven for rest. The legislatures of the various States have seen fit to recognize and establish this as a day of rest, and have prohibited the carrying on of the usual avocations of life, and the indulgence of those sports which create noise and disturbance and are regarded as offensive to the moral and religious sentiment of a large share of the people." And after considering a large number of decisions on this point, the Supreme Court concluded that under our statutes and the authorities referred to, this game of ball was a breach of the peace-which was within the province of the sheriff to stop or prevent. The re-trial is soon to be had, and we hope the result will fully justify Dr. Sweet in his position.

Already this case and the decision of the Supreme Court have produced good. Pastors and other citizens have appealed to sheriffs to prevent advertised Sunday base-ball games, and some of the officials have responded favorably and effectually. We rejoice in this advance, and hereby tender Dr. Sweet our thanks for his courageous stand.

We call the attention of all Christian citizens to the great gain this case has given them, and urge that general advantage be taken of it to secure the co-operation of the proper officers of the law for the prevention of disturbing Sunday games and sports.

TWENTIETH CENTURY THANKOFFERING COMMISSION.

For the prosecution of the important interests of the Twentieth Century Thank Offering Movement in our Conference, your Commission would respectfully recommend:

1. That from the opening of the Conference year until the Sunday preceding Thanksgiving Day, the Twentieth Century

Movement be given the right of way, no other special collection being taken.

- 2. That by the circulation of Twentieth Century literature, by sermons and addresses and by holding special public meetings, our ministers do all in their power to educate and inspire our people on the subject of the Twentieth Century Movement in our Church.
- 3. That each pastor in our Conference shall deliver at least two sermons on the subject, one in his own church or churches and one in exchange with another pastor; and that the Presiding Elder and the District member of the Conference Commission plan these exchanges, and that group meetings be arranged for within the bounds of each District.
- 4. That the Sunday following Thanksgiving Day be wholly given up to the purposes of this movement, and that upon this day there be taken our Twentieth Century Thank Offering; and we urge that our pastors impress upon the hearts of our people that this is a special offering of thanksgiving to God for his mercies to us as individuals, as families and as a church.
- 5. We submit that the great blessing and rich fruitage of this movement can only be reached by securing an offering from every member of the church, and recommend that we aim to secure a total offering of not less than \$2.00 for each member. We also recommend that a suitable certificate as a "Roll of Honor" be presented to every contributor of \$2.00 or more.
- 6. Believing that the success of this effort will depend largely upon the initiative and leadership of the members of this Conference, we hereby pledge ourselves to loyal gifts and service.
- 7. In harmony with and supplementary to the action of our Conference last year, we recommend that the undesignated gifts of this fund be distributed as follows:
 - 35 per cent. for Superannuated Preachers' Aid Society.
 - 50 per cent. for Albion College.
 - 15 per cent. for Wesleyan Guild.
- 8. We heartily approve of the action of the General Conference upon the recommendations of Bishop Thoburn for the prosecution of the spiritual part of this movement—the securing of two million conversions—and pledge our fullest co-operation with the methods of work suggested for this result.



RULES OF ORDER

As Adopted in 1869, Modified in 1875, and Adopted at Each Session Since.

1. The Conference shall meet at 8½ o'clock A. M., and adjourn at 12 M., but may alter the time of meeting and adjourn at its discretion.

2. The President shall take the chair precisely at the time to which the Conference stood adjourned. The first half hour of the session shall be devoted to religious services and thereafter the journals of the preceding day shall be read and approved.

3. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but, in case of an appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

4. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference, but any member may decline serving on more than one committee at the same time.

5. All motions and resolutions introduced by any member shall be reduced to writing, if the President, Secretary, or any member of the Conference requests it.

6 When a motion, resolution or report presented, is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference, but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before action or amendment.

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7. No new motion or resolution shall be made before the one under consideration has

7. No new motion or resolution shall be made before the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following should intervene, which motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, viz: Indefinite postponement, lying on the table, reference to a committee, postponement to any given time or amendment.

8. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President, to call him to order when he departs from the question, uses personalities, or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems the speaker out of order, or any other member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

self misrepresented.

9. When any member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise from his seat and respectfully address himself to the President.

10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject, or more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

11. When any motion or resolution shall have passed, it shall be in order for any member who wited with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration.

member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration.

12. No member shall absent himself from the services of Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

unless he is sick or unable to attend.

13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time such question is put by the President, except by leave of Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

14. Every member who shall be within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, excuse him.

15. No motion shall be considered unless seconded.

16. The Secretary shall keep a journal of the proceedings of the Conference, and, when approved, shall record them in a book provided for that purpose. He shall take charge of the journal and other papers of the Conference, and preserve them with care; suffer no person to take a copy of any paper during the interval of Conference, except with the consent of the Conference; and shall forward the journal and papers to the next Annual Conference. Annual Conference.

17. A motion to adjourn shall be in order at any time, and shall be decided without debate.

18. No preacher shall bring any charge against any member of this Conference until he has first given him information of the same, either by letter or otherwise, ten days in advance, if practicable, so that the accused may have an opportunity for defense.

19. When any brother intends to object to the passage of another's character, it shall be his duty to hand the name of the person against whom objections are to be made to the President of the Conference.

20. Two-thirds of the members present, and voting, may order the previous question

on a pending motion.

Regulations.

1. No candidate for admission on trial shall be received to examination except on the written statement of a Presiding Elder that he intends

to present the name of said candidate to the Conference.

2. Two examinations shall be held during the year: One in May, at such places as the Board of Examiners may determine; the other at the seat of the Annual Conference the day before the opening session.

3. The May examinations shall be held simultaneously. 4. All sermons, essays and syllabi shall be delivered at the May examinations, or sent to the Registrar within ten days thereafter. Delinquencies in this particular should be reported to the Board.

5. Each Examiner shall prepare and send to the Chairman a list of

questions on each subject assigned him, one month before the time of examination.

6. All examinations shall take place in the presence of a member of the Board, who shall immediately forward the papers to the Registrar.
7. The candidate shall be required to finish writing on one study be-

fore receiving questions on another.

8. Those who begin to write on the studies of a given year are expected to write on all the studies of that year.

9. The papers shall not be signed, but the name of the candidate shall

be written on a separate sheet and attached to or inclosed with each of

his papers.

10. 'The Registrar shall forward the papers to the proper Examiner, accompanied by a number corresponding to the number of the candidate's

11. At the several examinations the subjects will be taken up in the

11. At the several examinations the subjects will be taken up in the order in which they appear in this schedule. After the class has written upon a set of questions, no absentee shall be permitted to write upon the same set without consent of the Board; or of the conducting Examiner.

12. A properly authenticated certificate showing that a candidate has already pursued and passed a satisfactory examination in a prescribed study, as a regular attendant on the class room instruction, in an accepted literary or theological institution of the Methodist Episcopal Church, shall be received in lieu of Conference examination, except on Doctrine and Discipline.

13. Examinations shall, as far as possible, be in writing; they shall be graded upon the scale of 100, and the candidate must attain a standing of 70 in order to pass.

14. Examiners shall give such instruction and guidance in studies as

possible by correspondence.

15. After an Examiner has marked and delivered a paper to the Registrar, he has no authority to change the marking without the consent

of the Board.

16. The midyear examinations shall be held on the last Wednesday of 16.
