It has come to the attention of the Civil Education Section, Hyogo Military Government Team that certain parent-teacher associations in Hyogo Prefecture are endeavoring to raise money for construction of shinsei chugakko by means of large, compulsory contributions from parents. This is in direct violation of Japanese government ordinances. No person shall be forced to contribute funds for any purpose, although individual members of parent-teacher associations may voluntarily contribute money for educational purposes in specific schools. Instances of forced levies, either by schools or parent-teacher associations, should be reported to the competent Japanese authorities.

SUBJECT: Investigation Concerning Purchase of Site for New Middle School, Taki Gun, as Stated in Petition from Munejiro Habe, dtd 24 Dec 1947

TO: Commanding Officer

1. Investigation made by Lt Behne and C. Spooner on 1 Jan 1947.
2. Meeting held with Mr. Habe, supervisor of the Taki Gun, Hioki-mura and Kumobe-mura School Association (also mayor of Hioki-mura), and Mr. Moriguchi head of local land commission at Hioki-mura town hall. Meeting also held with above two persons mentioned and 3 tenant farmers (largest donators and most opposed to release of land) and the landowner.
- 3.a. Discrepancies found between petition 24 Dec 1947 and facts disclosed at meeting.
  - b. Farmers are not without some justification in withholding consent, since village people or farmers were not consulted about proposed school until all plans had been made by a few officials.
  - c. Building does not have to be completed by 31 March 1947 as stated in petition, in order to receive loan from Prefectural Government.
  - d. Meetings of farmers and people concerned as described in Paragraph 4 of the petition did not actually call together all farmers concerned but a representative of their town district, and farmers concerned did not seem to be notified of the matter.
  - e. Necessary building supplies are not on hand (Para. 4). No lumber is ready, trees will be cut from surrounding forest land. Some cement and steel reinforcing has been received.
- 4.a. The three largest donators of land stated that their remaining land and homes which are on a lower level than the fields would be flooded because of inadequate drainage if the school was built at this site, since

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the land is now rice fields and school grounds would not absorb required moisture to prevent flooding. Impossible to determine truth of this statement.

b. If these 3 farmers gave up their land they would still have average holdings compared with other farmers of the village.

c. Landowner in Kumobe-mura offered land for school building, but authorities declined on basis that land was not suitable, being too hilly and uneven, too far from center of school population, and expenses of building would be greater.

5. Recommendations:

a. Meetings of interested people of both villages to discuss matter and to inform those concerned of plans and progress to date.

b. Reconsider donations of landowner of Kumobe-mura for school site.

c. Since school building is actually a necessity in view of compulsory education through grade 9, (students of junior high school age of two towns number 345 for next term, 114 more than at present), recommend that farmers further consider donation of land for school in interest of education and whole community.

d. The persons concerned can resort to the Land Expropriation Law (Tochi Shuyoho). In this case the problem is presented to the Home Affairs Ministry through the governor of the prefecture, and with their agreement to an Examining Committee (Shuyo Shinsa Iinkai) of 7 members of which the governor of the prefecture concerned is the chairman. Final decision rests with the committee. This process takes at least six months.

e. If no settlement can be effected by above suggestions, recommend a complete new start be made by people concerned of both villages, with a more democratic approach to the problem than formerly.

SUBJECT: Problems

TO : Commanding Officer, Hyogo Military Government Team, APO 317

The following problems, the solution of which are beyond the capabilities of this section, have arisen:

a. Communism in Kobe University of Economics; Communism has become quite rampant in this institution, with some members of the faculty openly condoning it. A weekly meeting is held and well attended, and such subjects as "Soviet Intelligentsia", "Marxism", "General Trends of World Labor", and "A system profitable to Soviet Independence" are discussed. The Director of the school claims to be opposed to the activities but is afraid to take action against it.

b. Translations of Directives and Information released by the Ministry of Education; Many directives and much information is sent from the Education Ministry to the Prefectural Government and this section is not apprised of their contents. Far too much of it is received to permit of translation by either this section or the Liaison office. It is felt that if this material were translated by a higher Headquarters and furnished to CIAE Sections in English, it would greatly assist our work. When important directives are received by the Prefectural Education Section, it frequently takes six weeks or more before this Section even knows of the existence of the Directive.

c. Replacement for Enlisted Man; On 31 December, 1947, the Chief Clerk of the section left for the Zone of The Interior on emergency leave and will not return. An enlisted man is needed with a high school education and at least average intelligence.

**SUBJECT:** Report of Investigation of Delinquency Report

**TO:** Commanding Officer

1. In compliance with oral instruction of 10 November 1947, I have completed the preliminary investigation of DR #47-11 (Record of Arrest No. 5859), which is returned herewith in duplicate.

2. The accused and the witnesses all were questioned and a gist of the testimony follows.

a. S/Sgt Charles Harris, RA 20810988, the driver was first warned that anything he said could be used against him, and then testified in substance as follows: "I admit that I was exceeding the speed limit, possibly going as fast as forty miles an hour, but certainly not fifty-five. I did not hear the siren of the MP Jeep until it was along-side at which time I stopped."

b. 1st Sgt Homer Yeany, RA 6898667, Hyogo Military Government Team, was first warned that anything he said might be used against him (inasmuch as he had been the senior military person in the vehicle), and then testified in substance as follows: "We may have been speeding a little but nothing like 55 MPH, I was not watching the speedometer. I did not notice the MP Jeep until it was alongside." S/Sgt Harris was asked if he desired to cross examine and replied in the negative.

c. S/Sgt Marion Cole, RA 14159125, Hyogo Military Government Team, APO 317, a passenger in the vehicle, was sworn and testified substantially as follows: "I was in the back seat and did not know what speed we were travelling. I first heard the siren when the MP Jeep was alongside our jeep. I was all bundled up in the rear seat because it was cold and probably would not have heard anything. Soon after the MP Jeep pulled alongside, Harris stopped." S/Sgt Harris was asked if he desired to cross examine and replied in the negative.

d. Capt Roy M. Johnson, O490416, Co E, 34th Inf (on duty with Provost Marshal), being sworn, testified in substance as follows: "I was proceeding east on Texas Ave at about 21:05 on 6 Nov 1947 and was passing



through Ashiya when I noticed a vehicle going in the opposite direction (toward Kobe) at an excessive rate of speed. Before the other car reached me, I pulled off to the side so I could turn around. As soon as he passed me, I followed and attempted to overtake him. I turned on the red light on my jeep and then tailed the other vehicle at 55 MPH for approximately one and a half miles, after which I turned on my siren and tried to overtake him at speeds in excess of 60MPH. After several miles, I finally was able to get alongside and motioned the driver over to the curb. He then turned left down a sidestreet in what appeared to me to be an effort to escape arrest. He then made another left turn and came back onto Texas Avenue where I stopped him. I then told them to go to the operations office, which they did. At the operations office I booked them and released them to return to their unit. With the driver, S/Sgt Harris, were 1st Sgt Yeane, S/Sgt Cole, and Mr. Fukumoto, a civilian employee, all of Hyogo Military Government. The trip ticket indicated that the vehicle was dispatched for recreation, and the maximum speed for such vehicles is 25MPH.

The first time I got close to the jeep when attempting to catch it, the two occupants of the rear seat turned around and looked at me. When I finally stopped the jeep, I asked Sgt Harris why he tried to get away from me and he replied that he did not know I was an MP or that I had been attempting to catch him."

- (1) S/Sgt Harris, in cross examination, then asked Capt Johnson if he would take the same jeep out on the road and see if he could make it go 50 MPH, to which Capt Johnson replied that he would not. Sgt Harris then asked Capt Johnson if he were able to see his speedometer inasmuch as Sgt Harris had not been able to see his in the dark. Capt Johnson replied that he has a dash light connected to the red light which thoroughly illuminates the dash, and that he could see the speedometer wall. Capt Johnson added that he had followed without gaining for 1½ miles at 55 MPH and that his speedometer was checked at least once a week.

### 3. Findings:

- a. From the available evidence, I am convinced that an offense of speeding was committed.
- b. 1st Sgt Yeane, the Senior Military Person in the vehicle, had not made an effort to keep track of the speed at which S/Sgt Harris was travelling.
- c. S/Sgt Harris realized that he was speeding, but probably thought he was going more slowly than the alleged 55 MPH.
- d. S/Sgt Cole and Mr. Fukumoto were not in a position to assume responsibility.



4. Recommendation: That 1st Sgt Yeanev and S/Sgt Harris be held  
punitively responsible.

**SUBJECT:** Educational Problems

**TO:** Commanding Officer  
Hyogo Military Government Team

1. Among the problems in Japanese education are two that, in my opinion, should be brought to the attention of Higher Headquarters. These are: (1) The almost total lack of classes in Personal Hygiene and Sanitation in the curriculum, and (2) The practice of requiring students to perform janitorial duties at the school.

2. The lack of sufficient instruction in Personal Hygiene and Sanitation is evidenced by the appearance of the students and their habits, both at school and away from school. Even with the current shortages of soap and cleaning materials, it seems that the person and the clothing of the students should be much cleaner. If the schools were to establish a goal of sanitary improvement, and work towards it by teaching better methods, it is felt that it would eventually result in a general dissatisfaction with present outmoded facilities and practices, which dissatisfaction would prompt necessary reform. Some of the following improvements might well be taught:

a. Elimination through instruction of the practice of publicly answering to nature's urgings.

b. Elimination of the practice, followed even in the cities, of using one stream for any and all of the following purposes: washing vegetables, washing dishes, bathing, sewage, drinking and cooking purposes.

c. Encouragement of the recently announced process by which human excreta is rendered sterile without losing its fertilizing qualities. This program would certainly, if successful, tend to decrease the extremely high incidence of intestinal diseases.

d. Encouragement of better diet planning within the availability of agricultural production.

3. At present, almost all of the janitorial work is performed by

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the students and teachers. It is felt that the employment of janitors, at least to clean the toilets and do minor repair work, would serve a two-fold purpose of improving the state of repair and cleanliness and permit the student to better pursue his studies. In most schools, very minor repair needs exist, which could be easily repaired by even a relatively untrained janitor with a few simple tools and a minimum of materials.

**SUBJECT:** Report of Debate on "The future of the Japanese Shipping Industry"

1. On the evening of 1 October 1947 I attended a debate on the above named subject at the Shinwa Girls' High School. There were four speakers, each of whom voiced his own opinion on the organization and control of shipping.

2. The four speakers were; 1. The Labor Minister, who advocated state ownership and state control; 2. A representative of labor, who advocated state ownership and labor management; 3. A representative of private shipping, who advocated free enterprise; 4. An advocate of private ownership and state control.

3. Each speaker had five minutes initially, followed by a three minute rebuttal, after which the meeting was thrown open to questions from the audience, numbering well over 1,000 persons.

4. A transcription was made of the entire program and this will be edited by SCAP and then released for broadcast to the Japanese public.

5. Audience interest and participation was very keen, and it was gratifying to note that there was no solid front, which might have indicated labor steering. There was a wide divergence of views and the questions indicated considerable free thought on the subject by the listeners. In my opinion the conduct, tempo, and flavor of the meeting was an accomplishment in furthering democratic procedures in the prefecture.

SUBJECT: Investigation of Letter of Complaint from Japanese National,  
forwarded by C.I.C.

1. Reference: letter this hq. dtd 1 May 47, subject: "Investigation  
of Letter of Complaint from Japanese National".

2. The facts presented in the letter were:

Seven middle school students were allegedly expelled from school  
for participation in a wartime incident involving petty thievery in a war-  
plant. The writer asks on behalf of his nephew, one of the seven, that  
this boy be reinstated in Kwansai Gakuin, since the original charge against  
him was a military one. It is also stated that the students were under-  
nourished at the time, and this inclined them to the theft.

3. Investigation at the school concerned disclosed that:

The boy in question was a poor student, with a record of disorder-  
ly conduct at the school, for which reasons he was not permitted to re-  
enter school. Evidence that no animosity was held against the seven students  
involved in the original incident was offered, in that three of the seven are  
now attending the university department of the same school.

4. It is the recommendation of the investigator that no further action  
by this HQ is necessary.

5. The letter referenced in Para 1 was dispatched in acknowledgement  
of transmittal of complaint letter from C.I.C.

Memo to the Labor Officer:

SUBJECT: Salary Raise for two Japanese Employees

1. Miss Sugi Mibai has been employed by this office for nearly 10 months, starting in March 1946. Her work has been outstanding and her loyalty admirable. Her starting salary was ¥1,000 monthly and has had one raise, to ¥1,050. However her classification from the first has been advisor and her salary is disproportionate to that classification, which ranges in salary from ¥1,200. Miss Mibai is well-trained for her work, having taken B. A., M. A. and Ph. D. in Educational Psychology at American University. I therefore recommend that her salary be raised to ¥1,200, the lowest salary grade in the classification of advisor.

2. Mr. Hideo Konishi has been employed in this office as an interpreter - translator for nearly four months. His salary is ¥550 and has never been raised. His work has been excellent in all respects. Recently he has married and taken on family responsibilities. In view of the above, I recommend that his salary be raised to ¥600.
