At 1445 I on 3 May 2 divisions of VC-94 F4U-2's returning to base from TOAP, strafed targets of opportunity on Kume Shima. 1 division hit with 1600 rds. of .50 cal. ammo a possible revetment area hidden by trees near the air strip on the east side of the island. No damage was observed. The other division sighted and strafed 7 25 foot fishing boats near the beach on the west side. Numerous hits were scored on all boats, but since the boats were in shallow water near the beach none were sunk.
