Death by Gas Cruel? U. S. Court to Decide

CARSON CITY, Nev., Feb. 3.— The United States supreme court probably will be called upon to determine whether death by lethal gas as provided by statutes in this state as a penalty for murder is "cruel and unusual."

This developed today as the death watch was placed on Gee Jon and Hughie Sing, Chinese assassins, who murdered a compatriot in a tong feud last year, and who are concondemned to die by lethal gas during the week of April 16 to 22.

Their counsel declared an appeal will be taken acting as an automatic stay against execution and carry the case, if necessary, to the supreme court of the United States.

Jon and Sing are the first to be sentenced to death under the new law which, beyond providing generally for the administration of lethal gas in executions within a suitable enclosure at the state prison in the presence of the warden, a physician and not more or less than six citizens, contains no directions.

It is expected that to meet the issue respecting the character of the punishment the prison board will order plans prepared and adopted. A hermetically sealed cell with a glass front and having pipes for the entrance and exit of the deadly gas is contemplated.







1. DAVIS-GLENDALE COMPANY

The Davis-Glendale Company operates greenhouses and gardens at 1301 North San Fernando road, the plant proper now lying adjacent to the Burbank Pacific Electric line near Vine avenue, in the northwest section of the city.

Products raised include hothouse vegetables, but a specialty is made of cucumbers which are bought by the wholesale dealers for market and pickling. It is one of the uncommon industries which meets a large demand in a very economical manner. Twelve men are employed at present.

W. B. Davis is the president and general manager of the concern which now has only one-sixth of the contemplated buildings erected. Already \$100,000 in material and labor has been invested in this industry which will take two more years for development. It is a branch of the W. B. Davis Company at Aurora, Ill., an old established business having several eastern branches. J. L. Henderson is vice president and superintendent

Many thousand boxes of cucumbers and tomatoes are raised here for export to the principal cities of the east. These vegetables are all raised in large glass hot houses during the winter months when it is not possible to have the home-grown variety on the table. The greenhouses are heated by steam, but due to the usually equable climate in the vicinity of Glendale, it is possible to operate here on an economical scale.

A large part of the product is shipped to Chicago, it being a strictly wholesale business. There is no desire on the part of the management to entertain visitors during the days of development, but when the plant is finally completed it will be one of the most interesting showplaces in the rapidly developing northwest section of the city, according to Mr. Davis who likes to live in Glendale. His business interests, however, require part of his time in Illinois.

When General Wood and former Governor Forbes went to the Philippines in March, everyone knew that they make a report that would the independence movement for awhile, at least. To be fair with these gentlemen, that was what they were sent for.

Commissioner Gabaldon is giving the widest possible publicity to the independence," he declared on the floor of the House of Representatives the other day, "but we are not knocking at the doors of Congress with any bitterness in our hearts. prove to us that independence is the greatest blessing of mankind, as you have succeeded in doing, and that it is the one thing every patriotic citizen is justified in dying to obtain, and then to deny us that independence, would surely be a cruel accomplishment.'

Must Be Met Fairly

We have just had a great international conference in Washington in which many nations have voiced their grievances, and one needs only to regard the upheaval of opinion in sympathy with China to understand that the heart of the people who believe in "democracy," still beats honestly and patriotically for people who are ambitious to rule and govern themselves. The Philippine problem belongs to the American nation, and there is no question but what we must meet it fairly. The Filipinos are making their own wishes known, and it is apparently true, as they state, that the selfish commercial interests that have grown up in the Islands, and that are mainly directed by Americans, are obstructing their progress towards self-government The Filipinos admit that the American government has been their benefactor; but they are pardonably proud of their remarkable progress and very insistent for recognition of the fact that their advancement along educational, industrial and poby a mere thing like a "report," even though it happens to be made by a man who has attained distinction by reason of presidential preference under two administrations.

They challenge General Wood's report as opinionated and lacking in a true presentation of the "facts." Congress does not need to be told that the Wood-Forbes report teems with statements that are contradictory of the conditions reported by some of the ablest men in the Senate and the House-members of both parties, who have personally gone to the Philippines and made "reports" that were not inspired. The Wood report involves the future status in the world of ten million people in the Philippines—and, as usual, General Wood is not convincing.

One is reminded by the Wood-Forbes report of the definition found under the word "report" in the Universal dictionary, which says: "The sound of an explosion; a loud noise; and defined more clearly in the next line by a quotation from Shakespeare's Midsummer Night's Dream, which reads: "Rising and cawing at the gun's report."

A portion of the report follows: "You instructed me to make an investigation into the cost of automobile transportation preliminary to a special study to see if it would be advisable to substitute or supplement the present Pacific Electric Railway service on some lines and in some instances with motor transportation

Without fault or negligence on her part the telephone operator is left to explain, and the sentence first quoted is that adopted as most briefly and concisely covering the situation.



GOVERNMENT GIVES FACTS, FIGURES

Male and Female Totals Are Announced; Ship Subsidy

Is Under Discussion

By U. S. Press Association. WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 3 .-The bureau of the census has issued 228 S. Louise St., Opp. High School. a statement showing the total male population of the United States to be 53,900,432, which included 36,920,-663 men and boys 15 years of age and over. Of the latter number 12,-967,565 were single, 21,849,266 were married, 1,758,308 were widowed, 235,284 were divorced, and for the remaining 110,240 the marital condition was not ascertained by the enumerators.

The total number of females in the United States, 51,810,189, included 35.177.515 women and girls 15 years of age and over. Of the latter number 9,616,902 were single, 21,318,933 were married, 3,817,625 were widowed, 273,304 were divorced, and for the remaining 50,751 the marital condition was not reported. The difference of 530,333 between the numbers of married men and of married women was due principally to the presence in the United States of many foreign-born married men who left their wives in the countries of their former residence.

The census figures give no indi-

cation of the total number of persons who have been divorced, but show merely the number of divorced persons who had not remarried at he time the census was taken.

This is because she is of the latest type of battleship, and one which can cope with any three battleships of the Maryland type, so we are told. Being thus despotic. Some years afterward America, for her own convenience, may begin to expand her navy. It is plain that recognition of America's proposals will be filled with serious dangers in the future.
