# Condensed List of Florists' Bulbs 

For Forcing and Other Purposes, to which we call Special Attention.

## Early White Roman Hyacinths.

In our advanced Import Sheet we notified customers that large-sized Roman Hyacinths were scarce, and that the price in general wholesale catalogues would certainly be high. Owing to the supply being very short, there is not enough for the demand, and, in consequence, those who have not already taken advantage of the information and placed their orders early, will in most cases be obliged to take smaller-sized bulbs. Early in February we were fortunate in securing nearly two millions of these bulbs, which gave us an advantage over most of our competitors; but this supply has become so reduced that the bulk of what we have now to offer are bulbs measuring eleven to fourteen centimeters (about $4 \frac{1}{2}$ to $5 \frac{1}{2}$ inches) in circumference. These are very fair-sized bulbs, and should give every satisfaction, the difference being only one-third of an inch in circumference between this and the largest size. The low price at which we offer this size will more than compensate for the difference in measurement. Purchasers wishing to avoid further disappointments should place their orders at once.


## Lilium Harrisii.

(The Bermuda Easter Lily.)
Like the Roman Hyacinths, owing to the increasing demand for this most useful of florists' bulbs, the quantity of selected stock is inadequate to the demand, and some of the largest dealers for some time past have been obliged to refuse orders, owing to their supply becoming exhausted, and their inability to procure more.

We are pleased to say that at this time we have yet a liberal supply of all our mequaled large sizes, which we guarantee are superior to any others in size and purity.

## Important Nevelties.

## DWARF CALLA=LILY, "THE GEM." (Richardia nana.)

This is a novelty of great merit, which we can highly recommend, having given it a very fair trial with the ordinary variety known as the Calla-lily. To illustrate its distinctiveness we give, on opposite page, a reproduction from photographs of two plants taken side by side, the Dwarf Calla and the common variety. It will be found particularly useful to florists for design work, as the flowers are somewhat smaller than the ordinary variety, and it is in every way its superior for a potplant. It is very prolific in flowering, throwing four to five blooms from one medium-sized bulb, and seldom grows higher than one and ahalf feet. ## SPIRAEA JAPONICA GRANDIFLORA.

This is a grand novelty of recent introduction, and will be found most picturesque. When well grown its flowers are of pearly white, double the size of the common Spiraa Japonica; close and compact in form, they give the effect of foam piled in pyramidal shape, while the dark green fern-like leaves give a most pleasing contrast. The plant will be found very useful for table decoration, forces admirably, and being perfectly hardy, will be found suitable for borders. There can be no greater evidence of its value than the fact that growing plants always command more than double the price of the old Spiraa Japonica when in bloom. See illustration, page 6. 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## Columbia Flower=Tubs.

They are made of twelve staves in tapered shape, held together by two heavy steel wires, which are connected by substantial iron handles, and are so arranged that the wire can be tightened or loosened by simply turning a nut on the handle.

We guarantee that these tubs will never fall apart, as when the tubs get very dry, the wire can be tightened by the nut on handle as described above.

The handle itself is so constructed that the tub can be lifted by hand, and in case the plants are heavy, sticks can be inserted in handle, thereby allowing all weights to be lifted with perfect safety.

We furnish these Tubs painted with heavy oils in dark wine color, highly finished and varnished. We manufacture them in five sizes, as follows:
