The Structure of the Skin.

Barely speaking, the skin is composed of two layers—the cuticle or scurf and the corium or true skin. The former is principally made up of two portions, the horny layer, which is the principal protective to the body, and the mucous layer, which contains cells to be pushed up and become the horny layer after while, and these contain the coloring substance which gives the tint to the complexion. It is true that some of the microscopists are uncertain about the transformation of the mucous into the horny layer of the skin, but it is difficult to imagine where the protection comes from if not from the horny layer itself. The true skin is composed of a network of fibres intermixed with particles of living matter abundantly supplied with blood vessels, nerves and all the apparatus necessary for a continuous supply of fresh materials for the building up of new structures as well as of means for removing those that are worn out. The glands of the secretion of the perspiration and for the formation of a fatty, lubricating matter are to be found almost everywhere, as well as the little sacs to give origin to the hairs, which are mere modifications of the cells of the skin. The nervous apparatus of the sense of touch is almost everywhere present in more abundance in some localities than in others. In the mucous layer are found in connection with the hair sacs and glands for keeping the skin oily and supple; they are not under the control of the will, but act to squeeze out the lubricating material and to raise the hairs to an upright position, as in the so-called 'goose skin,' noticed under the influence of cold and sometimes of fear.—Detroit Free Press.

PARK AND GARDEN.

How Often to Sow Clover.

Clover cannot grow forever. It is

an exhaustive crop, taking from the soil

in a crop of two tons to the acre 180

pounds of nitrogen, 71 pounds of phos-

phoric acid, and 77 pounds of potash,

with a large quantity of lime. It is sup-

posed, and is commonly taught, that the

clover is not hard upon the soil, and gets

its nutrients from some obscure source,

in point of fact, from wherever the

soil. This, however, is a great mistake,

as the above figures show, and as

farmers who try to grow clover often

find to their sorrow and disappointment.

Seeds of perennials often germinate

slowly, and they should be sown where

they can be seen daily and the soil kept

moist. After sowing and watering it

is well to give a mulch of short grass,

which will keep the soil from drying out.

Sow the seeds in the fall, light soil, and

if possible in a place somewhat shaded.

A cold frame is best for such seeds.

Where climbing roses do not bloom,

these climbing roses being correct, we

should practice root pruning. Before

laying down the stems in the fall, dig a

trench round the plants about four

feet away from the base and cut off the

roots that are met with. If the cause is

too luxuriant growth, this operation will

check it. When blooming has once

commenced that will probably tax the

strength of the plant so as to restrain its

excessive vigor.
