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A Word of Explanation

Have you been somewhat disappointed in not receiving a reply to that last letter you mailed me? Do you feel that the shipping date I promised on your last order should have been two or three weeks earlier? Have you become a little impatient in not receiving your Peony order which I had booked for shipment the second week of September?

Let me explain!

The first week of September was one of continuous rain, and during the second and third weeks, we have had rain nearly every other day. You can easily realize what such conditions do to a shipping schedule. However, I am making every effort possible to overcome this handicap. I have just finished wiring my "dividing and packing" shed so that we will have ample light for dividing and packing during unfavorable weather and at night. This permits my force to label and dig Peonies whenever the weather conditions are at all favorable for outside work. Sometime in the very near future I hope to have shipping facilities that will not be dependent upon weather conditions, but for this season at least the weatherman is an important factor in all our plans and schedules. I wish you could drop in and see my force at work. Of course, we could not take much time to talk, but I believe you would find the activity most interesting. I used to think that the concentrated work about a threshing outfit represented the acme of busy, rush industry, but it cannot compare with a Peony garden during the shipping season. Our working day starts at five a. m. or earlier, and many, many days, ten p. m. finds us still at work. Of course, I could pick up extra men and rush through our accumulated orders, but each order is so important to me that I like to feel that it is handled in every detail by an experienced and reliable man, and that each order has my personal inspection before it is packed and shipped. This, naturally, takes a little more time, but the satisfaction this plan affords me is. I feel, worth the little delay it causes.

Present conditions do not permit me to snatch much time for handling correspondence, but if you can be a little patient, I will work with my secretary and office force, and handle your letter with the least delay possible. I will be glad when the peak of the rush is passed so I can devote more time to my correspondence for I do enjoy the letters

I receive.

I have accepted sufficient orders to keep my force busy

digging and shipping Peonies until October twentieth, or possibly later, and so I am not in position to accept orders for shipment before that date. Here is a list of varieties on which I am not oversold, and in it you will find a few varieties which I am offering for the first time this season. I can accept orders from this list for shipment after October twentieth, which in most localities is an ideal time for planting. Nearly all my own planting is done the latter part of October and the first of November, and last year I had marked success with divisions of Alice Harding planted in late November.

The prices quoted are for **Bonnewitz Strong One Eye Divisions** which will have at least two eyes. The illustration on the inside cover page gives you an idea of the size roots on which I make my quotations.

TERMS

My terms are cash with order and money will be refunded for any variety which I cannot furnish. I will under no circumstances make any substitutions, as it is my established policy to send exactly the plant you order or refund the money.

I believe that every variety I offer is absolutely true to name, but should any prove to be untrue, I will gladly refund the money paid for it.

I like to send roots by express as in that case the customer pays exactly what the transportation costs. If, however, any customer ordering a few roots wishes them sent by parcel post, he may send fifteen cents additional for each root or division, and I will not only pay the postage but will also insure the safe delivery of the package. Express is usually cheaper when five or more roots are ordered.
