
















































**MUDEO**






### BONFIRE








### **CALTECH MUSICAL**




## SENIOR DITCH DAY

This was the year of the relay. The 440-relay team, composed of Norm Murray, Greg Blaisdell, John Hattick, and Brian Sutula, ran a season's best time of 44.0 and were the only Tech track athletes to qualify for the District Meet. A second mile relay team competed in addition to the first, and on occasion both teams beat the opponent. And then there was the infamous KELROF 24-hr Relay.


It was also a season of improvement which saw most athletes bettering their performances significantly. A growth in team size helped raise our duel meet record to 4-10, but many still competed in a wide variety of events.

High-point man Norm Murray was again named the Outstanding Athlete. As well as running on the 440-relay team, he set team season bests in the 100, 220, 120HH, and shot put. The team's other major point getters were senior Duane Boman, with team bests in the long jump, triple jump, and 440IH, and fieldman Brian Sutula, who set the standards for javelin and discus.

Newcomer John Hattick blasted a 53.0 440 at the SCIAC Finals and received the Most Improved Athlete award.

The distance runners had their day at the District Meet when Brett Van Steenwyck ran an amazing 15:47 5000m and Bob Bourret came up with a 4:10.8 1500m.





The Sophomores overpowered the Freshmen in the annual Lounge Run, with some miniscule help from the Juniors and Seniors. It was all over in a few hours.



The Black Hand made his appearance and proceeded to terrorize the Frosh. After several abductions the Frosh formed the Green Foot gang.






Midterms came somewhere in there, then finals. We lost Frank Lamelas. Jim Gerdes was almost lost.








There was an exodus from Tunnel and East Blacker; the frosh played musical rooms to avoid Tunnel.




Dave Shenton aced out Sangtae Kim to become Robert Roe Blacker Professor of AMa 95 for 1977-78.

The year ended with many happy memories of the past year, abundant plans and hopes for the future and no provision made for a Blacker Big T editor.

















#### 1st Term















### 2nd Term


For Spring Break, the house sponsored, for the second year in a row, a house skiing trip to Mammoth. Again this year it was very successful.




Graduation came, and school ended. Several graduating seniors got married. Chris Jenson and Linda, and Jim Seidel and Carol Stevens.

"She's doing all right so far. She handles a lot of guys at once pretty well."


"Yeah, 'handles' them. She's probably had more experience in high school than most of these girls. Some of these have never even considered what its like to be the prime attraction to five or ten guys."


"Well you certainly were a determined voyeur, Alex", Jamie said, "I don't think I could have stayed around and watched, knowing that..."

Elections were held during second term. One of the Morriss' won the top room pick in the lottery; the gory details are recorded elsewhere in this section. And with that, second term drew to a close.


Eric Holstege got the gong for its final term. Not much of interest occurred until "that" day.




bottom drawer, where it was found again and auctioned off by the Caltech Y lost and found for \$5.25.
