Okla. Solons to Keep Hands Off

O KLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Sept. 15.—The legisla-ture of Oklahoma was warned today by Governor Walton to make no attempt to meet for an investigation of martial law situation or an inquiry of the motives of the governor.

"I shall brook no interference," the governor as-serted. "I'll put the legisla-tors in jail and keep them there if they attempt to convene in extra session and fight my efforts to rid the state of mob violence."

Legal authorities were of the opinion the legislature cannot convene lawfully in extra session except at the call of the governor. On the other hand it was said the state law makers might meet as individuals.

Governor Walton said he would keep interfering legislators in jail as long as he remained in office.

In field crops alfalfa heads the list, showing a return of \$3,388,999 from 28,000 acres as against \$2,156,000 from the same acreage the year before. Beans increased from \$1,338,000 in 1921 to \$2,284,000 in 1922, the area each year being 34,000 acres. Other field crops in the million dollar class were: sugar beets, 16,200 acres, \$1,932,984, and small grain for hay, 98, 000 acres, \$1,764,000.

Strawberries took the lead in truck crops with a return of \$3,310,790, from 1719 acres, against \$1,497,124 in 1921 from 2000 acres. Other crops from truck farms that run well over the million mark included cabbage, \$1,250,000; lettuce, \$2,500,000; potatoes, \$1,633,-500, and tomatoes, \$2,550,000, the latter showing a gain of more than a half million dollars.

Walnuts Make Gain; Grapes Make New Strides In Total Of Acreage Reported

In the classification of fruits and nuts, lemons followed oranges with an output of \$3,748,000, and walnuts came third vith 8,754 tons valued at \$3,412,800, against 6325 tons in 1921, valued at

That grapes are coming into their own in Los Anglees county is reflected in an increase of near a thousand acres during the past year and a jump from \$980,240 in 1921 to a return of \$1,735,500 last year. Peaches showed a good increase in acreage, the return for last year being \$1,351,200, the gain being a material one over the year before. Even the humble prune came in with a crop amounting o \$22,190, while miscellaneous fruits and nuts yielded an aggregate

Almonds scored the most remarkable gain of any of the nuts, the jump in acreage being from 762 to 1062 and the returns from \$24,320 in 1921 to \$44,600 for the year just closed.






