



ROBERTSON'S ESTIMATE READY TO FEED OF WINNIPEG STRIKE

Labor Minister Says Movement | Allies Will Act Soon Deserves No Sympathy From Outside

Calgary, May 28.-Mayor Marshall of Calgary yesterday afternoon received the following telegram from Senator Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor, which the latter sent from Winnipeg:

"The employers affected proved con-clusively that they had no objection to their employees organizing themselves, and these employers have dealt with committees of their employees elected as representatives of various craft unions concerning their industry.

"The employers furthermore have expressed perfect willingness to meet and confer with executive officers of the various organizations if desired, but they refused to load with a body known as the Metal Trades Council, which is elected by other employees outside of their own.

Negative Reply...

"Twenty-four hours before the sympathetic strike was called the Premier of Manitoba urged an adjustment of the matters in dispute by arbitration, and in a final attempt to avert a general strike asked the committee if it would cancel the strike provided the employers would agree to recognize the Metal Trades Councii. To this question a negative reply was given. "Subsequent events have proven concisively that the motive behind the general strike affort was for the purpose of assuming control and direction of industrial affairs and of municipal, Provincial and Federal activities, so far as they are being carried on in this city, and with the avowed intention of extending that control to a vider field. "I have no hesitation in saying that the 'One Big Union' movement is the underlying cause c' the whole trouble, and that the Winnipeg general strike deserves no sympathy or support from the labor organizations outside of Winnipeg.

British Comments.

London, May 28.—The Manchester Guardian in discussing the Canadian labor troubles, remarks that labor in Canada until recently has been weaker politically than labor in any other part of the Empire. The present upheaval can not be conveniently accounted for by the familiar bogeys of Bolshevism and German machinations, the paper says. Profiteering on a scale unknown in this country has been rife, it adds.

At the same time the scarcity of labor and the vital importance of the ends to which it has been directed made the workmen realize that now for the first time the remedy for abuses is in their hands, the paper says, adding that the demands of the strikers apparently are no more drastic than those which already have been conceded in this country.

PETROGRAD PEOPLE

Bolsheviki Have Been Expelled

London, May 28.—The Allied and Associated Powers have made arrangements to feed Petrograd and render assistance to the starving population after the expulsion of the Boishiviki. Herbert C. Hoover, the head of the Allied relief organization, has the details in hand. It is hoped that relief will be in the city within thirty-six hours after the Bolsheviki withdraw.

Kolchak Advancing.

Paris, May 28.—Dispatches received in Paris yesterday announced that the reverse suffered by the forces of Admiral Kolchak, anti-Bolshevik commander in Russia, was only temporary and that Kolchak's armies again were advancing against the Bolsheviki, who were falling back on the Volga line.

KEFP THE POT BOILING.

By this time the people of Victoria, Esquiwalt, and Vancouver Island as a whole should be fully conversant with the dry-dock controversy. Even the school boy and girl have doubtless learned that a naval base at Esquimalt-modernized from time to time as demanded by the march of progress is part of a definitely decided national policy. It is on account of this decision made years ago, passed upon by naval experts and accepted by the Dominion Government, besides other reasons, that Victoria is entitled to expect Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues in the Cabinet to authorize the construction of this important public work with-

We shall expect that when the Prime Minister has doffed his Peace Conference clothes and the atmosphere which naturally goes with them, and again takes up the more domestic tasks that await him, a refreshed memory on the dry-dock question will be very promptly followed by the right sort of action. In any case, Victoria did the right thing yesterday afternoon when she decided to hold a delegation in readiness to depart for the national capital should Dr. Tolmie deem such a course ne cessary. For our part we would suggest that the city's deputation set out at once, for if Dr. Tolmie gets a satisfactory pronouncement in the meantime the Victoria missioners might assist in inserting the official speed plug.

THE MOTIVE BEHIND.

In his message to the Mayor of Calgary, printed elsewhere in this issue, Hon. G. D. Robertson, Minister of Labor, says in part:

"Twenty-four hours before the sympathetic strike was called the Premier of Manitoba urged an adjustment of the matters in dispute by arbiation, and, in a final attempt to avert a general strike, asked the committee if they would cancel the strike provided the employers would agree to recognize the Metal Trades Council. To this question a negative reply was given.

Subsequently, events have proved conclusively that the motive behind the general strike effort was for the purpose of assuming control and direction of industrial affairs, also of municipal, Provincial and Federal activities, so far as they are being earried on in this city, and with the avowed intention of extending that control to a wider field.

I have no hesitation in saying that the 'One Big Union' movement is the underlying cause of the whole trouble, and that the Winnipeg general strike deserves no sympathy or support from the labor organizations outside Winnipeg."

Thus the Minister of Labor, after a thorough investigation of the situation at Winnipeg, finds that the motive behind the general strike was practically the creation of a Bolshevik dictatorship, for the "control and direction of industrial affairs, also of municipal, provincial and Dominion tivities with the avowed intention of extending that control to a wider field" means nothing else. This, of course, would create anarchy, the L. W. W. paradise

Such an objective and the principles of organized labor are as far apart as the poles, but the promoters of the Winnipeg tomble are trying to divert the trades unionist provement into channels of lawlessness and chaos, to shackle it to the mad ideas of Lenine and Trotzky. It is not a little surprising that they bare been able to deceive and dominate so large a proportion of the organized labor membership of Winnipeg so long. No doubt the big alien element in that membership was an important factor in helping to produce the few days' paralysis, and not improbably it was this circumstance which induced the promoters to select Winnipeg as a strategic

The revolutionary movement at Winnipeg will fail, no matter how far its ramifications may extend, for the Canadian people will have none of it. But it will have taught certain useful lessons. One is the folly of permitting preachers of disruption and anarchy to enter this country, and of allowing them to carry on their campaign after they come here. Every revolutionary utterance from them is a violation of the law and should be dealt with as such.

Another lesson is the urgency of Government action relative to the cost of living, profiteering, and other economic disabilities from which the country is suffering. The existence of these produces a condition of mind which greatly assists the propagators of discord. But for these the Bolshevik movement in Winnipeg would not have gained any support, no matter how attractively it was garbed, except from the aliens and other agitators who are not aliens but who should be deported to the countries from which they came just the same.

COMMUNTY SETTLEMENT.

Just about a month has elapsed since active operations commenced in the Courtenay Community Settlement area and reports without exeption indicate that the soldies farmers will make it a success. The removal of stumps and the task of clearing in general is about the most disheartening task the settler has to face. It tests patience, brain and muscle and the refurned man will be called upon to surmount these and other difficulties attendant upon successful rural enterprise. But he will have the satisfaction of knowing that in the logical prosecution of the community plan he will be establishing a precedent which should subsequently lead to a land settlement policy in British Columbia that will bring the population of which this Province is in reed. which this Province is in need.

It is satisfactory to note that the Provincial Land Settlement Board and the Department of Agriculture are actively shepherding the Court-enay scheme, for the quicker it can be demon-strated to Canada as a whole that the community method of soldier and general settlement is economically sound, the sooner will the greater part of the Dominion's repatriation problems dis-appear. This does not mean that all former mem-bers of the Canadian Expeditionary Force will de-sire to till the soil. It should mean, however, that the extent of and progress in specially selected areas would be such as to demand that hand in hand with agricultural development should go industrial expansion commensurate.

Industries are needed in British Columbia, and until there is a more intensely and evenly distributed settlement on the broad acres of this Province it will be useless to expect very much profitable expansion in the comparatively ngested industrial areas now hugging the When this section of the Dominion can feed itself the royal road to prosperity will have been discovered and serious unrest will be a thing unknown. As a part of the remedy to existing conditions there is good reason to believe that community settlement pursued along its logical course would be a big step towards the destiny which rightly belongs to British Columbia.

NO PROSPECT OF CHEAPER CLOTHES

English Manufacturers Faced With Rising Cost of Raw Yarn

In view of the continued outcry against the high cost of living, which may be said to include the ever-rising price of clothes, it is interesting to note the following excerpt from a newspaper from Bradford, England. As Bradford is the seat of the woollen trade in Great Britain, the report may be credited as emanating from an authoritative source.

It reads:

"The price of cloth of the better qualities continues to advance. The reasons given are the growing demands from neutral markets and an anticipated boom when the blockade is entirely removed and the restrictions on exports are taken off.

"There are frage quantities of woollens and worsteds stocked in Bradford warehouses, though the manufacturers.

cult to get promise of delivery before September or October. The price of Yarn, already exorbitant, is still advancing, quotations to-day being well over is a pound higher than a fortnight ago. There is little prospect of the prices of cloth declining for a considerable period.

"Before the war a spinner of yarn was content with a profit of 6½d a pound, but he is now getting 5s or 6s, which means that he is taking toll of about 7s 6d a yard on an ordinary 22-oz. worsted coating, which cost about 7s a yard before the war. Cloth which sold retail at about 7s a yard now costs about 26s a yard. It may be taken for granted that so far from the removal of restrictions tending to chespen cloth it is more likely to make it dearer. There is said to be a great demand from Germany, and a big volume of trade with that country is sexpected. Japan is also said to be buying heavily."







Increase in Traffic Follows Failure at Last Session of Legislature

The great increase of jitneys on the streets of Victoria during the past few weeks is worrying the civic authorities not a little at present. It is under-stood that the failure of the city at the stood that the failure of the city at the last session of the Provincial Legislature to secure powers to regulate the traffic resulted in numerous additions to the jitney business. The consequence is that on some lines, the civic authorities are informed, the trade of the B. C. Electric Railway Company is suffering to a considerable extent. At present the city is powerless to do anything to combat these conditions.

It will be remembered that the city endeavored at the last Session to secure powers in its Private Bill to regulate and prohibit jitneys in the city. The plan was to allow the B. C. Electric Railway Company to charge a six-cent fare while lowering its lighting rates. This scheme failed, however, when the clauses in the Private Bill framed to give the city powers of jitney regulation were eliminated on technical grounds.

Vancouver, May 28.—The new pier which the Canadian Pacific will start work upon immediately on Vancouver's waterfront will be situated between the present piers A and D and will be the most modern construction on the coast, modelled after the best types studied by the company's experts. The plans are now complete and are at the present time in the company's head offices in Montreal, where they have been approved by the experts employed on their drawing. The pier will have accommodation for the largest ships entering the harbor and will be equipped with the latest appliances for the handling and trans-shipping of cargo.

With shipping released for wheat carrying, the company is expecting a big grain movement through this port during the latter part of the year and is well equipped to meet such haulage. Vancouver may expect to become a more important wheat shipping centre than heretofore, including wheat, silk, lumber, metals and everything shipped from Vancouver to the Orient and imported into Canada through this port.



Big Troop Carrier To Be Held in Quarantine



C. P.O. S. LINER EMPRESS OF RUSSIA

TROOPS ON RUSSIA TO BE QUARANTINED

Outbreak of Smallpox Necessitates Detention of Siberian Men 14 Days

Owing to the development of two cases diagnosed as smallpox and an additional case of scarlet lever, the C. P. O. S. transport Empress of Russia, conveying fifty-eight officers and 1,466 men of the Canadian Siberian Expeditionary Force from Vladiyostok, will, upon her arrival at William Head tonight, be held in quarantine and the returning soldiers detained for the regulation period.

Inquiry at military headquarters this morning elicited the information that no details had been received from the ship and that the authorities had not been notified as to the identity of the two men stricken with the secourge. It is presumed, however, that the cases

been notified as to the identity of the two men stricken with the scourge. It is presumed, however, that the cases are not serious, but the fact that smallpox has been contracted during the voyage will necessitate the detention of the troops at the quarantine station for fourteen days. There is adequate accommodation for the large body of troops at William Head and it is expected that the commissariat department will be taken charge of by the Army Service Corps. Under the quarantine regulations the transportation company is usually responsible for the care of passengers, but as this is an exceptional case there is every indication that the troops will be looked after by the military authorities.

Liner To Be Released.

Debarkation will commence to-morrow morning, and when the last of the troops are asshore the liner will be prepared for fumigation.

After this work has been completed the Empress of Russia will be allowed to proceed but the soldiers will be held for fourteen days. The fumigation of the ship will occupy between four and five days.

Washington, May 28. — A bill designed to protect and conserve the fishing in dustry in Alaskan waters was introduced to-day by Representative Alexander, Democrat. of Missouri. Alaskan canneries and fish packing establishments would be required to obtain a licence for operation from the Secretary of Commerce who would lease fixed locations for lifteen years or less.

Another measure by Mr. Alexander proposed that December and January be a closed season for hallbut fishing in United States waters of the Pacific and would make it unlawful to land hallbut in the Snited States or Alaska during that period.




