QUESTION 14. What Preachers have died during the past year?

REV. JAMES HUNTER departed this life Dec. 10, 1862.

Of his early life, conversion, and call to the ministry, we have no account. In 1806 he was admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference, and travelled until 1815, when his name disappears, to be seen again in connection with the Alcove Circuit in 1829-'30. In 1831-'2 he was assigned to the Monroe Circuit; to Fayette, in '33; superanuated in '34; travelled Newnan, '35; Hamilton, '36; superanuated six years; was appointed to the Greenville Circuit, '43; Thomaston, '44, and superanuated finally in 1845.

Of this venerable man we would say but little—let his works praise him. Seeking as he did the honor of God, and having no ear for the adulations of earth, we shall tread softly on his sleeping dust. Among his chief characteristics were gentleness, meekness, temperance, patience, industry, unflinching opposition to sin in its most specious appearance, and a constant, ardent attachment to the doctrines, polity and usages of the M. E. Church, South. In spirit he was ever present with the Church, whether assembled for prayer and praise, or deliberation and aggression.

During the last session of the Georgia Conference he contracted his fatal illness, and returned home to linger a few days—to set his house in order—to die. Those who knew Bro. Hunter will not pause to inquire of his last moments. By his life and death we are forcibly reminded of the exodus of Israel's Prophet-Bard, who "having served his generation by the will of God, fell on sleep, and was laid unto his fathers."

ALEXANDER GORDON was admitted into the Georgia Conference in 1835, and appointed to the Liberty and Darien Circuit. His fields of labor, subsequently, were Ogeechee, in 1836; Canoochee Mission, in 1837; Ogeechee Mission, in 1838, 1839 and 1840, and Cherokee Hill, in 1841 and 1842. His name does not occur in the Minutes of 1843. He was superanuated in 1844. For the most part, he was continued in this relation until his death.

Bro. Gordon was a simple-hearted, fervent old man, always cheerful, always ready to do what he could to promote the cause of Christ, preaching sometimes when he was not able to stand more than ten minutes. After an illness of about six months, he died Jan. 4th, 1863, "strong in the faith, and giving glory to God." "Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth : yea, saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors, and their works do follow them."

JOHN STRICKLAND.—In the death of Rev. John Strickland the Georgia Conference has lost an acceptable, laborious, successful member—one who was consecrated to God, filled with the Spirit, constrained by the love of Christ, and whose highest ambition was to save his own soul and the souls of others. With such preparation it is not astonishing that he was ready for the most difficult and uninviting fields, and, not unfrequently, exchanged for months the pleasures of home for the privilege of winning souls. Nor is it surprising that he triumphed over the disadvantages of a defective early education, and made an annual report of two hundred accessions to the Church. With his faith fastened to the truth and omnipotence of God, he needed no heavy armour, no helmet of brass, no coat of mail; but with his sling and a few stones taken from the brook of Nature, he encountered the enemies of Israel, slew their champions, scattered their squadrons and appropriated their spoils. "He was a good man, full of the Holy Ghost and faith; and much people was added to the Lord."

The study of this brother's life is replete with weighty and valuable suggestions; but we forbear—simply stating that his entire career, including conversion, call to the ministry and subsequent success, affords a sublime commentary on he achievements of grace.

Bro. Strickland joined the Conference, Jan. 10th, 1850; was Chaplain to the 40th Georgia Regiment, and attended Bragg's army in the memorable Kentucky campaign. His last illness was contracted on his way home, and was aggravated by a failure to secure shelter. A few days after his arrival he died in great peace, assuring his family that all was well. Thus passed away this man of labors.

REV. THOS. H. JORDAN died in Savannah, July 29, 1863. Of his early life, conversion or entrance into the ministry, no facts have been obtained. He commenced preaching when quite a young man, and joined the Conference in 1849. He has filled some of the most important and prominent charges in the Conference-always with great acceptability, and sometimes with much success. He was greatly beloved by all who knew him, and was a special favorite among his brethren in the ministry. He possessed a strong and vigorous intellect, with fine pulpit powers; and was a man of much more than ordinarily noble and generous impulses-ardent, devoted and impulsive in his temperament, entering enthusiastically into every undertaking of life; and also bold and fearless, determined and courageous, in the performance of Early in our present national struggle, while filling duty. an appointment in this city, he accepted the post of Chaplain to a company leaving for the seat of war, which position he filled during the first year. He then returned home, with a commission to raise a squadron of cavalry, of which he was to take command as Captain; which he did as quickly as possible, and was ordered to Gen. Bragg's army, where he remained until his death. He bravely and heroically led his command in a number of our severest battles—at Perryville, Murfreesborough, and others. His devotion to his men was unbounded, and they were extravagant in their praise and affection for him.

During the time of his connection with the army he was guilty of some improprieties and derelictions; but not so numerous or half so grave and serious as rumor laid to his charge, as his dying confession and testimony fully prove. And even his improprieties were the result of his temperament and social nature-not of the heart. During the last months of his life he preached often and most usefully to his own command, and his labors were blessed with a gracious revival of religion among them, in which he was zealously laboring, up to the day he left for his home, on a sick furlough. obtained at the earnest request of friends, to recruit his own health and also to obtain recruits for his squadron. The day he reached his family he told his wife that he had come home to die; and continuing in this persuasion, he began calmly and industriously to put his house in order and arrange all his temporal affairs, as if confident of his change. Some five days afterwards, he was suddenly attacked with the cholera, and in about thirty hours died in great peace. Although he suffered most intensely during his illness, he was patient, calm, and met death with greatest possible composure, yea triumph. When it was known that he must die, he was asked, "What was the state of his mind and prospects in view of his probable end ?" He replied, "All is bright and clear; not a cloud between me and my God. I now trust alone in the merits of Jesus Christ, and feel the presence of the Holy Spirit now with me-no fear, no doubt." He then sent messages of love and affection to his brethren in the ministry, the Conference and beloved ones away. A little while before his death, while prayer was being offered around his bedside, he was filled with rapture and praise, shouted aloud and declared that, though he was passing through the valley of the shadow of death, he feared no evil, saying, "For thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff, they comfort me-they comfort me," and then raising and clapping his hands, already cold in death, he cried with a loud voice, "Triumph! Triumph! Triumph! Victory !" which were his last words, for soon after, he peacefully fell asleep in Jesus.

ELIJAH N. BOLAND was born in Muscogee county. He embraced religion about the close of the Mexican war, and was admitted into the Georgia Conference, at LaGrange, in the year 1855. He served successively the colored missions in Talbot, in Columbus, on the Chattahoochee and in Georgetown. His education was limited, but being studious, he was rapidly improving as a preacher. He would work hard all the week, study at night, and preach on Sundays.

In the present great struggle for liberty and right, he felt that he ought to take an active part, and consequently, enlisted as private in the 46th Regiment Georgia Volunteers, expecting to be made Chaplain to the regiment. In this expectation, however, he was disappointed. He was faithful in his country's service, and maintained his Christian walk. He died in one of the hospitals of the city of Rome, in September last, with no Christian friend near him to minister to him, and receive his dying message; but his life gives us the best assurance of his peaceful, happy end. "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright; for the end of that man is peace."

ROBERT N. COTTER, the son of J. V. and M. Cotter, was born in Hall county, Georgia, April 11, 1826. When he was six years old his father removed to Murray county. The country was then new and education but little attended to. In the 17th year of his age he joined the church, and commenced praying in public before he embraced religion, and was converted not long afterwards. For several years he was Class Leader and Exhorter. In 1854 he was admitted into the Georgia Conference, and appointed as Junior Preacher to the Hamilton Circuit. In 1855 he served the Stewart Circuit in the same capacity. He was appointed to the Jacksonville Circuit in 1856, during which year he was married to Miss Caroline McRae, of Telfair county. He was returned to the same Circuit in 1857. He was appointed to McIntosh Mission in 1858 and 1859; to Swainsboro' Mission, in 1860; to Mt. Vernon Mission, in 1861 and 1862; to Swainsboro' again in 1863, where he died of typhoid fever, on the 6th of May, perfectly resigned and willing to die.

Bro. Cotter was a simple, earnest preacher, dwelling more on Christ as his ministry drew to a close. He never was known to complain of his appointment, but was willing to labor anywhere in his Master's vineyard. He has fallen asleep in Jesus, but, thank God, it is not a "sleep which knows no waking."

CHARLES MOUZON SMITH was born June 28th, 1841. He was the son of Robert S. Smith, of Washington, Ga., and the nephew of Rev. Whiteford Smith, of the South Carolina Conference. He joined the church under the ministry of Rev. J. O. A. Clark, in Washington, when he was sixteen

years old, and engaged at once in the duties of a Sunday School teacher, having a large class of colored catechumens. He was licensed to preach in 1859, and entered the travelling connection at the Rome Conference. He was appointed Junior Preacher on the Richmond Circuit. The next year he was assigned to the Isle of Hope. In 1862 he was appointed Junior Preacher on the Waynesboro' Circuit. The Rev. Robt. B. Lester, preacher in charge, being Chaplain in the army, could not enter upon his work until the month of May, and in the meanwhile the whole work of that large Circuit devolved upon Bro. Smith. It was too much for him; and being exceedingly zealous, he fell a sacrifice in the cause of his Lord and Master. While engaged in prayer, in the Spring of that year, he was taken with a violent hemorrhage of the lungs, from the effects of which he never recovered. Just before this, he had been married to Miss Florence Harris, of Richmond county. At our last Conference, he was placed on the list of superanuated preachers. He continued to be a great sufferer, and died of Consumption, at the house of his father-in-law, on the 9th of Oct., 1863.

Bro. Smith was a young man of great promise, and regarded as one of the best preachers of his age. He was devoted, zealous, pious. He fell in the early dawn of his manhood; but conquered when he fell. His end was peace—his reward will be everlasting life.

REV. WM. C. D. ful life. This expectation strengthened as youth developed into manhood. He graduated at Emory College with distinction, in 1856, and shortly after studied law and was admitted to the bar. About this time his health failed, and for a year or more he was alike disqualified for business and study. From the period of his conversion he had labored under a strong persuasion that it was his duty to preach the Gospel. It now matured into clear and solemn conviction, and he resolved to shape his future course in reference to the studies and responsibilities which it involves. Accordingly with returning health, in 1858, he was licensed to preach, and with characteristic modesty and self-distrust entered upon the work of a local preacher.

During 1859-'60 he presided with great efficiency over the Carrolton Female Institute, and at the same time labored with encouraging success as a minister. In 1861 he was employed on the Greenville Circuit, and at the close of the year was received into this Conference. In 1862 he was stationed in Newnan and Palmetto, and the present year he was appointed President of Andrew Female College, and Junior Preacher on Cuthbert Station. He had barely entered upon this work and made his arrangements for the 'year, when he. was interrupted by the appearance of Small Pox within the bounds of his charge. Not being aware of the fact that he had been in contact with this dreaded infection, he went into Houston county, on a visit to his wife's relatives, and while there the fatal disease was developed. His sufferings were severe, but of short duration. Cut off from the kindly visits and ministrations of friends-attended alone by his wife and wife's grandfather, the Rev. Howell Cobb, he encountered the last enemy, Death. He was patient and resigned under all his sufferings, and often triumphant. On the 7th February the final hour came. It found his mind clear and spiritual sky cloudless; and in undoubting faith and holy serenity he passed away.

Seldom is the church called upon to mourn the death of one so gifted, so cultivated and full of rich promise of usefulness; but we would bow with meek submission to Him whose ways are just and counsels wise.

Commencing, as we did, a few years ago without capital, it is especially gratifying to state that, through the liberality of friends, the earnest and faithful labors of the Agent, Rev. JOHN W. BURKE, and the blessings of God, we have now a very large and flourishing Book Establishment.

The sales for the past year amounted to \$110,439,37. The Agent's report shows the following facts of general interest:

REPORT OF MISSIONARY BOARD.

The following condensed statement embodies the material facts in reference to the various Mission fields within our Conference bounds:

Andrew Chapel Colored Mission-Rev. J. W. Turner, Missionary, is in a prosperous state, notwithstanding the embarrassment of the times. Has on probation 62; in full membership 295; 40 catechumens. Has paid its pastor \$100, and will pay more next year.

Burke Colored Mission—Served by Rev. Thomas B. Lanier, is in a fine condition, over 300 having been received the present year, and has been in constant peace. It is selfsustaining, having paid \$710. It has 775 members, 325 probationers, 475 catechumens.

Glascock Mission.—Is reported by the missionary, Rev. J. J. Morgan, to be in a prosperous condition, having 7 appointments, 201 white and 51 colored members, 23 white and 11 colored probationers, 2 Sabbath Schools doing well; has paid to missionary \$500.

Athens Colored Mission—Is reported by its pastor, Rev. G. W. Yarbrough, to be in a very flourishing condition, with 275 full members, 20 probationers, 75 catechumens, having paid to its support \$230.

Clayton Mission—Has been served by Rev. J. Newell, is in a good state, with 9 appointments, 140 members, paid missionary \$286.

Atlanta Colored Mission—Was served by Rev. J. B. Payne, and is in a most flourishing condition indeed, having 290 full members, 125 probationers, 85 catechumens, and has paid \$675 to the support of its missionary. The congregation is one of our largest, and has built and paid for a good house of worship.

Atlanta City Mission-Rev. W. H. Evans, missionary, has accomplished a good work, though not as much as it might, and it was hoped it would, owing to the embarrassments of the times, especially in that city. It has 140 white members, 10 probationers, 2 colored members, 2 Sabbath Schools, 85 scholars, and has contributed to its support \$575.

Houston Mission—Rev. J. P. Howell. This mission lies in Heard county, and has 6 appointments, 179 white members, 41 on probation, and has paid to missionary \$161. It is reported in a tolerable condition, and its continuance desirable.

Griffin City Mission—Has been under the pastoral direction of Rev. C. W. Parker. The mission to the whites has been served as efficiently as possible, without house of worship or church organization. The colored charge is in a very flourishing condition, with 174 members, 22 on probation, 70 catechumens, paid missionary \$50. Its continuance as a mission is considered important.

Macon City Mission—Rev. Thomas T. Christian, missionary, has done a noble work, and is in a fine condition, with

200 members, 36 on probation, and a prosperous Sabbath School. Has contributed \$1000 to the support of the pastor.

Macon Colored Charge—Rev. J. W. Burke, is prosperous, having just closed a revival meeting of 6 weeks, has 638 members, 110 on probation, 120 catechumens.

Everett Mission—Served by Rev. J. Dunwoody, has 4 appointments, in a good condition, 174 members, 16 probationers, 100 catechumens.

Columbus Factory Mission and Colored Charge-Rev. W. J. Wardlaw, missionary, has 3 appointments, with 250 white and 900 colored members, 2 Sabbath Schools, and one large class of catechumens, all in good condition; 200 have been added to the membership this year; paid missionary \$500.

Clinton Mission—Was served by Rev. T. A. Pharr, its condition is highly prosperous, has 5 appointments, 327 members, 133 on probation, paid missionary \$400; ought to be continued.

Greenville Colored Mission—Was served in connection with the circuit by Revs. J. B. McGehee and J. T. Payne. It has nine appointments, 464 members, 100 probationers, and is reported to be in a prosperous condition.

Isabella Mission—Rev. S. A. Clarke, has 8 appointments, 2 Sabbath Schools, 121 white and 38 colored members, 40 white and 13 colored probationers, and has paid \$219, towards its support. The missionary reports it in a prosperous condition.

Mt. Vernon Mission---Was served the past year by Rev. W. T. McMichael. It is growing rapidly, over 100 members received during the year, has 13 appointments, 2 Sabbath Schools, 257 whites and 18 colored members, 64 whites and 55 colored on probation. It has paid the missionary \$500.

Starkville Mission—Rev. W. F. Holland, has 8 appointments, and is upon the whole in good condition. There are 75 white and 41 colored members, 48 whites and 87 colored on probation, has contributed \$377,75, also \$101 for armymissions.

Broad River Colored Mission-Rev. W. T. Norman, missionary, has 6 appointments, 113 members, 115 catechumens. Has raised for its support \$375,25. It is in a good condition and its continuance desired.

Morganton Mission—In charge of Rev. A. C. Carson, is generally prosperous. Has 12 appointments, 332 members, 112 probationers, 5 Sabbath Schools, 115 pupils, and has paid missionary \$302,25.

Huralson Mission-Served by Rev. F. A. Robertson, em-

braces parts of Haralson, Carroll and Paulding counties, has 8 appointments, 200 members, 19 probationers, and 2 Sunday Schools. It has paid missionary \$90,10. Mission is improving.

Paulding Mission-Was served by Rev. A. J. Deavors. It is mostly in Paulding county, has 6 appointments, 142 members, and paid missionary \$34,75. This mission is improving and its continuance desired.

Oglethorpe Colored Mission-Rev. J. W. Neese, missionary, has 188 members, is in a healthy condition, and its continuance desirable.

Buffalo Mission-Was served by Rev. J. W. Knight, has 100 members, 100 catechumens, paid missionary \$450. It is in a good condition, and its patrons take a deep interest in its welfare.

Monticello Colored Mission--Has been served during the year by Rev. J. E. Sentell and W. Cook, has 8 appointments, 325 members, 90 probationers. It is doing well, and the planters would not have it abandoned.

Morgan Colored Mission--Has been served regularly in connection with the circuit by Rev. D. Kelsey, has 170 members, 4 probationers. It promises good results and should be continued.

Columbia Colored Mission—Rev. I. S. T. Hopkins, missionary, has also been served in connection with the circuit. It has 230 members, 200 probationers, paid missionary \$813. It is reported to be prosperous.

Oxford Colored Mission—Under the supervision of Rev. Morgan Bellah, is doing well. Has 7 appointments, 228 members, 10 probationers, and its continuance much desired.

Louisville Colored Mission-Rev. E. P. Bonner, missionary, is doing well; 50 additions to membership this year, and has paid to missionary \$500.

Puinam Colored Mission—Served by Rev. James A. Baugh, 388 members, 40 probationers. It is in a good state, and it is desired that it be continued.

Chattahoochee Mission—Rev. W. W. Tidwell, missionary, has 12 appointments, 560 members, 250 catechumens, paid missionary \$600. It is doing well and its patrons want it continued.

Georgetown Colored Mission—Has been served by Rev. J. T. Turner, in connection, with the Georgetown station, has 3 appointments, 41 members, 10 probationers, has paid to its support \$175. The patrons desire it to be continued and it is recommended.

Lincolnton Mission-Served by Rev. G. L. W. Anthony,

has 7 preaching places, 119 members, 5 on probation. It is reported in a prosperous condition.

Euharlee Mission—Served the latter part of the year by Rev. R. H. Jones, as supply, reported in good condition, has 206 whites, 5 colored members, 14 white and 2 colored probationers, 6 Sunday Schools, 276 pupils, paid R. H. Jones \$340.

Asbury and Trinity Mission, Augusta—Has been under the pastoral supervision of Rev. D. D. Cox. Asbury has 181 members, 45 on probation, 1 Sabbath School, 160 officers and pupils, has paid for its Sunday School \$250, and to missionary \$1000. Trinity has 990 members, 92 on probation, paid to missionary \$135, has 103 catechumens. Both churches have been greatly blessed during the year. The mission is in an exceedingly fine and flourishing condition.

GEORGIA CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS.

CHAPLAINS IN THE ARMY.

Resolved, That the Board of Managers of the Missionary Society of this Conference be and are hereby instructed to appropriate all the funds remaining in hand, after paying the drafts of the past and present year for this Conference, to the support of Missionaries to the army, to the number of one for each Brigade composed wholly or principally of Georgia Troops, and that further collections be taken early in the year, by all the preachers for the same purpose.

FADED TEXT

Resolved, That the funds so collected, and those in hand, be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer of the Conference Missionary Society, to meet the drafts in favor of Missionaries or Chaplains appointed to the army under this regulation.

28

Resolved, That the Board of Managers recommend to the Bishop ten men to be set apart by the presiding Bishop as suitable persons to be appointed Missionaries to Georgia troops; and the Bishop is hereby requested to appoint the brethren thus recommended, to the brigades the Executive. Committee of the Board may designate.

Resolved, That an Executive Committee shall be appointed from the members of this body, who shall have the supervision of this Mission work till the next meeting of this. Conference; and shall have power to recommend the discontinuance of any Missionary, or recommend the appointment of others, as the necessities of the work may require; and that Bishop Pierce be requested to act with said Committee in all matters requiring the exercises of episcopal prerogative—said Committee to report its proceedings in full to the Board at its next meeting.

Resolved, That the Mission Committee fix the salaries of . the Missionaries appointed at this Conference; and that the Executive Committee fix the salaries of those appointed, if any, in the interval of Conference.

Recolved, That the Executive Committee be authorized to make an appropriation to those Chaplains in the Confederate service, belonging to this Conference, whose salaries, from the Government, do not support them.

Resolved, That the Treasurer shall be informed by the Mission Committee and Executive Committee of all salaries allowed, or appropriations made, and that the Missionaries or Chaplains may draw on him for the same, monthly in advance.

Resolved, That the Army Missionaries under the direction of this Conference be required to make full reports of their labors, monthly, to the Executive Committee of Army Missions.

Resolved, That nothing in these resolutions shall be so construed as to prevent the Executive Committee from making appropriations to members of other Conferences, serving Georgia troops as Missionaries and Chaplains.

The Executive Committee appointed under these resolusions are: E. H. Myers, A. T. Mann, W. H. Potter, J. O. A. Clarke and H. H. Parks.

The preachers were instructed to take up the Missionary collections in the month of May.

SOLDIERS' TRACT ASSOCIATION.

In view of the urgent wants of religious literature in the army, and the efforts of the Soldier's Tract Association of

the M. E. Church, South, to meet that felt want, therefore Resolved, That the Georgia Conference recognize it as one of the leading interests of the church, at this time, and urge all its members to co-operate with the Superintendent and Agents in carrying forward its heaven-approved designs.

THE LORD'S SUPPER.

In view of the great importance of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper, therefore

Resolved, That an hour be appointed during this Conference and at each succeeding Conference for the administration of this Sacrament and that should the Bishop not be able to superintend it himself, he be requested to appoint some one to do so.

SERMON TO UNDERGRADUATES.

Resolved, That Rev. Walter Knox be requested to deliver a sermon for the benefit of the undergraduates of the Conference, at our next session, on Monday night of said session.

FAST. DAYS.

Resolved, That the first Fridays in April and September be set apart as days of fasting and prayer; and that our brethren and friends be invited to attend, and let their servants attend public worship on the days so set apart.

A FUND FOR SUPERANUATED PREACHERS, ETC.

Whereas, Several brethren of Trinity Church, Savannah, send a proposition to this Conference, in which they each agree to be one of 100 or 150 persons to give \$100,000 to raise a permanent fund for our superanuated preachers, and the widows and orphans of preachers who are placed upon the Conference fund; and, whereas, our annual collections for that purpose are subject to fluctuations and contingencies, and, often in those years, when they are most needed, they fall far below the demand, and we have to settle with the claimants at a very heavy discount; and, whereas, there is now an abundance of money in circulation, and many of our brethren are desirous of placing this fund above contingency—Therefore

Resolved, That we entertain the proposition from the brethren of Savannah, and that we will try and obtain one or more persons in each of our charges to respond to it, and during the next year raise \$100,000 or \$150,000 to be placed in charge of the Board of the Preacher's Aid Society, for the purpose above specified.
