


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

ALMOST FLATTENED.

In a few hours the St. Mihiel salient will join the other German wedges on the West Front in the limbo of things defunct. The progress of American and French troops on both sides of it yesterday and last night was so rapid that the enemy was left no time to organize a counter movement or, in fact, to do anything else than begin the extrication of his troops and material from the trap of his own making. The five-mile advance of the Americans to Thiaucourt from the southern side of the salient yesterday was extended to eight miles during the night, and as an advance of over three miles was made on the west side the two jaws of the attacking forces are so close together that what enemy forces remain around St. Mihiel must be captured. The number of prisoners taken up to this morning is 12,000 and the material captured includes sixty guns. These figures should be substantially increased when the operation has come to an end.

This offensive was essentially an American affair, conducted mainly by the American First 'Army under the direct supervision of General Pershing, the French forces engaged being inconsiderable. It is thus the first important operation conducted by the American army in France as a distinct organization and the sharp, businessfike manner in which maximum results were achieved is a highly favorable augury for the future.

Berlin announces the "evacuation" of the salient "during the night." It says this plan has been "under consideration for some years and was completed without interference." It must strike the German people as a most unfortunate coincidence that the move which had been in contemplation for some years was not begun until after the Allies had advanced five miles and taken many thousand prisoners in the first few hours of their attack upon the German positions, and they should be legitimately curious to learn why the Great General Staff was so slow in making up its mind. Berlin also says the German forces are occupying new lines previously prepared. These are said to extend from Pagny, on the German border, northwestward to the heights of the Meuse.

Whether the Americans will continue their pressure against the enemy's new positions or will wait until the spring when they will be able to strike with full force will be revealed in a few days. It is evident, however, thatt Foch will keep striking at the enemy as long as the weather enables him to do so, and there are still a few sectors to be heard from, notably the Champagne, the Argonne, the region around Verdun and the line from the Vosges through Lorraine and Alsace.

THE KAISER AT ESSEN.

The Kaiser's speech at Essen apparently marks the commencement of a campaign of desperation designed to combat the menace of disintegration which must have grown ominously out of the German defeat on the West Front. It is an appeal to the German people to remain united behind the Hohenzollerns whatever may happen, and, if peace be impossible now, to continue to stake their all-on Prussian militarism. The fact that the speech was delivered at Essen, the headquarters of the Krupps, and the chief arsenal of the country, suggests that conditions there among the workers are such as to arouse serious apprehension in the minds of the Potsdam war gang.

As for the speech itself, it is plainly the out-


THEIR PEACE DRIVE.

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While the Kaiser is trying to keep the German people united behind the Hohenzollern dynasty by a sudden display of interest in the restless workmen of the industrial centres, preparations for the inevitable peace drive are proceeding apace. According to The Frankfurter Zeitung the "Reichstag majority" is about to bring the resolution of "peace without indemnities and without annexations' back from the scrap heap to which it was contemptuously flung after the commencement of the German drive against the British front last March. Von Hertling, of course, will resign, and we should hear much talk of the German intention to cancel the Treaty of Brest-Litovsk and the Roumanian treaty. We note, too, that Prussian electoral reform is also being pressed. Soon we will learn that Germany is ready to evacuate northern France and is willing to negotiate about Belgium and Alsace and Lorraine and the German colonies. There probably will-obe a request for an armistice. All the while the Kaiser will continue his desperate efforts to keep the people firmly behind the Hohenzollern dynasty whatever happens. The whole programme is futile. There will be no peace by compromise with Prus-sian militarism, and the Hohenzollerns and the Prussian war gang will be overthrown and punished. Mr. Lloyd George declared at Manchester yesterday that "not only must Prussian military power be beaten but Germany herself must know and the German people must know, that their rulers have outraged the law of humanity and that Prussian strength cannot protect them from punishment.

Proposals for boycotting imports from the Central Empires after the war must be modified according to developments. For instance, it may be necessary to eliminate a large part of the present Austria from the programme because there will be scarcely anything left of that country after the various subject races have won their independence. Incidentally, we have recognized the Czechs as Allies, and this means the recognition of Bohemia. Before the war is over we may find that the Czechs and Slovaks in Russia by their splendid resistance have done more for the Allies than even important victories elsewhere, for their activities probably will form the nucleus of the restoration of the East-


Advance Continues. Advance Continues. London, Sept. 13. - The American of-fensive in Lorraine was reported to-day to be continuing its brilliantly successful course. The apparent prospect was that not only would St. Mihiel salient be speedify wiped out, but that a heavy blow would be dealt the Germans in the loss of men and material. Already 12,600 prisoners and sixty guns have been taken, according to to-day's ad-vices. Prisoners to the number of 8,000 had been actually counted up to last night.

In the Loop.

In the Loop. The rapid progress of the American forces on both sides of the salient now affords hope that still greater numbers of Germans may be caught in the loop upon which General Pershing's troops are closing in. The Americans now appear to have made an advance of some eight miles on the southern side of the salient. This would bring them to tho import-ant town of Vigneulles, lying on the only raflway line in the loop, which town indeed is unofficially reported in American hands. South of Vigneulles the town of

American hands. South of Vigneulles the town of Heudicouri is declared to be in Ameri-can possession, while to the east, to-ward Thiaucourt, Pershing's troops have acquired the important Thiau-court Wood and the town of Beney.



"Instead of proceeding, thither by New Westminister and the old Cariboo trail he was persuaded by Victorians to try the newly advocated route by Bella Coola which was emphasized by the islanders as a better and shorter route. Starting for Bella Coola with a few companions, he took Lieut, Palmer's trail from that Indian settlement with the intention of reaching Fort Alex-andria. But in some manner they miss-ed the trail and wandered about in the woods for three months, but finally reached their objective. But when they arrived on Williams Creek the mining stasson had almost closed, so they invested their remain-ing money in provisions and started on their return to Victoria, where they put in the winter working on the wharves, loading and unloading vessels. Man-nion continued working in Victoria until 1864, when he obtained employ-ment with the Overland Thegraph Company who were at that time erect-ing the trans-Siberian telegraph. "In 1866, on the ecessation of that work through the successful laying of the Atlantic cable, Mannion started for the Atlantic cable, Mannion started for the Blend, then enjoying a great roputation as a mining camp, but there he had no tuck.
