CHINA NOW EXPECTED TO SIGN PEACE TREATY WITH RESERVATIONS

Wants Different Settlement for Kiao Chau; Holland Willing Treaty of 1839 Be Revised But Not Willing PUBLIC MEETING HELD IN Territorial Changes Be Made

Paris, May 23.—(Associated Press).—The Chinese delegation to the Peace Conference is understood to have reached a decision to sign the treaty of peace with reservations relative to Kiao Chau and Shantung. It is said that this will not affect the treaty as a whole and will preserve the rights of China.

Precedents are cited in which the United States Senate similarly attached reservations to treaties before ratifying them.

The Hague, May 23 .- Jonkheer Van Karnebeek, the Dutch Foreign Minister, in a statement on the Conference in Paris regarding the revision of the Treaty of 1839, says he declared Holland was ready to be a party to the revision, under a strict reservation that no attempt would be made to alter the territorial status quo, which was founded on historical rights and in keeping with the wishes of the

CONSTANTINOPLE

ESTHONIANS MOVE AGAINST PETROGRAD

Within Fifty Miles of City; May Be Mandatory; Wilson Finnish Troops Are Nearer

London, May 23.—Esthonian forces are rapidly approaching Petrograd from the west, according to an official statement issued at Esthonian army head-quarters and received here. The text of the statement follows:
"Esthonian troops are advancing swiftly on Petrograd. Besides the town of Yamburg, the railway stations at Weymarn and Moloskowizy, on the Narva-Petrograd line, have been captured and the town of Koporje and several villages near Kohganpia, on the Gulf of Finland, have been occupied. This brings the Esthonian troops within fifty miles of Petrograd."

A dispatch from London last night said;
"The Bolsheviki have not succeeded in checking the advance on Petrograd. Finnish forces, according to British reports to-day, are within forty-five miles of the city, and Esthonian troops are within fifty. The British force at Laga Bay is not important so far as concerns an attack on Petrograd, being merely a landing force from warships."

GOVERNMENT SCHEME

London, May 23.—Rt. Hon. Edward Samuel Montagu, Secretary for India, announced in the Commons yesterday that he hoped to introduce early in June a Government bill for the referm of the government of India. He said the keystone of this reform would be transference of power from the bureucracy to the people, which, he said, "may perhaps be gradual, but real at every stage."

Against Afghans.

London, May 23. The Viceroy of India reports that the Council of the Regency of Bahawaipur has placed the Imperial service troops and the whole of its resources at the disposal of the Government in view of the Afghan war. At a representative gathering of Moslem Sikhs and Hindus at Lahore, the Lieutenant-Governor of the Punjab received from all communities assurances of support of the Government in the present crisis.

Not Have Treaty Before It Is Signed

Paris, May 23.—Premier Clemenceau declined yesterday to comply with the demand of the Budget Committee of the Chamber of Deputies for the communication of the full text of the peace treaty. He said an agreement had been made between the French Government and all the other Allied and Associated Governments not to communicate the text of the treaty in advance of its signature to their respective Parliaments. Speaking at Westminster, Sir Robert said that the result of nearly four months' deliberations at the Peace Conference had beef greeted in some quarters with strong criticism and in others with doubt and hesitation, but for the most part with deep satisfaction. Some said the terms were too severe; others desired severity to be carried far beyond any point that could be described as reasonable. The problems to be solved had been of unprecedented difficulty and complexity and also of extraordinary range and variety. The Germans had fully anticipated that the alliance and good understandings between the Associated Powers would be completely shattered and that no conclusion acceptable to all could be reached. With a little less patience that might easily have been the outcome. The wonder was that there had been in the end an absolutely unanimous adoption of the treaty.

Some of Teuton Mission Went From Paris to Spa Yesterday for Conferences; Germans Left at Versailles Proceeding With Their Work

Versailles, May 23.—(Associated Press).—Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau and those of his colleagues on the German peace delegation who left Paris yesterday for Spa are expected to return Sunday. The remaining German delegates are proceeding with their work as usual.

Paris, May 23.—(Havas).—Newspapers here believe that the abce of Count von Brockdorff-Rantzau and the other members of the German delegation who left yesterday for Spa will be short. Some regard the departure of the Germans as a means of utilizing the delay in the peace negotiations granted by the Peace Conference Wednesday. SURRENDER OF SHIPS PENALTY **GERMANY MERITS, ALLIES SAY**

Paris, May 23.—In being called upon to transfer to the Allies under the terms of peace treaty 4,000,000 tons of her shipping, Germany is merely being called upon to pay the inevitable penalty for the destruction of ships by her submarines during the war. This is pointed out in the reply of the Allied Powers to the note on the economic effects of the treaty on Germany sent to the Allied Powers by the German peace delegation.

PRISONER QUESTION

Germans Are Told Prisoners Guilty of Crimes Must Be Punished

Paris, May 23.—The correspondence etween the Allied peace delegation and the German peace delegation re-

discipline cannot be repatriated unconditionally. "Certain alleviations" for prisoners of war and interned twilliams were asked for, and a request was made that clothing be provided.

The text of the reply of the Allied and Associated Powers, signed by M. Clemenceau, follows:

"Sir.—The representatives of the Allied and Associated Powers have given consideration to the repatriation of the German prisoners of war. In reply, they wish to state that they cannot agree that prisoners of war and civilian prisoners who have been sould be released. These crimes and lied soil, and have been dealt with by the legally constituted authorities without reference to the fact that the wrongdoer was a German, rather than an Allied citizen.

Treatment of Prisoners.

"In regard to the second question, the German peace delegation makes no specific suggestions as to the alleviation which would it propose propose. The Allied and Associated Powers are not aware of what alleviation it is possible to make, seeing that they have scrupulously endeavored to observe both the laws of war and the dictates of humanity in the treatment they have given to the prisoners of war, and that, as provided in the last section of Artice 128, it is easential that prisoners should remain subject to discipline and control pending their repatriation, in the interests of all concerned.

"The German peace delegation may rest assured that it is the intention of the Allied and Associated Government to treat their prisoners of war during the period between the signing of the peace and their repatriation with fully consideration of their feelings and needs.

"The restitution of personal property to prisoners of war constitutes a legal right which the Allied and Associated Powers have every intention of respecting.

As regards information about the missing, the Allied and Associated Powers have always endeavored to supply the German Government with all information in their possession on this subject, and they will certainly continue to do so after peace is signed.

"In regard to the third question, the representatives of the Allied and Associated Powers are ready to do everything possible to repatriate German prisoners of war and interned civilians properly fed and in good condition after the conclusion of peace.

"They regret, however that the present demands on them from the territories recently liberated from the German yoke, as well as their own nationals, will probably make it impossible for them to supply the prisoners of war with clothing, etc., for which the German delegation asks.

"Finally, in regard to the appointment of a commission to deal with the representatives of the Allied and Associated Powers will be glad to set up such commissions immediately upon the signing of peace. They regret, however, that they do not see their way to appoint them until they are notified of the intention of the plenipotentiaries of the German empire to sign peace.

Commons Approves Recommendation of Special Committee It Appointed

Ottawa, May 23.—"To be knocked on the head is a terrible death to die." Joyfully chanting doggerel, the House of Commons at midnight last night adopted the report of the special committee, alming to abolish titles.

The veto came after a long debate, somewhat dragging at the outset but winding up in exciting scenes. Early in the afternoon Mr. Nicholson, Unionist, East Algoma, had moved an amendment to refer the report back to the Committee with instructions to strike odi all the paragraphs excepting the reference to hereditary titles. There was considerable criticism during the debate that the report was for sweeping, and the final rejection of the amendment by 96 to 43 came somewhat as a surprise.

There were six ministers of the Government in the House, Three, Sir Thomas White, Hon, Martin Burrell and General Mewburn, voted for the amendment. Three, Messrs. Carvell, Crerar and Rowell, voted against it, On the Opposition side of the House, one member only voted for the amendment—W. F. Kay, of Mississquol.

If this were done the country would see clearly the attitude of Parliament on the matter. Although Mr. McKenzie expressed himself as being in favor of some vecognition for meritorious conduct, he strongly opposed the granting of hereditary titles. He said he would not like to see the door absolutely closed to the granting of recognition when it was merited.

The Leader of the Opposition expressed the view that Canada was apt to go a little too war along the lines of democracy, forgetting the magnificent stability given to this country by the fact that the Empire had a King. It would not be well, he said, to strike too close to the roots, lest that stability be disturbed. He was prepared to vote for the report although he did not think that much would be accomplished by its adoption.

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MORE PRESSURE NEEDED.

The announcement that Sir Thomas White will deliver his budget speech next week reminds us that the parliamentary session is drawing to a close, for no doubt business will be rushed after the debate on the Finance Minister's pronouncement. We are reminded also that no definite word has come from Oftawa regarding a new dry-dock for Esquimalt, and it is high time some decision was reached by the Government on the matter.

The Government evidently had no difficulty in coming to a decision respecting the five million dollar provision for harbor improvements at Vancouver-a provision which ought to satisfy the aspirations of our neighbors for this year at least. Why is it delaying so long over the determination of the dry-dock question? It cannot be for reasons of economy, for it is wasting enough money on futile enterprises to build a dry-dock in every seaport of Canada.

It is time the various public bodies of southern Vancouver Island again rallied behind our representatives at Ottawa in urging the early commence ment of work on the new dry-dock. Sir Robert Borden is returning to Ottawa, and it would be well to direct his attention to this matter as soon as possible after his arrival.

THEY WILL SIGN THE TREATY.

If some of the people of the Rhine cities be tween Duesseldorf and Mannheim are actually moving themselves and their belongings eastward, as a dispatch from the latter point appears to indicate, they are accepting a good deal of inconvenience needlessly. The cause given for this sudden migration is the belief that Germany will refuse to sfign the Peace Treaty, and that the Allies will exact immediate retribution by military pressure.

This is precisely what would happen in the event of Germany's Peace delegates betraying themselves into an erroneous view of Allied intentions. But von Rantzau knows perfectly well that the requisite signatures will be appended when he has exhausted Allied patience. He knows that he cannot succeed in his attempt to whittle down the terms of peace to any appreciable extent. What is more he must have retained sufficient sanity to visualize a great Allied army moving practically unhampered into the heart of Germany, only to result in final terms about which haggling would be

out of the question.

Completely lacking any sort of organized resistence, the machine polished up and propelled by the spirit of conquest in August, 1914, now merely a mass of tangled wreckage, failure to sign the Peace Treaty would be the last straw on Germany's back. But her delegates will not refuse; there exists yet an unquenchable pride which points there exists yet an unquenchable pride which points to the absence of the scars of war from the great German cities. Psychologically there is value in this for the average Teuton who dares to look into the future. On more than one occasion this lone factor has been trofted out as a salve for the Junker conscience, and something of the national spirit has clung to it even in the face of the "hate-

ful" treaty.

If only for this reason the Rhinelanders at least will still demand that Duesseldorf, Cologne, Cob-lence, Mayence and Mannheim remain intact, Frankfort and its historic associations, too, will have something to say. On the other hand an Al-lied army could move very quickly between Mayence and Mannheim; but it will not be necesary. The German delegates will sign the treaty.

WAR MARRIAGES AND LAW

Unless the Matrimonial Causes (Dominion Troops) Bill now before the British Parliament is subjected to considerable modification we can readily imagine that its provisions will work much inconvenience in the case of some Dominion soldiers who took unto themselves wives while quartered in the Old Country. Briefly, the bill in its original form was designed to give leave to the High Court in England and Ireland and the Court of Session in Scotland, to entertain matrimonial proceedings in respect of marriages contracted by Colonial soldiers in the United Kingdom-during the war, although such soldiers are not domiciled there. Proceedings may be instituted by either party to the marriage and the Act is to apply to Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and Newfound-land, as from such dates as may be fixed by the Legislatures of those Dominions.

Nobody will suggest that as a result of matrimonial alliances contracted in Britain during the war there is going to be a big crop of court cases. It may be that a few will require some re-adjust-ments; but as far as the Canadian soldier is con-cerned, it should be taken for granted that he is as good at courting as he is a fighter, and there is a popular song which makes fitting reference to the dual role. Scriously, however, we see no reason why the Dominion soldier, once he has returned to his native or adopted country with his bride, should be answerable to the courts of the United Kingdom rection with the settlement of domestic differences which may develop. There should at least be a time limit in which such drastic provisious may remain operative. During the time the soldier and his bride are residing in Britain the matter is, of course, entirely different.

THE TITLES REPORT.

The report of the special committee on titles, which was adopted by the House of Commons yesterday, recommends that an address be presented to the King, urging that no more titular distinctions of any kind be conferred upon people residing in Canada. If that recommendation be accepted in London, it will mean that not only will no more peerages, baroneteies and knighthoods be bestowed upon residents of Canada, but there will be an end to the C. M. G.'s, I. S. O.'s and other minor awards which figure prominently in the usual awards which figure prominently in the usual birthday honor list.

birthday honor list.

The adoption of the committee's report does not necessarily involve the elimination of the practice of bestowing titles upon Canadians residing in Canada. It is only an expression of the opinion or will of the majority to be translated to London in the form of an address. Furthermore, the Senate may have other views, and may desire the recommendations to be considerably modified. The majority of Senators may not be satisfied that membership in the Senate sufficiently crowns their social and political aspirations, and may decide that the report which the House of Commons has adopted is altogether too sweeping.

The indications are, however, that the practice is doomed as far as Canada is concerned, for it is

is doomed as far as Canada is concerned, for it is not likely the British Government, the real author of these distinctions rather than the King, will continue it in the face of the adverse expression of opinion in the House of Commons, especially since that vote reflects the view of the people at large. 29TH BATTALION BUYS ARRIVING TO-MORROW

Will Not Reach Vancouver Until Morning; Will Cross Over on Afternoon Boat

The Victoria men of the 29th Battalion who reach Vancouver to-morrow with the main body of "Tobin's Tigers" will cross the Gulf on the day boat, and will reach here about 3 o'clock. Captain Crease is in Vancouver looking after the Victoria party.

The Vancouver parade will be carried through with Colonel Montizambert as marshal and Captain Gallant as assistant. A civic reception will be tendered at the Arena, and an entertainment and dance have been arranged for the following Monday.

The 29th Battalion has had an enviable war record. One of its first experiences was during the Spring of 1916, when it took part in a raid at Kemmel, where Major L. A. Wilmot, of Victoria, at that time a lieutenant and subsequently a winner of the Military Cross, distinguished himself. At St. Eloi about April 6 of the same year, the battalion had a terrible experience, with desperate fighting which lasted a week. During that time all the front line trench was shot away and the line was held by outposts and from shell craters.

The 29th captured the trench shead of Courcelette which had been occupied by the Prussian Guards. From the Somme the unit went to Souchez, one of the worst sectors on the line because it was commanded by the pimple on Vimy, Ridge. The mud was so heavy that movement was very difficult. The battalion dfl good work in the taking of Vimy Ridge, going 4,000 yards from Neuville St. Vaast to the railway embankment at. Vimy station. Heavy losses were sustained in this chaggement. Service Prohibited.

Shortly before noon on that day a large number of worshippers went to the clurch and found posted up a notice stating that the Bishop had "prohibited" the service, and that "this order, of course, will be obeyed." It was added that the service of meditation according to the Book of Common Prayer would be held in the parish room adjoining. As only a couple of hundred could be accommodated there many had to go away.

Miss Royden, who wore a surplice, was accompanied on the platform by the Rector, the Rev. W. Hudson Shaw. She asked that the congreation should put out of their minds all question of controversy. The service was of an impressive character, and appropriate addresses on the words of Calvary were given by Miss Royden.

Memorial of Protest.

As an outcome a memorial is to be presented to the Bishop of London on behalf of a number of the laitymany of them communicants of the Church of England—expressing the grievous distress they are in by reason of the obstacles placed by the ecclesiastical authorities in the way of the ministry of women.

The signatories are, they say, convinced that "there is something seriously wrong, and needing speedy remedy, when an evangelist so plainly called of God to win souls for Him, as Miss Maude Royden, is seen to be harassed and impeded by those who, it seems to us simple folk, should be her chiefest upholders and strengthners in her great work. Some of us have tried to be patient, but after the scandal of Good Friday we feel that the time for slent acquiescence has passed."

GERMAN REFUSED TO FIGHT THE BRITISH

Yukon Veteran, Now Home Here, Meets Victoria* in Bonn

Sergt.-Major H. Butler, formerly of Dawson, Yukon Territory, tells an interesting story of a meeting which tookplace at Bonn with a German who formerly operated a ladies' tailoring establishment at 1122 Government Street, Victoria.

Sergt Major Butler, who is staying at the Dominion Hotel, says that one day a German came up and accosted him in English, inquiring if he knew many people in Canada. The strangest part of the affair was that the man asked if he knew Stophen Jones, in whose hostelry Sergt. Major Butler is now staying.

Mr. Quinker then went on to explain how the fates had landed him in Germany, how he had owned a ladies' tailoring establishment in Victoria which he closed up in 1914 for the purpose of paying a visit to Germany and other European countries. He landed in his native country just two months before the war broke out and as soon as the conflict began the Germans demanded that he should don a uniform and fight against the Eritish soldiers. This, however, Mr. Quinker refused to do and for his refusal he paid the penalty of his freedom, for the Germans immediately held him a prisoner of war until the armistice.

According—to the Act, failure in this respect by the mining company leaves the Taylor Company free to take over the mine and develop it as the firm may see fit. In the communication to the Premier, reference is made to the Dolly Varden appeal for a disallow-ance of the statute and the suggestion advanced that the Provincial Government take the necessary steps to frustrate any interference with Provincial rights.

SILVER MINING IS DUE FOR ACTIVITY

Rise in Price of White Metal Will Create Confidence

With all restrictions on exports of silver removed by both England and the United States. Western camps are looking for a grand revival of the white metal, says a Washington despatch, Costs of supplies, which in some phases have reached 150 per cent, and labor, which still holds against reductions in wares, will temporarily pretions in wages, will temporarily prevent a boom condition; but labor—between 65 and 70 per cent. of total cost—will no doubt meet the readjust—ment conditions and share in the promised prosperity. Thirty years ago silver sold at \$2 cents an ounce. Low costs made wilver mining a good investment, and finds of rich ore created bonances stampedes and fortunes, To-day \$2 cents would produce a profit for the big producers of "mixed" ores, who develop silver as a "side issue," but even \$1 is not attractive, and silver miners found increasing costs ate up the profits and destroyed the "iure" of the game. The Government is slow in returning the silver loaned to it during the war and inaction has been so marked during the past six months that even China's offer of \$1.06 last week falled to encourage big movement. "Wages will go back to a reasonable scale, based on costs and profits," said a leading silver producer at the American mining congress headquarters, "and the open market will bring silver to \$1.10 plus before long. And then you will see many of the old camps come to life and the big producers unwater their neglected mines, it will be a big day for the West when that happens."

Mexico, once a great silver-producing country, is so badiy disorganized as the result of the continuous internecine strife, that very little silver has been produced from her mines during the past four years, and she is now a negative quantity. Tonopah and Cobalt, the two big producing districts in North America, have passed the peak of their production, and the fact that there has been a general slowing down of copper and lead, with which silver has been an important by-product, has resulted in a well-night exhausted market and opens the way for a quick rise in the white metal when labor costs can be adjusted. The annual demand for silver totals \$50,000.000 ounces above the annual production figures, which indicates that the silver miner will have his inning when once the upward movement begins.

She liked that ancient feeling. She gloried that in her very age she was a mother to most of them and that the anxiety of the woman of her could never be misunderstood by these men who had seen so many women whose anxiety for them was dengerous.

"For nine months," he told her, "I have not seen a woman I knew to be good until I came do Paris—here at the Y Hut. And it's made all the difference in the world that I happened to come here my very first day of leave. It sort of made me ashamed to talk to you—and yet it was the feeling I knew was good for me—and I liked it. I'm going back now to my unit, and I believe I'll go back fitted to put in another nine months without fearing any woman I meet. I know my mother would like to meet you."

Another day a group of Canadians filled, a cluster of tables near the stage, where aft orchestra played through the lunch hour. The Hut Mother finished serving them and sat down to talk to them. Their leave was just up, and she was eager to have their impressions of Paris.

But they were not eager to discuss that phase of their leave. In these last few hours of their holiday they wanted rather to express their gratitude for what had made that holiday so pleasant. One of them put it into words like this: "I's been a fine leave—best we ever had, I-belleve. We're going back without a—without a blush—the lot of us. We haven't done a thing in Paris we're ashamed to talk to you about. It's mighty good meeting a Canadian woman here—you don't know how good. It's not the Canadian who goes wrong, but the chap who's forgotten Canada because he has so little about him to remind him of it, If we had a few of you 'mothers' up there near the front we'd have a bit of Canada right down here in France—and there's nothing better on earth."

The co-operative soldier settlement lan at Courtenay, Vancouver Island, hich means the clearing and cuitination of logged-off lands in the omotion valley, is the first actual denonstration of community settlement, he working out of the problem of oldier rehabilitation, so essential to ost-war readjustment. Under the irection of the Provincial Land ettlement Board, seventy-five veterans are busily engaged in founding omes "down on the farm," and this amber will be doubled this summer come 14,000 acres, purchased from the anadian Western Lumber Company, the low, price of five dollars per cre, have been set aside. Camps ave been erected—comfortable, saniary camps, where the H.C.O.L has seelved a rude jolt, Logging grades re being cleared of the old ties, welled and utilized as splendid ragon and automobile roads. Veteran in Charge.

Present plans are said to provide for the subdividing of the tract into farms averaging eighty acres in extent, aithough opinions ar expressed as to the advisability of limiting the farms to a smaller acreage, so fertile is the soil and so great the promise of intensive farming. Capt. R. P. Bishop, B.C.L.S. himself a veteran, is the engineer in charge of the survey. He is engaged on reconnaissance work and a preliminary examination, which will permit of a satisfactory division of the property so as to have all farms equally valuable, insofar as this is possible.

The Island Highway, a splendid thoroughfare, runs through the lands, while several well-kept "side roads" provide suitable routes to and through the bulk of the property. Other highways are being constructed. The abandoned grades of the logging company make first-class roads, the only work required being the removal of the old ties and a little levelling. The lands are situated within a few miles of the town of Courtenay, the terminus of the E. & N. Railway.
