# PRESIDENT WILSON **OFFERS TO ARBITRATE** IN BIG COAL STRIKE

Striking Coal Miners Informed That U. S. Government Is Prepared To Do Everything In Power To Facilitate Inquiry Into Controversy

Washington, Nov. 3.-Attorney-General Palmer to-day informed coal miners who protested against the strike injunction that the Government stood ready "to do everything in its power to facilitate an inquiry into the merits of the controversy but that in the meantime the law must be enforced and combinations to stop production can not be tolerated."

Mr. Palmer's statement, made in reply to a telegram from the local union at Glencoe, Ohio, to President Wilson, was taken to indicate that no attempt would be made by the Government to settle the wage controversy until the strike was called off.

C., Nov. 3.—Steaming slowly into the new Canadian National Railway's palatiat new million dollar station here at 8 o'clock on Saturday night, No. 1 from Winnipeg marked two great events in the history of the Canadian West. First and foremost, it marked the official inauguration of another daily transcontinental passenger service for Canada, and also it saw the official opening of a handsome station for the coast city, situated on reclaimed land. 

## CULTIVATE VACANT LOTS.

Just as soon as an official proclamation dearing the conclusion of peace has appeared in The British Columbia Gazette the Greater Food Production Act of 1918 will die a natural death. automatically will expire and unless some arrangement be entered into between the owner and the cultivator there will be no law to compel production from such land.

The Act, it will be recalled, conferred upon Municipal Councils the power to make available or food production purposes any unused arable nds lying within municipal boundaries. The lan worked exceptionally well from the comencement and Victoria ran out at the top of the list. Out of 3,433 vacant lots cultivated broughout the Province this city took the palm ith 1,091. Saanich set the pace for suburban ntres with 348.8 acres, or ten per cent. of the hole urban and suburban area cultivated in the Province.

During the year there were 3,233 acres brought under production; 26,747 tons repreated the volume by weight, while the commercial value reached \$869,240. To have transported the whole a freight train of 1.486 freight cars, and eleven and a quarter miles in length, would have been required.

It will be admitted that legislation of this character was a product of abnormal circumstances. A world food shortage demanded action not only for the replenishment of the national larder, but also as a means of stabilizing prices of the commodities of life. British Columbia did her part, although she is still a long way from the point where she can feed herself. Prices for garden produce are still high, and there is no immediate prospect of relief unless there is anything in the evidence accumulated by the Board f Commerce that will suggest a downward ndency.

In view of these facts and the knowledge that under the most favorable circumstances British Columbia will not be able to feed herself for some time to come, it would be a pity if the obvious enefits derived from the Greater Food Producion Act are to be merely temporary. Under the same conditions, however, there is no reason why she should not use her war-time legislation and endeavor to adjust the adverse balance.

While those energetic gardeners who made un idy lots into healthy gardens responded to the need from a sense of duty, they must have derived sufficient satisfaction from the discharge of their tasks to desire a continuance of the policy. It is to be hoped, therefore, that some movement will be got under way, before the Legislature meets early in the year, leading to a e-enactment of the Act which will expire when peace has been declared officially.

## CANADA'S WHEAT CROP.

The preliminary estimate of Canada's wheat crop by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics shows of 1918 the respective totals being coal mine operators and their employees. 204,749,800 and 189,075,350. In the Prairie Prowinces, the report states, the dry weather of June and July shortened the growing period and resulted in one of the earliest harvests on record. ## MERELY A SUGGESTION.

## THE FAMILY BUDGET.

According to the October number of The Labor Gazette, issued by the Dominion Department of Labor, the cost of the average Canadian family's weekly budget of staple foods in September showed a slight decline under the weekly budget cost in August, the figure being \$14.33 against \$14.45. The principal reductions recorded are in meats and potatoes. On the other hand dairy products and sugar were higher in September than in August, but the difference was not great enough to counteract the decline in meat prices in the Department's estimate.

The cost of the weekly budget of staple food with fuel, rent, laundry and lighting, however, shows only a cent to the good for September, the total being \$22.88 against \$22.89 for August, fuel and rent showing decided increases. It is altogether probable that if we took into consideration the comparative eosts of other necessaries such

the comparative costs of other necessaries such as clothing which are not enumerated in the Department's report, the favorable margin of September over August would disappear.

British Columbia headed the list in the family budget cost of staple foods, the total here being given as \$14.81. Ontario came next with \$14.45. Manitoba and Nova Scotia ran abreast with \$14.36, while Saskatchewan was fourth with \$14.21, and Alberta fifth with \$14.18. These estimates are based upon the average prices of sixty cities in Canada and are useful merely as indications of general conditions in respect of the items contained in them. The doctor declared that from his own experiences, gathered in the hospitals, "nature's bookkeeper" and from authoritative statistics, the evil of what was "pleasantly termed social disease", is at the bottom of the

Canadians Are Using More Narcotics Than Ever Before

ing with the tremendous increase in the importation of drugs into Canda. A copy of the minutes of the Council's deliberations which has just reached Dr. H. E. Young, Secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, and, automatically, a member of the Dominion Council, shows the quantity and value of imports in respect of cocaine, morphine optum (reude) and opjum (powdered) for the fiscal years 1812 to 1818, both inclusive.

For instance, in 1912 only thirty-five ounces of cocaine were imported. In 1914 the figure had jumped to 1.628 ounces; in 1916 to 5,531, and in 1319 12,333 ounces, with a value of \$143,123.

The amount of morphine imported in 1912 sigven as 460 ounces, in four years the figures increased to 15,485 ounces, in 1917 54,125 ounces were imported. In the case of morphine, however, there is a considerable reduction shown both in 1818 and 1919.

This year, for example, the amount is placed at 50,637 ounces with a value of \$173,195.

Crude opjum has steadily increased to volume of import since 1912, when the total did not exceed 5,017 pounds, until it reached this year 24,263 pounds with a value of \$334,555. In respect of the powdered product of the poppy there has been a decrease inc 1912 by approximately half the amount, 123 pounds being the figures for this year's entry.

Dr. Young stated to The Times in case of controlling these drugs the three following suggestions were proposed: (a) A Government purchase for distribution to legitimate dealers; for distribution to legitimate dealers; for entry, Of these three courses the Council unreservedly advised the first one. 



Doherty, Minister of Justice, and Major-General Mewburn, Minister of Militia, and declares that "upon the evidence before us we think that the conduct of, this raid (the raid on the Gueiph novitiate conducted by Captain Macaulay) was open to all the adverse criticism found in the memorandum of the Adjutant-General."

"We are further of the opinion," says the report, "that the Minister of Militia acted with entire propriety in the circumstances."
