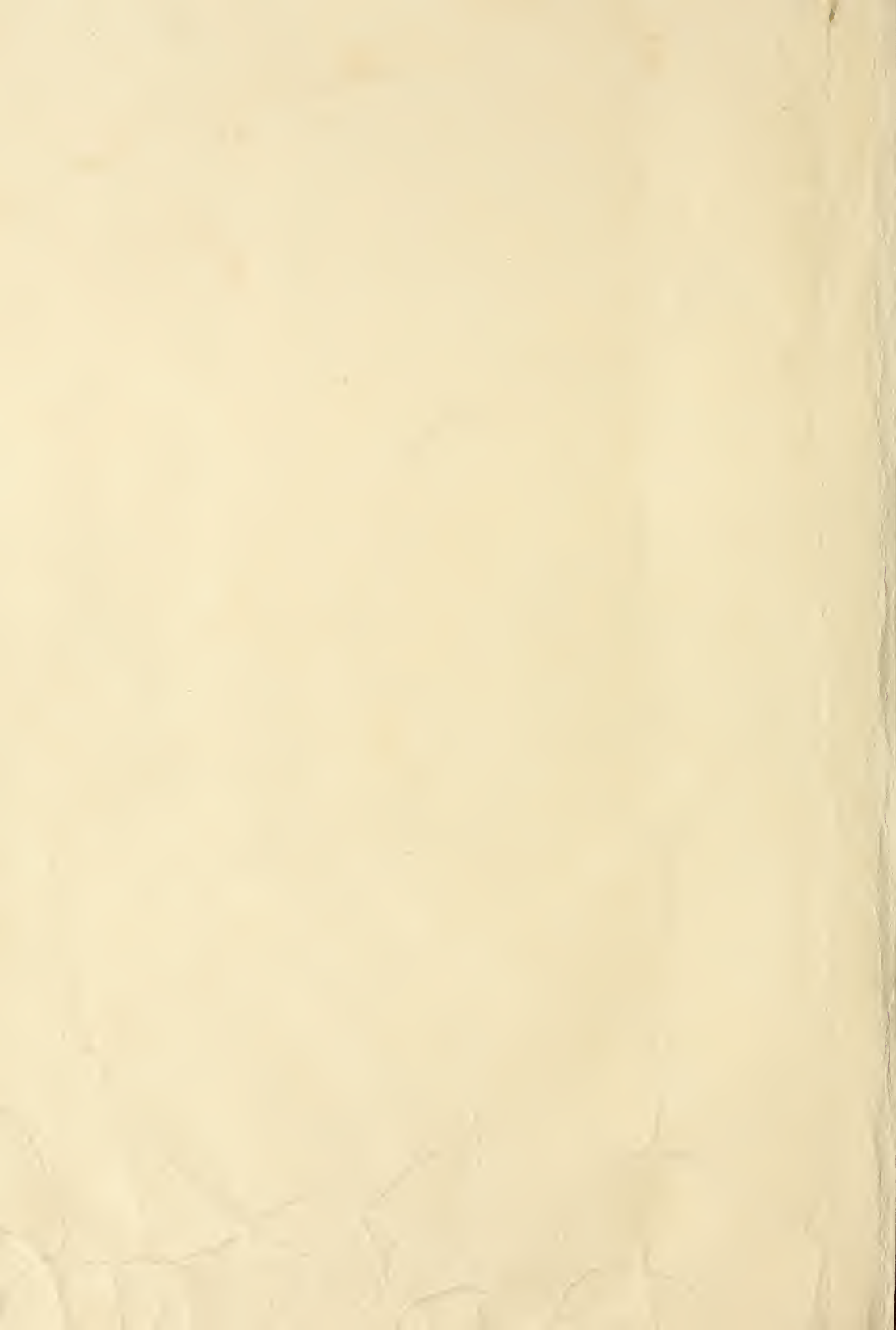

## TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

**Terms of Payment.**—Cash, or satisfactory security, before shipment of stock. All Orders to be sent by Express, "C. O. D." must be accompanied by ONE-HALF THE AMOUNT IN CASH.

**Orders and Conditions of Sale.**—Please order EARLY, with order legible and separate from body of the letter, with name of Postoffice, County, and State, and how you wish packages directed on the ORDER.

Long specified lists are subject to special prices. Needed specifications as to age, size, style, etc., state *on the order*, to save the trouble of referring to previous correspondence.

On all wholesale bills, the choice of varieties must be left to us. Particular varieties named in order furnished as far as practicable. Orders forbidding substitution we fill so far only as we can supply the sorts specified.

Prices named rule only when the number specified is taken, but when the order amounts to \$10 or more, 5 will be furnished at 10 rates; 50 at 100 rates; 500 at 1,000 rates.

Dealers who bill on our grounds, will please be particular in making out their aggregate list as no stock will be counted back from the heeling in grounds, unless we are at fault in putting it on.

**Packing.**—Prices do not include packing. Packing carefully done, in boxes, mostly, sometimes in bales or parcels, for which we charge moderately; for large boxes, 8 or 9 feet by 2½, three of which usually hold 1000 5 to 6 feet apple—\$2.50 each, and in proportion for larger or smaller boxes. **NO CHARGE FOR DELIVERING AT RAILROAD, EXPRESS, OR POSTOFFICE HERE.** On lots by mail, postage and packing extra. Trees per car load, if desired, can be packed in bulk at trifling expense.

For convenience of packing, Dealers and Agents will find our facilities are unexcelled, as we have a large stock of fresh moss, plenty of straw, long hay, etc., and an abundance of water from hydrants distributed through all parts of our Packing Grounds, so that we feel confident all our customers will realize and appreciate the advantages we offer.

**Shipping.**—We usually commence shipping in the Fall about October 1st.

We prefer parties ordering should indicate the route by which they wish stock sent. In the absence of particular directions, we forward to the best of our judgment; but in no case do we assume any responsibility after consignment to purchaser, unless for our own mistakes. When losses occur by detention en route, claims should be made on the carriers immediately.

Remit by Postal Orders, Bank Drafts on New York, St. Louis or Chicago, payable to order of PHOENIX NURSERY COMPANY, or currency by express prepaid.

*In writing us, always give your name and full address, including State, county, and postoffice, or if in city, your street and number. Repeat this every time you write us, no matter how often you may have occasion to address us.*

We cannot give prompt answers if we have to look over a multitude of letters to find your address.

Roses, Greenhouse, Bedding, and all choice and tender plants should be packed separately from trees, shrubs, and bulky articles, and sent by mail or express. Write orders for such plants upon separate sheets.

**SPECIAL INDUCEMENTS ON LARGE AND EARLY ORDERS.** Purchasers by the car load save not only on boxing, but freight agreed through by the car load is usually much less in proportion.

☞ We usually commence packing in the Fall about October 1st, but **WE PACK AND SHIP SEEDLINGS, APPLE, PEAR, PLUM, AND CHERRY STOCKS, CUTTINGS, CIONS, ROOT-GRAFTS, GREENHOUSE, AND A LARGE ASSORTMENT OF NURSERY STOCK, ALL WINTER.**

☞ **DEALERS AND LARGE BUYERS,** wishing to contract, should apply early, with list of items and quantity wanted. Conditions, rates, etc., can then be furnished.

☞ Those wishing an agency will please apply with references, stating terms on which they wish to handle stock.

## REDUCED FREIGHT RATES.

We beg to call your attention to the following **Change** in the **Classification** governing the rates on **Nursery Stock** by the railroad companies comprising the Eastern and Western Traffic Associations:

Nursery Stock, in car loads, 5th class rates.

Nursery Stock, boxed, less than car load lots, 3d class rates.

The minimum car load weight has also been changed from 24,000 to 20,000 pounds, which is a large gain to shippers, as it is rarely a car load of Nursery Stock will weigh more than 15,000 pounds.

This classification reduces the freight rates on Nursery Stock from **thirty to forty per cent.**

When practicable, we obtain through Freight and Express rates on all Shipments.

☞ One thousand Apple trees, packed for shipment, ordinarily weigh —1 year, 1 to 2 feet, about 400 lbs.; 2 years, 3 to 5 feet, 800 lbs.; 3 years, 4 to 6 feet, 1,400 lbs.; 4 years, 5 to 7 or 8 feet, 2,200 lbs.

To our customers at a distance we would also state that the postal rates on Trees and Plants have been reduced from 16 cents to 8 cents per pound, and can be shipped in any number of four-pound packages to one address. We ship a great many root-grafts, seedlings, cions, etc., in this way.

**Delaware Red Winter Apple.**

This variety is now fruiting in this section of the state, and it is with much pleasure that  
we again call attention to it, and trust it will become justly popular in all parts of the  
country; except, perhaps, in the extreme north, where it may not prove sufficiently hardy to  
withstand their severe winters. Mr. P. H. Storm, the veteran Horticulturist and Fruit  
Grower, says of it:

Having had about fifty years' experience in the cultivation of fruit, particularly apples,  
I have no hesitation in saying the DELAWARE WINTER heads the list. It is a vigorous  
grower as well as a prolific bearer. It also possesses excellent cooking qualities. Last, but  
not least, its keeping qualities are far beyond anything else of which I have any knowledge.

I have eaten them the last of August, ten months after they were gathered. No special  
care had been taken in their preservation. I have known them exposed to climatic influences  
through the spring and summer, and yet they were well preserved.

They are attractive in appearance, being highly colored, red all over, of large and  
uniform size. It is without doubt the coming winter apple, for both North and South, as it  
supplies a long-felt need to both nurserymen and consumers.

## Longworth's No. 1 Pear.

Every Tree Has Our Seal Attached.

This is a very hardy Seedling Pear of recent introduction; originated at Dubuque, Iowa, and was grown from seed, some forty years since, by the veteran Nurseryman and Horticulturist, Wm. Longworth. The tree is a strong, upright grower, entirely **Free From Blight** and an enormous bearer. Fruit, medium to large, nearly round; skin yellow, with warm blush on the sunny side; flesh rather coarse, juicy, sugary, good flavor. Ripens from first to middle of September.

Having thoroughly tested this variety, we have no hesitancy in recommending it to the public for general planting. This pear has withstood our severest winters without the slightest injury, while other varieties were frozen to the ground. Being free from blight and **EXTREMELY HARDY**, it is a very desirable variety, and should be planted largely. (See sizes and prices above.)


