Terms of Payment.—Cash, or satisfactory security, before shipment of stock. All Orders to be sent by Express, "C. O. D." must be accompanied by ONE-HALF THE AMOUNT IN CASH.

Orders and Conditions of Sale.—Please order EARLY, with order legible and separate from body of the letter, with name of Postoffice, County, and State, and how you wish packages directed on the ORDER.

Long specified lists are subject to special prices. Needed specifications as to age, size, style, etc., state on the order, to save the trouble of

referring to previous correspondence.

On all wholesale bills, the choice of varieties must be left to us. Particular varieties named in order furnished as far as practicable. Orders forbidding substitution we fill so far only as we can supply the sorts specified.

Prices named rule only when the number specified is taken, but when the order amounts to \$10 or more, 5 will be furnished at 10 rates; 50 at 100

rates; 500 at 1,000 rates.

Dealers who bill on our grounds, will please be particular in making out their aggregate list as no stock will be counted back from the heeling-

in grounds, unless we are at fault in putting it on.

Packing.—Prices do.not include packing. Packing carefully done, in boxes, mostly, sometimes in bales or parcels, for which we charge moderately; for large boxes, 8 or 9 feet by 21/2, three of which usually hold 1000 5 to 6 feet apple-\$2.50 each, and in proportion for larger or smaller boxes. NO CHARGE FOR DELIVERING AT RAILROAD, EXPRESS, OR POSTOFFICE HERE. On lots by mail, postage and packing extra. Trees per car load, if desired, can be packed in bulk at trifling expense.

For convenience of packing, Dealers and Agents will find our facilities are unexcelled, as we have a large stock of fresh moss, plenty of straw, long hay, etc., and an abundance of water from hydrants distributed through all parts of our Packing Grounds, so that we feel confident all our

customers will realize and appreciate the advantages we offer.

Shipping.-We usually commence shipping in the Fall about Octo-

ber 1st.

We prefer parties ordering should indicate the route by which they wish stock sent. Roses, Greenhouse, Bedding, and all choice and tender plants should be packed separately from trees, shrubs, and bulky articles, and sent by mail or express. Write orders for such plants upon separate sheets.

SPECIAL INDUCEMENTS ON LARGE AND EARLY ORDERS. Purchasers by the car load save not only on boxing, but freight agreed through by the car load is usually much less in proportion.

We usually commence packing in the Fall about October 1st, but WE PACK AND SHIP SEEDLINGS, APPLE, PEAR, PLUM, AND CHERRY STOCKS, CUTTINGS, CIONS, ROOT-GRAFTS, GREENHOUSE, AND A LARGE ASSORTMENT OF NURSERY STOCK, ALL WINTER.

REDUCED FREIGHT RATES.

We beg to call your attention to the following Change in the Classification governing the rates on Nursery Stock by the railroad companies comprising the Eastern and Western Traffic Associations:

Nursery Stock, in car loads, 5th class rates.

Nursery Stock, boxed, less than car load lots, 3d class rates.

The minimum car load weight has also been changed from 24,000 to 20,000 pounds, which is a large gain to shippers, as it is rarely a car load of Nursery Stock will weigh more than 15,000 pounds.

This classification reduces the freight rates on Nursery Stock from

thirty to forty per cent.

When practicable, we obtain through Freight and Express rates on all Shipments.

One thousand Apple trees, packed for shipment, ordinarily weigh -1 year, 1 to 2 feet, about 400 lbs.; 2 years, 3 to 5 feet, 800 lbs.; 3 years, 4 to 6 feet, 1,400 lbs.; 4 years, 5 to 7 or 8 feet, 2,200 lbs.

To our customers at a distance we would also state that the postal rates on Trees and Plants have been reduced from 16 cents to 8 cents per pound, and can be shipped in any number of four-pound packages to one address. We ship a great many root-grafts, seedlings, cions, etc., in this way.

LUCRETIA DEWBERRY.

The Lucretia Dewberry, the best of the blackberry family, is hardy and very productive, producing an abundance of fruit, remarkable not only for its large and uniform size (many of the berries measuring 1½ inches long by 1½ inches in diameter), but excellent quality as well, as it is rich, sweet, and luscious to the taste, and free from the hard core so common in some blackberries. The color is a glossy, shining black, and the berry ripens here the first week in July.
