## LIFE IN ATTACK IN MISSION AT YO CHOW

(Special Service to Glendale Evening News) HANKAU, China, June 16 .- Forces under General Chang, governor of Hunan Province, killed W. A. Reimert, an American missionary of the Dutch Reformed Church when they attacked the mission at Yo Chow, according to reliable reports to the American Consulate here. The mission was attacked and southern forces drove General Chang's contingent from Chang Sha, the capital of Hunan Province.

The message to the Consulate said the attack was in retaliation for the alleged sympathy of the missionary with the enemies of Chang.
