The way in which a lesson is taught to these heathen women is a revelation and those seeing and hearing it have a greater interest in that particular people and those who labor with them. The following ladies assisted Miss Bassett: The gate woman, represented by Mrs. Walter Stamps; the school matron, by Mrs. Barnes; the pupils by Mrs. Olin, Mrs. Rowe, Mrs. McKeever, Miss Barnes, Mrs. Hosking, Mrs. Bentley and Miss Hazel Walters, the latter singing one of the songs Miss Bassett teaches which was sung to a very Chinese-y tune.

Following Miss Bassett's demonstration Mrs. Worley from Swatow, South China, spoke of the work done among the Chinese girls and she also had brought some interesting pictures.

The room was most artistically decorated with Miss Bassett's own beautiful things from China and those who took part were privileged to wear some of the beautiful costumes which she had brought.

### TRAGIC DEATH

**WELL-KNOWN GLENDALE CHILD DIES FROM POISONED RAISINS PUT OUT FOR GOPHERS**

Funeral services held in Los Angeles Tuesday morning constituted the final rites in a tragedy which has considerably stirred residents in the southern part of Glendale. They were held over the body of a little boy but two years and eight months of age, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Vance Veith of Los Angeles. The Veiths are near relatives of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel T. Bresnahan, of 1516 South Brand boulevard, and with their baby have been frequent visitors in the Bresnahan home. The little boy, the joy of all who knew him, was poisoned by raisins doctored with strychnine or some other deadly drug which had been put out to kill gophers by the owner of the apartment in which the Veiths were living. She had said nothing about her campaign against the gophers and the parents were not on their guard. Residents on South Brand who knew the child are very much worked up over the matter and feel the case should be given publicity that persons making similar efforts against rodents may use precautions to protect against any possible danger to human life.

### H. C. L. IN HAVANA

**NORMAN WHYTOCK DESCRIBES CRIMPS IN CLOTHING COSTS IN CUBA**

According to representations made in an article in the Havana (Cuba) Post which was written by Norman Whytock, son of Dr. and Mrs. Whytock of this city, a drive is on in that country similar to the one in progress here to reduce the high cost of clothing. To quote from this Cuban report:

"The latest seen in the development of straw hats along the Prado was a delicate tomato-colored affair boasting a shimmering black and pink band that bore evidence of the same art displayed on camouflaged transports. But eccentric colored straw hats have lost their conspicuousness in the real issue of defeating the high cost of sky prices that lies behind the painter's imagination and the wearer of the tomato-colored straw was no more of an individual on the Prado than the hosts who swarmed about him in the now altogether common-place, shoe-polished Leghorns.

"Hat coloring establishments are springing into being with avidity and proprietors of these places who classify themselves as 'artistic decorators' are making wholesale experiments with the public's straw hats to determine the best coloring materials. Common black house paint, lamp black, jap-a-lac, shoe polish and hair dyes were most prevalently used yesterday.

"Women employed at the different Havana banks have already decided they will wear a cheap blue percale skirt and white blouse similar to the uniform used by girls in high schools. Bank officials have already stated they will advance the necessary amounts that their employes may secure the new economic garments which will, it is expected, be in vogue in the course of a few days. ### FREEDOM OF IRELAND

**PREDICTIONS THAT IT WILL BE A BIG ISSUE AT DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION**

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—Irish freedom is scheduled to be among the big issues of the Democratic national convention in San Francisco. How hard the fight will be depends largely on the Illinois delegation.

If Illinois names former Governor Dunne as its representative on the Resolutions Committee, the battle may become intense as Dunne is the leader of the Irish Freedom movement in this country.

Charles Boschenstein, national committeeman from Illinois, declared today: "We have been freeing Ireland in Illinois for thirty years and our delegation will fight here to give Ireland everything she wants."

If the battle reaches the convention floor it is predicted the galleries will play a big part as San Francisco has strong sentiment on the Irish question.

### AMERICAN MISSIONARY IS KILLED

**W. A. REIMERT OF DUTCH REFORMED CHURCH, LOSES LIFE IN ATTACK IN MISSION AT YO CHOW**

HANKAU, China, June 16.—Forces under General Chang, governor of Hunan Province, killed W. A. Reimert, an American missionary of the Dutch Reformed Church when they attacked the mission at Yo Chow, according to reliable reports to the American Consulate here. The mission was attacked and southern forces drove General Chang's contingent from Chang Sha, the capital of Hunan Province.

The message to the Consulate said the attack was in retaliation for the alleged sympathy of the missionary with the enemies of Chang.

### DEMOCRATIC LEADERS MENTION HOOVER

**TAMANY'S OPPOSITION TO WILSON AND BRYAN BRINGING FOOD ADMINISTRATOR TO FRONT**

FRENCH LICK, Ind., June 16.—Telegrams from Democrats in all parts of the country favoring a "wet" platform are pouring in on the conference of Tom Taggart, of Indiana, Senator Watson of Virginia, Governor Smith of New York and Charles Murphy, Tammany leader, which is in progress here. These messages endorse Edwards for the Democratic nomination.

It was learned today that the New York delegation probably will vote for Governor Smith on the first ballot. Watson thinks that Virginia will vote for Ambassador Davis. Taggart's first choice is Vice President Marshall. Should Marshall indicate that he did not want support, the Indiana delegation will probably split.

Herbert Hoover's name was frequently mentioned in the conference of leaders. Tammany opposes Wilson and Bryan and this attitude is bringing Hoover's name into prominence.

**SENATOR HARDING SQUELCHES STORY OF HIS HUMBLE ORIGIN TO BE USED FOR CAMPAIGN SPEECHES**

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Senator Harding, Republican presidential nominee, played golf today on President Wilson's favorite course. He squelched the story of his log cabin origin which orators were preparing for campaign speeches.

"I am sorry, but the truth is I was not born in a log cabin," he said.

### GOOD OMENS


