



TRUSTEES' REPORT.

The Trustees of the Peabody Institute herein present to the citizens of Peabody, their forty-second annual report; the reports submitted by the Lyceum and Library Committee give positive record of the great educational work that is being accomplished by the Institute, and we think it can be said that it has been one of the most successful years in its history.

The circulation of the library shows a gratifying increase over that of last year; an excellent course of lectures, which were well attended, was furnished by the Lyceum and Library Committee, at a moderate expense, and the new reading room has been patronized beyond our expectations. The literary activities of the reading public are now largely directed toward periodical literature, and the tendency is toward short roads to knowledge, the current reviews and magazines contain the very highest literary and scientific thought of the day, and must be consulted by persons desiring to be well informed upon the leading literary, historical and scientific topics of the times.

The present intention of the Trustees is to make the expenses of the Institute as small as is consistent with the actual needs of the Lyceum and Library Committee, and to husband its resources for the purpose of still further enlarging the reading room facilities, as we believe that it is a reasonable prediction to say that in the future, the equipment of a reading room will be more essential to the success of this and similar institutes than the library itself, and instead of the reading room being considered an annex to the library, the library will take the secondary place.

The invested funds of the Institute now amount to one hundred ninety thousand, eight hundred seventy-eight dollars and seventy-nine cents (\$190,878.79), and we congratulate our citizens on the fact that we have no securities in default of interest,

and the finance committee feel warranted in saying that the investments are of the highest class, and that the aim of the committee has always been to look to the safety of an investment rather than a high rate of interest. This principle has brought an assured income, but it is steadily decreasing on account of the maturing of securities which must be reinvested at lower rates of interest.

There has been considerable discussion both in our Board and among the citizens generally, regarding the position of the town in taxing our real estate. While perhaps not questioning the legality of such action, we do think that considering the great benefits that accrue to the town from the beneficence of Mr. Peabody, it is not unreasonable to ask that the Institute be relieved from paying a tax upon such benefits. Although the expense of the tax is not large when distributed among our tax-payers, it bears somewhat heavily upon the Institute. It its influence and work is to be kept at its present high standard, we think our citizens should be willing to make an appropriation for the benefit of the Institute equal to the amount they take from its income in taxes.

If our resources will permit, it is proposed to equip the Institate with electric lights from the town plant, as no doubt it would be a great improvement over the present method of lighting.

The Librarian, his assistants, and the janitor have as usual, merited the commendation of the Trustees, and we take pleasure in recognizing the fact that they have given diligent and appreciative services in their several capacities.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE PEABODY INSTITUTE:

The reports of the Librarians, of sub-committees, and of the Treasurer of the Lyceum and Library Committee are herewith respectfully submitted. They present very fully the details of the work of the Institute for the year ending Feb. 1, 1894; so fully, indeed, that but little remains to be said here.

The report in reference to the success attending the increased facilities of the Reading Room is especially gratifying; and the carrying out of the suggestions concerning conveniences for the disposal of hats, caps, and other outer garments, and the supplying of more recent books of reference would make this department of the Institute all that can at present be desired.

The patrons of the Sutton Library—and all our citizens should be its patrons—are to be congratulated upon the additions made of the World's Fair art and literature.

The Lecture Committee, with means somewhat limited, gave a most excellent course. In the report of that committee a reference is made to the free use of the Town Hall for an occasional popular lecture. When the desire to hear a lecture is so great as to insure an audience that will more than fill the Town Hall, it would seem that the town ought to grant its free use. Previous experience has proved that for all ordinary occasions the Institute is the better place, and a demand for the larger hall would not often be made.

The year just completed has been a successful one in all departments of the Institute, and the increasing number of people who patronize it is the best testimonial to its increasing usefulness in the community.

LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

TO THE LYCEUM AND LIBRARY COMMITTEE:

The Peabody Library Committee submit this report for the year ending Feb. 1, 1894.

Perhaps the most interesting feature of the Library during the past year has been the growth of the Reading Room. With the additional funds placed at the disposal of the Committee by the Trustees, great progress has been made in its development.

By a vote passed May 8, 1893, the room was opened the next day, May 9, from 2 to 9 P. M., and on the following Sunday, May 14, from 1 to 6 P. M. It has been open every day since at these hours, with the exception of legal holidays. About twenty new periodicals were at once added to the list and several more have lately been subscribed for, making a total at this date of 56, or, including the Official Gazette of the Patent Office, 57. These may be classified as follows: 19 Weeklies, 34 Monthlies, 1 Bimonthly and 3 Quarterlies. This list embraces the greater part of the field covered by periodical literature -scientific, technical, literary and artistic-and includes all the most popular and successful magazines of the day. Juveniles, represented by such publications as St. Nicholas and Harper's Young People which obtain a wide and doubtless, most enjoyable reading. For women, Harper's Bazaar, The Delineator and Good Housekeeping supply abundant food for thought relating to the Fashions and the Household.

It may be said at once and with hardly a qualification, that the Reading Room has been, during the past year, a complete success. The attendance has been most gratifying, not only in point of numbers but in the careful and orderly use that has been made of the privileges it offers, on the part of the public.

A record has been kept by the janitor, Mr. McKeen, of the number of people using the Reading Room since May 9—the day of opening under the extended time and with the larger list of magazines. The record for the week days was taken between the hours of 7 and 9 P. M. For Sundays it covers all the hours.

We have tabulated this record so as to show at a glance the attendance for each month.

An analysis of this table shows that the average attendance for each of the 38 Sundays included has been 11, increasing from 3 in May 1893, to 29 in January 1894.

For the week days the average attendance has been 14 between the hours of 7 and 9 P. M. The apparent decrease in the recorded attendance during the months of December 1893 and January 1894 has been more than compensated by the increase in the hours before 7 P. M.

The janitor who has had immediate charge of the Reading Room says that it would be entirely within bounds to estimate the number of persons using the room between the hours of 2 and 7 P. M., as equal to those of whom a record has been made between 7 and 9. Thus we say safely double the number for the week day attendance, making a total of 6,224 at a low estimate. To this must be added the Sunday attendance which increases it to 6,641. This is certainly a most gratifying result for the first 9 months under the greater attractions which the committee has been enabled to offer in the new Reading Room. It puts beyond a question a proposition to which attention has often been directed in these reports. The great development of periodical literature in these days calls for a corresponding effort upon the part of public libraries to enable their patrons to share

in its benefits. It encourages your committee in the belief that in the near future we may be able to do still more in the development of this growing department of library work. A word or two of suggestions may be added in this connection. Some provision should at once be made for the disposition of hats, caps and other outer garments in connection with the Reading Room. These articles are now placed upon the chairs and tables, much to the inconvenience of the public. The number of books of reference in the room accessible to readers, outside of periodicals, is about 180. Many of these are antiquated encyclopædias and other books of reference of rather an ancient date. We believe the number of volumes thus placed where they can be freely consulted might be largely increased, particularly in the line of technical and scientific subjects and of science applied to the arts and industries. The excellent and careful use our patrons have made of the few within their reach warrants the belief that they would be equally careful with a larger and more modern selection. Should this suggestion be acted upon it will necessitate the provision of more shelf room at the southerly end of the room, in place of the gloomy closets now of so little use.

The Librarian's Report sets forth with more than usual fullness the details of the work accomplished in the Library. By this it appears that the number of books borrowed has been 33,836, a return to what may be called the normal circulation after the broken year of 1892-93. The readers of fiction have increased to 75 per cent. of the total as compared with 68 per cent. in the previous year. The accessions to the Library have numbered 735. Of these, 641 have been obtained by purchase, 35 were gifts and 59 were bound volumes of magazines.

As already mentioned, the publication of the Weekly Official Gazette of the Patent Office, after a long suspension, has been resumed. It is now placed in the Reading Room where it is accessible to everyone. The additional shelf room constructed in the Library at the time when the alterations were made in 1892 has proved to be a great convenience in the distribution and classifying of the books. The administration of the library has been carefully attended to by Mr. Upton and his assistants. Mr.

McKeen, the janitor, deserves the thanks of the committee for the painstaking manner in which he has looked after the business of the Reading Room on week days, while Mr. Dalton has been equally faithful on Sundays, for which he was specially employed. It may be fairly said that the Library in all its departments has never been in a more flourishing condition and more fully met the constantly increasing demands made upon it. This should only incite us to further efforts to increase its usefulness.

"It is of the first importance that the public library of every town should preserve every published detail of its history and of the lives of its citizens. It should be the treasure house for the local historian. With this end in view, great care should be taken to secure and preserve:

1. All printed histories of the town and its locality, including all historical addresses, or sketches of its churches, associations

or societies of whatever nature.

Complete sets of the reports of the selectmen, school committees and all other town officers. Few towns have preserved a complete set of their own municipal reports.

3. Genealogies and family histories, which relate to those

who have been or who are citizens of the town.

4. Files of the newspapers published in the town, or of those published in the vicinity, containing a chronicle of the current events of the town.

5. All publications of natives or residents of the town, and of persons in any way identified with its history.
