THE new grist mill and tannery of Maclay & Butler, at McCartysville, Santa Clara, were destroyed by fire on Saturday night last, together with 200 cords of of bark, and a large quantity of hay and grain. The entire loss is estimated at \$30,000, upon which there is no insurance. Much of the grain belonged to amounting to the sum of \$110 48. farmers in the vicinity. The loss to the firm is about \$20,000.

The Independent (Stockton) whose editor is the State Printer elect, favors the move, and no doubt such high authority will not want for able backers, and should they persist in this ostracism, a very nice little family quarrel may spring out of it. BY OVERLAND TELEGRAPH. Bragg's army, the capture of a whole

The following dispatches are from the Sacramento Union:

Washington, Nov. 24.—The Star of this evening contains the following account of the brilliant preliminary movement of Gen. Thomas, at Chattanooga, Nov. 23: The reconnoiseance in force made by Thomas has been completed in a most brilliant and successful manner. The object of the movement was to ascerto the nominees of the regularly organiz-ed Union convention by an independent tain the strength of the enemy, and also to occupy and hold the knolls in front of our left, half way between our lines and missionary Ridge. The principal attack was made by General Hazen's brigade, supported on the left by General Willich's brigade and on the right by Sheridan's whole division. The entire field was visible from Fort Wood, where General Hazen's line of battle was formed in a field, being commanded by the heavy guns of the fort. Only one field battery was taken into action. This was planted on an elevated knoll, in the center of which Sheridan's line of battle was form. ed before the order to advance was given. The troops moved out of their positions at one o'clock P. M., and remained in line full three quarters of an hour in full view of the enemy. When everything was ready orders to advance were given. Generals Hazen and Willich pushed out simultaneously. The first shot was fired at two o'clock P. M. In five minutes the lines of General Hazen were hotly engaged, while the artillery of Fort Wood opened upon the rebel rifle pits and camps behind the line. The firing practice of our gunners was splendid, but it elicited loss. no reply, and it was soon evident that the rebels had no heavy artillery in that part of their intrenchments. Our troops, rapidly advancing, occupied the knolls upon which their works were constructed. A few moments later, Gen Willich. driving across the open field, carried the rifle pits in his front, the accupants of which fled. Gen. Sheridan, moving through a forest which stretched before him, drove in the rebels' advance, and halted according to orders. We have taken two hundred prisoners and gained positions of great importance. Should the rebels still attempt to hold Chattanooga valley, with the hights in our possession, a column moving to turn Missionary Ridge would be secure from a flank fire of artillery.

Washington, Nov. 25 .- Official dispatches frym Grant and Thomas, dated Chattanooga, November 24th, state: Yesterday, Palmer's Granger's and Howard's corps carried the first line of rifle pits be tween Chattanooga and the creek, and captured nine officers and about one hundred men. Our loss was about one hundred. To-day Hooker, with Granger's and Osterhaus's divisions and two brigades of the Fourth Corps, carried the north slope of Lookout Mountain. The enemy's loss was about six hundred. Ours was small. There has been continuous fighting from twelve M. until after night, but we repulsed the enemy's attempt to retake the position. Sherman crossed at ten this morning, at the mouth of the South Chickamauga, with three divisions of the Fifteenth Corps and one division of the Fourteenth Corps, and carried the northern extremity of Missionary Ridge. Our success so far is complete. The troops from Lookout Valley carried and now hold the eastern slope of the mountain and points higher up Hooker reports 2,000 prisoners.

Chattanooga, November 25 .- We are victorious. The enemy are routed. Our loss is small; that of the enemy heavy, particularly in prisoners. The enemy evacuated Lookout mountain during the night. Hooker occupied it this morning

Sherman attacked the enemy on Missionary Ridge this morning and gained at that portion of the line a complete victory. General Coarse's brigade led the assault. Coarse was repulsed with heavy loss, Coarse being wounded in the tigh. The second assault wos made at 1:30

P. M. Mathias', Loomis' and Ransom's brigades were engaged. They had nearly reached the summit of the hill, and tee enemy's works, when they were flenked, and an hour's fighting ensued. Mathias was wounded, and Colonel Putnam, of the Ninety-third Ohio, killed. The enemy being compelled to protect their right heavily, General Grant attacked their weakened center, and after an hour's hard fighting broke it and gained possession of the Ridge. The main force of the enemy was driven north toward Sherman, who ferced them to break up and flee ocross the Chickamauge. We have taken not less than five thousand prisoners-perhaps as many as ten thousand. Hooker will probably intercept the flying enemy in the vicicity of Rossville.

It is reported that we have taken a whole corps.

Prisoners say Bragg was on the Ridge just before it was taken.

Chattanooga, Nov 25-10 P. M. The captured artillery is reported to number forty pieces. Hooker captured five boxes of new muskets on Lookout Mcuntain. We are in entire possession of tee field and have full control over the railroad and river to Bridgeport.

Our losses will not amount to over 300 killed and 2,500 wounded in the three days operations. Our success has been most brilliant. The enemy is reported bivouacked beyond (south of) Mission

THE Union of yesterday says in its editorial comments on the above dispatches, that rejecting for the present, at least, the stories of the rout of of

corps and anticipations of intercepting the flying foe, it is still evident that Grant's forces have obtained brilliant, if not decisive, advantages, and at comparatively small cost of life The capture of the whole of Lookout Mountain by Hooker on the 24th settles the question of maintaining Chattanooga as a permanent base of operations, as both river and railroad communications were thus secured against rebel interruption. And when to this achievement is added the storming of Bragg's position on Missionary Ridge, compelling the enemy to retire toward Lafayette and the gaps of Pigeon Mountain, whence they moved against Rosecrans in September, leaving in the hands of Grant as many guns and prisoners as were taken from us at Chickamauga, we may safely congratulate ourselves upon a triumph of skill and valor full of promise of richer fruits. If the dispatches correctly depict the situation on the 25th, Grant at that date had the choice of following up the discomfited Bragg or of interposing a column between Longstreet and the main body of the enemy.

HOMICIDE IN SOLANO COUNTY .- The Suisun Herald of 18th November suys:

On Friday last, John Croesdale, waiving an examination, was held to bail by Justice Hubbard to answer at the next term of the Court of Sessions, to a charge of having committed an assault with a deadly weapon on D. A. Fitzpatrick, with intent to do bodily injury. On Saturday morning Croesdale was killed by Fitzpatrick, and the latter is now in jail, awaiting the action of the Grand Jury at the ensuing term of court. We learn that the two men had conflicting claims to a tract of land, and quarreled upon the subject; that early on Saturday morning Croesdale left his house and proceeded on horseback nearly in the direction of Fitzpatrick, who, with his son-alad 12 years of age—was out driving cattle. Croesdale being blind in the right eye, had acquired the habit of carrying his gun on his left side, and the piece was, as asual, resting on the saddle pommel. Fitzpatrick and son approached him so near that the boy testified to seing Croesdale's gun cocked and his finger on the trigger, and that he was raising it to shoot, when Fitz-patrick fired—the charge from his gun striking Croesdale's at the lock, shivering the stock, and driving pieces of iron and wood, with a gold buckle Croesdale wore, into his abdomen, about four inches below the navel, thus inflicting a frightful wound, from which he soon after died An inquest was held by acting Coroner Hubbard at the scene of the occurrence, some five or six miles from town, the facts of the case elicited, and Fitzpatrick, who had previously been arrested, was lodged in jail as above stated.

STATE HOUSE. - Secretary Tuttle is seeing that the State House shall be in neat and comfortable order for the Legislature when it shall assemble on the first Monday of next month. The new sidewalk is finished, and the iron fence is being made glossy with a coating of black paint. Internally, the two "legislative chambers" are feeling the influence of warm suds, and are having a harrowing time under the bristles of a number of whitewash brushes. The Senate Chamber at the session of '63 will be graced with new curtains and upholstery, a compli-ment which the Assembly Chamber deserved and received last session or the session before. Strong and heavy scafthe building are now under consideration. Recent alterations made to the State Treasurer's office have added much to the comfort and convenience of that department. The State House will be in perfect order, inside and out, by the morning of Monday, 7th of December .-

DECLINE OF NAPA.—The Napa Re-porter says that in 1860 it was difficult for a new comer to find either a vacant house for his family, or store or office in which to do business. This is far from being the case at the present time. We yesterday counted no less than sixty-three vacant buildings and offices on five of our principal streets, and there are many more in the outskirts of the town. There are probably about eighty altogether, among them one steam mill, one brewery and one large hotel. The causes of this state of things are manifold War, Washoe Reese River, Cariboo, Salmon, John Day's River, and the low price of grain, have all played their part in depleting our population.


