made by Thomas has been completed in a most brilliant and successful manner. The object of the movement was to ascer to occupy and hold the knolls in front of our left, half way between our lines and missionary Ridge. The principal attack
was made by General Hazen's brizade Wap made by General Hazen's brigade,
supported on the loft by General Willich' supported on the the righe by Sheridan's
brigade and on the whole division. The eutiro field was vis
ible from Fort Wood, ible from Fort Wood, where Genera
Hazen's line of battle was formed in Hazen s line of battle was formed in a
field, being commanded by the heavy guns of the fort. Only one field battery was taken into action. This was planted
on an elevated knoll, in on an elevated knoll, in the center of
