IV. A Letter from Mr James Young, F. R. S. to Dr Edward Tyfon, F. R. . . concerning a Ball, extracted from aperfon, whobad affered. by. t 3 o yerr, in which ubas a Pluinh-ftone,

Plymouth, Sept. 6.1702.
Wortby Sir,

WHen I had laft the Honour to be at a mecting of the Royal Society in Grefbam College, there happencd in a difcourfe concerning Plumbs,which gave me occafion to tell you of one detained in the Guts of a Woman above 30 years, caufing frange and grievous accidents, till I drew it out ex Ano.

According to ny promife then, I fend you now a more particular acconnt of that wonderful cafe and cure than I could give by meer memory.

Her name is Sarab Smayn, of a thin habit and middle ftature, who when but fix years ode, was firf afticted with a violent pain, together with a large hard fweling on the left fide of her telly, which lafted twclue hours, and then went off without ufe of any Remedy or fenfible evacuation; and at the end of three months returned, lafted and went off as before.

Several years it obferved that Period, and then changed its intermifilion from 3 months to 3 weeks, and fo continned till fhe was 35 years old, in which time fhe married, and bore one Child, the pain of which fhe averr'd to be much lefs than what thefe Paroxifms gave her.

During her pregnancy, lier Pains nor Intermiffion; hati no alteration, andin her whole Life the found no ble detubd her but Milk and Salt Meats.

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Abour mombs berore for was cured, the Pandate res nour encreated to the bignefo of a mans two tifts, bee endeavourcel by many Remedics to get cafe, but in vain, till the torment and watching had to weakned her, that he could notrife otit of her Bed nor lic down in it.

In this deplerable condition the was advifed b; a Woman to take a dofe of Powderd Jalop, what the guanty was I could not learn, but it operated violonty, and lud. denly drove the pain from her fude down to the Achs, where it refembled a Tenefmus, viz. a conftant and violcat inclination to ftoois without being able to force off any thing, and afier the bad been thus crucified four dajs her Urine alto ftopr, and two days after that the charitable Neighbouss, who had all along given her their beft affiftance craved mine.

I perccived by their report of the matter, that fomething obfructed the paflage of her Excrements, and foca found it fo by a probe; I then ancinted the paffage with Populkeum, and taking hold of the fubfrance with a pair of large Forceps, made to extract Stones from the Bladder afier Lithotomy, I drew it forth.

Abundance of Wind and Excrements g: fht our, and continued to flow till her Guts were eniptic: of all the matter, which had been fo long retained; after which I ordered her an Anodine Clyfter, and a compofins draught, and ever fince (being feveral years) the continteri well.

The thing extracted was round, fonewhat oblong, having on it fome fuch impretions, as mens Fingers make on Wax or Plaifter. It then weyhed io Drachms, now tcarce an Ounce, it was 5 inches in recumference, and aitho it felt and otherwife appeared a Stonc, it fwam on Water, which made me fee the infide of it iy cutting it in two with a Knife, externally it was black, ard fmooth as if varnifht, and no thicker, which made me before I had confidered the whele, think it the expanded skin of the Plumb indurated; next to this thin blacknefs was a cruft of matter like Brick, the thick-

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nefs of an half Crown, within that appeared a fubtance refembliug Pafte-board or chewed Paper, and within that lay a Prune or withered Plumb, with the Stone and Kernel cut alunder by my Knife.
I have fent it for the R. Society to examin, who I prefume will think that all thore wonderful accidents, which fo long molefted this poor Womın, were occafined by this Plumb fwallowed fo many years before; but how thofe different accretions were made to it in fuch a place as the In teftines? how it ceafed to torment her at fo many and fuch different In crvais? where it lurked between thofe Fits, and how the Pain and Tumour obferved fuch exact Periods for fo many years; at firf every three months, and afterward every 3 weeks? are queftions I am not abic to refolve.
Many Authors tell us of various Stones cje:ted by Stool, wifell. rur-

 diced People. I have feen two fach bigger than any I have $\mathrm{B}_{\text {nutrit well }}^{\text {A.t. }}$. read of, one fo big as a Pullets Egg, which came from a ${ }^{\text {ob }}$. 55 . Lady in the operation of a frong Cholagogue taken for a Jaundice that had refifted many other Remedies, the other as big as a large Nutmeg, driven out by the fame means from an aged Man languifhing in the fame diftemper, and both of them for many days after thofe Stones came off, evacuated great quantities of Choler by Stool, and were freed of the Difeafe.

That thofe two Stones were generated in the Folliculus Fellis or duitus Choledochus, no man will doubt who confiders the confequence, and knows that in rolour, tafte, weigl $t$ and fhape, they refembled fuch as are found in thof parts upon diffection of Jaundiced Bodies. I once faw near an handful of them taken out of the Gall Bladder of the Portugal Ambaffador that dyed in London, 1679. and we are lately told by Baglivius, that the famous Malpighius's was full of them, they ufually are of fubcitrin colour, refemble bright Myrrh, and feem an aggregate of fmall Stones, which
perhaps are made fingly in the veficula, and Coalefce in the Ductus.

The confequence of their coming off fhews, that they eat fed the jaundice in thofe two perfons I have mentioned, by obitructing the Charncls thro which the Bile paffeth from the common receptacle into the duodenum. It may porhaps focm imponible to fome men, that fabfances of that magnitude could parsthorough a Meatus fo fmall as the common Duthus is. But it hath been no wonder to me this twenty years, fince I differed a Phyfician of this place, who dred of the Jaundice, and found the Dutius Communis large encugh to admit my greateft Finger, as 3 Phyficians and one Surgcon befides mytelf, faw to cur great furprize.

Thofe Stones which are generated in the Gutts are of another fort, and eatily diftinguithable from thofe I ain Writing of. Eeckers fpcaking of fome Stones voided by Stool, faid - - Calculos illos in Inteftinis genitos efe, quia Colore, pondere © figure a choledobis lapillis diftincti Arbitratus fum. Thofe generated in the Gall caufe the Jaundice, thofe in the Guts, beget Cbolical,Splanchnical, Hypocondriacal Pains, and Cometimes Nephritical, all which vanifh when they are ejected.

It's not for want of old Authorities that I have here quoted few but Moderns; I know Galen, Crato, Sennertus, M. Donatus, Z. Lufitanus, Fernelius, G. Horftius, Scbenckius, and many more before this Age, who have told the world of Stones generated in, and ejected from the Inteltines of difeafed people, but none that I know with fuch furprizing circumftances as this fent you by

V. Some inftances of other perfons who were burt by formo lowing Plumb-ftones, by the Publifher. P He difcourfementioned in the beginning ot the foregoinu Letter was concerning Plumb-ftones which had beer. fwallowed by fome perfons, and had been the caufe at theis Sicknels or Death.

The firft was a Man in Lancafbire, who being for many years ill of the Colic, and receiving relief from no Med'cine, defired he might be diffected after his Death, to fee what might be the caufe of his Difeafe. This was accordingly done, and they took out of one of his Guts a large Ball 6 inches about, of an ounce and half weight made up of a fpungy matter which fwims in Water, and viewed by a Microfcope, appeare to be made up of very fmall, tranfparent Hairs or Fibres, wrot ght together, after the manner of the Tophus Bovinus taken out of the maws of Oxen. In the middle or center of it was a common Prune or Plumb-ftone, which had been fwallowed, and fticking fomewhere in the Guts, had gathered that fubftance about it which refembled the finall Hairs on the skins of feveral Creatures or Fibers of Plants we eat. Dr Charles Leigh in his Natural Hiftory of Lancaflire, Cerc. in his firt Table has figured this Fig. 4. He Nnnnnna
