TROUBLES IN GERMANY. Franckfort-on-the-Maine, Sept. 16 .- "Events in Germany have within the last few weeks assumed a very serious character. Hitherto the disturbances have arisen only from distinct grievances, each State acting only for itself, without any general combination. But now a general and well-founded cause of complaint appears to have united forty of the States in one movement, without which success would have been impossible. The greater part of Germany has risen against the system pursued by the directors of the Customs, which has deprived the country of that freedom of trade so necessary for the extension of an au lience with the Emperor of Russia: thereits resources. The following intelligence will be truly surprising, and which you will not find in nowledge the new French government. the Austrian observer, or any other of the German papers. BOLIVAR REAPPOINTED PRESI-DENT OF COLOMBIA.

By the Enterprize, we received Bogota papers o 7th inst.; by which it appears, that General Bolivar has again been called upon to act as President of Colombia: a m a ure which we so no time ago preflicted, and which, we have no doubt, the General himself fully expected.

The following is a translation of a Proclamation, issued by the Liberator, on the 18th instant:---

Proclamation of Bolivar to his Countrymen. The public calimities which have reduced Co ombia to a state of anarchy, force me to quit the repose of retirement, to fulfil my duties as a Citizen, and a Soldier. Many of you call me, that I may assist in freeing the Republic, from the alarming dissolution which threatens it .-Penetrated with the sincerest gratitude, I promise to fulf I, to the utmost of my abilities, the confidence with which you have honored me. I offer you all my zeal, to co-operate with you in the re-union of the family. Colombia, at present sunk in the horrors of civil war, it belongs to you to save her, and to re-unite yourselves to the Government, which our common danger has placed at your head. Forget, I entreat you, even your passions, for without this heroic sacrifice, Colombia will be no more! You will, otherwise, leave the inglorious reflection, that a people who did not respect themselves sacrificed their glory -their liberty-and their existence.-But no! Colombians, you are obedient to the voice of your Religion, and your Country: You respect the Magistrates and will obey the Laws; and by these means, you will save Colombia, BOLIVAR.


