Fisher: I want to introduce a group of leaders who want you to be re-elected.

[More words of introduction.]


<u>President:</u> I am very grateful you came by to hear me say a few words, but I'd like mostly to respond to your questions.

You are interested in the economy. One year ago, we were in trouble. Now you know as well as I do that we are headed in the right direction. To best coordinate the economy, it is important to work with the leaders of the other industrial countries. That is why I am going to Puerto Rico this weekend to meet with them, in a continuation of Rambouillet. [More on the economy.]

In the Middle East, the situation in Lebanon is a mess. The line-up there is so complex as to be unbelievable. [Describes] Israel has been magnificent in its restraint. We are working for a resolution of this difficult situation. My relationship with Prime Minister Rabin and the Israeli Government is excellent and I think he would agree.

I have recommended 40% of all the aid given to Israel since its independence. I am not apologizing -- I am proud of it.

There are some problems. Jewish immigration from the Soviet Union was 35,000 in 1974; it's 1,000 a month now. We must get it back up there.

In Defense, I was known in Congress as the biggest hawk. [Made the standard pitch about turning around the trend of the defense budgets.] I strongly believe the U.S. must keep its leadership role in the world through our strength and our diplomacy.

Question: What would be our reaction to attempts to expel Israel from the UN?

President: We would vigorously oppose it, mobilizing our friends and all other resources.

Question: In the event of a resolution of Lebanon, how would you see the position of the PLO?

<u>President:</u> One can only speculate, but I would see Syria as the dominant element. I see the PLO as having only a minimum role in Lebanon. I think Syria will play a big role and they are working with the Christians. I think the PLO will play a minimum role.

Question: Syria is an age-old enemy of Israel. In that case, how do you see them in that role on the flank of Israel?

President: The greatest deterrent is the military capability of Israel. You will notice the Syrians didn't do all that well against the PLO. What better solution in Lebanon would you propose than the one I outlined? Partition would still have the Arabs on the Israeli border and the Christian state separated. Or, the Libyans and Iraqis with the radicals could triumph. How would that be?

Question: I'd like to ask about the Transition Quarter. If you could resolve it at the \$375 million level, it would certainly help us with our constituents.

President: [Described the FY 76 budget submission. Then pointed out the TQ problem.] For FY 77 -- the 15 month period -- the low agency recommendation was \$500. We had all the intelligence

estimates. I told the high figure of \$1 billion. At that time, I was told it included the necessary figure for the TQ. [Described the FY 77 figures.] The Senate added \$550 million for the Transition Quarter. That was contrary to all the experts in the Administration, many of whom thought I was too high. We were also facing a fiscal crisis in the government. I decided I had to cut the budget growth from 11% to 5.5%. So I need to make cuts, and at the same time I was increasing the Defense budget. It was a difficult situation.

[Described the meetings with Congress.] I will continue to work with the Hill and I think we can resolve it to take care of the real needs. It will probably be more than the \$200, but it may be not so high as the Congress wishes.

Question: Could you tell us how committed the United States is to Israel? How important is it and why, beyond the fact it is a democracy and a friend?

<u>President:</u> I think one of the best indications of my commitment is the word of two Israeli Ambassadors -- Rabin and Dinitz. They both know it and will testify to it.

[Described his admiration of the American Jewish people and the development of Israel and the accomplishments of both.

Question: Could you expand on what our specific interests are in a security sense or other sense in Israel?

<u>President:</u> Israel is in a vital spot in the Middle East. It is an area of great riches and strategic importance and Israel is the key to peace in the region.

Question: Soviet Jewry. We need to find a way to rectify this terrible situation.

<u>President:</u> [Described the situation.] We would like to rectify the situation and we are willing to work with the Congress if we can get the votes. It would be realistically hard to do in this unusual legislative year.

Question: Boycott: There are two measures in the Congress now which hit companies that are abiding by the boycott.

<u>President:</u> I don't want to comment on specific legislation, but we are working on the boycott. We haven't gotten far enough, but we are doing things.

Question: On the domestic side, quotas are really hurting. What is your attitude?

President: The quotas are anathema to me. [Long description.]

Question: The thing most Americans want is a new unity of America under its principles. You as a person stand for that, but I don't think that is coming through in your campaign organization.
