LASTING YEAR Croses Panama Canal Two Times; Journeys in South America and England

"Glendale is the most wonderful home spot I have ever found in all my travels," is the enthusiastic greeting E. Dukinfield Jones of 118 Fairview avenue had for his friends when he arrived HARRY BROLASKI IS last Friday from a trip he began October 31, 1921. Mr. Jones was

accompanied on part of the trip by his son, Frank D. Jones and wife, who returned to Glendale in May.

Interesting features of Mr. Jones' trip was crossing through the Panama canal to the Atlantic ocean and back again; an exten-sive trip into South America, where he secured a collection of 2000 butterflies and moths, many of them rare specimens for the National museum in Washington; and a visit to his native country, England.

Feature of Trip

Mr. Jones and his son and daughter-in-law left California on October 31 and en route to Panama they stopped for a visit at They had intended San Salvador. stopping at Mazatlan, Mexico, but because of the prevalence of yellow fever they were unable to carry out this plan.

"The real feature of the trip," says Mr. Jones, "was our trip through the canal, which is a wonderful engineering feat. It is marvelous to see a big boat of 15,000 tons lifted thirty feet in six minutes. It took us just fifty minutes to get from the Atlantic ocean to Gatun Lake.'

Only Boilers Remain From Panama Mr. Jones con-

tinued on south stopping at Valparaiso and also at Arica and Tacna, over which Chili and Peru are disputing. In telling of Arica Mr. Jones says that one of the interesting sights he saw there were the boilers of an old American ship that was driven very far inland by a storm in 1863 and the boilers are all that remain of the wreck
