Gentlemen:-I perceive that you seriously intend now to act upon an amelioration claimed by public interests, but I am sorry your ideas on that subject should so materially differ from mine; for I never intended to deprive Mr Pilio of the direction and inspection of the works of the corporation, as would essult from the ordinance you have adopted in your last meeting, and which would puttus in a very awkward predicament. I don' wish to over-rate the services and the usefulness of that wish to devertice the services and the userimers of the collect; but gentlemen, in an administration so complicated as that of our city, where, in spite of the most watchful inspections, so many chances of prevaidation are left, could you well dispense with the services of an action of the collection of the collectio officer who has eighteen years' experience, and whose pro aty has never been questioned! The numerous abuses which have lately continue that administration, abuses which have lately e spt into that administration, ought to guard you against taking such a step yet by the 20th section of your ordinance, you deprive that afficer of a con idence thus far so well deserved, twinvest another with it, and with the right of approving the accounts of works done for the corporation. I do not know, gentlemen, what could have induced you to adopt such a resolution; but I know of motives powerful enough to have dictated quite a contrary one. Your ordinance is so enacted that it is evident the city surveyor shall be under the contated quite a contrary one.
