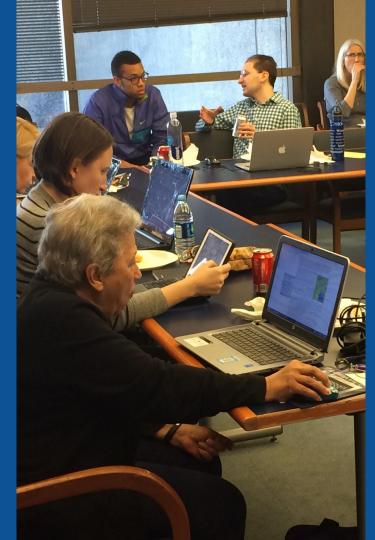

#### Wikis

- A website where anyone can edit any page at any time
- Meant to be "quick"
- Remembers all versions (nothing ever destroyed)
- Hyperlinks between pages

#### Wikipedia Five Pillars

- Wikipedia is an encyclopedia
- Wikipedia is written from a neutral point of view
- Wikipedia is free content that anyone can use, edit, and distribute
- Wikipedia's editors should treat each other with respect and civility
- Wikipedia has no firm rules

#### Wikipedia Policies

- Neutral Point of View written so all sides can agree
- Notability significant independent sources -> importance
- Verifiability Using reliable sources to reference information
- No original research point to existing scholarship
- Assume good faith start with congenial spirit
- Conflicts of interest disclose and abide by terms of service

#### Wikipedians-in-Residence

- Wikipedians who dedicate time to working in-house at an organization
  - Paid staff or volunteers
  - Work to lay the foundation for a lasting partnership between the Wikipedia community and an organization

#### **WIR Core Characteristics**

A Wikipedian-in-Residence:

- Serves as a liaison between the organization and the Wikimedia community to promote a mutually beneficial cooperation.
- Promotes understanding of Wikimedia among staff through workshops/events.

#### **WIR Core Characteristics**

- Works with organizational staff to digitize, compile, and organize resources to be shared with the Wikipedia community.
- Facilitates the improvement of content by the Wikipedia community, rather than directly editing articles as a core goal.

#### **WIR Core Characteristics**

- Coordinates events, such as Scan-a-Thons, Edit-a-Thons, or Backstage Passes, that bring Wikipedians on-site to work with staff on content creation and improvement.
- Formally coordinated by the institution for closer relationship with staff



Anna Mae Violet McCabe Hays (February 16, 1920 – January 7, 2018) was an American military officer who served as the 13th chief of the U.S. Army Nurse Corps. She was the first woman in the U.S. Armed Forces to be promoted to a General Officer rank; in 1970, she was promoted to the rank of Brigadier General. [2] Hays paved the way for equal treatment of women, countering occupational sexism, and made a number of recommendations, which were accepted into military policy.



[1] During Hays' childhood the family moved several times in the western New York and eastern Pennsylvania areas, but settled in Allentown, Lehigh County, Pennsylvania, in 1932. [1][5] She had an elder brother, Daniel Joseph II and a younger sister, Catherine Evangeline. [4] Hays attended Allentown High School, now William Allen High School, graduating with honours in 1938. [6][7] Hays had a love of music, playing the piano, the organ and the French horn, and wanted to go to Juilliard School to study music but due to a lack of funds for tuition she decided to pursue nursing instead. [1]

#### Career

Following her high school studies, Hays enrolled in 1939<sup>[4]</sup> at the Allentown General Hospital School of Nursing, from which she graduated in 1941, having obtained a diploma in nursing. In May 1942, she joined the Army Nurse Corps, and was sent to India in January 1943, serving with the 20th Field Hospital,<sup>[8]</sup> to the town of Ledo in Assam.<sup>[9][10][11]</sup> The hospital was stationed at the entrance to Ledo Road, which cut through the jungles into Burma.<sup>[12]</sup> The living and working conditions were somewhat primitive; the buildings were made of bamboo, and dysentery, leeches and snakes were common, particularly during monsoon seasons. Just over two years later, in April 1945, she was promoted to the rank of first lieutenant.<sup>[7]</sup>

After serving two and a half years in India, Hays was on leave in the United States when the war ended. [5] Remaining with the Corps, she served as

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




In August 1950,<sup>[8]</sup> she was deployed to Inchon to serve in the Korean War.<sup>[11]</sup> She was posted to the 4th Field Hospital<sup>[9]</sup> for seven months, and later described the conditions in the hospital there as worse than those in India in World War II, due to the cold temperatures in the operating room and a lack of supplies.<sup>[1][11]</sup> In the following fourteen months, she and 31 other nurses treated more than 25,000 patients.<sup>[8]</sup> As she had done in India, Hays spent some of her off-duty time in Korea assisting chaplains by playing a field pump organ for church services, some of which were held on the front lines.<sup>[6]</sup> Following her tour in Korea, Hays was transferred to Tokyo Army Hospital in April 1951<sup>[17]</sup> and served a year there.<sup>[6]</sup> A year later, she was transferred to Fort Indiantown Gap, Pennsylvania as an obstetric and pediatric director.<sup>[18]</sup> After graduating from the Nursing Service Administration Course at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, she was appointed head nurse at the Walter Reed Hospital in Washington D.C.<sup>[17]</sup> emergency room, where she served as the head nurse of the Radioisotope Clinic.<sup>[17][8]</sup> During this time

## Create A New Article: Three Ways to Get Started

- 1. Start a draft using the Article Wizard (Enter Wikipedia: Article Wizard into search bar)
  - Follow prompts
  - Publish in draft form

## Create A New Article: Three Ways to Get Started

- Enter Draft:Article title into WP search bar
  - Click the red link to start the article





## **Draft** cont.

- Start writing and publish as you go
  - When happy with your draft, select 'More' then 'Move'
- Select 'Article' in menu under New Title, remove 'Draft:' and move page

- Enter Article title into WP search bar
  - Click the red link to start the article





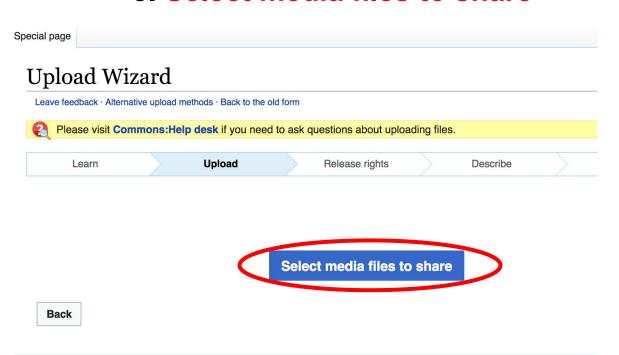
