Mixed Hyacinths are the smaller bulbs selected from named sorts, enabling us to offer them at much lower prices than the named ones. They are well adapted for open ground culture, and as we have then in separate colors, the purchaser can plant them out in such designs as fancy may dictate. They are also largely used for honse culture, but we would always advise that named sorts be used when fine bloons are desired for pot or water culture.

Single bulbs mailed free at price named. To the price per dozen, or one hundred if desired, by mail, add at the rate of 10 c . per dozen for postage.

## Selected Named Hyacinths.

The named Hyacinths are by far superior to the unnamed for growing in pots or grlasses indoors, and should always be used for that purpose. The single varieties are most generally used, as they produce finer spikes of flowers than the double ones. The individual flowers of the double are large and beautiful, but there are fewer of them borne on the spike.

## Grape Hyacinths.

This perfect little gem. also called "Blue Lily of the Valley," shows beautiful flowering spikes about six inches high and resembling a bunch of grapes. To obtain the best results the Narcissus should be left undisturbed for at least three years, when they should be taken rip, divided and reset.

## LILIES.

No class of piants capable of being cultivated out of doors possess so many charms as the Lilies. Their stately habit, rich and varied colured tlowers. often delicionsly fragrant and of easy culture, render them so distinct from other harly plants that no collection, however select, should be without a few of the choicest sorts. They commence fiowering in May. and with various species maintain a continuous and unbroken siccession of bloom until autumn.

## Orders for Lilies cant not be filled before November, excepting for the Candidum and Harrisii, which are ready in August.

Culture out of Doors. - Their culture is simple, and with a little care, failure is impossible. The bulbs should be planted in autumn. if possible, fron: the first of November, or as long as the soil can be worked. If in spring. as soon as the frost is out of the ground, until the first of May-the earlier the better. In the South where frost does mot prevent, plant from November to March.

Select a well-drained spot, dig the soil deep. and make it fine. enriching it abundantly with very rotten cow manure, and adding a liberal mixture of sand. Set the bulbs from 3 to 5 inches deep. according to size. During the winter it is advisable to cover the surface of the bed with a thin layer of manure, which will not only afford a slight protection to the bulbs, but will materially enrich the soil. In spring the manure can be removed or dug in between the rows.

Care should be taken that they have proper drainage, no water being allowed to stand around the roots. Once firmly established they should not be disturbed oftener than once in five years.

Culture in Pots for House Decorations.-Plant in pots from + to 7 inches, according to size of bulb, from September to December. Use good sandy soil mixed with well-rotted manure, and allow plenty of drainage; water and set away in a dark place until the pots are well filled with roots and the tops have started an inch or more; keep the earth moist, and bring to the light as wanted to force irfto bloom.
L. Auratum-(The Golden Rayed Lily.) The flowers are pure white, thickly studded with crimson spots. while through the center of each petal runs a golden band. ## CHOIGE FLONLER SEEDS FOR FALL PLANTING IN GARDEN, PARLOR, CONSERVATORY \& GREENHOUSE.

Many hardy sorts of Flower Seeds succeed best if sown in the open border during August, September and October. Some hardy annuals, when sown late in the fall so that the seeds will remain dormant in the ground during winter, will start earlier in the spring, thrive better, and flower sooner than if sown in spring. . Such hardy sorts as Columbine, Foxglove, Hollyhock, Pinks, Sweet William, etc., that do not bloom until the second season, mnless started very early in spring, are particularly recommended for fall planting. They should be sown early enough to make pretty good plants before very cold weather-say not later than first of October. Then they will flower freely the next summer.

Besides the hardy sorts suited to fall sowing in the garden, our list below embraces many tender varieties, which should now be sown in pots or shallow wooden boxes of finely sifted soil for winter and spring blooming in the house. With a little care, and at trifling expense for bulbs and seeds, a world of pleasure and comfort can be had from a few flowers in the house in winter.
