HOMESTEAD AFB, Fla. (Apr 10) -- The Air Force has completed an investigation of the UFO sighting by the students and teachers of Crestview Elementary School of 2201 NW 187th St., at 9:45, April 7th.

The majority of the witnesses described the object as white with a red light that flashed once. The object was sighted along a line north-northwest of the school. Witnesses differed as to the size and distance of the object.

The investigation revealed that a Coast Guard helicopter, white with red trim, was maneuvering in the area of North Perry Airport between 9:31AM and 11:07AM the morning of the report. The helicopter was practicing landings and takeoffs in a East-West direction between ground level and 1000 feet altitude.

North Perry Airport is almost due North of the elementary school and approximately three miles in distance.

Little girls screamed, boys pointed and three teachers followed anxious fingers to the object above the tree-tops.

Friday was the day of the "flying saucer" happening at Crestview Elementary. It was the biggest thing since runway balls lumbered onto school grounds last September.

It was "twilight zone," "The Invaders" and "Outer Limits" all crammed into one, five minute show. Only this time, said 12-year-old freckleface Andy Cohen, "I was part of it."

Andy has witnesses -- several hundred in fact. Whatever it is people see when an unidentified flying object appears, they saw in Northwest Duke Field.

The object -- some of the kids had two of them -- teachers said there was more than one -- appeared in a tree-dotted field behind the school a little after 10 a.m.

The next 10 minutes were chaotic.

"There was a lot of excitement," said Mrs. Virginia Martin, a sixth grade teacher. "I didn't pay any attention to what the children were pointing. In at first, I was trying to get them lined up."

Most of the 300 girls and boys at morning recess were running toward the school grounds screaming and pointing.

"They said 'You've got to look, you've got to look' and I did," Mrs. Martin said.

What Mrs. Martin, fourth grade teacher Mrs. Anatol and sixth grade instructor Miss Marian Waters spotted appeared to be hovering behind a pine tree in an open field.

When the Kids Screamed

"It was oval shaped. It seemed to hover. I realized that an airplane doesn't do that. I thought, my gosh, this couldn't be happening."

The school is located at 2201 NW 187th St. The tents are directly north.

"I seemed to move it toward the school, then went straight back and circled below a pine tree. It came up again and went westward."

"I don't know what it was. Don't say I said it was a flying saucer or an unidentified flying object, because I just don't know," Jeff Martin exclaimed.

Teacher Bob Apfel exhibited an qualms. "It was a flying saucer," he said, matter-of-factly.

When asked what he saw, Apfel returned the question:

"Which day?"

The fourth grade teacher said Friday was the second day he and his class saw the same, metallic-like object north of the school grounds.

"One hovered northeast of the school about 12:47 p.m. Thursday, Apfel said. "We were going back into the school when the children pointed it out to me."

The teachers spent Friday afternoon talking to three Air Force investigators who drove to the school from MacDill Air Force Base.

The children screamed, newsmen, cameras and

adults — almost anyone who would listen — and chattered in unison, drowning out each other's voices.

"They looked like big cigars they were red, silver they were flying apart the girls got scared I saw them, hey, I saw them" the voices ran together.

Andy Cohen, of 1951 NW 188th Ter., became the closest to a consensus spokesman for the kids. He sat in a car and told what he saw. His mother, Mrs. Abraham Cohen, listened a curious half-smile cringing her face.

"They looked like long cigars. They were flying apart one at a time. Some of the girls got scared when they saw them. Jeff Moore's sister ran into the class and grabbed Jeff.

"Oh, Jeff, she screamed," Andy said.

Later in the day, it was discovered that the UFO sightings were not limited to the children and teachers at Crestview.

Mrs. Mary Troesser, who is staying at the home of a daughter at 800 NW 190th St., called the Herald to inquire about any "strange sightings."

Mrs. Troesser had been out in the yard and happened to glance in the direction of Crestview Elementary School.

AF Says 'It' Was Copter; People Who Saw It Say No

White sightings upon the wooded plain to the southwest where the children yelled out, "See trees where 'it' landed," the field over which "it" flew, the Air Force was working on an answer.

And Monday the answer came. The "sighting" of an unidentified flying object Friday evening by 200 Crestview elementary School children and three teachers was, in fact, a helicopter, possibly taken off and landed.

The Air Force conclusion came after a team of three men spent Friday afternoon at the site and interviewed "witnesses."

"The majority of the witnesses described the object as white with a red light that 'seemed to glow,'" the report said. The investigation revealed that a Coast Guard helicopter, white with red trim, was maneuvering in the area of North Dade Airport between 6:30 p.m. and 11:07.

North Dade Airport is some three miles north of the Crestview school which is located at 2201 NW 187th St.

"The Air Force concluded that given the time of day with the angle of the sun and the unfamiliar maneuvering of the red and white helicopter, the witness could not identify it as such."

Bob Apfel is one of those "witnesses." Friday he saw what the children pointed to and said: "It was a helicopter."

Monday he heard the Air Force report. "I'm in complete disagreement with the Air Force," he said, but would not discuss his differences.

Since the "sighting" his phone has rung frequently, his life has been interrupted, magazines have approached him about his "story."

"I have no reason to tell anything but the truth," he said. "I'm not sorry for anything I said."

Among the children, Andy Cohen of 1901 NW 188th Ter. spoke of the incident Friday, the day he saw the "long 'coat'" in the field behind his school.

Andy says the Air Force is mistaken. If his "coats" were helicopters, he said, "you would have been able to see something that looked like pieces of wings."

Of the four objects the boy says he saw, only one was white.

Reports of UFO's have brought members of the National Investigations Committee on Aerial Phenomena to the Crestview neighborhood.

John Granlich, a NICAP member and senior at the University of Miami from Arlington, Va., said: "I'm convinced it wasn't a helicopter and I doubt any conventional object would excite the kids this much."

Of the half-dozen witnesses Granlich has interviewed, none has reported the object producing any sound.

"How do they account for

it being completely silent?" he asks.

But the Air Force is resolute. Lt. Bob Clegg of the Homestead AFB public information office said "eyes can play tricks."

"You can attribute something to the excitement of the moment."

Return Of The UFO

The things were back in the sky Saturday.

John Wolf had been out with his sons at the Boy Scout Campsite. He had to come back to his home for water and ice and other supplies. When he drove up his daughter, Judy, said: "They're back."

So Wolf got his binoculars and he went over to the field just past the Crestview School. He was thinking: "Sure, I believe there could possibly be something around. I probably won't see it though. It always happens to other people."

There were 20 or 40 people standing around on the dead-end road and in the field. They were looking north and some had binoculars. John Wolf looked and there they were.

It looked like three or four things were out there. They were hovering just behind a line of trees.

They seemed to change shape from oval to cigar-shape and back again. They seemed to change size. They were globes of white with red flashes in them. On top there seemed to be a dome — like the glass dome on a coffee pot.

At the same time he was seeing them, Wolf could see the airplanes from North Perry Airport flying around. He could see the detail in the planes but there was not much detail in the things.

Sometimes they would also up in pairs. These two would peel off to the right and one would peel to the left. Both would rise a little more and then sit there.

Every time a plane approached one of them something astounding happened, Wolf said. There would be no motion but the thing suddenly just was not there any-

more. When the plane left, the thing always reappeared — almost in the same spot.

Toward afternoon the things slowed their activity and then they went away.

Wolf had watched them for about an hour and a half. So did a few dozen other people — mostly adults. They all saw the same things.

John Wolf is 42. He is a father four times. He works in a printing office. He is in his second year of prosecution at Duke Junior College. He spent eight years in the Navy. Some of that time he was a plane captain on a flight service line.

He says: "I'm too old to be flippy about these things. I'd like to know what they were — even if someone proves I was having hallucinations."

The Air Force said that what everybody saw in the sky Friday was a Coast Guard helicopter on a training mission.

But that's not what John Wolf and the other watchers saw Saturday.

Because on Saturday, Wolf said, there were no Coast Guard helicopters up in that part of the sky.

Not one.

They were like pogo sticks, jumping all over the sky.

John Wolf watched them for nearly an hour. Then he went home and got his wife. She nearly fainted herself hysterical when he told her what he had seen. She went back to the field with him and looked for herself.

She stopped laughing. The things were still there.

It was a bright, clear day.

There were just a few clouds. The things were below the clouds. Sometimes they flew below the clouds and sometimes they flew off to the sides — out of the range of the clouds.

When they got away from the clouds, John Wolf knew that he was not seeing a reflection from the clouds. He knew that he was not seeing airplanes. He knew that he was not seeing helicopters.

But he didn't know what he was seeing.

There was no sound. There was no exhaust smoke. The things looked like they were a couple of miles away.

There were no houses between Wolf and the things. There were a few small rises and open space. Then the line of trees behind which were the things. Wolf looked with his bare eyes and then he verified what he was seeing with his binoculars.

1. The following information is forwarded in accordance with AFR 80-17, para 7 a.

a. A report of UFO sightings was forwarded to Homestead AFB at 0945, 7 Apr 1967, from Crestview Elementary School located at 2201 NW 187th Street, Miami. Copies of the statements received from the three teachers are attached. (See Exhibits A, B, and C)

b. Further investigation revealed that a Coast Guard helicopter was operating in the general area around North Perry Airport, just three miles to the north of the school. Instructions were to hover no higher than 1000 feet and to perform "touch and goes" from the end of the runway. The helicopters were white with red and black markings. The maneuvers began at 0931 just fourteen minutes before the sightings were first made.

c. As the colorings corresponded fairly well to those reported, the maneuvers were in conformance to those on the attached descriptions, the range and direction of sighting are the same as that of the North Perry Airport, and the sun was in such a position as to possibly have caused reflected light to strike observers located south of any airborne objects, the Homestead AFB Office of Information, upon query demand, issued a news release on 10 April 1967. See Exhibit D.

d. Exhibits F, G and H give an accurate portrayal of both the radio stations' and newspapers' unfavorable reactions to the news release. All questions brought up subsequent to the release have not been officially answered as no further statements have been solicited from Homestead AFB by any news media. The atmosphere surrounding this incident is somewhat emotional. In fact, it appears that often times individuals reactions have been significantly influenced by their wanting to see some unidentifiable phenomena. Mass reaction to any stress situation often deviates from the norm which would be displayed had each person been isolated from those around him. Finally, once an individual unequivocally states that he saw a "Flying Saucer", normal psychological responses would tend to compel him to maintain his story against all attempts at

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at logical solutions which vary from his account. The answers to such questions as "why was there no sound" and "why couldn't we see the rotors" seem obvious. Upwind observers might not even hear a jet engine run up at distances above one mile and props rotating at high RPM are hard to distinguish at close range, let alone at two to four miles.

e. In the wake of this first report, 15 separate unrelated reports were called in within a one week period. Many of these are still under investigation. Information on these will be forwarded, where applicable, as soon after investigations are completed as possible.


