RIDE 'EM COWBOY

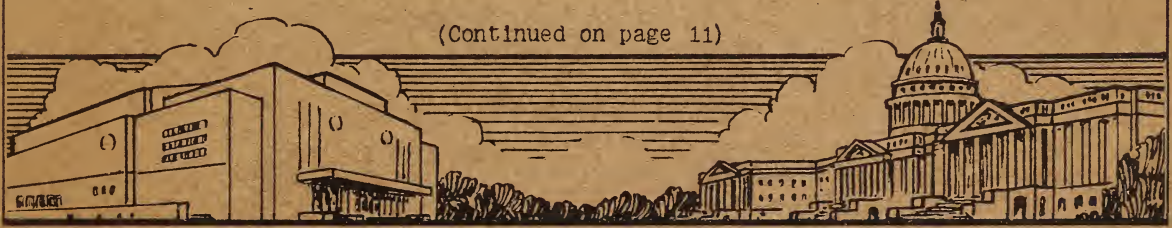

Pfc. Pearl V. Spicknall, (A-1001371, Hq. FEAF, APO 925, c/o Postmaster, San Francisco, Calif.) Somewhere in the Philippines. Your very attractive and welcome package was the first to arrive, in excellent condition, and two days before Christmas - the super-efficiency of the old FCA must still be a dominating issue.

The two Readers Digest have been eagerly read by all near and far. The cigarettes and American soap likewise appreciated. The fruit-cakes, besides being so attractively wrapped, were food for the gods and were slowly and meltingly eaten.

Arriving here just 2 months ago, we are busy from 8 to 4:30 daily and 3 hours

3 nights a week. It takes an amazing amount of paper work to keep the wheels of victory moving forward. We are located in a large coconut grove (as who is not here), have almost nightly air raids; but life is still very interesting and I am more than glad to be here.

The people here, with their shy manner and soft speech, are pathetically glad to see us. Three years is a long time to wait in one's own country for freedom, kindness, food, and clothing.

At the present time we are living in a large old French chateau; this makes it very comfortable.

The following letter from James J. Rick, Chairman of the Infantile Paralysis Institute of Kansas City speaks for itself:

"Dear Miss Connor:

"We are addressing you as President of the Farm Credit Club with the request that you pass on our sincere appreciation to each individual girl that helped in the infantile paralysis collection.

"The girls did excellent work; they gave unstintingly of their time and worked very hard, and their efforts were sincere. The collections resulted in more than \$6500 coming to the fund, and your organization played no small part in the collection of this money.

"We thank all of you sincerely, but the real reward will come to you in the knowledge that you have been of great assistance to those poor suffering victims of infantile paralysis whom we all aim to serve."

In addition, collections at the Midland Theater, where a number of FCA girls gave their assistance, amounted to \$7,009, and contributions by FCA employees helped to swell the fund.

FARM CREDIT'S RED CROSS DRIVE

Our drive for funds to assist the Red Cross in carrying on during 1945 starts on Wednesday, March 7 and will continue through March 24.
