

**BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

**TRANSACT REGULAR WEEKLY BUSINESS AT THURSDAY NIGHT'S MEETING.**

The regular meeting of the board of trustees of the city of Glendale was held at the City Hall Thursday evening, July 12, 1917. Present: J. S. Thompson, president of the board of trustees; Charles Grist, R. M. Jackson, F. L. Muhleman, G. B. Woodberry. Also present: T. W. Watson, City Manager; J. C. Sherer, City Clerk; H. B. Lynch, manager public service; Ed M. Lynch, City Engineer; A. H. Lankford, fire marshal, and G. H. Herald, city marshal.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and a correction ordered to be made with reference to the closing of Louise street on the evenings of the band concert, and with this change, were approved. The minutes of the adjourned meeting of July 10 were read and approved.

An application was received from L. N. Hagood for permission to install a curb type gasoline pump in front of 441 South Brand boulevard. The president stated that the board had adopted a rule refusing permits for such pumps within fire district No. 1, and on motion of Trustee Muhleman, the application was denied.

A communication was received and read from the Reliable Garage, northeast corner Colorado street and Brand boulevard, asking permission to install a gasoline pump. On motion of Trustee Grist, it was ordered that this application be denied if the location is included within the limits of fire district No. 1; otherwise to be granted.

A communication was read from the Committee of Arrangement for the reception of the Belgian Mission on July 14 next, inviting the participation of the officials and the people of Glendale in this parade and reception. On motion the invitation was accepted on the part of such trustees as can make it convenient to attend.

A petition was presented requesting the trustees to initiate proceedings for the improvement of Milford street between Pacific avenue and Columbus avenue, signed by nine of the owners of frontage amounting to 550 feet out of the total of 1900 feet on that portion of the street requested to be improved. On motion of Trustee Jackson the petition was referred to the City Engineer for investigation and report.

On motion of Trustee Woodberry bids for the improvement of Grand View avenue were ordered to be opened, read and publicly declared. The only bid received was that of Peter L. Ferry.

On motion of Trustee Jackson the bid was referred to the City Engineer.

A deed was presented to the board signed by all of the owners of property to be used for alley purposes on the rear of Lots 22, 23 and 24 of the W. S. Knott Tract, acceptance of the same being recommended by the City Engineer, was ordered, on motion of Trustee Grist, that the deed be received by the city and recorded. The City Manager submitted a lot cleaning resolution.

On motion Resolution No. 956, "Resolution of the board of trustees of the city of Glendale ordering the City Manager and ex-officio street superintendent to abate certain nuisances in the city of Glendale," was taken up for reading. Upon motion of Trustee Jackson, the same, upon being read, was adopted.

On motion, Resolution No. 957, "Resolution of the board of trustees of the city of Glendale ordering the City Manager and ex-officio street superintendent to abate certain nuisances in the city of Glendale," was taken up for reading. Upon motion of Trustee Woodberry the same upon being read was adopted.

Report of the health officer for the month of June was presented, read and ordered to be filed.

The City Manager reported receipt of a letter from Supervisor Dodge, stating that the petition for bridge appropriation had been placed on the calendar for Monday next, and that he would be glad to receive a committee to confer upon the subject between 10 and 12 o'clock on that date; further stating that he had secured an appropriation for \$5000 for the Ivanhoe bridge, which money will be held until the city gets ready to construct the bridge.

The Manager presented a statement from the Tax Collector showing that the total amount of delinquent taxes for the past five years, with penalties and interest, amount to the sum of \$7023.01.

**STATE NEWS**

**GOVERNOR DIRECTS ENERGIES TO SOLUTION OF THE FOOD PROBLEM.**

SACRAMENTO, July 13.—The machinery of the State has been put into operation by Gov. William D. Stephens to bring about a final and lasting solution of the food problem in California.

It is declared that the ultimate result of the drive will be the elimination of the middleman. With the middleman eliminated the producer and consumer would be brought more closely together, prices would drop and the producer would be able to dispose of his crops more profitably, an investigation conducted at the instance of Gov. Stephens has convinced him. The Governor believes, as a result of this investigation, that the middleman is responsible for the present State-wide cry of over-production of potatoes and onions in California.

The investigators declare middlemen realizing that the spring crops of potatoes and onions will be exhausted before winter, are offering to buy from the producers at a figure less than the cost of production to discourage them from winter planting, and in the meantime they are leasing all available land for raising winter potatoes and onions. With the spring supply of potatoes and onions exhausted and with speculators in almost entire possession of the winter crops, it can easily be seen how speculators, if not eliminated, will corner the market and fix the prices to suit themselves.

Commission merchants are now declared to be paying the producers one and a quarter cents per pound for potatoes and these same potatoes are being sold to the consumers of San Francisco and other cities not situated in agricultural districts, at 4 and 5 cents per pound.

It is estimated that 200 cars of onions are rotting in California because the commission merchants refuse to pay the producers a fair price for the product.

In some sections where large acreages of onions were grown last spring, the producers have been offered as low as 30 cents per 100-pound sack for onions and at the most 60 cents, which is below the cost of production.

It is to remedy all these things and to lower the cost of living that Gov. Stephens is directing his energies for a solution of the food problem.

SACRAMENTO, July 13.—Junk dealers and peddlers who have been reaping a harvest, due to the unusual demand for junk as the result of the war by using false scales, are to be vigorously prosecuted by Charles G. Johnson, State Sealer of Weights and Measures. Orders have been sent by Johnson to all weights and measures officials to make rigid inspection of the scales used by the junk peddlers and to prosecute all frauds in the purchase of junk.

SEBASTOPOL, July 13.—With the crop the heaviest and of the highest quality for many seasons, apple packing in this section is in full swing this week. The Graton and Forestville packing houses have been in operation for about ten days and Monday the first apples were packed at Sebastopol.

**DEATH OF THOMAS MALONE.**

Thomas C. Malone of 131 South Louise street died Wednesday, July 11, at the Clara Barton Hospital in Los Angeles, at the age of 36 years. He leaves to mourn for him a wife and three children.

Mr. Malone came from Atlanta, Ga., about a year ago to take the management of the Remington Typewriter Company in Los Angeles. He was a member of Glendale Lodge of Elks No. 1289, having recently departed from Atlanta lodge.

The remains are in charge of the Pulliam Undertaking Company, but are being shipped to Millidgeville, Ga., for interment, today.

**INDUSTRIALISTS MAROONED AT HERMANAS**

**HURL DEFIANCE AT ARMED GUARDS AND THREATEN TO RETURN TO BISBEE ON NEXT TRAIN**

BISBEE, Arizona, July 13.—Seven hundred armed deputies are being rushed to Osborne to stop the 1200 I. W. W.'s who are reported to be attempting to return to invade Bisbee. The report says the industrialists plan to seize the first train through Hermanas, where they are now.

DOUGLAS, July 13.—Left on a side track at Hermanas, thirty miles west of Columbus, N. M., 1200 I. W. W.'s flung defiance at the armed guards as the guards left them without an engine to return to Bisbee, it was learned from the guards. "We'll burn the cattle cars and hold up the first train through Hermanas. You'll see us back in Bisbee soon," the industrialists called to the guards. As the train which was bearing the guards back to Bisbee steamed off, the I. W. W.'s piled off the cattle cars and hurled rocks after the train. There is no train through Hermanas scheduled before late this afternoon. It is feared the agitators will carry out their threats.

**I. W. W.'S MARCH TOWARD EL PASO**

**HASTY PREPARATIONS BEING MADE BY MILITARY AND CIVIL AUTHORITIES TO PROTECT CITY**

EL PASO, July 13.—Twelve hundred industrialists departed from Bisbee to Hermanas, N. M., it was reported this morning were marching toward El Paso. Three women are said to be in the party. The party has not tasted food for 36 hours. Local authorities are making hasty preparations to handle the agitators. The police have arranged to call out the citizens by a signal whistle when the I. W. W.'s are approaching. It is said the invaders will be given food but must leave the city immediately afterward. Military authorities will co-operate with the citizens to protect life and property in El Paso.

**WAR DEPARTMENT AUTHORIZES SOUTHERN COMMANDER TO TAKE PERSONAL CHARGE OF SITUATION**

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Gen. Parker, commander of the Southern Department of the U. S. army, was ordered by the war department this morning to maintain law and order in Arizona in connection with the I. W. W. disturbances. Gen. Parker has as yet made no report on the situation.

**AMERICAN SCHOONER BELONGING TO OLD FALL RIVER LINE TORPEDOED BY SUBMARINE**

**GOVERNMENT MAY ACCEDE TO DEMANDS**

**DISPATCHES INDICATE THAT KAISER MAY BE FORCED TO LISTEN TO MAJORITY MEMBERS OF REICHSTAG**

LONDON, July 13.—German dispatches prophesy that the German government will accede to the demand of the majority Reichstag members in their demand for electoral reforms and for a full statement of Germany's war aims before the vote of credit is asked, Saturday. Dispatches via Holland say the majority are firmly united in their demands for immediate electoral reforms and pledges of German peace without annexation.

## KEEP CAMP SURROUNDINGS CLEAN

(Contributed)

Sons and brothers are going out of over a thousand of honorable and honored households in Glendale to give their services, their lives it may be, to the defense of the nation. They are answering the nation's call. Already, and justly, there rises from these households a demand that the nation, in return, shall at the very least provide for these, its soldier boys, every possible safeguard against the moral pitfalls that have proverbially beset the pathways of the man-at-arms. It is none too early to arouse the authorities to the need of safeguards of this sort. Conditions on the Mexican border were not above reproach, as witness the saloons that were strung along the line, always inviting soldier patronage. Conditions that surround the permanent Army and Navy stations are constantly in need of betterment, as witness the Newport situation, wherein the complacency of the local authorities has forced Secretary Daniels to use the men in the United States service to keep patronage away from resorts that were said by the local authorities not to exist. In short, it is clear that the forces of immorality are seeking to in-trench themselves in or around every station or camp where the young men who are going forth to serve their country are likely to be assembled in any considerable numbers for instruction, for practice, or in actual performance of duty.

Strange as it may seem, city and town authorities are not, as a rule, alert to exercise their power of prevention in this situation. However much local officials may have bestirred themselves to secure the taking up of their district allotment of Liberty bonds, or to swell the contributions to the Red Cross, too often they forget their opportunity to contribute to the support of the war by closing a resort or refusing a license to some craftily placed saloon. The same officials who may be emphatic in their demand for sanitary conditions at military camps are not always equally emphatic in their willingness to insist on moral sanitation as one of the prerequisites. Civilian bodies, women's clubs, and many medical or sanitary experts, are giving attention to this phase of the matter; and there are indications that the national Government will not fail to act in cases where the State and local authorities are derelict. But the demand for complete extinguishment of immoral influences about camps or in the neighborhood of military or naval stations should be taken up by every well-meaning man or woman who has at heart the welfare of the country, its soldiers, and the great cause which they are now seeking to defend. To see that the boys and men in United States service have decent surroundings, and are subject only to clean influences while in camp or awaiting their call to positive activity, is only one way in which the non-combatant population of the country can "do its bit" in the war; to assist even passively in giving aid or comfort to the forces that would tend to demoralize the boys who have come from their homes to offer

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themselves for the service of their nation is little short of treachery to that nation, and should be dealt with by those summary methods that are always in keeping with war.

For war is the Great Adventure of this day and generation. The nation that wages it should pause for no toleration and no quibbling when the end to be achieved is efficiency, based on what is right. The families that have given up their boys are no "slack-ers" in the nation's hour of need. Shall the nation be a "slacker" in its response to the demands of those families that their boys shall have proper moral protection?—From Christian Science Monitor.

He went to save from ruthless Huns  
His home and country, and to be  
A guardian of democracy.

"What if he does not come?" you say;  
Ah, well! My sky would be more gray,

Not "will he come?" but "did he go?"  
My son well knew that he might die,  
And yet he went, with purpose high,

**BOY SCOUTS**

The Boy Scouts in the State of Ohio have been doing splendid work for forestry in fighting the tussock moth that was destroying the trees in Canton, Ohio. In two weeks the Scouts collected three million of the eggs. A quart of these eggs were sent to Professor Barnes of the Department of Entomology of Harvard, for investigative purposes. The mayor of Canton commended the work of the Scouts.

**LAGUNA BEACH.**

Laguna is an ideal beach for people who like a quiet, restful place. It is a mountain and beach resort in one. The hills reach down to the sea and there are cliffs along the shore and rocks that extend into the water.

The town itself is very small and situated at the foot of the hills in the midst of a grove of giant eucalyptus. It is very quiet and secluded; not a noisy amusement center like many of the other resorts.

The beach is practically deserted all day long except for occasional exploring parties from the Pomona College Marine Laboratory, where students are taking courses in zoology and biology.

Our little cottage was on the top of a hill overlooking the sea. We certainly had a grand view.

At low tide you can go out quite a way on the rocks and, oh, the wonderful sea life you can find there. The most conspicuous of the inhabitants of the rocks are the shore crabs. You could probably cover one with a cup, but though so small they are regarded with respect on account of their stout pinchers. They are beautiful, yet grotesque. Their flat bodies are a dark green, their eight legs a darker shade, tinged with pink, and their fat arms or pinchers which they keep folded in front of them in a comical way, are rose pink. They walk sideways and when you poke them out of their holes in the rocks they scurry away in great haste. If they are cornered, however, they put up a plucky fight, jumping at your stick and sidestepping out after you in a swaggering manner, their beady black eyes on the ends of little stalks fairly glowing at you, while bubbling away at the mouth. They breathe in this fashion, bubbling first at one end and then at the other.

The rocks at one place are full of little round holes about a foot across, which the tide leaves full of crystal-clear water. Each of these is the special property of a family of crabs. The sides of the holes are covered with mosses of delicate yellowish-green and rose pink. The crabs must have an artistic eye to know their brilliant green and pink will look well against it.

Hermit crabs, sea snails, limpets and chitons share the holes, clinging to the walls. The hermit crab, though less conspicuous than the shore crab, is even more interesting. He is not able to make a shell himself, so he hunts around for deserted snail shells and tries them on till he finds a good fit, then fastens himself in. When he moves around he carries his shell with him. He is a funny looking little creature. He is always popping his head in and out of his shell. He has one large claw or pincher and several small ones, blue knee joints—or speckled and banded ones—long orange antennae and eyes on little stalks.

The limpets live in those little shells which you find all over the beach; small, raised in the middle, and often with little holes in the tops. When alive they cling very tightly to the rocks, and the foot of them, as the part that clings to the rock is called, is salmon-colored or orange. The volcano limpet is the prettiest. It looks like a miniature volcano, being steep, the hole in the top resembling a crater and the red streaks down the side carrying out the idea of molten lava. Among the more common kinds are the ribber, mask and keyhole limpets.

The chitons are most interesting. They are something like the limpets except that they are oblong, usually green, and their shells are divided into eight sections, which overlap one another. The moss chitons have a fringe of curly bristles around their edges, which resembles moss.

The rocks are covered with barnacles, mostly the squat variety, which are a pretty pink and sometimes green. It is impossible to get them up with your fingers; they seem cemented on.

We managed to get some anemones to take home. You wouldn't believe that such soft, shapeless creatures would be so hard to pull up. If they are on the sand they wriggle down out of sight the minute you touch them, while if they are on the rocks you can't pull them off unless the rock is soft and will come with them. They secrete a sticky fluid so that bits of shell will adhere to them, to protect them from the crabs, make them less conspicuous and to keep them from drying up.

There are many varieties of beautiful sea weeds instead of the usual coarse kelp. A delicate, fern-like, lacey red kind called curly red hair, a bright, rubbery green kind called sea lettuce, a clammy green thing aptly named dead men's fingers, and every shade of coralline algae, red, green, yellow, brown and white. The last variety is all red at first but changes to different colors. It greatly resembles coral.

We went with a party from the Marine Laboratory one day, and in that way we were able to learn the names of quite a few things. A professor was along, very dignified except that his trousers were rolled up above his knees, while the young people were more interested in each other than in the shells.

Our eyes were open for birds also and we saw several kinds which we had not seen before—a road runner, crows and cliff swallows and their nests.

We brought some of the sea crea-

tures home in glass jars, but they died very soon.

The roads to Laguna are fine all the way. It is sixty-one miles from Glendale there.

In the days not only "before the Gringo came," but before the honking automobiles were abroad in the land, a winding path left the highway which from the beginning was designated as the Verdugo Road because it led to and through the old Verdugo land grant. And this path which led by little ranches, fenced in by thorny cactus hedges with giant oaks overshadowing the little homes if followed would lead the strollers of a Sunday afternoon to a delightful, shady canyon with trickling water and ferns and flowers.

We had our special seasons for visiting the canyon. We went in the early spring to find the ferns that peeped out from the moss on the north side of Fern Rock. We searched for yellow violets a little later. In summer's heat we sought the coolness of the oaks with well filled lunch baskets.

And it was not an uncommon occurrence to see a white tent gleaming among the trees. Some good people were there taking a little rest. The accommodating water company would attach a faucet and pipe to one of their mains and the old furnace of homely construction, which was the property of the "Deeds" camp, was put into commission and the smell of bacon and frying eggs was abroad in the land. What steaks have been broiled on the glowing coals, and biscuits baked in the improvised Dutch oven.

The close proximity to Glendale made it possible for friends and neighbors to join you with well filled lunch baskets and spend the day in the delightful coolness. They were welcomed as though a long absence and distant lands had divided you and the children greeted each other as long lost friends. The little outing had been good for all parties.

Then before the Yule Tide season we scoured the hills and stripped the scarlet hollyberries from the trees.

Sometimes the floods came down and thrifty people who had their winter supply of fuel piled neatly awoke to find it scattered down the wash for a mile.

If you cared to take a hike you could follow up the winding trail to the open meadow where the foundation of the old cabin was still in existence a few years ago and children would say, "That is where the French man lived who killed a man." Just how true this is, is a matter of some doubt.

Crossing the meadow and taking a horse back trail to the right you would, if persistent enough, come out above the arroyo and look out on Pasadena. This was a favorite hike with the young people.

The flying motorist missed all this and now if he does turn aside and follow up the canyon road after he has passed the pleasant ranch homes and crossed the little bridge instead of pushing aside the old rickety gate and entering the shady canyon and passing the old camp on the bench, on up past the "tunnel" where the water looked cool and dark, winding around tree and rock, he is confronted by stately iron gates.

The city dweller has found our retreat and sequestered himself in more pretentious villas. Where the white tent gleamed the tiled roofs rise. But changes must come. California since the war has come to be the playground of the world and we cannot keep nature's bounty to use for ourselves alone but must share with all comers.

**ON FRENCH FRONT.**

The following extracts are from a letter received by Mrs. Ella W. Richardson from her son, Bert, who is in France:

"I am not in ambulance work. At present I am driving a large Pierce Arrow for Capt. Malley. In this way I can learn a great deal about this war, also about France and the French people. I am now next to the trenches. Airplanes are flying all around and the large artillery guns roar night and day. I am very happy here and work hard; am taking the best of care of myself; am very well fed and am not able to kick about a single thing at the present time. I wear a French uniform, metal helmet, gas mask and carry a gun and canteen just like a regular French soldier. I am not able to say much about what I am doing as this is to be censored, also our letters must not be long.

"The French people admire all American soldiers in the French army, so they are courteous to me. Yesterday an officer was decorated with the Croix de Guerre—it was very impressive."
