"We, therefore, send you here with a fresh invitation to a conference in London on October 11, where we can meet your delegates as the spokesmen of the people whom you represent with a view to ascertaining how the association of Ireland with the community of nations known as the British Empire may best be reconciled with Irish national aspirations."

POLITICS More Election Guessing. Natural Resources, Another Western Issue. Almost Hopeless for Meighen. Scaring Up Tariff Votes. Back to Two Parties.

Here is another election forecast. It is that of The Edmonton Bulletin: Liberals, 100; Government, 37; Farmers, 78; Labor, 20.

The estimate of The Ottawa Citizen gives Liberals about the same, but has Government and Farmers running nearly even. There is almost unanimity in the estimates which are being published in placing Liberals at the top of the column with nearly twice as many seats as either of the other two major groups.

The question of the Dominion satisfying the claims of the Western Provinces to their natural resources, which was raised in British Columbia last week by Premier Oliver, is being revived on the Prairies as an issue in this campaign.

Efforts are being made to have every candidate in the Western constituencies declare himself in regard to a settlement.

Says The Lethbridge Herald: Westerners will agree in the contention of The Winnipeg Free Press that the elimination of the other Provinces is an essential precedent to the discussion. This, as it points out, implies no disrespect to the other Provinces; but this is none of

their business, to be quite plain. The controversy is between the Western Provinces and the Dominion; and they must be the only parties to the settlement.

Accepting that it is necessary that every candidate in the Western constituencies should be called on to make a proper declaration in respect to the question of the natural resources, it is obvious that the curtailed representation in the next House, through the failure of a redistribution measure being passed, acts as a handicap, in restricting the volume of Western opinion brought to bear on a very important question as it affects the West.

The Monetary Times, one of the financial publications of the East supporting the Government on its high tariff policy, has little hope of Premier Meighen gaining a majority. It says: The Government has been so weakened by the events of the past few years that an absolute majority for it is not probable. Just what the party results will be cannot be foretold.

The free trade bogey is being worked overtime in the East to drum up voters for the Meighen Government.

Witness this as a sample thriller from The Toronto Telegram: The work of The Toronto Globe in encouraging Mr. King and of The Toronto Star in backing the Farmers can be of use only in rushing Canada towards Free Trade and consequently ruin. This free trade movement, having taken root in the foreign-populated communities of the West, is both un-

Canadian and anti-Canadian. Parliament so constituted would have in it a good proportion of men very much in earnest. Commoners who go to Ottawa as exponents of some particular theory or platform are usually serious-minded men with purpose behind them, and they are not necessarily cranks or radicals. As for that, however, there is little danger that any government will have opportunity, with the problems of the next few years on its hands, to loaf on the job.
