You will find a color reproduction of the WRIXPARENT from Kodochrome natural Color Photograph on the outside cover page of our 1940 catalogue. The picture was taken June 18, 1939, at Magnolia, Delaware, at which time a handsome and profitable crop of fruit was being picked from Mr. McIlvain's WRIXPARENT orchards.

Found as a chance seedling in the Yellow Transparent orchard of Mr. Wrixham McIlvain near Magnolia, Delaware about 1920.

Mr. McIlvain after several years observation determined the variety to be superior in every way to the Transparent and grafted over his Transparent orchard to this variety. This 2nd generation orchard now 16 years of age has been producing heavy crops for 12 years. A 3rd generation orchard was planted in 1935 and began bearing at 4 years of age. The tree is more spreading than Transparent, vigorous and hardy in wood not being subject to blight and other fungus diseases. The fruit averages large in size being a little more flat in shape than Transparent and packing out commercial sizes of 2 1/2" and 2 3/4" at picking time. The Wrixparent ripens from 10 to 15 days before the yellow transparent and ripens its fruit evenly so that the entire crop may be harvested in two pickings if desired. It is an attractive light green color without markings; the flesh is white, crisp, sprightly, very fine in texture and does not bruise readily or turn

dark after bruising. Sub-acid in flavor and unsurpassed as a cooking apple. The fruit keeps well and can be held for 10 to 15 days after picking without storage. The Wrixparent is an annual bearer and continues to bear large fruits on the older trees.

NOTE

The ripening order of varieties is designated by bracketed number after the name. Varieties overlapping in ripening season are indicated by sub-letter. Example: McIntosh and Kendall are same season and are designated as by numbers 10a and 10b. We are endeavoring to give the ripening order and not the picking order as this will vary greatly according to the grower and where they are marketed. Many of our green apples are picked early for cooking purposes. Other highly colored red apples are marketed long before actual ripening time and again soil, fertilization and climatic conditions will cause a variation in ripening season. We trust this listing will be helpful to you. We have endeavored to make it as authentic as possible.

WRIXPARENT (D). See description and prices on page 2.

CRIMSON BEAUTY (3). Hardy grower, very productive, early bearer, earliest apple known. Flesh sub-acid, pleasant to eat; ripens July 1. 1 yr. trees only.

YELLOW TRANSPARENT (2A). Early bearer, fruit good size, skin clear, white to pale yellow, flavor very good. Ripens July 1-10.

The New "CLOSE" Apple (2B)

This variety, tested as U. S. D. A. No. 57, ripens with or slightly ahead of the Yellow Transparent. It appears to adapt itself over a wide growing area. The fruit is medium to large size averaging 2 1/2"; fair to good quality, suitable for both dessert and cooking. The fruit develops a bright, attractive color when full ripe but when grown for the large commercial markets would have to be picked with 1/4 to 1/2 color. It seems to stand high summer temperatures well, thereby making it desirable in early apple producing areas of the South. The tree is vigorous, productive annual bearer and comes into fruiting while the trees are young. This variety has outstanding promise as an EARLY RED APPLE ADAPTED TO BOTH HOME AND COMMERCIAL ORCHARD PLANTINGS.

LODI (3)

A product of N. Y. Experimental station. Now proving outstanding in many early apple districts.

The Lodi after being tested over quite a large area is now proving one of our most worthy Early Apples. It is of Transparent type only much larger and more firm. The tree is more spreading and vigorous and bears more regular than Transparent. It should be interplanted for cross polinization. It ripens a few days later than Transparent but is large and can be picked with Transparent if desired. We ask no additional price for Lodi.

ANOKA (3A). One of Prof. Hansens Hybrids and noteworthy for its beautiful red striped fruit and early bearing. The fruit is good quality ripening shortly after yellow transparent. 1 yr. trees only.

WILLIAMS EARLY RED (3B). Largest of all early apples. Flesh white, juicy, tart, very good. Like Transparent bears young. July 10-15.

EARLY HARVEST (Yellow Harvest) (D). Medium to large, beautiful, fine flavor. Ripens July 15-30. 1 yr. trees only.

EARLY MCINTOSH (4A). A McIntosh hybrid being almost solid red in color, very crisp and juicy, with same high quality as the well-known McIntosh. A thrifty grower and regular bearer. Follows Transparent close.

DUCHESS (4B). Vigorous grower, Russian origin, large, striped, tender, juicy, sub-acid; regular bearer. Very hardy tree.

STARR (4C). One of the finest early apples grown in New Jersey. Large to very large, green in color. Tree develops rapidly, fruits young.

MONMOUTH BEAUTY (5). One of the finest summer apples. Fruit large, excellent for cooking and eating.

MELBA (5A). A McIntosh in quality and appearance, only more flat in shape. Canadian origin. Tree vigorous and productive. 1 yr. trees only.

RED GRAVENSTEIN (5B). Large striped apple ripening after Duchess, good quality and ripens over several weeks time.

MILTON (6). Typical McIntosh, coloring full red, very good quality. Tree hardy and vigorous. Ripens 3 to 4 weeks before McIntosh.

RED WARRIOR (5A)

Meets every demand for a mid-summer apple. It's beautiful all-over bright red color, large size, excellent quality and shipping ability should make it a leader for its season.

The tree is normally vigorous, grows naturally well formed similar to McIntosh, and bears regularly. The fruit is large to very large, many apples being four inches or better but normally averaging better than three inches. The skin is smooth and colored a brilliant bright red from stem to calyx without stripe. The flesh is white and fine texture and does not bruise easily. Its ripening season is about with Wealthy or a little earlier. It is sub-acid in flavor and is an excellent cooking apple. The apple is shaped nearly like a Staymans, being a little longer from calyx to stem.

WEALTHY (7). Fruit brilliant red, fine quality, best of its season, good keeper, adapted to cold climates, bears early. Used as a pollinator. Season August 15-25.

SUMMER RAMBO (7A). Large, flat, streaked red and yellow. Fine flavor, juicy, tender, productive. Ripens August 20-25.

This is to state that we have examined for trueness-to-name all the saleable apple, pear, cherry, and plum stock of Bountiful Ridge Nurseries, near Princess Anne, Maryland, and as they now stand in the nursery row all varieties are, to the best of our knowledge and belief true-to-name.

GLENTON (8). A seedling of the Northern Spy originating at the Canadian Experimental Station. A new apple ripening with and just after Wealthy. The trees are vigorous nicely shaped and annual bearers. The apples are medium to large, highly colored with attractive red and good quality for either cooking or eating. We first observed the Glenton in the Ohio Experimental Orchards at Wooster. The beauty, quality and season of the apple were such that we felt it held real commercial possibilities. It should prove valuable as a good quality red apple to precede the McIntosh season.

LOBO (9). Same season as McIntosh, larger apple, colors earlier, full red, extra quality. Recommended for Southern growers.

IMPROVED ALL RED MCINTOSH (10). A special selected strain of the famous McIntosh apple. Solid red color without stripe. Finest type of the McIntosh Red strain at present. Both 1 yr. and 2 yr. old trees available.

McINTOSH (10A)

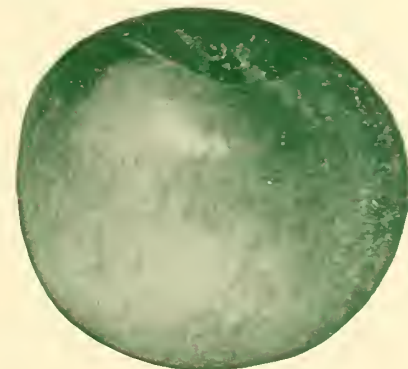
Tree vigorous with spreading head, good bearer; fruit medium to large, brilliant crimson, flesh snow-white, crisp, slightly aromatic, good quality. Ripens September 5-20. One of the greatest general purpose home and commercial apples ever introduced.

KENDALL (10B). Has attracted more attention from fruit growers than any other new apple of McIntosh season. Apples large, whitish, fine grained flesh of McIntosh. Flavor the same. Apples hang better than McIntosh.

LAWFAM (10C). A product of Central Exueriment farm Ottawa, Canada. A cross between Lawver and Fameuse and one of the most beautiful of the new McIntosh types of apples. Excellent quality. Fine tree growth and fruit hangs well to tree. A very deserving new type of the McIntosh which should be tried out promptly by fruit growers in the McIntosh districts.

CORTLAND (10D)

Is an improved late McIntosh. The fruits of the two varieties are similar, but those of Cortland are more oblate, average larger, and are more uniform in size; they have more color and the red is lighter and brighter and the stripings and splashes are laid on differently; the taste of Cortland can hardly be distinguished from that of McIntosh; the flesh is firmer but just as juicy; the apples do not drop so readily and ship better.

OHIO NONPAREIL (10E) (Red Bellflower). We re-list this old variety in response to many requests from Ohio fruit growers. High dessert quality and fine appearance is responsible for its popularity. Originated near Massillon, Ohio, it has been extensively planted in many sections of the middle west as well as Ohio. The tree is medium in size and spreading in type. Fruit medium to large, round oblate in shape. Skin is yellow overspread with red-mottled and striped with bright red. Flesh yellow, firm, crisp, tender, juicy and aromatic. Sub-acid in flavor. This fine old apple is hard to equal where quality is the factor.

SMOKEHOUSE (11). Moderate bearing. Fruit yellow, striped with dull red, very attractive. Ripens September 10-20.

IMPROVED ALL RED JONATHAN (11A). If you are not getting enough color on your Jonathan, plant this improved strain. You will be satisfied with the results. Both 1 yr. and 2 yr. old trees available.

JONATHAN (11B). A good commercial apple, hard to equal for hardness and productiveness. Good quality, medium size, excellent eating and cooking apple. Used as filler and pollinator.

GRIMES GOLDEN (11C). Highest quality fancy dessert apple. Ranks with Delicious and Jonathan. Medium to large, bright yellow, pink cheek. Trees hardy, highly recommended to pollenize. Ripens September 10-15. The old home orchard standby and a great apple wherever planted.

TWENTY OUNCE (12). Fruit exceptionally large, sub-acid; color green slightly striped with red blush. Tree vigorous and one of our finest baking apples.

OPALESCENT (12A). Very large, brilliant dark red all over; tree bears young and very prolific. Quality good. Its beauty and size gives it ready sale.

NORTHWEST GREENING (12B). Tree vigorous, hardy. Fruit large to very large; clear green skin, yellow fleshed, fine grained and firm. Very attractive.

TOLMAN SWEET (12C). Medium to large size, pale yellow, firm, rich and very sweet. Vigorous, hardy and productive.

YELLOW DELICIOUS (13)

This apple has received national publicity during the last few years. It is famous for quality, which is hard to equal. This combined with fine, firm texture of flesh and its golden yellow skin, attracts the consuming public. Tree thrifty and extremely productive, bears early with abundant crop while very young.

MACOUN (13A). Very highly colored, no stripe. Same quality as McIntosh, same texture fruit. Hangs better than McIntosh. Ripens 2 to 3 weeks after Cortland. Recommended to extend McIntosh season.

RICHARD DELICIOUS (13B). See full description page 2.

DELICIOUS (14). A remarkable variety introduced in the West several years ago where it is being largely planted and rapidly taking first rank both for commercial and home orchards. Fruit large, nearly covered with brilliant dark red; flesh fine grained, crisp, and melting; juicy, with a delightful aroma; of very highest quality. A splendid keeper and shipper. Tree one of the hardest, a vigorous grower.

MEDINA (14A). Delicious shape and appearance. Recommended by N. Y. Fruit testing asso. to prolong the Delicious season.

ORLEANS (14B). Same season as Delicious only better keeper in common storage. The flavor resembles that of Staymans. Apple shape and color of Delicious.

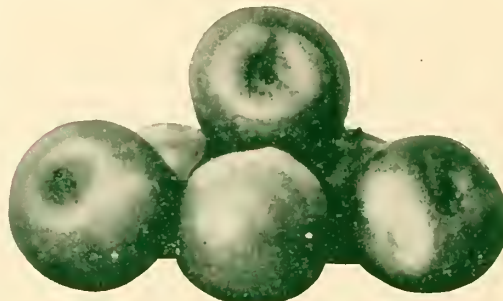
RHODE ISLAND GREENING (15). Fruit large and handsome. Dark green overspread with yellow. Flesh tender, rather acid, flavor excellent. Ripens September 25-30.

NORTHERN SPY (15A). Large, roundish-conical, slightly ribbed, bandsomely striped with red, flavor rich, aromatic, mild sub-acid. Renowned for fine quality.

RED NORTHERN SPY (15B). A typical Northern Spy except in color. The Red Spy colors a solid red without stripe or splashes.

TURLEY (16)

The Turley is an winesap seedling originating in the experimental orchard of Mr. Burton at Mitchell, Indiana. This beautiful apple is gaining in popularity as it comes into fruiting more generally and has many points to recommend it as a profitable commercial variety. The trees resemble those of the old Staymans, are vigorous and productive. The apples average large to very large. The skin is smooth and colors a bright attractive red almost over the entire apple. The flesh is firm, similar to Staymans. The quality is good but cannot be classed as a high dessert apple being superior to Rome Beauty. The value of the apple lies in its handsome appearance, large size, the fact that it is Staymans type and will not crack at the stem and that it is a good cooking and baking apple. As an early winter variety it should have the consideration of the planters.



THE TURLEY APPLE

ALBEMARLE—NEWTON PIPPIN (16A). Large, smooth skinned, beautifully colored yellow apple. A valuable market variety. Tree long lived and productive.

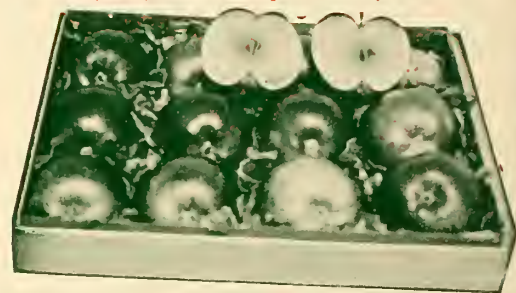

The "ERLY-RED-FRE" originated as a chance seedling in the orchard of Wm. Perry near Chase City, Va. Apparently the "ERLY-RED-FRE" is the results of the planting of a Red Bird Peach Seed planted fall of 1928. Our attention was first called to this splendid peach in 1935 and we instructed Mr. Perry to bud the variety off to see whether it would reproduce true to type in succeeding generations. The second generation trees bore in 1937 at 2 years of age, the fruits on these being identical with those on the Parent tree. The original tree and second generation trees both bore a heavy crop in 1938, it being necessary to thin the fruit on all trees. These same trees repeated in 1939, having a normal crop on them which was thinned lightly, when other varieties in the same orchard were killed out almost entirely with late frosts. The fruit is very highly colored with an attractive bright red on a creamy white background. The skin is tough and medium thick. The flesh of the peach is of such texture that it does not show bruises through the skin for several days after being bruised and is a clear white through to the pit. We believe this peach has one of the smallest pits of any cultivated peach we know of in existence. The Fisher Peach Is Hardy—Medium to Large Size—Highly Colored With Handsome Appearance, Superb Quality and Shipping Ability.

Growers In All Peach Producing Areas Can Realize Its Possibilities. Step Up Your Yellow Peach Season By Planting Fisher Peach Trees This Year.

Observations of the FISHER PEACH on fruiting trees in the TEST Orchards of the Bountiful Ridge Nurseries near Princess Anne in 1940.

We are pleased to say that about 80 trees of the Fisher peach planted March, 1938, in our test orchard have given us some interesting data on this peach which we pass on to you.

The trees had a light bloom set. The blossoms opened medium to late and were not affected materially by snow and sleet storm of April 12, followed by temperatures of 25 degrees. Fruit set well in proportion to blossoms. Fruit withstood the severe hail storm hitting this orchard May 27. The fruit on these young trees has sized up well, many peaches being 3 inches or better in diameter. The tree is proving vigorous, foliage somewhat subject to Bacteriosis. Fruit seems fairly resistant to Bacteriosis. Picked first soft ripe peaches July 18, general picking July 27 to Aug. 3. Were still harvesting Red Bird, Greensboro and Early Rose when Fisher started. Fisher cleaned up before starting Golden Jubilee.

Fruit averaged large, were very highly colored and very attractive and most excellent quality. The flesh of the peach is a clear yellow showing no red at all even about the pit. Some trees showed the fruit to be perfectly free-stone, fruit from others clinged to the pit. We experienced some extreme high temperatures from July 20 to 28 which ripened peaches too fast, many fruits showing the effects, and this in part may account for some fruits clinging to the pit. Fruits were very high quality, somewhat more acid than Jubilee or Early Elberta, not so much as some types Elberta. From observations this year in this orchard you can expect the fruits to cling to the pit while trees are young in many cases but we are confident as your tree settles down to real production at about 5 years of age the fruits will be free-stone. These are the facts friends. We believe after trial you will find it to be one of the fine peaches preceding the Golden Jubilee season and we recommend it especially for the central and northern districts. The Fisher peach was discovered as a bud sport of the Valiant in August 1934 at the Dulverton Fruit farms owned by Mr. C. Howard Fisher Sons, Queenstown, Ontario, Canada.

ERLY-RED-FRE (3A). See preceding page.

GREENSBORO (Semi-Cling) (4). Large yellow with splashes of bright red; highly colored; flesh white, very juicy and of good quality. Hardy, early.

EARLY ROSE (5). A white cling peach. Variety is a favorite with Southern peach growers.

FISHER PEACH (5A). See preceding page.

ORIOLE (6). Introduced by New Jersey experiment station in 1925 an early yellow freestone peach ripens a few days ahead of Cumberland. Fruit medium size, yellow in color, blushed with red and notable for fine quality. Tree is vigorous and productive. The fruit buds are very resistant to cold and will grow where others fail.

CUMBERLAND (6A). A N. J. Station Product. A seedling crossed with Greensboro. The tree is a vigorous grower and as hardy as Carman. Fruit is medium to large in size, skin a deep golden yellow blushed with bright red, the flesh is firm, tender, melting and juicy. New Peach Varieties Developed at N. J. Experiment Station. Released by N. J. Peach Council

We have propagated these varieties with the full knowledge and consent of the N. J. Peach Council, bud wood being supplied from their certified trees and second generation trees growing at Barton Brothers orchards Marlton, N. J.

After careful study based on our own observations and reports from experienced growers we recommend the following varieties for trial and future planting in most peach producing sections.

TRIOGEM (N. J. 70). An early, oval, red all over, firm, yellow freestone peach ripening usually about 2 days before Golden Jubilee or 20 to 25 days before Elberta. The trees are medium in size, hardy and heavy bearers. Trees require good soil and good culture for best results.

NEWDAY (N. J. 79). A large oval, yellow-fleshed peach which begins to ripen a few days after Triogem. The tree is somewhat more vigorous and the fruit averages larger which makes the variety somewhat easier to grow for market. The fruit is showy, firm in texture and hangs to the tree well. It is not always a freestone but this has not apparently affected the market demand.

GOLDEN GLOBE (N. J. 73). Where the market demands a large peach this variety meets that demand. It is very large, showy yellow peach of delicious flavor ripening about 20 days before Elberta. The flesh ripens rather slowly and the fruit hangs well to the tree making it valuable for roadside and nearby markets. The tree is vigorous, upright and spreading. Fruit buds are somewhat tender under certain conditions. Usually a freestone.

SUNHIGH (N. J. 82). A large red, bright, smooth peach which colors well all over before it ripens, softens slowly making it a good commercial peach. Flesh inclines to adhere to the pit when hard ripe but is generally freestone. The tree is spreading in growth and the dormant buds are hardy. The variety seems to do best in hilly sections and requires thorough summer spraying. Recommended for planting where climatic conditions are similar to northern New Jersey.

GOLDEN EAST (N. J. 87). A large, oval, firm, melting, high colored, yellow fleshed peach ripening with Hiley or about 15 days before Elberta. Usually a freestone. A promising variety for sites south of central New Jersey where favorable elevations, soil and climate prevail. The tree is upright, spreading and vigorous. The dormant buds are medium in hardness. Worthy of trial in all sections.

SUMMERCREST (N. J. 94). A large, oval freestone peach of fine quality ripening with Georgia Belle. The flesh is a deep golden yellow, melting and sweet. Tree is exceptionally vigorous, requiring light soil and very little nitrogen. Summercrest is hardy as J. H. Hale and adapted to regions having a climate similar to central and southern New Jersey.

AFTERGLO (N. J. 81). Usually ripens 3 to 5 days after Elberta therefore often meets good strong markets. The fruits are large, round, oval in shape and almost completely overspread with red. The flesh is yellow stained with red about the pit and is free. The trees are vigorous and rapid growers, the fruit buds appear more hardy than J. H. Hale where observed. Recommended for trial in most districts.

This splendid variety should be planted more extensively as we know of no variety we can recommend more highly for a peach to follow the Elberta.

Random observations relative to conditions and behavior of certain peach varieties in the test orchards of Bountiful Ridge Nurseries, Princess Anne, Md., Season 1940.

The winter of 1939 and 1940 was very severe throughout, with temperatures falling as low as 5 degrees below zero, and for a protracted period, low temperatures were experienced throughout the entire winter. During the blooming season in the orchard the weather was extremely cool and at the height of bloom, on April 12, a freak storm from the east, with snow, sleet and extreme low temperatures, recording of 25 degrees, was experienced on the mornings of April 13 and 14. This resulted in a heavy kill to most of the varieties in full bloom. Other varieties, however, which were not so far advanced did not suffer to as great a degree as those which were more open. However, good fruit sets were noted on Mayflower, June Elberta, Red Bird, Greensboro, Early Rose, Golden Jubilee, Carman, Rochester, Crawford, Vedette, Eclipse, Hiley, Colara, Georgia Belle, J. H. Hale, Elberta, Gage Elberta, Shippers Late Red, Veteran, Hope Farm and Wilma. Other varieties in the orchard set fair crops, but was further subject to adverse weather conditions, when the hail storm on May 27 struck the orchard causing a great deal of damage to set of fruit, knocking off many and destroying others. Following this freak storm, the weather was dry throughout the entire growing season, which had a tendency to produce much small fruit and premature ripening. Several varieties which were outstanding in behavior, might be mentioned.

The **Early-Red-Free** produced a fair crop, notwithstanding that it was in full bloom at the time the April storm hit and the low temperatures were experienced which killed a great many of the blooms. The fruit developed rapidly and produced ripe fruit from blossom in 96 days; the first fruits ripe around July 5 in this orchard and the crop lasted over a period of 12 days. The fine color and large size of this quality freestone peach prevailed throughout the ripening period, the fruit ranging up to 3 1/2" in size. To say that the quality was exceptional and the general character of the fruit was outstanding, is putting it mildly.

The **Fisher** set a nice crop of fruit which developed well in a normal way, with the first ripe fruits in 105 days after blossom. The crop was picked on July 27, with the first fruit showing ripe on July 20. The fruit run medium to large, and was of good quality, although was slightly acid to the taste, due to the fact that the fruit ripened on young trees bearing their first crop and there was some noticeable sticking of the flesh to the pit.

Golden Jubilee, while not setting a heavy crop, had a fair crop on all the trees which developed normally with plenty of color, size and fine shape. The first fruits were ripe July 27.

The **Colara**, possibly the most outstanding peach in the orchard, as resistant to low temperatures. It came through the storm of April 12, as well as the subsequent hail storm on May 27, with a fine crop of fruit. We have been advised from all sections of the country, where low temperatures were experienced last winter and crops lost on all other varieties, that the Colara came through with a full crop, practically everywhere. This was particularly so from those sections of North Carolina which lost their crops on all varieties this past season.

Vedette set a normal crop which carried through well to maturity. The peach is firm, size, was very handsomely colored and was of exceptional edible quality. The peach is firm, hung to the tree well and is superior to the Veteran and Valiant under conditions here at Princess Anne. We recommend further planting of this variety in most sections and particularly in southern districts.

The **Hale Haven** variety, both in the test orchard block as well as at the nursery planting, set a fair crop which developed normally and produced fruits which were very large in size, highly colored, of fine quality and firmness. The Hale Haven continues to improve under our conditions, and we wholeheartedly recommend its planting in all peach growing districts for all planters desiring a peach to ripen ten to fifteen days before Elberta. In our opinion, it is one of the outstanding introductions during the past 25 years.

Elberta produced a fair crop in the orchard this year. The fruits were notable for their good size, particularly fine color and high quality. We find Bountiful Ridge Strain Elberta a distinctive improvement on many strains of this old variety which are now being offered to the trade.

Gage Elberta is another outstanding variety, one which we have for years been telling a story about to the orchardist. Not alone for the fact that the tree is disease resistant to the most common peach diseases, but that it sets a crop of fine grade, high colored peaches that are unequalled for quality and are in many ways superior to the regular Elberta. Plant more Gage Elberta.

Shippers Late Red, another outstanding variety which Bountiful Ridge Nurseries have recommended of late years. Our strain here showed a very fine crop of fruit, which for size, quality, appearance and shipping ability, can be recommended to all commercial orchardists and we feel sure that any future planting, where a variety is desired three to five days later than Elberta, that Shippers Late Red is the answer.

for resistance to bacterium pruni. The tree grows thrifty as the Elberta and looks much like the old time Elberta. 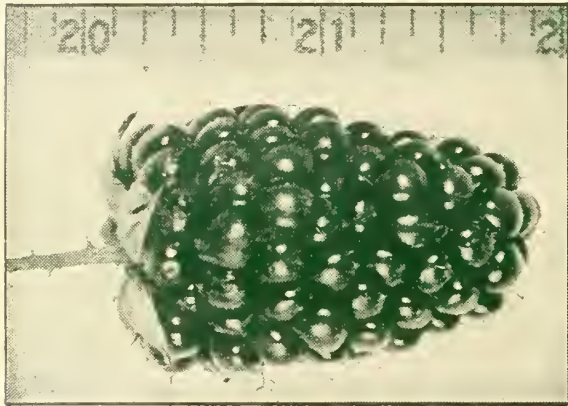

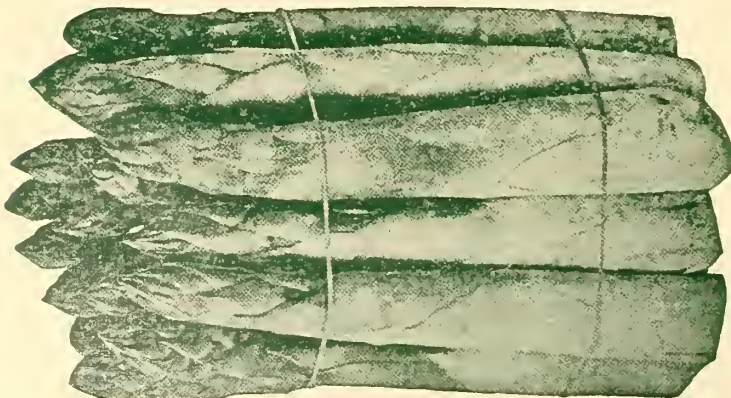

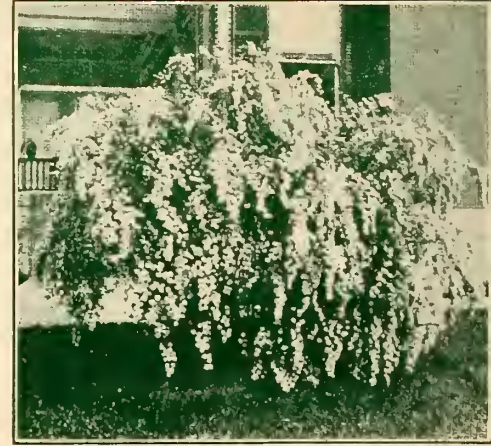
