CORRESPONDENCIA INTERCEPTADA
Continuacion de la carta de la Habana, fea
1.º de Octubre.

Se trataba de mandar igualmente algunos Centenares de Paños, mas rulos los que se pasan de una Compañia de Zapateros para los trabajos de esa, seria un de sacarla que haria levantar en maga d' esas gentes. No lo tenga usted por cuento: es verdad.

En expectativa de noticias de ustedes ha suspendido el General Vives la salida del correo hasta el dia seis. Si en este intermedio no viniere alguno de tantos barquichuelos como han ido, nuestros cuidados hiran en aumento. A no ser por el paquete ingles habiamos desesperado. De Orleans son 45 dias que no ha llegado un barco. Inculque Vd. en cuanto pueda á ese Gefe la frecuencia de comunicaciones.

Somos á 2 del mismo.
Ayer tarde entró de Cadiz la fragata española Espectacion: salió el 20 de Agosto y conduco al pie de doscientos reclutas para el Fije, y la importante noticia que sigue. Según noticias del ultimo correo se observaba un gran movimiento de tropas con direccion á la costa de Galicia, y en el apresto de los buques de guerra de la armada se habia mandado al Ferrol muchas mas artilleria de la que necesita el Heroe, y tanto por esta como por que los buques de guerra no tienen que ir á Nápoles á causa de habers resuelto el viaje de la presunta Rey por tierra, no se duda que el objeto de estas disposiciones es el envio de tropas para Méjico. En igual sentido escriben tambien de Madrid, designando 16 batallones los que deben embarcarse. Quien se hallaba hereño y loco de contento es Caucelada, habiendo llegado á Cadiz la Isidra no octubo entrada por la sanidad, que la destinó para Mahon, pero le rogó ochar algunas cartas. Por una preciosa que iba en ellas del Capitan Genl. y la publicó al momento, tuvo que sufrir mucho por parte de los que siempre lo ridiculizaban, pues la calificaron de especifico, pero se puso como un pabo real cuando recibió por conducta del Fiscal Figueroa una carta de este Capitan General incluyendole otra proclama. Luego, luego, publicó ambas piezas, y todos los charlatanes, e incrédulos emudecieron.

Animo Aviraneta, firmes en ese punto para que no se pierda la gloria del 21 de agosto; Enristre Vd la pluma y esparra por toda la Federacion Coletiana al similitud de los de Barradas para que se acredite con ellos el brillo de la empresa militar.

The London Times asserts the authority of official returns for the following facts, noticed in an article on malt duties and tavern licenses. "1st, that the population of England and Wales amounted, in the year 1750, or thereabouts, to not more than 6,500,000 of people (it is said to have been something less,) and that in 1828, it could not have fallen short (admitting the data of the successive returns from 1800 downwards) of 13,500,000. 2d, That the quantity of malt consumed in England was, in 1750, about 3,400,000 quarters, and, in 1828, about 3,140,000; so that the consumption of malt has been diminished near ten per cent., while the number of consumers has more than doubled."

Lake Champlain.—Previous to the construction of the Northern Canal, the commerce on this Lake was principally with Canada, and employed only about forty vessels. There are now upwards of two hundred and forty vessels, including steam boats, all fully employed in transporting the produce and merchandize which pass the canal, and the trade of the country has been diverted from Montreal to this haven. N. Y. Jour. of Com.

A chemist at Geneva has constructed a table of safety. Whoever would attempt to possess himself of the money that might be contained therein, without being in the secret, would find himself seized by four iron bands, a loud and noisy music, which plays for five minutes, announces the forcible detention of the captive; and as soon as it has ceased to play, a battery of six pistols closes the career of the thief, unless reasonable assistance arrives to save his life.

From the Boston Evening Bulletin.
A SPEECH
Delivered at a 4th of July dinner in the city of Boston.

"I shall propose, as a toast, the name of an illustrious Statesman, whose heart is, I trust, this day beating with emotions of the love of Liberty, the love of Country, and every noble sentiment, the other side of the mountains I allude to the glory of the West, the liberal and high-souled Republican; who has always been an honor to his country, and whom his country, in her turn, is always proud to honor. The history of M. Clay is a great and glorious subject for exultation to an American. It proves that talent and merit can neither be depressed nor trampled upon, in a country "where Liberty dwells", for the mountain oak can neither be withered by the chill of neglect, nor beaten down by the storms of opposition. No matter that Fortune smiles not on the birth of an individual, upon whom Heaven has set its brightest seal, the impress of Genius; no matter that no distinguished ancestors have raised the expectations of mankind, that the line of glory will be continued; this man's life is a proof, that virtues, talents and enterprises are more precious than riches; and that a man's best distinction, is that which is founded upon the basis of his own character. No bright star in the sky, no happy distinction, was the presage of his fame. The great men of the land came not to burn their incense, at his feet. He was not rocked in the cradle of glory. No strong hand was stretched forth to sustain his first steps, and he had no powerful influence to encourage his early efforts, for "infancy, ignorance and poverty," were his only patrimony. Yet we find him by his native energies, rising above the difficulties of his situation; distancing in the race of honor the competitors who had enjoyed every advantage, and at this day among the foremost of the great men of his nation.

Mr. Clay has been the able vindicator of his country's rights at home, and no less able defender of her rights, interests and glory abroad in the negotiations at Ghent, which produced a happy peace, with the only free country in Europe; and which I trust will be permanent as the principles of liberty, which form the best basis of the constitution of one country and the basis and the superstructure also of that of the other. The honor of that transaction has been claimed for one man, by some of his ardent supporters. But that inestimable honor belongs not alone to one, for is a mission that contained the names of Clay, Gallatin, Adams, Russell, and Bayard, who like the Bayard of former times, the flower of the chivalry of his age was "without fear, and with-

out reproach," it will not, cannot be believed, by any American who cherishes a just pride of country, that but one man could be found, to whom the glory of that negotiation was due.
But the most brilliant event of his life, is his enthusiastic defence of the cause of South American Freedom. So long as liberty shall exist, so long as our country shall preserve its independence; the name of Chatham, Fox, and Burke, the eloquent advocates of America will be revered for their services in that noble cause, by our citizens, and so long as South America shall enjoy the blessings of Freedom, the name of Clay will be dear to a great people, inhabiting the finest portion of the Globe. He has gained an exalted reputation among his fellow citizens, but others share with him, their respect and favor. But his glory in South America, is not shared with his rivals, and the monument which he has reared to his character in the hearts of her citizens is as imperishable as the love of liberty in the human breast."
