

The term biennial is applied to plants which flower the second season after planting and then perish. The term perennial is applied to plants which flower the second season after planting, and continue to flower year after year.

Culture.

Early in the spring make a trench about six inches deep, in rich, mellow soil so arranged that no water can stand in it, and plant the seed at the bottom, taking care not to cover it more than two inches. All Sweet Peas, but particularly the white seeded sorts, are often a little difficult to start. If the soil is too dry, they will remain a long time without germinating; if it is too wet and cold they will not sprout at all. In soils which are at all heavy or composed largely of clay, it will generally pay to put about two inches of sand in the bottom of the trench and to sow the seed on this, covering with more sand. Often it will be an a-ivantage to cover the row with a board so as to shed the rain and protect the soil from the hot sun, but care should be taken to remove this as soon as the young plants cut through the soil. When the plants are about five inches high, fill up the trench and furnish some support for the vines to run upon. The flowers should be picked before they form pods, or the plants will soon stop flowering.

Cupid Sweet Peas.

When the Cupid Sweet Pea was introduced, it seemed to most people that its distinct habits had so delighted its propagators that they had exaggerated its value, but continued trial demonstrates that in those localities where the conditions of soil and climate are favorable for its best development, it is even more valuable than was claimed. For growing in pots, for edgings and bedding, the Dwarf Sweet Peas are a valuable addition to our flowering plants. They require no support, but form a low, compact bush covered with large, finely formed flower.

Culture.

Cupid Sweet Peas require a well drained, rich soil, and care should be taken that the seed is not covered to exceed one inch in depth, and that the surface soil does not become caked or hard. Sow in a sunny situation somewhat later than other Sweet Peas, and give each plant plenty of room. The white seeded varieties are especially liable to rot if exposed to extreme moisture. They germinate best in moist, sandy soil. If such is not available a little damp sand should be placed in the bottom of a trench and the seed imbedded in it and then covered to a depth not exceeding one inch. Place a board over the row, supported two or three inches above the soil, so as to afford protection from rain and sun. Be careful to remove the board as soon as the young plants begin to appear.



Summer Flowering Tuberous Rooted Begonias.

These are among our finest bedding plants. They, however, seem yet to be appreciated but by only a portion of those who cultivate flowers. For some unknown reason the idea seems prevalent that their cultivation is difficult. We do not so consider it. They require a well enriched soil, a location partially shaded, and protection from severe winds. The soil should be moist but never soggy. Given these conditions, their culture is simple and easy. For best results, tubers should be started early in the house and then be planted out only when danger of frost is past. They -will come into flower very soon and bloom profusely and continuously until frost. The tubers can then be taken up and stored in dry sand in a moderately warm place.

The flowers are marvels of beauty—delicate yet brilliant, of beautiful form and very large, often measuring, when conditions are favorable, over four inches in diameter. In color they are extremely varied, ranging from pure white through many shades of pink and rose to scarlet and deed crimson, and from pale yellow to deep orange. The foliage is remarkably clean and healthy, varying in form, deep green, presenting a very pleasing contrast with
