Inform Bowman Percival continues stress importance of time lag between date private businessmen admitted Japan and date when Japanese Government or Japanese firms authorized to conclude export ^{import} transactions with private individuals and firms. He feels without such time lag of at least 30 to 60 days firms and individuals in Japan on date other foreign businessmen admitted (for example firms of neutrals and firms represented by Japanese nationals) would have unfair advantage over businessmen just arriving Japan. Please discuss with Pickell and suggest consideration delaying for some reasonable period approval all export import transactions arranged by individuals in Japan on date foreign traders permitted entry.

Percival also stresses importance including in announcement of date when private businessmen permitted enter Japan information on types business transactions to be permitted, and what commodities will continue to be sold only to governments.

Presume raw silk in latter category. Also presume cotton textiles must continue to be sold exclusively by USCC.

Dept has no further suggestions as to commodities not to be handled by private traders during initial period but suggests consideration be given to feasibility including in announcement of date reentry private businessmen complete list commodities to be available for purchase for export by private

traders during balance this year.

Mr. Skentelbery called in reference to a previous conversation on the above subject and gave Miss Wolberg the following information:

The six Irish nuns mentioned in the attached correspondence are leaving Cobh, Ireland on May 23 aboard the SS Marine Flasher which is due to arrive at New York on May 30. He said the sisters hope to enter Japan before June 30. He estimates it will take them about a month to go from New York to Japan.

Mr. Skentelbery requested that the Department endeavor to have the nuns' military permissions extended in view of the fact that Sister St. Enda's permission was granted on February 26 and for the others' on April 8 (the permissions are valid for 60 days only). Miss Wolberg said that the Department would communicate with the appropriate authorities on this matter and inform the Legation as soon as a reply was received. She requested that the information set forth above be confirmed in writing. Mr. Skentelbery said this would be done.

(During a previous conversation with Mrs. Flickinger, JCS, Miss Wolberg was informed that upon the receipt of a memorandum from the Department, the Joint Chiefs of Staff would consider extending the validity of the military permissions granted the six sisters.)

My dear Commander Millett:

I refer to a recent telephone conversation between Mrs. Flickinger of your office and an officer of the Department of State concerning six Irish nuns for whom permission has been granted for travel to Japan. It will be recalled that in a memorandum dated February 26, 1947 you indicated that theater clearance had been received for Sister St. Enda to return to Japan. Your memorandum of April 8, 1947 indicated that theater clearance had been received for the travel of the other five nuns to Japan.

As stated to Mrs. Flickinger, the Irish Legation has informed this Department that the six nuns mentioned above expect to depart from Cobh, Ireland on May 26, 1947 aboard the SS Marine Flasher which is scheduled to arrive at New York, New York on June 2, 1947. They expect to proceed to the West Coast and to travel from there by water to Japan arriving in Japan before June 30, 1947. According to numbered paragraph 8a(2) of the Supreme Commander's Circular No. 8, clearances for entry into Japan are valid for a period of 60 days only. Consequently, the Legation has requested that the Department of State endeavor to obtain an extension of the permissions granted in these six cases. It is understood from Mrs. Flickinger that the permissions can be extended by your office.

In view of the foregoing, I should appreciate being informed whether extensions may be granted in the six cases under reference.

1. At their 58th Meeting on 24 June 1947 the State-War-Navy Coordinating Committee approved SWNCC 348 as previously amended by SWNCC 348/1, subject to the qualifications in the enclosure to SWNCC 348/3.

2. In approving the above paper, the Committee agreed not to accept the amendment proposed by the Joint Chiefs of Staff in SWNCC 348/2. In lieu thereof, the Committee agreed that the United States Member on the Far Eastern Commission should be directed to make a statement to the Commission as provided in paragraph 4 of the enclosure to SWNCC 348/3.

3. The Committee also agreed to delete the cable proposed by the State Member in SWNCC 348/3, and that the War Department would take the matter up with General MacArthur directly.

S E C R E TE N C L O S U R EPOLICY FOR THE INTERCHANGE OF PERSONS
BETWEEN JAPAN AND OTHER COUNTRIES

Report by the
State-War-Navy Coordinating Subcommittee for the Far East

THE PROBLEM

1. To determine United States policy with respect to the interchange between Japan and other countries, during the period of occupation, of persons useful to the process of reorientation of the Japanese people.

FACTS BEARING ON THE PROBLEM

2. See Appendix "A".

DISCUSSION

3. See Appendix "B".

CONCLUSIONS

4. It is concluded that:

a. During the period of occupation and subject to the provisions of the following paragraphs there should be permitted between Japan and other countries an interchange of persons for educational, religious, scientific, informational and general cultural purposes including members of trade unions and related organizations and agencies whose purposes are recognized as democratic and who will contribute towards the process of reorientation. Such interchange shall include participation by the Japanese as well as other nationals in international conferences and conventions, in either Japan or other countries.

b. Each individual proceeding to or coming from Japan must be sponsored. In the case of U.S. citizens proceeding to Japan and Japanese nationals proceeding to the U.S.A., the eligibility of each person and that

of his sponsor should be approved by SCAP, the War Department and the Department of State. In the case of Allied persons proceeding to Japan and Japanese nationals proceeding to countries other than the U.S.A., the eligibility of each person and that of his sponsor should be approved by SCAP and the country or countries of destination or origin other than Japan. Communications regarding clearance for such persons should follow established governmental and military channels.

c. The total expenses outside of Japan, including travel, living and incidental costs of Japanese going from Japan, shall be defrayed by the non-Japanese nationals, institutions or governments of the country or the countries receiving or sponsoring such persons. The total expenses, including non-yen equivalent of yen used in Japan, of persons going to Japan shall also be defrayed by the non-Japanese nationals, institutions or governments sponsoring such persons. Such non-yen equivalent of yen used in Japan shall be made available in currencies usable by SCAP in payment for imports of goods or services to Japan.

d. For the purposes of this program no interchange shall be effected of persons who will engage in political or commercial activities except insofar as these activities are authorized by SCAP as contributing directly to the accomplishment of the objectives of the program.

e. Religious missionaries may engage in their normal pursuits in Japan subject to the conditions stated in Annexes "A" and "B" to Appendix "A".

f. Interchange of students, teachers and other personnel engaged in social, natural, medical or other related scientific studies, teaching or research shall be permitted provided such personnel and studies are of a non-military character and contribute to the process of democratization or otherwise further the purposes of the occupation.

g. The general program shall be prepared by SCAP in consultation with the State and War Departments and with the foreign governments concerned. Such a program for the exchange of persons should take into consideration the needs and objectives of the occupation and the conditions and facilities available both in Japan and the countries concerned.

RECOMMENDATIONS

5. It is recommended that:

a. This paper be referred to the JCS for comment.

b. Provided the JCS have no objections from the military point of view, this paper be approved by SWNCC and forwarded to the State and War Departments for guidance; and that thereafter

c. The conclusions be forwarded by the Department of State to the U.S. representative on the FEC for submission to that body as a statement of the U.S. policy, and

d. The JCS be requested to forward the conclusions to SCAP for his information.

S E C R E TAPPENDIX "A"FACTS BEARING ON THE PROBLEM1. SWNCC 162/2 - Reorientation of the Japanese.

"4. c. Because of the inherent nature of the problem, the basic planning program for and continuing development of a U.S. program of reorientation and reeducation is an appropriate responsibility of the Department of State subject to existing arrangements with respect to control machinery for Japan and the channel of command for issuing instructions to SCAP.

"d. The Department of State should immediately undertake basic planning for and the development of such a program for the approval of SWNCC, and where necessary, for that of FEC. Such a program should be implemented by SCAP and where appropriate and after coordination with SCAP by the Department of State in the United States.

"e. This program should be considered as a matter of priority and should be given adequate support in funds, material and facilities to insure that maximum advantage is taken of present more favorable psychological conditions of the Japanese people."

2. SC-034/1. External Relations of Japanese Trade Unions.

"1. The Steering Committee of the Far Eastern Commission at its twenty-sixth meeting, 20 August 1946, agreed that the problem of external relations of Japanese trade unions should be considered as part of Japanese external relations in general exclusive of diplomatic, political, trade and commerce relations. The Soviet Member reserved his position on this paragraph."

3. SC-038. Civilians Permitted to Enter and Leave Japan.

"1. At the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth meetings of the Steering Committee, the United States member agreed to request information of his government with respect to categories of people permitted to enter and leave Japan.

"2. The Enclosure, a reply from the United States Department of State to the request of the United States member for this information and presented by him at the twenty-seventh meeting of the Steering Committee, is circulated for the information of the Far Eastern Commission and referred to COMMITTEE NO. 4: STRENGTHENING OF DEMOCRATIC TENDENCIES for consideration in connection with SC-034, External Relations of Japanese Trade Unions.

E N C L O S U R ECIVILIANS PERMITTED TO ENTER AND LEAVE JAPAN

22 August 1946

"With reference to your request regarding civilians exclusive of Government employees who have received permission to enter Japan I have been informed that only missionaries and religious workers are permitted to enter that country. According to Commander Mellett of the Military Permit Office, there have been approximately 90 such missionaries and religious workers who have been given permission to go to Japan since the close of the hostilities.

"With regard to the number of Japanese subjects who have been permitted to leave Japan since the end of the hostilities for the purpose of visiting another country, the only information I have been able to obtain is that there has been only one Japanese permitted to leave Japan for the United States. This person was a Mrs. Uemura, a Christian worker who was invited to come to this country for the purpose of participating in religious conferences."

S E C R E TANNEX "A" TO APPENDIX "A"MESSAGE FROM GENERAL MACARTHUR TO THE WAR DEPARTMENT,
29 DECEMBER 1945

It is my policy to permit the return of missionaries to Japan to the maximum extent practicable. It is proposed to approve the return of all those missionaries who have previous service in Japan as rapidly as applications are received provided that the sect sponsoring their return can furnish assurance that it has available suitable living accommodations and will provide maintenance which will guarantee that the individuals will not become a burden on the occupation forces. This policy is to apply whether the missionary is male or female.

Under current economic directives the assurances of financial support of missionaries must be based entirely on church resources in Japan. Assurances of living accommodations must be based on investigation of local conditions by church representatives. Assurances of food must be based on arrangements between church representatives in Japan and the Japanese Government. Those sects which at present have no representation in Japan are not in a position to guarantee suitable conditions for reception of their missionaries. In order to provide an equitable basis for returning missionaries of all sects which had representation in Japan prior to the war, it would be desirable for such sects not presently represented here to return representatives qualified to investigate local conditions and church resources available.

Authority would be needed to furnish such representatives food, yen funds, housing, and transportation until they can establish themselves, at which time they could assume responsibility for giving this headquarters the necessary assurances on which return of other missionaries may be based. It is believed that families should not be returned to Japan until the present living conditions have materially improved. This may take place in the case of individual families progressively and each case should be carefully examined on its merits.

The foregoing policy has been stated on the basis of returning missionaries who have actual experience here. It may be extended to include new missionaries upon receipt of adequate assurance of individuals, preparation to cope with the language and other local problems of the country.

The following broadened general regulations will be substituted for the policy announced in our CX 56466 (Annex "A"). It is the policy of this theater to increase greatly the Christian influence and every effort will be made here to absorb missionaries as rapidly as the church can send them into the area. The basis to insure their economy and domiciliary arrangements are stated herein.

Missionaries will be cleared for entry into Japan if assurances can be given that adequate shelter is owned or is available for lease in Japan for the use of missionaries for whom assurances are given. Such assurances should be based on actual surveys to determine the availability of such property. Property which is under requisition by the United States Army may not be used as the basis for assurances; however, upon application by the proper representatives consideration will be given where military necessity permits to the return of property to its owners in order that it may be used as the basis for assurances.

In addition to assurances required in respect to shelter, further assurances must be given that food and clothing in adequate quantities are available from church resources in Japan to support the missionaries for whom clearance is sought, or that arrangements will be made for supplementary shipment of food and clothing to Japan which will be used exclusively for the support of missionaries.

Organizations which have no missionaries in Japan to give assurances may send a representative who will be temporarily

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supported from United States Army sources on a reimbursable basis until such time as they can become self sufficient. These representative missionaries will conduct on the ground surveys in order to provide necessary assurances for the return of operating missionaries.

It is preferable that missionaries with prior service return to Japan. However, missionaries who have had no prior service in Japan may be cleared if they are to become associated directly with missionaries who are in Japan and who have had prior service in Japan. Assurances must be given that those without prior service in Japan possess a working knowledge of spoken Japanese, or that by the nature of their work no language qualification is necessary.

No discrimination will be made because of sex or nationality among Bona Fide Missionaries. Dependents of missionaries will not be admitted unless they are Bona Fide Missionaries in their own right. When assurances have been made that shelter is available to missionaries, the representative or board making such assurances should at the same time request authorization to ship any food, clothing or other immediate necessities required on a space available, revenue or commercial basis. These shipments should be sufficient to prevent the missionaries from becoming a charge upon the occupation forces and should be in addition to normal baggage and household goods. Such shipments should insofar as practicable accompany the individuals concerned. Request will, however, be honored from duly designated representatives of various organizations and sects to authorize the shipment of additional food, clothing and other necessary supplies after the arrival of operating missionaries. Such shipments may not exceed one ton per individual per annum. Requests for additional special shipments which are too large for international mail will be considered on their own merits. If shipment of household goods is desired, application for such shipment should be made

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at the time necessary assurances are given in connection with request for clearance. Such household goods may be shipped on a space available, revenue or commercial basis.

Use of United States Army supplies and facilities will be extended to operating missionaries only in cases of emergency on a reimbursable basis to prevent extreme hardship and suffering and then only to the same extent and on the same basis as such privileges are available to other individuals of the same nationality. However, minimum assistance to prevent hardship will be provided upon their arrival on a revenue basis and transportation will be arranged for operating missionaries from the port of debarkation to the rail station nearest their ultimate destination only.

Special visits by high officials in the organization or hierarchy of any church will be considered on their own merits as an exception to the above policy.

S E C R E TAPPENDIX "B"DISCUSSION

1. The Potsdam Declaration states in part that "The Japanese Government shall remove all obstacles to the revival and strengthening of democratic tendencies among the Japanese people. Freedom of speech, of religion, and of thought, as well as respect for the fundamental human rights shall be established". To that end, it would appear essential that the Japanese people be allowed to resume contact at the earliest possible date with all democratic peoples, the more effectively to expedite the reeducation of Japan in the democratic way of life.

2. An interchange of persons in the fields of education, religion, science, information and general culture between Japan and democratic countries will further Japanese reeducation in the following respects:

a. It will assist the Japanese in overcoming their nationalistic isolation in the spiritual and intellectual spheres by the reestablishment of personal ties with citizens of democratic countries.

b. It will provide an effective means of countering the undermining influences of Japanese militarists and reactionaries by enabling reliable Japanese to gain first-hand knowledge of the ways of democracy in other countries.

c. It will assist in achieving the aims of the occupation by providing additional personnel for the reorientation of the Japanese people toward democracy and peace.

d. It will enable the citizens of democratic countries to acquire direct appreciation and understanding of the problems of Japanese reorientation and of the work necessary for their successful solution.

3. Subject to the favorable development of Japanese reorientation, the interchange of persons should be conducted increasingly on a private basis, in the educational, religious,

scientific, informational, and cultural spheres or in other areas of importance for the spiritual and intellectual reorientation of the Japanese people toward peace and democracy. Until such a time, however, as interchange can be placed largely on a private basis, SCAP, in consultation with appropriate U.S. governmental agencies and with the foreign governments concerned, should have the responsibility for formulating and executing a positive program of interchange of persons which will provide the Japanese with knowledge of the achievements of democratic nations.

4. In selecting persons for the purposes defined under paragraph 2, the following types of individuals shall be regarded as particularly suitable:

a. Leaders in education--professors, teachers and other persons concerned with educational affairs.

b. Leaders in religious activities, wherever they would contribute to freedom of religion or the spread of other democratic ideals.

c. Leaders in science--social, natural, medical and other related sciences conducive to the development of a peaceful and democratic Japan.

d. Leaders in informational and related fields of activity, such as press, radio and films.

e. Leaders in civic, welfare, youth, social and other organizations.

f. Leaders in occupational and professional organizations, such as agricultural associations and representatives of trade unions.

g. Leaders in art, letters, music and the stage.

h. Qualified students from institutions of learning, trainees, and professional research experts.

5. Approval of persons should be carried out as follows:

a. Certification must be made by each applicant that his trip will not be utilized to serve commercial or political interests. The trip of each applicant must be

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sponsored by an organization, institution or an agency either official or private.

b. The total number of applicants for entry into Japan should be limited by the nature and objectives of the control machinery and the problem of living conditions in Japan.

c. In the case of U.S. citizens proceeding to Japan and Japanese nationals proceeding to the U.S.A., the eligibility of each person and that of his sponsor should be approved by SCAP, the War Department and the Department of State. Such approval shall depend on the results of a thorough security check made by the appropriate agencies in Japan and the United States, and submitted with full information on each candidate to SCAP, to the War Department and to the Department of State. It shall be understood that, in case of reasonable doubt regarding a candidate, his application shall be disapproved.

d. In the case of Allied persons proceeding to Japan and Japanese nationals proceeding to countries other than the U.S.A., the eligibility of each person and that of his sponsor should be approved by SCAP and the country or countries of destination or origin other than Japan. Such approval shall depend on the results of a thorough security check made by the appropriate agencies in Japan and in the foreign countries concerned and submitted with full information on each candidate to SCAP. It shall be understood that, in case of reasonable doubt regarding a candidate, his application shall be disapproved.

6. Payment of Expenses. SCAP should be responsible for restricting yen funds of persons visiting Japan to amounts required for reasonable personal expenses. In the case of United States nationals, each person should submit for prior approval of the War and State Departments, a certified statement of sources of funds to cover his or her expenses. The sponsoring person, institution or government is responsible for making

arrangements for all necessary expense payments. Yen may be purchased by methods currently authorized (e.g., through War Department, National City Bank, etc.). Currency other than dollars, if usable by SCAP for purchases of imports or services, may be accepted in payment for regular yen. "Type A yen" for expenditure in Army Post Exchanges must be procured with dollars. Any compensation received by Japanese nationals in the democratic country visited, over and above actual expenses, shall be exchanged for yen at the prevailing rate, and the equivalent shall be deposited in a special fund for cultural purposes. This fund may be drawn upon to defray expenses involving currencies other than yen which are not covered by the sources listed above.

Miss Wolberg called in reference to Commander Millett's memorandum of May 29, 1947 indicating that his office "has no objection to the extension of clearances for above individuals entering Japan as requested." Miss Wolberg indicated that she was not clear on the meaning of the memorandum, particularly with respect to the length of the extension which had been granted. She pointed out that clearance had been received from JCS for Sister St. Enda on February 26 and for the other five Sisters on April 8 and that the clearances are good for only 60 days.

Commander Millett said that in all six cases we might consider the validity of the permissions extended to July 15, 1947 and that this telephone conversation could be used as the basis for informing the Irish Legation in the premises. In answer to Miss Wolberg's inquiry, Commander Millett stated that his office, upon receipt of a memorandum from SPD, would be glad to issue a transit permit through Japan for the above-mentioned Chinese nationals. He said he saw no point in having them apply through the Chinese representative at Tokyo in view of the time element involved.

During the course of the conversation Commander Millett mentioned a telegram received in his office today from SCAP recommending that American Consuls in various cities throughout the world be authorized to issue transit permits through Japan to American nationals. Commander Millett seemed to think that a similar recommendation would be forthcoming from SCAP with respect to transit permits through Japan for aliens. (He indicated that his office is fully authorized to issue transit visas through Japan in a case like this one.)

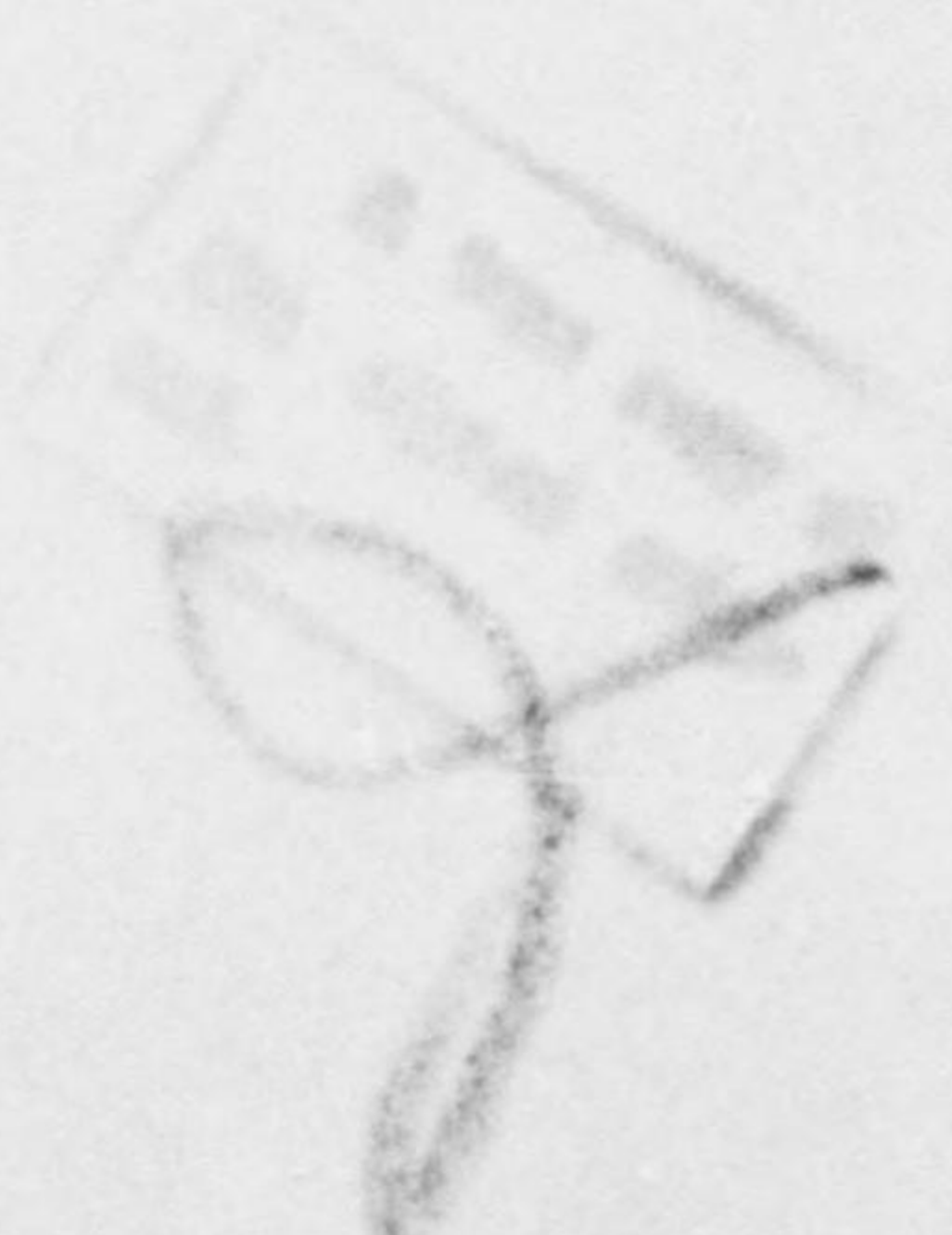

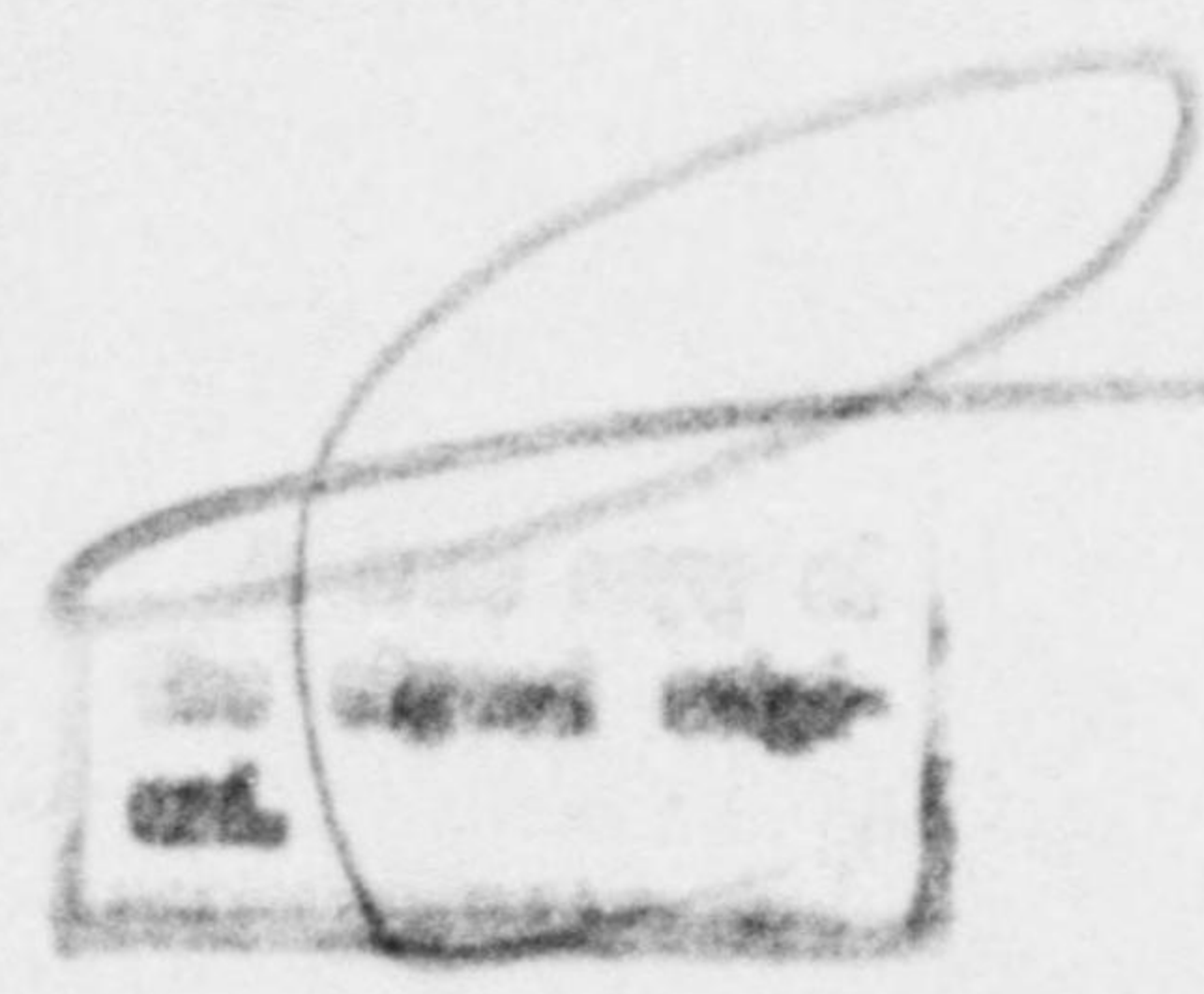

Official of Foreign Office has inquired orally if an Uruguayan consul could be sent now or in the near future to Japan and if so what authority in Japan would issue an exequatur.

If no consuls are to be received in Japan now or in the near future (as the Embassy assumes is the case), the official of the Foreign Office desires to be informed tentatively if Uruguay might send to Japan a liaison officer or trade representative (probably the latter). If the reply were affirmative, could the Uruguayan liaison officer or trade representative execute the usual shipping documents for exports from Japan to Uruguay? (It is understood that the Uruguayan representative in Japan would have the principle duty of endeavoring to sell Uruguayan products, especially wool, in exchange for Japanese products.) Prior to the war Uruguay had consuls in Japan.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILES:

Reference the underlying despatch No. 3148 of June 4, 1947 from Budapest transmitting the request of Mrs. Maria Dajkovich, a Hungarian national, for permission to enter Japan.

In view of the fact that the Supreme Commander at Tokyo appears to have granted clearance for Mrs. Dajkovich to enter Japan and to have notified the Military Permit Secretary, Joint Chiefs of Staff, Washington (See enclosure to despatch), Miss Wolberg telephoned Mrs. Flickinger in Captain Keough's office, Military Permit Section, Civil Affairs Division, War Department (formerly Military Permit Secretariat, Joint Chiefs of Staff) to check on the matter. Mrs. Flickinger stated that on January 23, 1947 the Military Permit Secretary had sent a memorandum to Mr. Meyer, VD, indicating that clearance had been granted for Mrs. Dajkovich to enter Japan and suggesting the appropriate Hungarian authorities be notified.

Miss Wolberg checked with Mr. Hutchison and Mr. Meyer, VD, and with VD's file room only to be informed that VD has no record of the above-mentioned memorandum of January 23. A check with DC/R likewise reveals no correspondence concerning Maria Dajkovich. In view of the foregoing, Miss Wolberg requested the Military Permit Section (Mrs. Flickinger's secretary) to send over a copy of the memorandum of January 23. Further action will be taken on this case upon receipt of the memorandum.

*Relative to Edward Sandrock, from information gathered locally, he should be permitted to return to his mission post in Japan. He has no Nazi or Fascist tendencies. The reason for his leaving Tsinan is that no American brothers of the Society of Mary (Marianists) are available for Li Ming School in Tsinan. Li Ming School will henceforth be conducted by Chinese brothers of this order.

"Sandrock spent the majority of his missionary life in Japan and as an old gentleman nearly 70, I feel it would be wise to allow him to spend his remaining years in the school to which he gave the best years of his life."

Mr. Skentelbery telephoned in reference to the Department's note of June 10, 1947 in which it is stated that the validity of the military permission for the above-mentioned nuns has been extended to July 15, 1947. Mr. Skentelbery stated that the nuns had been unable to get passage until July 11 and that on that date they were to leave San Francisco for Yokohama aboard the SS GENERAL MEIGS. He pointed out that they would not arrive in Yokohama until July 27 and that consequently they would need a further extension of their military permission.

Miss Wolberg then telephoned Mrs. Flickinger to see what could be done. Mrs. Flickinger stated that ordinarily a formal request from the Department to Commander Millett would be necessary to enable JCS to extend the permission but that if the Department were willing in this case to act on the basis of a telephone conversation, she could say that the validity of the permission in each of the six cases under reference could be considered extended to August 15, 1947. Miss Wolberg said that she would discuss the matter with Mr. Hibbard and let Mrs. Flickinger know whether this conversation would be sufficient or whether a letter would be forthcoming from the Department requesting the extension.

My dear Commander Millett:

I refer to a telephone conversation of June 13, 1947 between Mrs. Flickinger of your office and an officer of the Department of State concerning six Irish nuns for whom permission has been granted for travel to Japan. You will recall that the period of validity of their permits has already been extended until July 15, 1947.

Mrs. Flickinger was informed that the Irish Legation has reported to the Department that the six Irish nuns have arrived in the United States from Ireland. They have, however, been unable to arrange to leave the United States for Japan until July 11, 1947 aboard the SS General Meigs which is understood to be scheduled to leave San Francisco on that date and to arrive in Yokohama on July 27. In as much as the validity period of the nuns' permits to enter Japan now extends only until July 15, the Irish Legation has requested that the Department of State endeavor to obtain an extension of the validity period of their permits beyond July 27.

I would appreciate, therefore, being informed whether, in each of the cases under reference, the validity period of their permission to enter Japan may be extended until August 15, 1947.

In the event that circumstances permit their travel from Japan to Argentina the Argentine Government will assume responsibility for any expenses involved therein.

If circumstances permit, the Political Adviser is requested, as a good office for the Argentine Government, to ascertain and report any information available in connection with the request contained in the enclosed note, mentioned above. Upon the receipt of this report the Argentine Embassy at Washington will be informed accordingly. It is assumed that particular mention should be made regarding any documentation possessed or needed by the persons concerned. These persons may in the discretion of the Political Adviser be informed of the interest of the Argentine Government in them.

A number of my clients have asked me to ascertain the procedure to be followed in applying for entry into Japan under the recently publicized program for the resumption of trade with that country.

As you know, Hawaii has a very large Japanese population. Many American merchants of Japanese ancestry here were engaged in commercial activity with Japan prior to the war and have valuable contacts there with which they are anxious to resume business. Furthermore, there is a definite demand for Japanese made articles in the Territory.

I should greatly appreciate being advised as to the steps that must be taken by persons wishing to participate in the new program and also as to whether United States citizens only are eligible or whether Japanese nationals in the United States with no record of subversive activity may also enter Japan.

Would you also be kind enough to forward any announcements, regulations, application forms or other materials that might be of help?

As regular mail from the mainland is slow and as I am anxious to secure this information at the earliest moment, I enclose air mail stamps. Thanking you for any assistance you may be able to afford in this matter and hoping for an early reply,

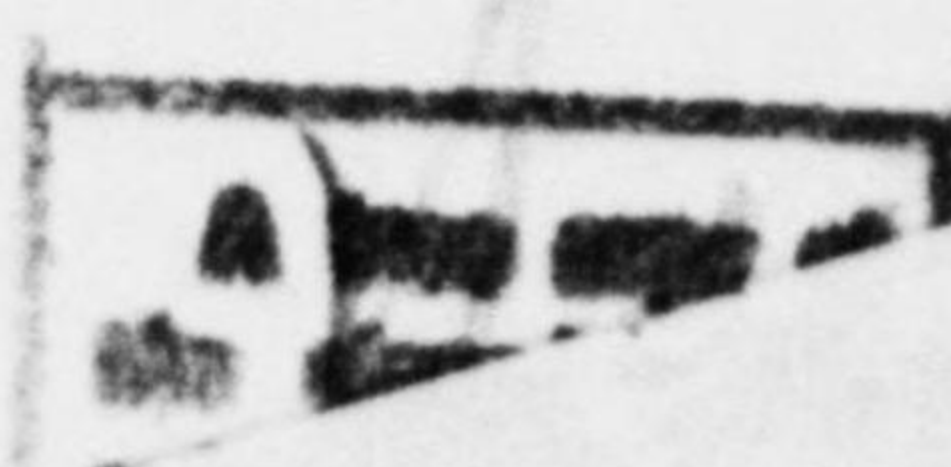

Mr. Braun may apply to the Turkish Government for a passport, explaining the types of products he wishes to buy. The Government in turn will obtain a military permit from the occupation authorities. The application may be made now, but travellers may not arrive in Japan until August 15, and contracts may not be finalized until September 1.
