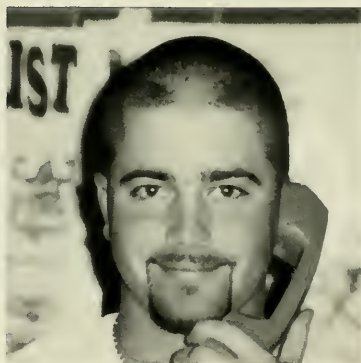

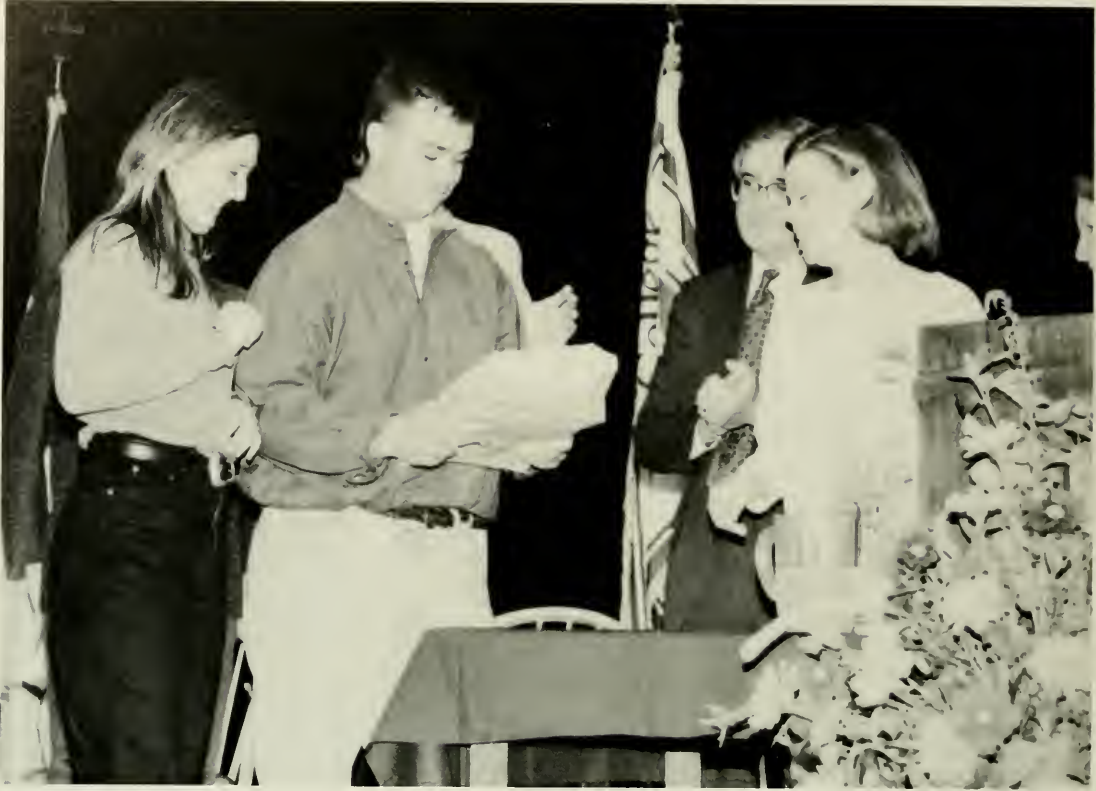

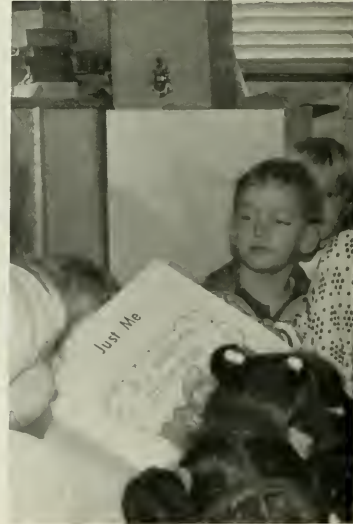

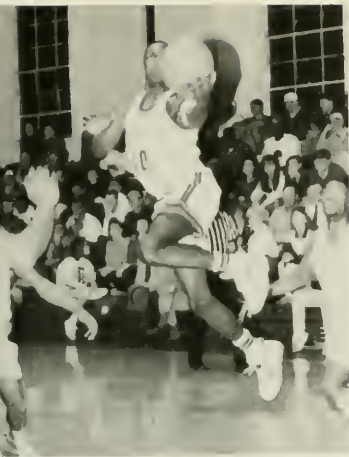

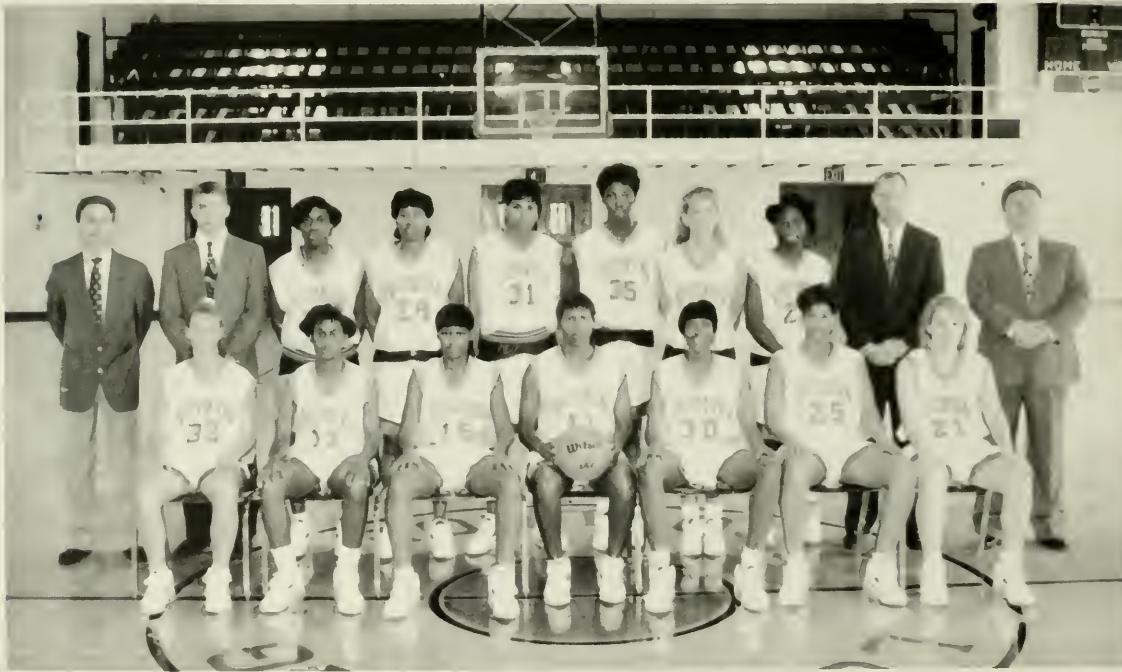

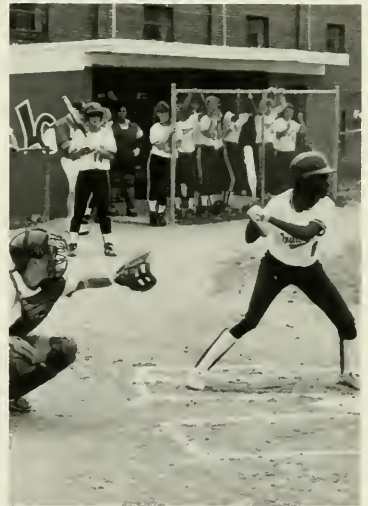

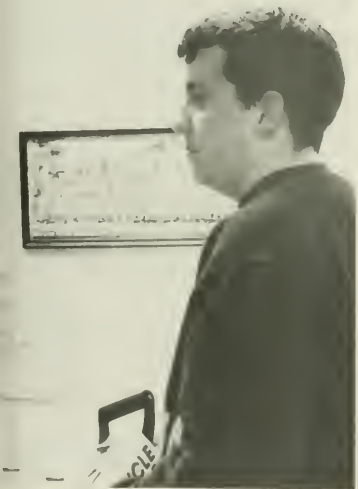

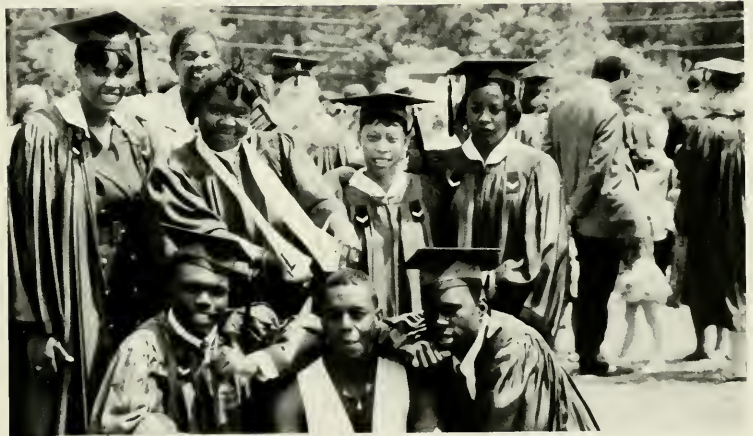

Good-bye Louisburg!!

The 1993-94 school year was a period of transition. The College had gained a new President in January of 1993. Nineteen ninety-three/ninety-four saw a number of President May's dreams begin to take shape, among these the creation of the Assistant Dean for Residence Life position, which greatly benefitted the residence halls. Many new faces appeared on campus, including that of the new Dean of Students. Under Dean Krause's leadership, policy changes occurred and the College obtained the services of Burns International Security. This was a year of planning. The College made plans for major renovations in the residence halls, cable hook-ups and telephone service in every residence hall room, and electronic key card access to the residence hall buildings.

At first, in the midst of all of the changes, it appeared as though the College would not be able to publish any type of record of the class of 1993-94. The Academic Affairs Office was unable to locate any faculty members willing to take on the responsibility of the yearbook. Some students went to Dean Keller and expressed their concern that *The Oak* would not be published in 1994. Dean Keller agreed to work on coming up with an alternative publication since a regular yearbook would not be published. She approached Dean Krause about the idea of putting together a "memory book" for the students. In January, Dean Krause and Dean Keller, along with Dr. May, the Business Manager, the Director of Public Relations, and two students, met with a representative from Josten's and came up with a plan for a small, soft-cover book that could be published with limited funds and limited staff.

Thanks to the efforts of volunteers, this year's "alternative version" of *The Oak* came to be. Two students who had worked on *The Oak* the previous year, Mojdeh Ghoddoussi and Danney Coon, agreed to serve as editors. A major problem, however, was what to do about pictures since there was no "yearbook photographer" and no photographic equipment. The Louisburg College students pitched in and, in response to announcements sent out by Dean Keller, donated hundreds of pictures for the effort. This book would not have been possible without the help of all those students. The memory book staff would like to thank everyone who donated pictures, including Director of Public Relations, Jeff Prince. *The Oak* staff also would like to thank Kevin Marshburn for volunteering his time to crop all of the pictures in the layout process. We hope that you will enjoy looking back on some of the good times at Louisburg College and that this book will bring back many happy memories for you.

Beginning with the 1994-95 school year, publication of *The Oak* will fall under Student Affairs. Look for the full version of *The Oak* to be back in 1994-95!
