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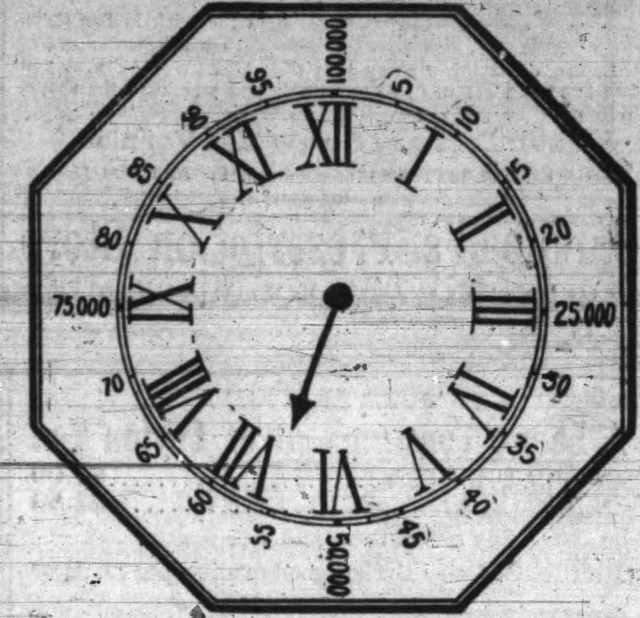

KING OF ITALY STIRS OFFICIALS

DISSATISFIED WITH
WORK AT MESSINA

Epidemic is Feared With Arrival of Warm Weather.

Rome, April 23.—Exceedingly dissatisfied with the conditions he found at Messina early in the month, King Victor has been stirring up the officials in charge of the improvement work there so vigorously that more has been accomplished since April 6th than during the entire preceding months from December 2nd, when the city was destroyed.

There was a decided flutter in official circles when the king and queen announced their intention of visiting the scene of the earthquake this month, and strong efforts were made to dissuade them. The king and queen insisted in going over the entire city alone, on talking with the refugees and on investigating fully for themselves everything that had been done and the reasons for the omissions of the numerous things that had not been done at all.

In some respects their majesties found the ruined metropolis in worse condition than immediately after the earthquake. Of sanitation there has not even been a pretence since the city was wrecked, and between the decaying corpses, of which there are still thousands in the debris, and the subsequent accumulation of filth, incidental to the continued residence of a considerable number of survivors in the vicinity, there is every prospect of a frightful epidemic with the arrival of warm weather. No arrangement has been made for the removal of the wreckage. No streets have been opened. At night the community is in darkness. There is no water supply. Not even a start has been made on the reconstruction of any buildings of importance. Efforts at private enterprise appeared actually to be discouraged.

WILL USE ELECTRICITY ON ROAD IN CASCADES

Great Northern Power Plant Near Leavenworth About Completed.

Seattle, April 23.—May 20th is the date now set by the Great Northern railway for changing its motive power from steam to electricity in handling traffic through the Cascades. The four big electric locomotives are all ready for use at the Everett shops, and there remains but a few details in completing the equipment of the plant in the Tum-water canyon, near Leavenworth, where the power plant is located and which will furnish 10,000 horse-power. The electric locomotives will run between Leavenworth and Wellington, a distance of thirty-six miles. Each engine will have a hauling power of 1,500 tons.

MACEDONIAN IS MURDERED IN TORONTO

Believed to Have Been Slain in Row in His House.

Toronto, April 22.—The body of Vani Simoff, a Macedonian, aged about 65 years, was found in the cellar of his house on Eastern avenue this morning. He had been murdered with a hatchet. The body was hacked to pieces. Simoff was employed in the Grand Trunk roundhouse at night. He left the roundhouse at 7 o'clock this morning, and at 8:30 his body was found by a Macedonian, Polis Steoff. Steoff, who gave the alarm, was placed under arrest as a material witness, and all the other people who reside in the house will be arrested as quickly as they are located.

As Simoff's watch and a small sum of money were found in his pockets, and over \$1,000 in gold sewed in his clothes, robbery was evidently not the motive. It is thought that a row occurred after Simoff entered the house, but nothing definite has been learned as yet.

INSURANCE INQUIRY BECOMING LIVELY

Washington Official Says He Obeyed Instructions of Secretary of State.

Olympia, Wash., April 23.—Fur is likely to fly in the legislative insurance investigation when Secretary of State Sam Nicholas takes the stand.

State Insurance Commissioner Schively yesterday endeavored to place the entire blame for the criticisms of his office on Nicholas, saying that every move he had made had been upon Nicholas' orders and that half of all the money collected had been turned over to Nicholas.

Schively said that he was glad that the new law had been passed and that he favored it, so that a deputy no longer would have to suffer the entire blame for simply following out the orders of his superior.

When Nicholas is called to the stand to explain Schively's charges, it is expected that some sensational testimony will result.

LOSSES FORTUNE; STEALS LOAF OF BREAD

Woman After Squandering \$75,000 is in Toils of the Law.

New York, April 23.—After losing her fortune of \$75,000 at race tracks and in pool rooms, Mrs. Anna Trafford, widow of John Trafford, a Peruvian mining promoter, is in the toils of the law.

Mrs. Trafford was arrested on a charge of stealing a loaf of bread and a bottle of milk with which to break a fast, of many days.

SUCCESSFUL SEASON AT DOMINION HATCHERY

Four Million Three Hundred
Thousand Young Sockeyes
Liberated This Spring.

A very successful season's work has been done during the season at the Skeena river hatchery of the Dominion government. Four million three hundred thousand young sockeyes have been liberated in the river this spring, half of which, if they live, would have the effect of materially increasing the catch four years from now.

The steamer Vado, which arrived from the Skeena yesterday, brought the manager of the hatchery, Thomas Whitwell, S. Whitwell, G. Kelly and B. Johnson. The party made the trip down the river in a canoe. The river was, at the time they left, free from ice from the Kittelas canyon to the mouth, although the water was very low.

RIGHTS OF PUBLIC
ARE SAFEGUARDED

Executive Council Settles
Long-pending Question
After Consideration.

Careful and lengthy consideration has been given by the executive council to the application of the Vancouver Power Company, one of the B. C. Electric Railway Company's corporations, for permission to raise its dam at Coquitlam lake to a height of sixty feet, and yesterday afternoon it was decided to grant the request.

This matter has been before council for many months, and several sittings were held for the purpose of hearing the application and the objections made, and adjustments were granted to enable engineers to examine the site and report.

The company has a large dam at the mouth of the lake to create a head of water for power generation purposes, and is desirous of greatly increasing the size of it so as to obtain a big addition to the horse-power available. Its application was opposed determinedly from two sides. The city of New Westminster gets its water from the lake and rejoices in an almost absolutely pure supply. As the raising of the lake level will naturally flood a certain amount of the wooded land around the lake the people of the Royal City are afraid that the water will be contaminated by the decaying vegetation in the flooded area. A special dispatch to the Montreal Herald from Quebec dated April 16th, says: "Whereas the territory of Ungava in question in one of the resolutions above set forth and adopted by the parliament of Canada at its last session, geographically forms part of the province of Quebec and it is in the interest of such territory as well as in that of the province, that it be annexed to the territory of the province of Quebec:

"Be it resolved: That the Lieutenant-Governor in-Council with the Governor of Canada in-Council respecting the annexation to the province of Quebec of all territory situated to the north of the northern frontier of this province and extending to Hudson's Straits, between the bay so named and the Atlantic ocean, or the strip of territory which may belong to Newfoundland, along the shore of such ocean, including on the west coast the archipelago and island adjoining the mainland, as well as the following islands and groups of islands: Ottawa, Sleepers, Sakley's, Dosen, Belchers, North Belchers, King George, Mansfield, Charles, and all the islands of Ungava bay, and the Button Islands, upon such terms and conditions as may be accepted by the government of Canada and that of this province."

BEARS IN CONTROL OF WHEAT PIT

Force Prices Up and Down at Will—Recovery Near Close.

(Times Leased Wire.)
Chicago, April 23.—The bears played with the wheat market to-day, advancing and forcing it lower at their will. The closing was to be a bushel above the final figures of yesterday.

Information which came from the growing wheat was principally of the bearish order, and this brought about the same very severe selling pressure. Liverpool was the safety valve of the world's market to-day, and its sharp recovery after a most serious decline was what caused the advance of 2 cents a bushel in the May option here at the opening of the market this morning. May started at \$1.23, compared with the close at \$1.21 yesterday. At the opening July went to \$1.24, as compared with \$1.05 at the closing yesterday; September started at \$1.04, the same as yesterday, and while the December was 10c. lower at \$1.00.

Liverpool opened 1 1/2c. to 1c. lower and closed unchanged to 1c. under yesterday. Weakness developed in the market after the opening, and prices at one time during the early trade were carried about a cent below yesterday's close, but this was recovered at a later hour with short covering.

TEMPERANCE TEACHING IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Mrs. Spofford Advocates it at Meeting of W. C. T. U.

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the W. C. T. U. was held yesterday afternoon at the home of Mrs. McAdams, Fraser street, Esquimalt, with the president, Mrs. Thompson, in the chair, and the secretary and a large number of members present. The meeting was in charge of Mrs. Spofford, and after the usual opening exercises, she gave a very interesting and instructive address on Scientific Temperance, handling it in a way which showed a thorough mastery of the subject. After some introductory remarks the speaker said in part:

"In the light of many years work as a teacher of total abstinence from alcoholic poisoning, I solemnly aver that had I the power our system of education would be so changed that the course of study for every pupil from the kindergarten, toddler to the high school graduate should be founded where God founds our very being—on natural laws. They should know the laws of health since their physical being is the firm base of the whole character. The body was intended as the temple of the Holy Spirit, but alcoholic and nicotine poison leagued with bad food, unnatural dress, bad ventilation and ill proportioned exercise are demons that hold the sacred citadel. God's laws written in our members we pass lightly over that we may learn man's formula for parading a verb or construing a foreign quotation. When we study the natural sciences we soar amid the stars, and hammer the rocks or dissect the flowers, but place the study of our own wise splendid mechanism at the foot of the list, instead of building the white edifice of education upon the solid rock against which the gates of hell shall not prevail. Yet we call ourselves a science loving people, and think we know God's reason why. So said Francis E. Willard years ago and in creating in the Woman's Christian Temperance Union the department of scientific temperance instruction, her prophetic vision then beheld what we now see, every child in the public schools of America being taught first of all to know itself.

"There are four virtues which may be said to be the cardinal points of character—sobriety, integrity, industry and gentleness.

"But how shall the young avoid this great peril and the nation be saved from drunkenness? Only by being taught, not alone by the religious or moral agencies of the country, but by the state, which recognizes itself as the educator of the nation. In the geography lessons of the public school should be included the maelstrom of moderate drinking the Niagara of drunkenness. In learning grammar the importance of the verb 'to be' and 'to do,' as related to a boy's life, proceedings, should be emphasized. The true solution of many knotty problems of life are of most importance, and should receive more study than mathematical problems do.

"With regard to this important instruction our Canadian schools are far behind those of the United States. In nearly all provinces the educational department provides for optional teaching only and no examination on the subject. We are without textbooks from which to give instruction. Though in all provinces the number of educationalists who are deeply interested in the study of the question is rapidly increasing.

In response to an invitation from the Dominion W. C. T. U. the following gentlemen consented to act as an advisory board to assist in the selection of a text book, which can be recommended as a uniform book of instruction for the scholars of the Dominion. For New Brunswick, D. Inch, chief inspector of schools; for Quebec, Principal Rexford, Montreal; for Ontario, Newton Powell, K. C., Toronto; for Manitoba, Prof. Stewart, Waseley college, Winnipeg; for Alberta and Saskatchewan, Dr. Riddell, Edmonton; for British Columbia, Dr. Ernest Hall, Victoria.

TO AROUSE SYMPATHY.
Litigants Injured on Railways Will
Gather in New York.

New York, April 22.—If the plans
materialize which the attorney retained
in the suit for damages filed during the
last seven years against the bankrupt
New York Central Railway Company
are endorsed by the court, Cooper
Union is to be the scene of the great-
est gathering of cripples, widows and
orphans that the nation has ever seen.

ELDERLY WOMAN FOUND DYING AT HER DOOR

Mrs. Madeline Goupon Expires
Before Reaching a
Physician.

Mrs. Madeline Goupon, an elderly wo-
man, was found lying in front of her
store last night about 9.30 o'clock, died
from causes at present unknown while
being conveyed to the office of Dr. Fra-
ser, Douglas street. Constable Carlow
had been called to the scene by a pass-
er-by who had heard the woman's
groans and seen her lying on the side-
walk. No cause of death could be
assigned. The woman had evidently
been in the act of leaving her store to
get into the fresh air when she was
discovered. Coroner Hart will hold an
inquest, but said this morning it would
not be until to-morrow.

The woman appears, as far as is
known, to be without relatives in Vic-

which consist of a quantity of small
notions in an untidy condition. In the
rear room was found a collie dog, evi-
dently the woman's only companion,
lying on a small camp bed. The place
was unkempt and dirty and contained
also two large trunks filled with per-
sonal belongings, some newspaper clip-
pings, letters and rags and a bank book
issued by the Credit Lyonnais, which at
one time had contained a heavy credit
balance. An address on the book
which is old and torn is 47 Rue Royale,
indicating the woman to have lived in
France. The body was taken to
Smith's undertaking parlors, where it
awaits the action of the coroner.

NAVAL AND MILITARY PARADE IS PROPOSED

Victoria Day Committee to In-
vite Men on Japanese
Cruisers.

RECIPROCITY WITH STATES.

Montreal Board of Trade Will Not
Send Delegates to Conference
at Detroit.

Montreal, April 22.—The council of the
Montreal board of trade has turned
down an invitation from the Detroit
board of commerce to send a repre-
sentative to attend a conference in
that city on the subject of better trade
relations between the United States
and Canada, which opens in Detroit

the boot was on the other foot, and
while there was in the States an in-
creasing desire for open trade rela-
tions between the two countries, Can-
ada did not need it, and was quite
prepared to keep her foreign relations
and her commercial relations with the
Empire as they were now.
