The 1908 record of accidents in the. United States is a startling one. Be-tween 30,000 and 35,000 fatalities are re-corded, while nearly 2,000,000 were in-jured. An official bulletin shows that of those employed in factories and workshops, the most exposed class are the workers in iron and steel. Fatal accidents among electricies and accidents among electricians and elec-tric linemen and coal miners are de-clared to be excessive, while railway trainmen were killed in the proportion of 7.46 deaths, per 1,000 workmen. The bulletin declares that it should not be impossible to wert at least one-third and perhaps one-half of the accidents by intelligent and rational methods of factory inspection, legislation and con-

As the raising of the lake level will naturally flood a certain amount of the wooded land around the lake the people of the Royal City are afraid that the water will be contam-inated by the fleetying vegetation in afraid that the water will be contaminated by the decaying vegetation in the flooded area. The settlers in the Coquitiam valley had a much more imminent danger in mind—but onsy which engineers declare to be visionary—that the enlarged dam might burst and sweep them and their farms out of existence.


