Materials and Dissolution of the Dental Materials  
Control Company

1. References are:

a. Central Liaison Office Memorandum No. 4577 (PK), dated 9 September 1946, subject: Abandonment of Control over Distribution of Dental Materials.

b. Memorandum to the Imperial Japanese Government AG 091.33 (18 Jan 46) ESS/PI, dated 18 January 1946, (SCAPIN 616), subject: Release of Gold, Silver and Platinum for Dental Work.

2. No objection is offered to the abandonment of control over the distribution of dental materials or to the dissolution of the Dental Materials Control Company provided:

a. That provision for the allocation and distribution of gold, silver and platinum used for dental purposes be made in a manner consistent with the policy stated in the directive referred to in paragraph 1b above.

b. That in the dissolution of the Dental Materials Control Company provision be made for liquidation in conformity with existing price control and currency regulations and for distribution of the stockpiles of its materials so as to make them fairly available to the public and to prevent monopoly.

c. That no other control or control agency be established in this field without prior approval of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

3. Reports on the action taken will be submitted to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers in quintuplicate typed in English on 8" x 11" paper. These reports shall include the following:

SUBJECT : Production and Distribution of Supplies and Equipment for Disease Control Purposes.

1. In the near future certain medical supplies and materials for insect and rodent control purposes will be transferred to the jurisdiction of the Japanese Government, for storage and distribution. These supplies will be received on an import basis and are intended solely to supplement indigenous supplies and equipment to provide minimum requirements for the prevention of disease. In the past supplies of this nature have been distributed directly to Japanese health authorities, by the Occupation Forces, as required for disease control programs. This function will now be assumed by the Japanese Government.

2. The Imperial Japanese Government is directed to prepare and submit to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for approval, not later than 25 October, a plan for distribution of subject supplies making provision for the following:

- a. Adequate facilities for transportation, warehousing and safeguarding until delivered to the jurisdiction of designated health authorities.
- b. Expeditious delivery to each prefectural health officer of sufficient supplies to carry out prescribed health programs.
- c. Control of distribution agencies to obviate the possibility of release through unauthorized channels.
- d. Establishment and maintenance of adequate reserves to be released only with the concurrence of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
- e. Maintenance of sufficient records to provide:
  - (1) Accurate information on national and regional levels of stocks on hand available for issue.

- (2) A basis for computation of future requirements.
- (3) A check on the integrity of distribution channels.

## 1. Reference is made to:

a. Memorandum from Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, file AG 370.05 (7 May 46)GC, (SCAPIN-927), dated 7 May 1946 subject: "Repatriation," as amended.

2. Effective at once special inspection and quarantine at Reception Centers in Japan against cholera as applied to repatriates from Hulutao is no longer required. Provisions of memorandum reference par 1 b above are amended accordingly.


3. The Imperial Japanese Government will take the necessary action, in regard to ships transporting repatriates from Hulutao, to:

a. Unload repatriates promptly from ships now in Japanese ports as soon as they are cleared by medical authorities.

b. Effect the prompt unloading and normal processing of repatriates from ships arriving in Japan subsequent to this date that are cholera free.

c. Place ships that arrive in Japan subsequent to this date with cholera aboard in quarantine, in accordance with the provisions of par 3 c, Annex V of reference paragraph 1 a above.

1. The Imperial Japanese Government is directed to amend the Plan for the Collection of Vital Statistics, submitted to General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, in C.L.O. No. 1556 (PP), 4 April 1946, and approved by SCAPIN 975-A, 12 April 1946, substituting the words "1 October 1946" for "January 1947" in section eleven (11).

2. 1. The port of Hulutao has been declared a cholera port or a cholera suspect port by the Supreme Commander.
2. The Imperial Japanese Government will immediately put into effect the quarantine procedures as stated in Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government (SCAPIN 927) dated 7 May 1946, subject: "Repatriation", with regard to all ships from Hulutao, except that the port of Hakata will be used in addition to the Ports mentioned in paragraph 3 c of Annex V for processing of cholera suspect ships.
3. The Imperial Japanese Government will establish processing facilities for ships from cholera suspect ports so that the combined capacity of Sasebo and Hakata are 10,000 cholera suspects per day. This will be accomplished by 10 August 1946.
4. A report will be made to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers by the most expeditious means when the requirements of paragraph 3 of this Memorandum have been met.

SUBJECT: Information of General Application Pertaining to Directive Number (SCAPIN 1102) File AG 710 (5 August 46)PH, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, dated 5 August 1946, subject: "Prevention of Introduction of Cholera into Japan."

1. With reference to Memorandum Number (SCAPIN 1102), General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, to the Imperial Japanese Government, the following is published for the information of all concerned.
2. Cholera is present in Manchuria in epidemic proportions.
3. Every effort is to be made to erect a barrier to the introduction of this disease into Japan. At present the only traffic from Hulutao is repatriation. To attain this end:
  - a. The principle of allowing no case or carrier ashore will be applied by transferring such cases or carriers to hospital ships at the port of entry.
  - b. Allowing only ports where quarantine facilities are adequate to be used by ships with cholera. These ports at present are Uraga, Sasebo and Hakata.
  - c. On ships which have cholera aboard all personnel will be quarantined on the vessel for fourteen days after the removal of the last case or carrier. All personnel except cholera cases will be immunized with 1.5 cc. of cholera vaccine. Stool examinations made on all personnel to determine carriers. Surveillance will be exercised to assure that these procedures are carried out. Ships will be anchored at a sufficient distance from shore so that personnel cannot swim ashore. Excreta from all personnel is to be disinfected before discharge into sea.
  - d. On ships which do not have cholera aboard, no personnel will be allowed to leave the vessel until six full days have elapsed since the vessel has departed from Hulutao. All personnel will then be immunized with 1.5 cc. of cholera vaccine, unless they have had such immunization within the previous 90 days, have their stool examined for cholera organisms, be given a physical examination for quarantinable

4. The passengers and crews of all vessels from Hulutao will be treated in the same manner.





Surveillance will be exercised to assure that these procedures are carried out. Ships will be anchored at a sufficient distance from shore so that personnel cannot swim ashore. Excreta from all personnel is to be disinfected before discharge into sea.

d. On ships which do not have cholera aboard, no personnel will be allowed to leave the vessel until six full days have elapsed since the vessel has departed from Korea. All personnel will then be immunized with 1.5 cc of cholera vaccine, unless they have had such immunization within the previous 90 days, have their stool examined for cholera organisms, be given a physical examination for quarantinable communicable disease and offloaded for processing.



1. Recent letters from the Minister of Foreign Affairs transmitting aide-memoires of the Japanese Government on the matter of the Japanese budget for the fiscal year 1946 have been received by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.

2. The Japanese Government is informed that the so-called GHQ Plan for dependent housing as described in the Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government from GHQ SCAP (SCAPIN-799), dated 6 March 1946, has been modified. A revised directive adjusting the production and delivery of required construction materials to satisfy a demand for approximately 10,000 family groups during the Japanese fiscal year 1946 is being prepared and will be forwarded upon completion to the Imperial Japanese Government. This modification will not be construed as a rescission of the ultimate family housing requirements set forth in the afore-mentioned memorandum.

3. The Japanese Government is advised that a recomputation of costs for the construction of dependent and troop housing, subject to the strict application of legal prices and appropriate crediting of materials stock piles seized from the Japanese military which have been returned to the Japanese Government, should result in very substantial reductions in budget estimates. In this connection, it is pointed out that a recent informal recomputation of troop housing construction costs by Japanese Ministries representatives indicates that budget estimates for this project should be more nearly 3.3 billion yen than 5.4 billion yen, even without consideration to returned military stocks.

4. The Japanese Public Works Program in the so-called GHQ Plan is designed to provide from 1,000,000 to 1,250,000 man years of employment. This program is considered essential to increase the supply of food, clothing and fuel for the Japanese people and to establish a counter-inflationary program and will be included in the budget without change.

Activities.

1. In order to cope adequately with the emergency health and welfare situation, as directed by Memoranda numbered (SCAPIN 48) 22 September 1945, and (SCAPIN 775) 27 February 1946, the Imperial Japanese Government will immediately reorganize the administration of health and welfare activities to provide for the following administration of functions:

a. A Bureau of Health, the responsibility of which will be public health (maternity, child, and adult hygiene), health education, vital statistics activities and nutritional activities.

b. A Bureau of Medical Treatment, the responsibility of which will be general affairs (medical relief programs), administration of hospitals, administration of sanatoria, medical affairs, pharmaceutical affairs (distribution) drug production (including biologicals) and pharmaceutical standardization.

c. A Bureau of Preventive Medicine shall be established, the responsibility of which will be those concerned with sanitary engineering, communicable diseases and chronic infectious diseases.

d. A Bureau of Social Affairs, the responsibility of which will be those in connection with public assistance, public welfare and the procurement and disposition of materials necessary to implement such functions.

2. The administration of other continuing activities and functions of the Ministry of Health and Welfare is not affected by this Memorandum and may be a matter for future consideration.

3. The Imperial Japanese Government will cause to be established in prefectural governments a Bureau of Health and a Bureau of Welfare whose functions will include those outlined for the Ministry of Health and Welfare, as shown in paragraph 1 of this Memorandum, which will act as the operating agency for public health and welfare activities.

4. Functions of operation in connection with this Memorandum will be performed as far as possible at prefectural and local levels. Matters of policy, technical matters and overall coordination of health and welfare activities are functions of the national government.

1. Reference is made to letter, Central Liaison Office, above subject, file C.L.O. 1427 (ECI) dated 28 March 1946.
2. A definite program has been established for distribution of DDT supplies for communicable disease control measures. The supply of DDT products is not sufficient for all inclusive control measures. Generally distribution must be made to those areas where emergencies arise. Some quantities have been allocated to coal mining regions. No further quantities can be allocated to coal mining regions at present, unless an emergency condition requiring all inclusive control measures, should occur.
3. In view of the urgent need for large quantities of DDT products in Japan for communicable disease control measures, it is directed that an import program be submitted to GHQ, SCAP not later than 10 May 1946. This program should include all DDT supplies needed for communicable disease control measures in Japan for the period 1 July 1946 through 30 June 1947.
4. Authority for direct communication with Chief, Public Health and Welfare Section, GHQ, SCAP, is authorized, with respect to types of DDT supplies considered essential for efficient control of communicable diseases.

1. Memorandum for the Imperial Japanese Government AG 435 (18 Dec 45)PH, subject as above, 18 December 1945, is rescinded.

2. The Imperial Japanese Government will enact and rigidly enforce appropriate enactments to provide:

a. That possession of, and selling or trading in, any food or beverage containing methyl alcohol in excess of 1 mg. per cc., or other poison in toxic amount, will be punishable by a fine of not less than 2000 nor more than 10,000 yen, or penal servitude of not less than three nor more than fifteen years, or both such fine and penal servitude.

b. That beverages containing methyl alcohol in amounts exceeding 0.2 mg. per cc., and not exceeding 1 mg. per cc. may be sold provided that each bottle or container bears a label stating plainly in both English and Japanese the methyl alcohol content of the beverage.

3. English translations of such enactments and samples of the labels proposed to be used in accordance with the terms of paragraph 2b hereof will be forwarded in duplicate to this Headquarters immediately upon preparation and prior to publication.

4. Direct communication with the Chief, Public Health and Welfare Section this Headquarters, is authorized respecting further details in the execution of the terms of this Memorandum.

1. It is directed that the Imperial Japanese Government prepare a plan for the collection and compilation of certain vital statistics data, and that the proposed plan be submitted in writing in English, for approval of the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, not later than 5 April 1946.

2. The plan must provide for the compilation of the following data as a minimum:

- a) For deaths: Total number, number of infant deaths (those dying under 1 full year of life), total number at all other ages, by sex.
- b) For births: number by sex.
- c) For stillbirths: number by sex.
- d) For marriages: number
- e) For divorces: number

Each of the above figures must be tabulated separately for each prefecture and city. The basis of this tabulation by prefecture and city must be place of actual residence of the person involved and not place of legal domicile (honseki).

3. The specified data will be collected and compiled monthly and transmitted to GHQ-SCAP not later than two (2) months after the end of the month to which the data relates (i.e. May data by July 31st, June data by August 31st, etc.).

4. The plan will contain an outline of the changes in registration laws and procedures necessary to insure that births, deaths, stillbirths, marriages and divorces are reported at the place of actual residence (not "honseki"), as well as the steps to be taken to re-instruct local registration officials about the new procedures.

5. Upon approval by SCAP of the vital statistics plan, the Imperial Japanese Government will take immediate steps to establish the collection of current vital statistics by the methods given in the plan. Such collection will start with data for the month of May and continue.

1. The exceedingly high case and death rates from diphtheria among Japanese civilians, particularly in the childhood age groups, constitute a serious health hazard in Japan.
2. It is desired that the Imperial Japanese Government inaugurate immediate and extensive measures on a nation-wide basis for the prevention of diphtheria.
3. In addition to other necessary control measures, the preventive program will include special emphasis on the following:
  - a. The manufacture and distribution of an approved immunizing agent on a nation-wide basis.
  - b. The immunization of all persons between the ages of nine (9) months and ten (10) years, inclusive.
4. The operational program, including technical procedures to be utilized, will be submitted to and approved in advance by this Headquarters. A complete operational plan to become effective on or before 1 June 1946, will be submitted to this Headquarters for consideration not later than 1 March 1946.

1. Reports reaching this headquarters concerning shortages of medical supplies and equipment indicate an urgent need for increasing production of essential items required for the care and treatment of the sick.

2. The production of an adequate supply of vaccines and sera is particularly important. C. L. O., No. 446 (1), 2 November 1945 reports the quantities that may be produced with available facilities and materials. Recent reports indicate that production of some important items is far below existing capacity.

3. You are directed to submit to this headquarters, not later than 20 February 1946, a plan covering the manufacture of medical supplies and equipment, with particular reference to the production of vaccine and sera. The plan will indicate proposed action for implementation. Consideration will be given the following:

- a. Full utilization of raw materials, manufacturing equipment and supplies pertaining to the Japanese Army and Navy, which have been returned to the Home Ministry for civilian use.
- b. Manufacture of essential supplies and equipment, as distinguished from items of doubtful value in the care and treatment of the sick.

SUBJECT : Establishment of an Effective System for Narcotic Control in Japan.

1. You are directed to enact legislation embodying the following provisions for the establishment of an effective system for narcotic control in Japan:
  - a. All persons lawfully entitled to deal in narcotics will be properly registered, licensed, and classified.
  - b. Dealers will be required to re-register annually.
  - c. Dealers will be required to submit an inventory of narcotic stocks on hand when registering or re-registering.
  - d. Dealers will be required to submit periodical reports of narcotic transactions and stocks on hand to the Imperial Japanese Government.
  - e. All transactions in narcotics will be in or from original stamped packages which you will provide for in your enactment.
  - f. Limitations of sales by the several classes of registrants will be set forth in your enactment.
  - g. Sales between registrants will be by means of order forms which you will record and provide in blank to registrants.
  - h. Except as provided in your enactment any person who is not registered, licensed and classified will be prohibited from having narcotics in his possession.
  - i. Severe penalties will be provided for any person who violates the provisions of your enactment.
2. You will submit a copy of the law in English to this headquarters prior to enactment.

SUBJECT : Abolition of Licensed Prostitution in Japan.

1. The maintenance of licensed prostitution in Japan is in contravention of the ideals of democracy and inconsistent with the development of individual freedom throughout the nation.
2. The Imperial Japanese Government is directed to forthwith abrogate and annul all laws, ordinances and other enactments which directly or indirectly authorize or permit the existence of licensed prostitution in Japan, and to nullify all contracts and agreements which have for their object the binding or committing, directly or indirectly, of any woman to the practice of prostitution.

SUBJECT : Smallpox Vaccination of Japanese Civilians.

1. The increasing prevalence of smallpox among Japanese civilians requires more concerted control action than is now being taken by responsible Japanese public health officials.

2. It is desired that the Japanese government immediately institute smallpox control measures as follows:

a. Vaccination of all Japanese civilian employed by occupational forces in any capacity, including all civilian personnel in hotels, rest centers and any other place operated for Allied Military Forces.

b. Vaccination of civilians as required for the immediate and effective control in all areas where smallpox has been reported or may be reported in the future.

c. Re-instatement of the pre-war compulsory vaccination program throughout Japan.

d. Immediate development of facilities required for the production of an adequate supply of smallpox vaccine to carry out and continue the foregoing as required for the eradication of smallpox in Japan.

1. Memorandum, file AG 402.5 (24 Sept 45)GD; subject: "Materials, Supplies and Equipment Received and to be Received from the Japanese Armed Forces", dated 24 September 1945, forwarded by this headquarters to the Imperial Japanese Government, directs that the Home Ministry will receive and distribute such supplies and equipment as are to be returned to the Japanese Government.
2. It has been noted from reports received in this headquarters from the Armies and from observation that large quantities of military medical supplies still remain available for distribution through civilian channels. It is known that doctors and hospitals are short of necessary drugs and equipment for proper treatment of the civilian population. This condition must be alleviated by prompt utilization of the existing military stocks.
3. Steps must be taken at once to stimulate the distribution of medical supplies transferred to the Home Ministry and to determine that they reach the consumer. Prompt measures must be taken to assure that:
  - a. Prefectural officials take vigorous action upon advice that supplies are available at a depot or collection point.
  - b. The prefectural agencies are furnished sufficient transport, labor and warehouse space, and that a minimum of delay is caused by necessary paper work.
  - c. Distributing agencies move the supplies to doctors, hospitals and other dispensers expeditiously for the relief of civilian ill.

1. The Supreme Commander desires factual information on the nutritional health and actual food consumption and food requirements in Japan.
2. The Japanese Government is directed to establish study groups of properly qualified physicians and nutritionists who will conduct nutrition surveys among the civilian population. These groups will gather factual data on the physical status and the food consumption of individuals, using statistical sampling methods and areas approved by this headquarters. Urban areas are of primary concern and initial surveys will include the largest cities.
3. The methods to be employed by these survey groups and their work in the field will be standardized, coordinated and directed by a control agency in the Japanese Government in accordance with plans submitted to and approved in advance by this Headquarters.
4. A complete operational plan for this work will be submitted to this Headquarters for approval not later than 20 December 1945.
5. The operational plan will be put into effect immediately upon approval. English translations of survey data received from the field will be submitted to this Headquarters each week. Final compilations and analysis of the data will be submitted not later than one week after any one survey is completed.

1. At dates to be set by this headquarters certain Japanese military medicinal narcotic stocks, in amounts determined by this headquarters, will be released by United States Forces into the custody of approved pharmaceutical wholesale houses.
2. You are directed to submit to this headquarters not later than 22 December 1945 a list of pharmaceutical wholesale houses who will receive and have custody of such military narcotic stocks, subject to the approval of this headquarters.
3. The list of pharmaceutical wholesale houses submitted for approval will consist of one firm in Hokkaido and three firms in the Eighth Army area of Honshu; and four firms in the Sixth Army area including one in Shikoku and one in Kyushu. The following information will be furnished with the list submitted:
  - a. Name and complete address of firm.
  - b. Name and position of responsible members of firm.
  - c. Facilities for securely storing narcotics.
4. After Japanese military medical stocks are released to the custody of these approved wholesale drug firms a report will be rendered by each such firm so as to reach this headquarters within ten days after the last day of each month. This monthly report will be certified to by a responsible official of the firm and will contain the following information regarding Japanese military narcotics stocks:
  - a. Inventory of stocks on hand on the first day of each month or in the first instance when custody of stocks is assumed.
  - b. Quantity of stocks disposed of during the month, showing in each instance the date and to whom released and authorization for release.
  - c. Inventory of stocks on hand on the 1st day of each month.

In addition to the measures outlined in memorandum of 21 November 1945 for the Imperial Japanese Government, Subject: "Prevention and Control of Typhus Fever in Japan" (Reference: AG 710 (21 Nov 45)PH), it is desired that the responsible Japanese agency immediately institute further measures for the control of typhus fever as follows:

a. Disinfestation by use of Insecticide, spray, DDT, residual effect at thirty (30) day intervals of the following:

(1) All railway cars assigned for use of Allied military personnel.

(2) All ferries operating between Aomori and Hakodate.

(3) Such other public conveyances that may be assigned for use of Allied military personnel.

b. After each disinfestation all conveyances will be plainly and uniformly marked as directed by the military command concerned to show date and place of treatment.

2. Military commands have been authorized to make Insecticide spray and equipment available as required for disinfestation.

3. Japanese civilian personnel will be provided by the Japanese agency concerned to carry out required disinfestation procedures.

4. United States military personnel will be available only for instruction and supervision of Japanese civilian personnel required to carry out the provisions of this memorandum.

Due to the prevalence of epidemic, louse-borne typhus fever in Japan, particularly in northern Honshu and Hokkaido, it is desired that the responsible Japanese public health agencies immediately institute the following measures for the prevention and control of typhus fever in Hokkaido and in all other areas or islands of Japan where typhus is or may be reported:

a. Control program in Hokkaido.

- (1) Intensive immunization program with typhus vaccine in coal mine and labor camps and such areas of the following cities and villages in the vicinity of troops as may be considered endemic for louse-borne typhus:

- (a) Yubari
- (b) Hakodate
- (c) Asahigawa
- (d) Kushiro
- (e) Otaru
- (f) Sapporo
- (g) Muroran
- (h) Obihiro

- (2) Routine monthly disinfestation of all occupants of the above coal mine and labor camps up to and thru April, 1946.

- (3) Routine disinfestation of all civilians crossing the straits of Tsugaru from Hokkaido to Honshu.

b. Adequate control measures against typhus fever in other cities, villages and areas where the disease constitutes a threat to U. S. military forces.

2. Japanese personnel and prefectural and local health organizations will be utilized to the fullest extent in the civilian control program. U. S. military personnel will be used only for instruction and supervision of Japanese civilian personnel except in emergencies to be determined by the U. S. military commander concerned.

- (1) Owner of heroin.

1. Reports submitted by representatives of the Imperial Japanese Government and observations by personnel of the occupation forces show that measures now in operation are inadequate to prevent the spread of Venereal Disease in the population of Japan.
2. The Supreme Commander directs that the Imperial Japanese Government put into effect immediately the following measures:
  - a. The designation of syphilis, gonorrhoea and chancroid as infectious diseases under the terms of Article I of the Law for the Prevention of Infectious Diseases (Law No. 36, 1897, as amended).
  - b. The reporting of all syphilis, gonorrhoea and chancroid cases by name, age, sex and full address of the individual concerned, on a basis similar to that in effect for the reporting of other notifiable infectious diseases.
  - c. Rigid enforcement of the Law for Prevention of Infectious Diseases, the Law for the Prevention of Venereal Diseases (Home Department Ordinance No. 44, 1900, as amended) and all laws, ordinances, regulations and instructions issued thereunder which relate, directly or indirectly, to the prevention and treatment of the venereal diseases.
  - d. Bringing under the examination, treatment and health provisions of these laws, ordinances, regulations and instructions all individuals whose occupations or activities subject them to serious hazard of venereal disease transmission.
  - e. provision of the hospitals, clinical and laboratory facilities, personnel, equipment and drugs necessary to ensure the required examinations, isolation, hospitalization and treatment.
  - f. The establishment of minimum and uniform technical and administrative standards and procedures for the guidance of operating agencies in connection with all phases of this program.

SUBJECT: Public Health Measures.

The Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers directs that the Imperial Japanese Government take the following action:

1. An immediate survey by agencies of the Japanese Ministry of Health and Welfare to determine:
  - a. Disease prevalence in each prefecture.
  - b. Medical, dental, veterinary and public health personnel available in each prefecture.
  - c. Hospital facilities, medical, veterinary and sanitary supplies present in each area with a comment in each instance as to its adequacy.
  - d. The adequacy of laws and regulation of the indigenous Japanese Public Health and Welfare authorities to meet current requirements.
2. Immediately inaugurate such measures as:
  - a. Weekly reports of communicable diseases by prefecture.
  - b. Examination, detention or hospitalization of cases or suspected cases of communicable disease.
  - c. Immunization, disinfestation and control of any disease, which would be likely to seriously affect civilian health.
3. Restore all public water supply, sewerage systems and other human waste disposal means to the maximum civilian capacity with the least practicable delay through the use of civilian resources and labor.

4. Reopen or continue in operation civilian hospitals, sanatoria, leprosaria and clinics for use of indigenous population as rapidly as conditions permit or require. Where civilian hospital space is inadequate, a survey of schools or other buildings will be made to locate facilities which are suitable to be used as emergency hospitals and these buildings so designated.
5. All civilian (wholesale) and Japanese Military and Naval medical, dental, veterinary, sanitation supplies and military foodstuffs will be distributed through indigenous Japanese agencies in accordance with Military Occupational control plans on recommendation to the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers for their conservation and distribution.
6. Inaugurate port quarantine control in cooperation with United States Naval Forces. Port quarantine will be established by Japanese civilian control.
7. Reopen or continue in operation civilian laboratory facilities for public health work, for clinical diagnosis, and for the manufacture of sera and vaccines.
8. Expedite the reporting and analysis of vital statistics data in accordance with policies established by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers.
9. Place special emphasis on adequate measures for the control of all venereal diseases occurring in indigenous Japanese personnel. This will be accomplished by using existing Japanese agencies.
