SUBJECT: Procedure with reference to the cases of Japanese businessmen at Honolulu who have been approved by Commerce and cleared by SCAP to enter Japan under the U.S. trader's quota.

I inquired of Mr. Spence of the Exit Permit Unit of the Visa Division how the Visa Division formerly handled cases such as the above since such cases apparently are now going to be handled in DS.

Mr. Spence informed me that the Visa Division after it learns that SCAP has cleared the subject individuals calls the Islands Possessions Division of the Department of the Interior (Miss Hackett, dial 812, Ext. 4737) and informs it of all the facts of the clearance. The Islands Possessions Division cables all these facts to the office of the Governor of Hawaii, who in turn takes care of the necessary documentation.

It is proposed that DS use the same procedure as described above. Your comments are requested.

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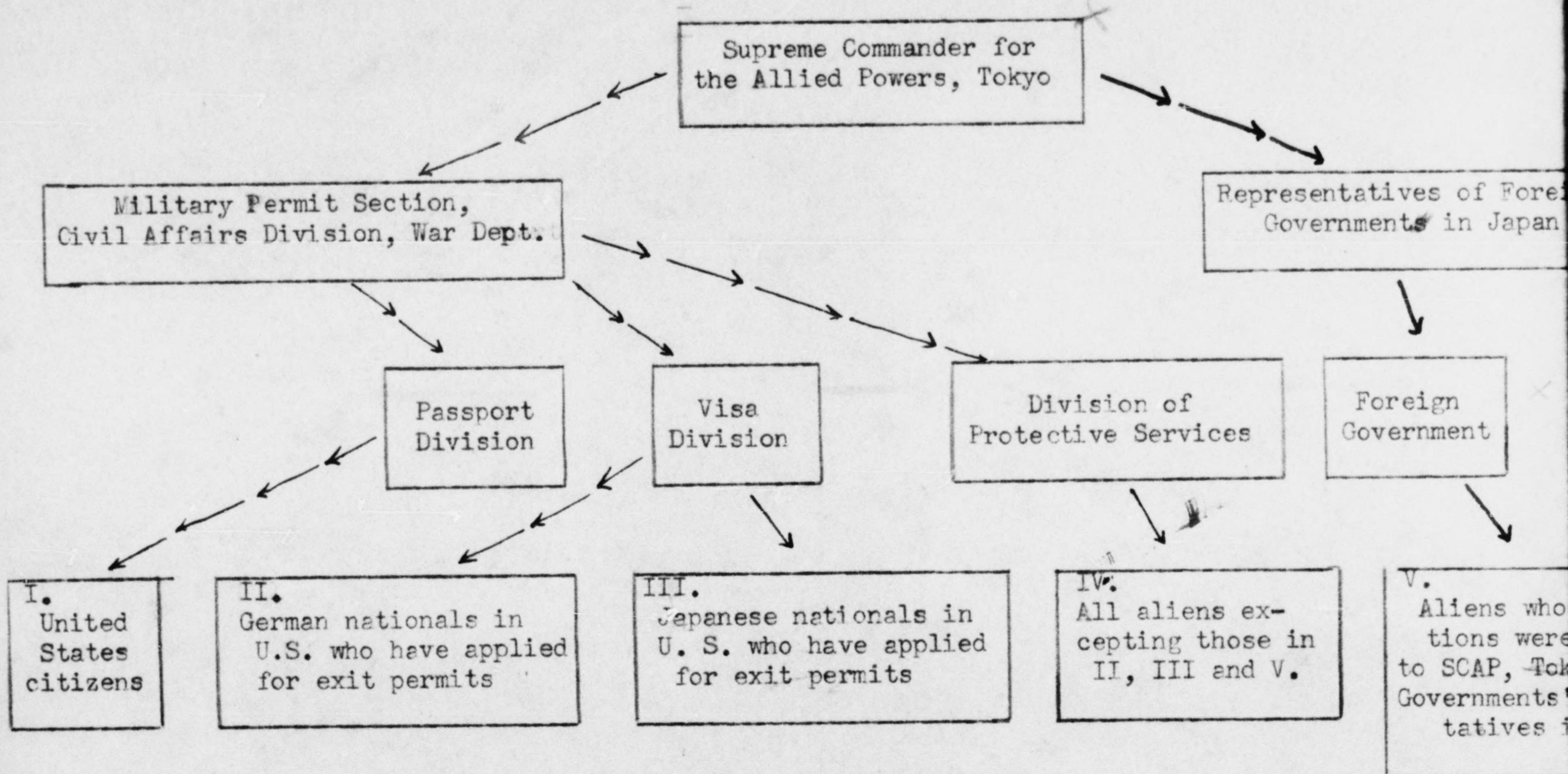

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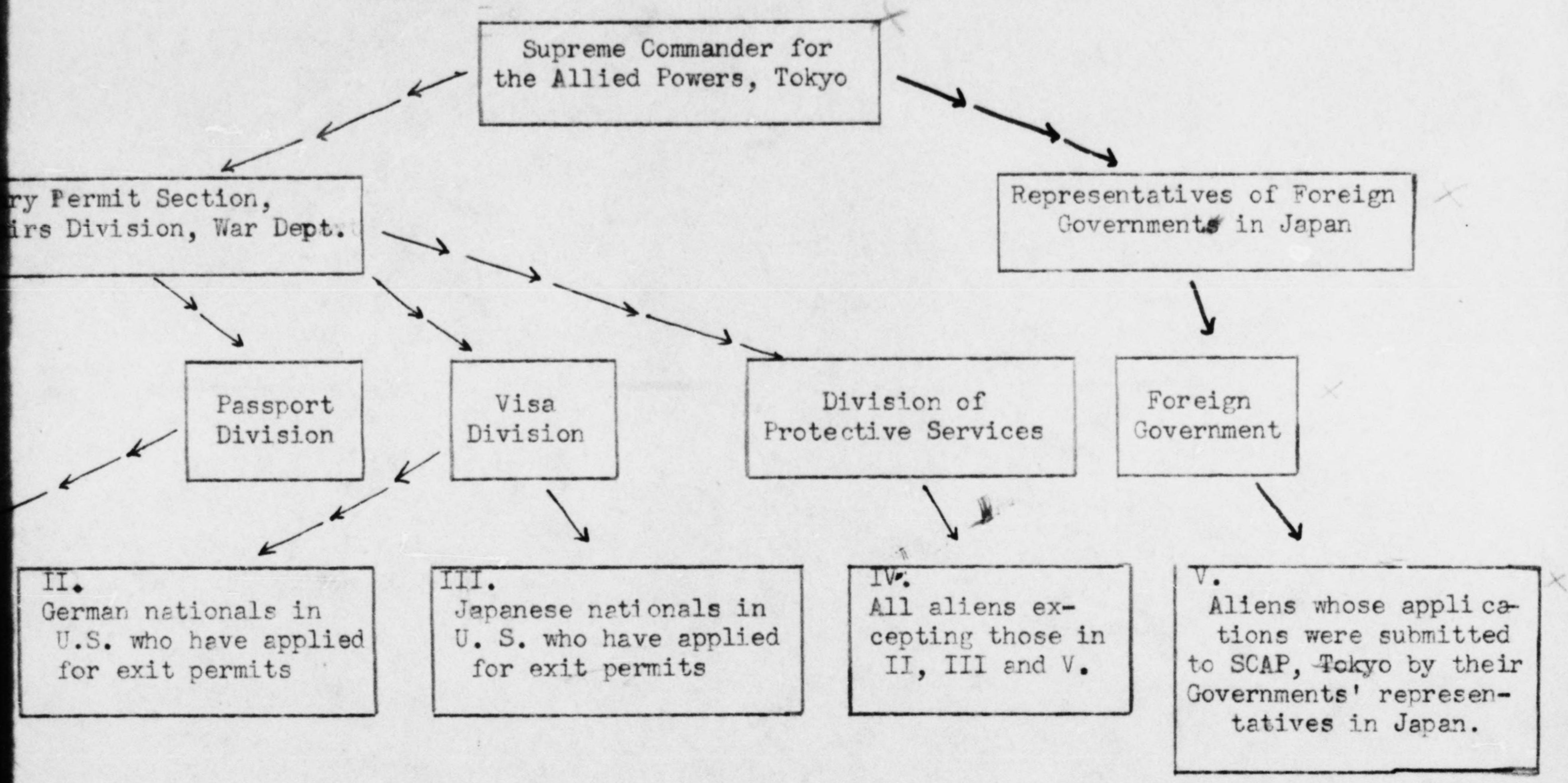

Late in the afternoon of November 3, 1947, Mr. Ejel called Mr. O'Brien to inform him that he encountered difficulty in arranging transportation to Japan and that he would not be able to utilize his clearance valid between November 20 and December 5, 1947. Mr. Ejel requested that a new clearance permit be granted him for the period December 5 to December 20, 1947. Mr. O'Brien informed Mr. Ejel that his request would be communicated to the military authorities and that he would be informed.

Mr. O'Brien called Capt. Keough the morning of November 4 and informed him of Mr. Ejel's request. Captain Keough stated that Mr. Ejel's request could be granted and that Mr. Ejel might be informed in this regard. Captain Keough stated a memorandum of confirmation in this connection would be addressed to DS.

Mr. O'Brien, upon completion of his conversation with Captain Keough, called Mr. Ejel and informed him that his request was granted and advised him to communicate with the Syrian Legation at Washington so that his document as required by SCAP Circular 8 might be put in order because of the change.

The Secretary of State presents his compliments to the Honorable the Minister of Syria and has the honor to refer to a telephone conversation of November 4, 1947 between Mr. George Tomsh of the Legation and an officer of the Department as well as to previous correspondence concerning Mr. Faaz Abdallah Ejel, a Syrian national, who is cleared by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at Tokyo for entry into Japan for business reasons.

It will be recalled in this connection that the Legation in accordance with the Supreme Commander's Circular 8 of August 30, 1946 previously prepared a statement in English for Mr. Ejel indicating that he was cleared for entry into Japan by the Supreme Commander for the period November 20 to December 5, 1947 for a stay of 21 days after his date of entry. Mr. Ejel, however, was not in a position to utilize this

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this clearance as he could not arrange transportation and consequently requested that his clearance be changed so that he might enter Japan between December 5 and December 20, 1947.

The Department is now in receipt of a memorandum from the military authorities, the facts of which were communicated to the Legation in the telephone conversation under reference, stating that Mr. Ejel may enter Japan between December 5 and December 20, 1947 for a stay of 21 days after his date of entry. The military authorities note that Mr. Ejel should carry with him to Japan two standard passport photographs which measure one and one-quarter by one and three-quarters inches.

The Department understands that the Legation will prepare another statement for Mr. Ejel similar to the statement prepared when his clearance was for the period November 20 to December 5, 1947.

My principals advise me, that, owing to the apparent postponement of the importation of raw cotton into Japan being handled by private commercial firms at least for some time, there would be no point in my visiting Japan in the immediate future.

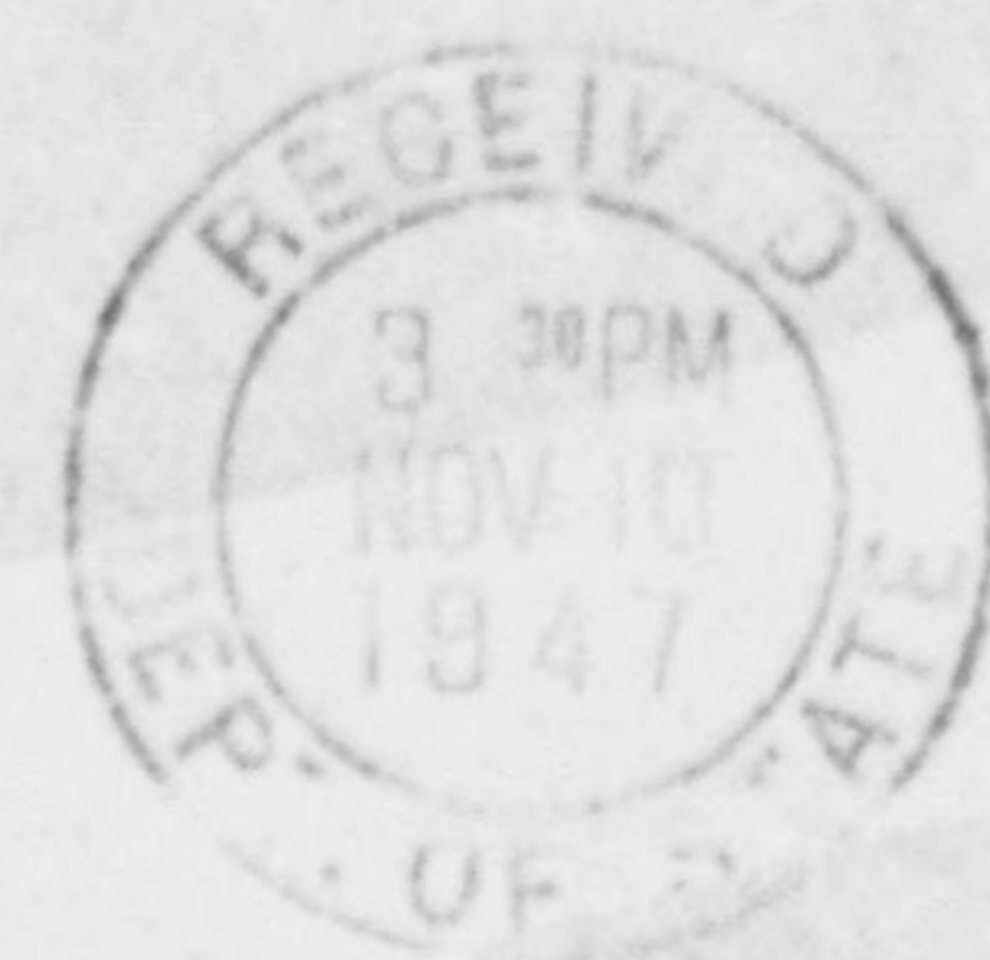

My dear Colonel Lynch:

I refer to the subject of military permits issued by your office in the name of aliens who are cleared for entry into Japan. It is understood that if, for any reason, such permits are not forwarded to the individuals concerned they should be returned to your office.

In this connection reference is made to the Military Permit issued October 7, 1947 in the name of Mr. E.O. Taunton. This Department has been informed by Mr. Taunton's firm that he does not wish to go to Japan until such time as raw cotton may be imported into Japan by private commercial firms. If Mr. Taunton later wishes to go to Japan he will file a new application with the Department of Commerce. Consequently, the enclosed Permit is returned herewith for such disposition as you may deem appropriate.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FILES

Mr. Alfred Goldman, who is cleared by SCAP to enter Japan between November 16 and November 30, 1947 on the Trader's Quota, visited Mr. Chappell's office (this date) to discuss his clearance with Mr. Chappell.

Mr. Goldman informed Mr. Chappell that he definitely is interested in going to Japan but wishes to have a clearance for a longer period of time than his present permit will allow; in fact, he is interested in putting his business on a permanent basis in Japan. Mr. Goldman requested that his clearance be suspended temporarily until he could determine whether he might enter Japan for a longer period of time. If he could not be allowed to enter Japan on a long time basis, Mr. Goldman stated he would like to utilize his clearance at a later date and requested that his case not be considered closed. Mr. Goldman stated he would inform DS when he would be in a position to travel to Japan.

My dear Colonel Lynch:

There is enclosed a military permit issued by your office October 30, 1947 for Mr. Alfred Goldman to enter Japan on the Trader's Quota between November 16 and November 30, 1947.

The Department of State is informed in this connection by Mr. Goldman that he is unable to utilize this permit but that he definitely is interested in going to Japan at a later date. He is not quite certain, however, as to the exact date when he will be in a position to depart for Japan but states that he will inform the Division of Protective Services in this regard as soon as it is possible.

The Military Permit Office is requested, if it is possible, to consider Mr. Goldman's case as one which is temporarily suspended rather than one which is definitely closed, so that when Mr. Goldman communicates to the Division of Protective Services the information regarding his travel to Japan as described above, arrangements may be made to include him in another quota.

SUBJECT: Requests by passengers of the American President Lines for military permits so that they may visit ashore while their ship stops at Yokohama or Kobe, Japan. The destination of these passengers is elsewhere than Japan.

Mr. O'Brien, upon receipt of two recent letters, one from ~~Mr.~~ Gordon K. Agar and one from Capt. Rev. A.E. Toombs requesting military permits of the type described above, called Mr. Weymueller. Mr. O'Brien informed Mr. Weymueller that such letters are becoming increasingly common but that no favorable action may be taken on them since, according to the most recent information available, SCAP does not make any provision for sightseeing and the Military Permit Office of the Department of the Army does not consider such requests.

Mr. Weymueller stated he realized the information Mr. O'Brien communicated to him and that he would try to stop such requests by instructing the various agents of the American President Lines in other cities to stop advising passengers to apply for permits. He added that the American President ships stop at Yokohama and Kobe for only 10 hours each and that the Company is not anxious to have its passengers disembark. Mr. Weymueller took the names of Mr. Agar and Capt Toombs so that they could be informed that as yet passengers en route elsewhere are not allowed to disembark in Japan.

Mr. O'Brien, upon receipt of two recent letters, one from ~~Mr.~~ Gordon K. Agar and one from Capt. Rev. A.E. Toombs requesting military permits of the type described above, called Mr. Weymueller. Mr. O'Brien informed Mr. Weymueller that such letters are becoming increasingly common but that no favorable action may be taken on them since, according to the most recent information available, SCAP does not make any provision for sightseeing and the Military Permit Office of the Department of the Army does not consider such requests.

Mr. Weymueller stated he realized the information Mr. O'Brien communicated to him and that he would try to stop such requests by instructing the various agents of the American President Lines in other cities to stop advising passengers to apply for permits. He added that the American President ships stop at Yokohama and Kobe for only 10 hours each and that the Company is not anxious to have its passengers disembark. Mr. Weymueller took the names of Mr. Agar and Capt Toombs so that they could be informed that as yet passengers en route elsewhere are not allowed to disembark in Japan.

The facts of Mr. Saiki's clearance were communicated by the Division of Protective Services to Mr. Saiki through the Department of the Interior and the Governor of Hawaii. It is understood that the Office of the Governor of Hawaii will document Mr. Saiki in the manner required by the Supreme Commander's Circular 8 of August 30, 1946. DISCUSSION:

The Department received two applications submitted separately by the Panamanian Embassy at Washington under cover of its respective notes of August 13, 1947 and July 7, 1947 for Messrs. Eduardo and Isidoro Azrak to enter Japan. The Department transmitted these applications along with what information was available in the Department's files concerning the subject gentlemen to the Military Permit Office of the Department of the Army to be communicated by that office to the Supreme Commander for approval or disapproval. In a memorandum dated November 17, 1947 the Military Permit Office informed the Department that the Supreme Commander approves the entry into Japan of Messrs. Azrak. It is proposed to communicate the facts of these clearances to the Panamanian Embassy at Washington by the underlying draft note.

Captain Keough informed Mr. Chappell that all the information supplied to his office by the Department of State in connection with the Azraks was made available to SCAP and presumably was considered when approval was given for the issuance of military entry permits. However, since Mr. Chappell had raised the question of the security factor involved in the issuance of military permits to these men, Captain Keough again checked with his superior, Colonel Lynch, who decided that all the information in the case had been made available to the military authorities in Japan and that no further action would be taken by the Department of the Army.

Mr. Isidoro Azrak have been cleared by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers at Tokyo to enter Japan during the month of December, 1947 for a stay of twenty-one days beginning the date that they enter Japan. If these gentlemen wish to stay in Japan longer than twenty-one days they should make application for an extension of this time limit after they arrive in Japan. The military authorities request to be informed, however, with respect to this clearance in which fifteen day period during the month of December, December 1 to December 15 or December 16 to December 30, the Messrs. Your memorandum stated, however, that if positive evidence were submitted to show that Mr. Virata's travel to Japan is necessary and that a useful purpose could be served by this travel, his case would be reconsidered.

In this connection the Department submitted the substance of your memorandum under reference to the Philippine Embassy at Washington, and under cover of a note from the Philippine Embassy in reply the Department received the enclosed application so that Mr. Virata's case might be reconsidered. It would be appreciated if Mr. Virata's application were resubmitted to the Supreme Commander and that the Division of Protective Services be informed as to any decision reached by the Supreme Commander concerning it.

Reference is made to your airgram No. A-366 of November 19, 1947 informing the Department that Mr. Leon Julian Godet, a French national, appeared at the Consulate General November 19 with telegrams from the French Minister at Manila and the French Mission at Tokyo both of which indicate that Mr. Godet is authorized by the military authorities to enter Japan. The Consulate General requests confirmation of this military authorization.

The above information with respect to Mr. Godet's military authorization may be correct since the French Mission at Tokyo is in a position to secure such authorization for him. However, in accordance with procedure evolved concerning the documentation of persons traveling to Japan his case is not one for the Department or its representatives to handle.

If Mr. Godet's telegram from the French Minister at Manila contains a statement in English indicating, in the manner required by paragraph 9 of SCAP Circular 8 of August 30, 1946 (see FSS 667 of January 17, 1947), that he is cleared for entry into Japan his documentation with respect to military authorization is complete. If such is not the case, this statement in English should be prepared for him by the French Consulate at Bombay which may also check the validity of the two telegrams referred to above.

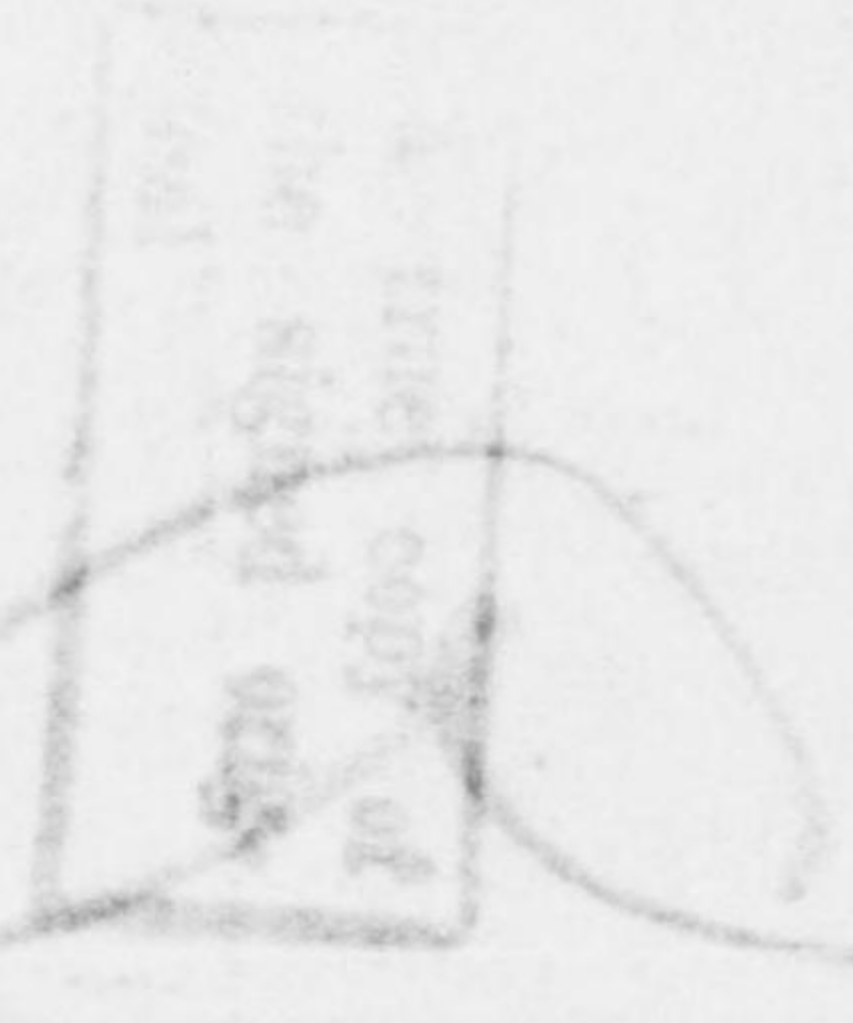

Mr. Asha called Mr. O'Brien and informed him that Mr. Ejel was in Mr. Asha's office and that Mr. Asha, for reasons of his health, wishes to have his clearance date changed to a period later than December 5th to December 20th, 1947.

Mr. O'Brien informed Mr. Asha that he would communicate Mr. Ejel's request to the Military Authorities for their approval. Mr. O'Brien called Captain Keough and informed him of Mr. Ejel's request. Captain Keough stated that Mr. Ejel's request would not be considered until the definite date of his entry into Japan was known, and only within 30 days of his proposed entry. Captain Keough further stated if Mr. Ejel were given a change, this would be the last considering that he has been cleared two times previously.

Mr. O'Brien returned Mr. Asha's call and informed him of the substance of his conversation with Captain Keough. ① A letter dated September 28, 1947 from Mr. P. H. Andrews, a British national, was received in DS October 10, 1947. In this letter Mr. Andrews requested permission for him and his wife to disembark at Yokohama while the vessel on which they were travelling to Singapore was in port at Yokohama. Mr. Andrews stated that he was travelling aboard the SS Marine Swallow sailing from San Francisco October 10, 1947, the same date that his letter was received by DS. In view of the time element it is apparent that DS could not communicate with Mr. Andrews concerning his request (which would have to be denied since SCAP does not pass favorably on such requests) before his departure date.

A check with American President Lines, owners of the SS Marine Swallow, revealed that Mr. and Mrs. Andrews sailed for Singapore from San Francisco, October 10, 1947, as they proposed.

Reference is made to your Operations Memorandum of October 27, 1947 requesting information regarding an alleged statement of the Swiss Legation in Brazil that travelers to Japan no longer need military authorization to enter Japan.

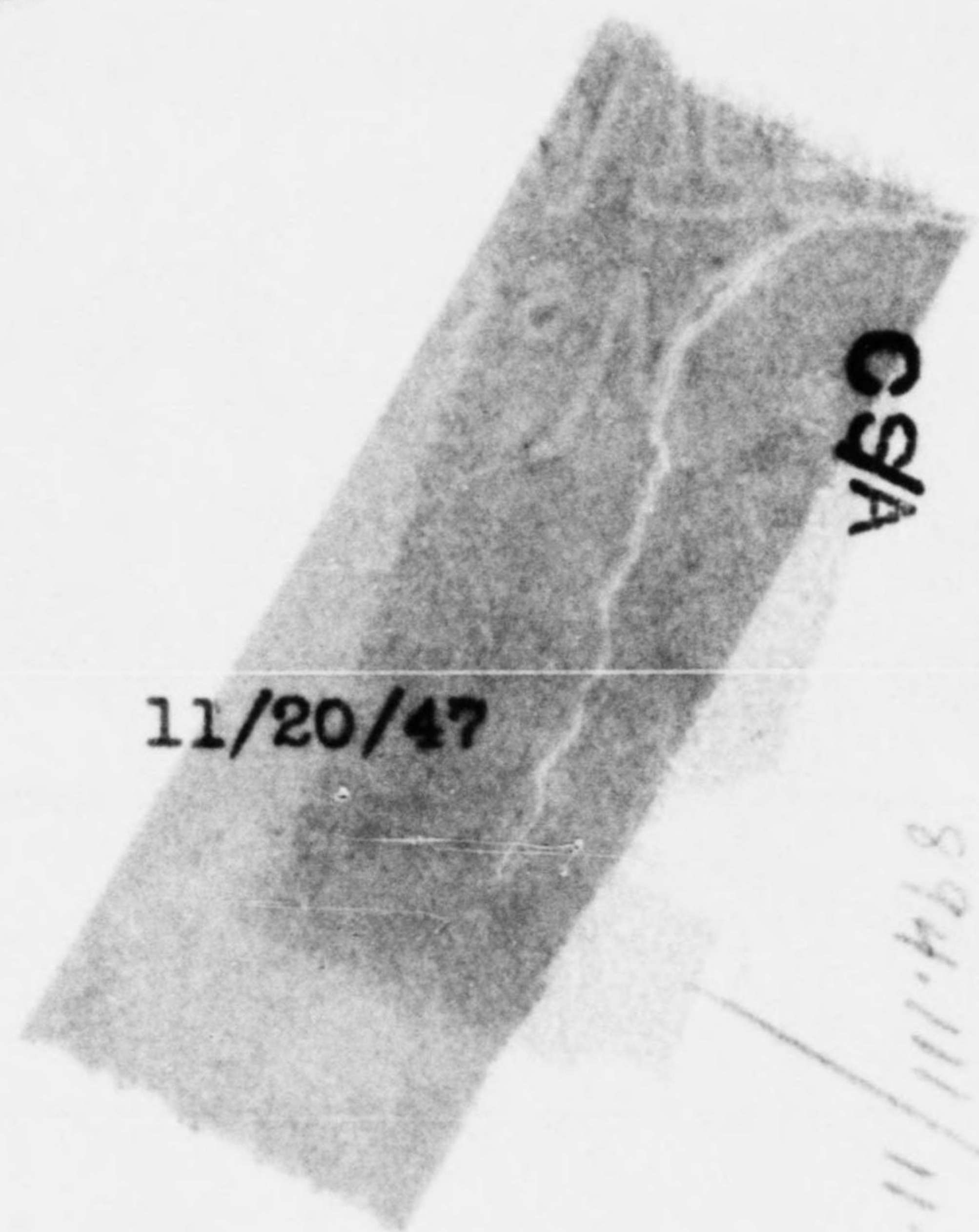

Mr. O'Brien called Miss Flickinger in accordance with his telephone conversation of November 26th with Mr. Asha and informed Miss Flickinger of the dates during which Mr. Ejel proposed to enter Japan. Miss Flickinger said this information was satisfactory and that Mr. Ejel could enter Japan as he requested. She stated a memo in this connection would follow. Mr. O'Brien called Mr. Asha and informed him of the substance of his conversation with Miss Flickinger. Mr. Asha stated that Mr. Ejel would be informed by him. Mr. Asha requested that Mr. Tomeh of the Syrian Legation in Washington also be informed of the facts of this case by Mr. O'Brien so that proper documentation for Mr. Ejel could be prepared.

Mr. O'Brien called Mr. Tomeh and informed him of the facts of this case for which Mr. Tomeh expressed appreciation. Mr. O'Brien informed Mr. Tomeh that a note confirming this conversation would be transmitted to the Syrian Legation when the Department received a memo from the Military Permit Office.
