> stand. Get curtains washed and ready. Send big rugs to the cleaner from the old house, to be delivered by him to the new. Have a professional packer pack dishes, pictures, etc. His labor will cost less than the breaking of one treasure.

> Engage your mover, and have him make an estimate of the cost beforehand. Do not let him persuade you to have one van and two men make two trips. Unless impossible get enough men and enough vans to do it all in one trip. Five men is an ideal number.

> Pack dressers tightly. When the mirrors are removed, put the screws and fixings in the top drawer of each dresser. Lock drawers the last thing, and keep all keys on one ring. Let the housewife hang on to the keys and her house plans like grim

> Get the new house cleaned, windows washed, etc., see to gas, electricity, telephone before moving. Plan everything possible before the great day.

Have the movers place every large piece of furniture in its appointed place. They will usually screw on mirrors and set up beds. Bedding for each bed should be roped in one roll.

That's all. Keep your head and don't get rattled. Don't change plans at the last minute. If you have made a mistake in placing furniture, you can stand it that way for a few weeks, and move it when you have nothing else to do.

Three days, by this method, should see any house settled and homelike. The main thing is to believe that it can be done easily and in order, and to co-operate with the men who do the work instead of antagonizing them.
