

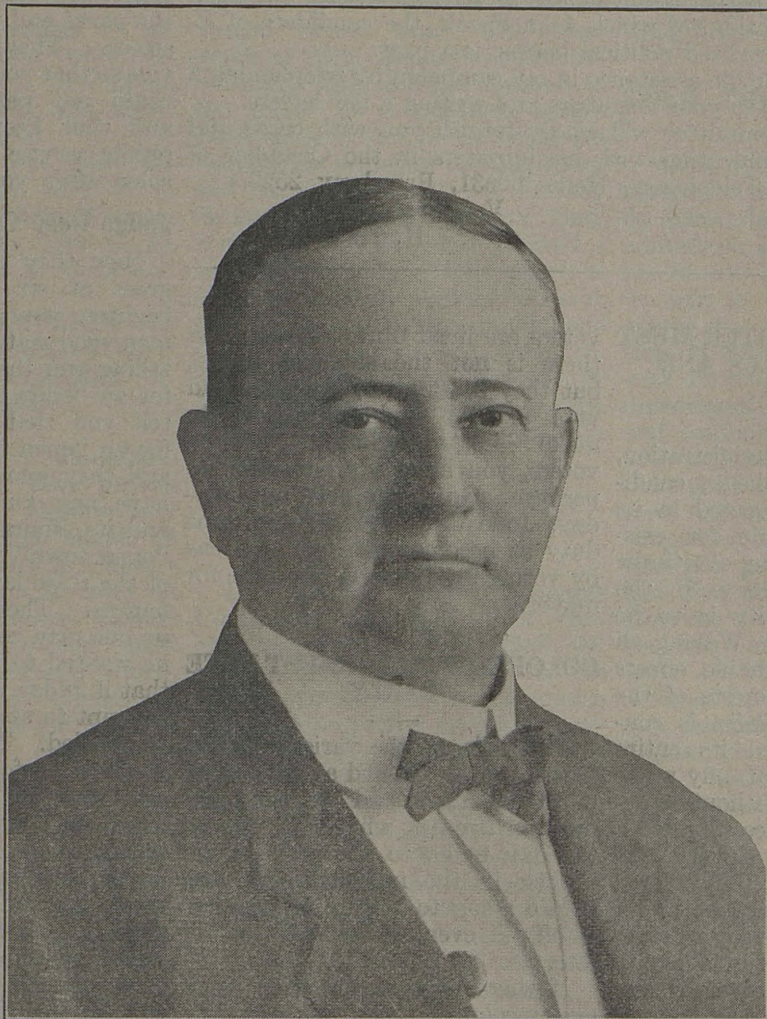

EVERY COLORED VOTER MUST GO TO THE POLLS AND VOTE

The Alexander administration, represented by Mr. Shenk, candidate for mayor, is engaged in its final desperate struggle for existence. Its overwhelming overthrow is absolutely necessary if the government of this city is to be rescued from bossism. Waving all discussion of its damnable effects upon the business interests of the city, so far as the Negro is concerned, it has exerted its entire force in an effort to not only make the Negro pay taxes without representation, but to reduce them to a position worse than slavery. In the present struggle the colored voters have the balance of power and it is up to them to say whether Alexander shall still run the city—through Shenk—or give the city a clean, progressive, business-like administration by the election of Judge Rose as mayor. In every great crisis that has confronted the people of this country, whether local or national, by throwing his strength on the right side the Negro has saved the day. In the crisis now confronting this city the people are again looking to the Negro for rescue. In order to prove true to the trust reposed in them, every Negro voter must go to the polls and vote on Tuesday, June 3rd. That nine-tenths of the colored

voters are lined up for Judge Rose there is not the slightest doubt, but they must go to the polls and vote for the Judge in order to make him victorious. Colored voters, you have a proud duty to perform. Go to the polls on Tuesday, June 3rd, and perform that duty as becomes men and citizens by voting for Judge H. H. Rose for mayor.

COLORED WOMEN MUST VOTE EARLY

The polls, at the various polling places, will be opened at six o'clock in the morning, and we especially urge our women who work out by the day to go to the polls at six o'clock in the morning and vote before going to work. If you put it off till evening you will be too late.

If there ever was a time when every colored woman in the city should vote it is now. Mr. Shenk, the Alexander candidate for mayor, is a part of the Alexander administration and backed by the Alexander administration. It was Mr. Shenk who ruled that it was neither extortion nor a violation of the law to charge a Negro five dollars for an article that was sold to a white man for five cents. The object of this ruling is to enable ice cream parlors, lunch counters and coffee houses to insult our women and girls by charging them five dollars

for a dish of ice cream, a cup of coffee or a glass of soda water. By this ruling Mr. Shenk intended for dealers to nullify the civil rights bill of this state without paying the penalty.

It was the Alexander administration that took your husbands out the parks and their teams off of the streets. They packed the civil service so that your sons and daughters could not pass the examinations and thus keep them out of the public service on account of their color after you educated them.

Judge Rose Cannot Open Town.

Now they have bought up Negroes at six dollars per day to frighten you into voting for the men who hate you and yours by telling you that Judge Rose stands for an "open town." When people tell you that Judge Rose stands for an "open town," they are lying and they know it; because if they have any knowledge of this city and its affairs, they know that an "open town" would be a violation of the state laws and the city ordinances. They know further that no one man could open this town if he wanted to, and they know also, that if Judge Rose as mayor should attempt to open the town he would be recalled. The trouble with these Negroes is, for a few dollars they are violating every principle of manhood and womanhood and are trying to slander Judge Rose and his supporters by telling you that they are advocating an "open town." Refresh your memory regarding the character of some of these people who are attempting to slander the Negro men and women who are fighting Alexander and Shenk for drawing the color line on the Negroes and closing the door of hope to our boys and girls. Place your stamp of condemnation upon these would be traitors by voting for Judge Rose.

THREE GREAT ROSE MEETINGS

The Rose meeting conducted by the ladies under the leadership of Mrs. Katherine E. Barr at Furlong

tract on Friday evening, May 23rd, was one of the largest political meetings ever held under the auspices of the colored women in the city. Although a large contingent of the Rose supporters were called away to attend secret-order meetings, the hall was packed to the doors. Able addresses were delivered by Mr. H. S. McCallum, Gen. Frank S. Prescott, and Attorney Leroy D. Barnett.

Short addresses were also delivered by Mrs. Barr, Mrs. B. S. Thompson, secretary of the Womans Campaign Committee, Mrs. G. D. Taylor and Mr. Titus N. Alexander.

THE SHENK CAMPAIGN AMONG THE COLORED VOTERS HAS COMPLETELY COLLAPSED

The Shenk colored six-dollars-per-day campaigners have proven a boomerang to him. Despite their efforts they have been unable to arouse any enthusiasm in Shenk's behalf. Their attempt to carry on a campaign of slander against Judge Rose was frowned upon everywhere by the colored voters, as it deserved. Every attempt to organize a Shenk club fell flat; the membership of the clubs never rising higher than their officers. Their final rally at Scott's Hall proved a howling failure, there being but twenty-seven present, counting speakers, Rose people and all. In the face of the treatment that the Alexander administration has accorded the Negroes, and Mr. Shenk's base attempt through his infamous ruling to popularize the cowardly color line, even the toleration of the attempt by certain Negroes to induce members of their race to vote for Shenk is proof of the Negroes' patience and obedience to law. The colored voters in this particular have acted the part which becomes good citizens by treating the "Shenk Negroes" with silent contempt.

BIG ROSE MEETING

Pushing their whirlwind campaign, Mrs. Barr and her secretary,

Mrs. Thompson, arranged for the big open air meeting held in front of the residence of Mrs. S. Bedney, at Council and Occidental streets, on Wednesday evening the 28th. This proved to be a big Rose meeting—the great body of men and women turned out. The front porch of Mrs. Bedney's residence, brilliantly lighted, was donated to the ladies as a speakers stand. Both sides of the porch being enclosed with beautiful running roses, and the front yard being literally decked with roses of every kind, it proved an ideal place to hold a great Rose rally. The speakers and the audience seemed to catch the inspiration of the scene, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. Able addresses were delivered by Leroy Barnett, Titus Alexander, Thomas P. White and J. W. Bell.

THE FINAL ROSE RALLY

The Ladies' Rose Campaign Committee will hold their final campaign rally at Scott's Hall, 561 Central Ave., June 2nd. As the entire Woman's Rose Campaign Committee of fifty prominent colored women, representing every section of the city, are taking a hand in this great rally, it bids fair to eclipse anything of the kind ever held in the city. The speakers for the occasion will be: Judge H. H. Rose, the next mayor, H. S. McCallum, Gen. Frank S. Prescott and Attorney Leroy D. Barnett. Everybody is cordially invited.

Too much credit cannot be given Mrs. Barr and her able secretary, Mrs. B. S. Thompson. Seeing that there was an attempt on the part of certain of the Shenk leaders to mislead the colored women and distract their attention from principles of the campaign involving the rights of the colored people, the two ladies named volunteered their services to the Rose managers to take up the fight among the colored women. They arranged a number of Rose Teas at the residence of colored women in various parts of the city and soon

formed a Rose campaign committee consisting of fifty of the leading colored women. As a result they will close with Monday night's meeting one of the most brilliant campaigns ever held here—a campaign that swept everything before it.

TOLD THEM WHAT TO SAY

When the colored contingent had agreed to support Shenk—backed by Alexander and his Negro-hating administration—they inquired of the Shenk managers: "What must we say to our people when they charge the Alexander administration, of which Mr. Shenk is a part, with drawing the color line in every department of the city's service, and confining all Negroes, regardless of fitness, to cleaning cuspidors and sweeping streets?" "You just tell them that Judge Rose stands for an "open town," and that *you people stand for decency*, and that the supporters of Judge Rose are those who stand for *brothels and indecency*." When the facts are that Los Angeles never suffered from so much immorality and scandal involving men of the highest standing as the city does now. Under the Alexander administration vice is scattered everywhere, white slavery and wholesale rape are of every day occurrence, and the character of no man, high or low, is safe. But the Negroes are not fools. They know that Judge Rose cannot and would not open the town. They understand the whole Lissner dodge and will not be fooled. They have an opportunity to put the Alexander administration out of business and they will do it. The naming of the next mayor of this city is in the hands of the Negroes, and they will call his name Rose.

The fact that the Times and the Express and Tribune have buried their differences and are supporting Shenk for Mayor is proof that some conspiracy is being hatched against the working people, who pay all of the taxes.

THE NEGROES' FRIENDS ARE ALL SUPPORTING JUDGE ROSE FOR MAYOR

If the colored voters were undecided as to whom they would support in this campaign for mayor, there is one fact in this connection that would throw them in line for Judge Rose. And that fact is, that every man who is known to be friendly to the Negroes are supporting Judge Rose. For instance, ex-mayor Hazard, who appointed the first two Negroes on the police force, is now supporting Judge Rose; ex-mayor Snyder, who appointed five times more Negroes in the public service than all the other Los Angeles mayors put together

is supporting Judge Rose. Mayor Snyder put Negroes in the police and fire departments and had them appointed as sewer flushers in the street department, put thirty-two of them in the parks, and had their teams employed on the streets. He ran upon a civil service platform secured its adoption and blocked every attempt to stack the cards against the Negroes in the civil service.

Ex-mayor McAleer, who succeeded Mayor Snyder, pursued the same policy. They (ex-mayor Hazard, ex-mayor Snyder and ex-mayor McAleer) are members of the Rose campaign committee. And every public man who, as such, has given the Negroes manly consideration is supporting Judge Rose for Mayor.

Supporting Shenk.

Every public man who has refused to give the Negroes manly consideration is supporting Shenk. Mayor Alexander, who was recently recalled, and under whose administration all of the Negroes have been taken out of the parks, and all of their teams taken off of the streets, and whose administration has stacked the cards against them in the civil service; Mayor Alexander, whose administration has propagated more schemes to cheat the Negro out of his rights than all of the others put together is supporting Shenk. The fact is, he was the first to suggest Shenk's name as candidate for Mayor. Every member of the Board of Supervisors who voted to keep colored girls out of the nurse training school of the County Hospital on account of their color, is supporting Shenk. Every man holding a clerkship in the city hall or court house, who refuses to give Negroes representation in his office, is supporting Shenk. Every saloon-keeper and restaurant-keeper, who wants the privilege to insult Negroes, is supporting Shenk. Every moving picture show owner, who wants to exhibit mobs lynching Negroes is supporting Shenk. Every dishonest, corrupt politician who would use a little money during election

times to get the Negro vote and ignore him afterwards is supporting Shenk. Every politician who believes that, regardless of fitness, no Negro should be given consideration above that of cleaning cuspidors and sweeping streets, is supporting Shenk. The political mountebank, who authorized Wm. E. Easton, the homeless political vagabond of the city, to write threatening letters to the colored employees of the city and county, warning them to come out for Shenk or lose their jobs, is supporting Shenk. Every Negro who puts a dollar above principle; every Negro who puts a dollar above manhood rights is supporting Shenk.

You, thoughtful, self-respecting colored voter: which crowd will you vote with on election day?

THE TIMES' SUPPORT WILL DEFEAT SHENK

Among the many reasons why the Negro should vote against Shenk, no reason for the Negro voting against him stands out stronger than the support he is getting from the Los Angeles Times. If there are two classes of people that the Times hates with a bitterness equal to wormwood and gall it is the Negroes, and the white men who labor and want pay for it. Despite the fact that the Negroes pay the Times something like \$50,000 per year for subscriptions and have sympathized with it in all of its struggles, it never loses an opportunity to create a mean public sentiment against them. While it does not directly attack the Negroes it keeps its columns open like the maw of the main sewer of a big city to receive and distribute any and all filth that may be aimed at them. Every mean, dispicable, venal, ignorant Negro-hater can vent his spleen against Negroes through the columns of the Times. Every non-progressive, malevolent little soul in the community who realizes that despite his advantages he cannot compete with the Negro when the Negro is given a square deal, is

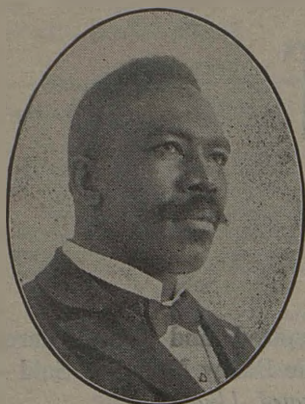
